



AED Automatic External Defibrillator

We have had at least 1 of these for about 15 years. Today we have 13 which most of where paid for by donations from individuals, groups and area businesses. Also 3 we received from a grant from the Federal Government.



Combi-tubes

A non visualized airway is a relatively new skill for First Responders . It was approved for us by our Medical director Dr. Mark Westphal. Every First Responder is trained and carries Combi-tubes in our bags at all times.



Epi-Pens

These are common for people who are allergic to bee bites. Also a relatively new skill for First Responders Dr. Westphal also approved this for use. We are all trained on how to use these. People who carry these know they are fairly easy to use.
