


2011 Calls

- Average of between 5-6 responders per call




Calls by Time

2010






Calls by Type

2010






Calls/Month by Type

CCR is our new CPR

Earlier in the year our Medical Director Dr. Mark Westphal explained that we would be starting CCR (cardio-cerebral Resuscitation) instead of CPR. The difference between CCR and CPR is if we witness the arrest we hook up our AED and analyze immediately. If we don't witness an arrest, we start With compressions of at least 100 per minute and at least 2 Inches in depth without breaths. We check for airway obstruction and then place a non-visualized airway (combi tube). We attach our AED and let it analyze our patient, if instructed to continue CPR we would give a ventilation every 10 compressions.

This is a change from our normal but is approved by Dr. Westphal and will probably be taught this way in the near future.
