Dear Commissioners,

We at GRACE appreciate the time and attention that the Board has given to the public outcry following the death of Capone. We recognize that these decisions are difficult, not every situation is black and white, and sometimes wrong decisions will be made despite good intentions and overall improvement.

However, after only two years into this new program, we should not delude ourselves into thinking that the staff has all the tools and knowledge at their disposal to make consistently good decisions for every animal coming into the shelter. We need to recognize that we are low on the learning curve in some areas of shelter reform. We can choose to learn and grow from the death of Capone, or we can become defensive, dig in our heels and become stunted.

Commissioner Shapiro's suggestion that GCAC develop a written standard operating procedure and utilize Maddie's Fund's Pet Evaluation Matrix is not an insult. These are best practice tools utilized by role model shelters in our state and across the nation. This Matrix will help staff make information-driven decisions with less stress and with greater consistency. Director Paul Wallace has indicated in previous conversations that he intended to develop written procedures for all shelter responsibilities. This initiative is well aligned with his stated vision.

Although you may not be aware, Capone is not the first animal to lose his life to a questionable medical euthanasia decision under the current shelter leadership. There have been several situations where a euthanasia decision has been inconsistent when compared to other animals with similar ailments, and there is at least one extreme example that would have been just as damaging to the GCAC reputation had the situation been known to the general public.

Dougie was a young cat that came into the shelter on November 16, 2016 and was killed on November 27. The cat was underweight and appeared dehydrated. Per the medical history that we obtained via FOIA, see attached, Dr. McCormick did not examine him for these observations because she could not locate him. He was sent to be neutered despite the concern for his overall health: a decision we cannot understand. When he returned from his neuter, volunteers reported he was lethargic and not using the litter box as much as he should be. The cat was not reported as straining as the notes record, and the cat was not acting painful at all. He was purring and cuddling in laps, not hiding or hissing, etc.

Without even a physical exam, and without either Renea Kennedy or the veterinarian observing the cat first hand, he was ordered to be killed. This was based upon what the veterinarian suspected *may be* going wrong with him after two verbal descriptions of the cat's behavior. No physical exam, no diagnostic test. This was devastating to the volunteers, and in our view, a major failure.

With a single phone call, the cat could have been transferred to a private cat rescue that would have used private donation money to obtain the proper diagnostics and make a fully informed medical decision. Meanwhile, the cat would have been in a foster home and been observed for any changes in status. GCAC would have had another live release, and the trust that the volunteers had in the team would have been maintained. Dougie may have gone on to live a happy life, or he may have been euthanized anyway, but either way our community would know that GCAC gave him every chance, and that GCAC is a safe place for our lost and homeless pets. Medical euthanasia should always be a choice of last resort.

Even with the best tools in place, an unpopular decision may be made in the future. However, should that occur, wouldn't it be better to have not only the staff opinion, but also a sound, best practice protocol to explain how that decision was made? Wouldn't that take some of the pressure off of the staff in these situations?

We urge you to require the GCAC staff to develop a written standard operating procedure utilizing the Maddie's Fund Pet Evaluation Matrix model. Not only will this make future decisions easier and more defensible, it will send a clear message to the public that the Genesee County Board of Commissioners is committed to continuous improvement at GCAC.

This had happened several times this day. discussed with Director this is an emergency where by the cat is unable to urinate because his urethra is obstructed. This is a unique problem to tom cats. In the best of situations with anesthesia to relieve the blockage, it can reoccur. This is most often a fatal complication of UTI/ dietary intolerance/ or unique metabolic issue. Humane euthanasia is a reasonable option.



Permission is being sought to submit a JSLG-2018 grant.

The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services, in collaboration with the Michigan Committee on Juvenile Justice, has issued a Request for Proposal to support juveniles and the juvenile justice system. The funds are intended to support expansion of services in four priority areas: data, diversion, drug/mental health courts, and school justice.

The submission deadline is July 20, 2017 at 3:00 pm. The anticipated dates of the program are October 1, 2017 through September 30, 2019. The maximum request amount is \$150,000 for the two-year period, and there is no match required from the County.

Your review of the request is appreciated and the Court will be represented at the Governmental Operations meeting.

MDHHS issues RFP to support juvenile justice system

LANSING, Mich. – The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS), in collaboration with the Michigan Committee on Juvenile Justice, has issued a Request for Proposal (RFP) to support juveniles and the juvenile justice system.

Funds from this grant opportunity are intended to support expansion of services for youth ages ten years old to 17 years old in four priority areas identified by the Committee on Juvenile Justice. The four priority areas are data, diversion, drug/mental health courts, and school justice.

Eligible applicants for this grant opportunity must be local units of government – courts, law enforcement agencies, county prosecutors – that work with or come in contact with juveniles that are at risk for, or are already involved in, the court system in the State of Michigan.

The Michigan Committee on Juvenile Justice provides advice, suggestions and solutions to Governor Rick Snyder on juvenile justice issues. The Committee works collaboratively with the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services and other agencies. The Committee has been instrumental in changing practices, policies, and philosophies to improve the juvenile justice system.

Grant applications must be submitted electronically through the MI E-Grants program. Applications will be accepted through July 20, 2017, at 3 p.m.
