

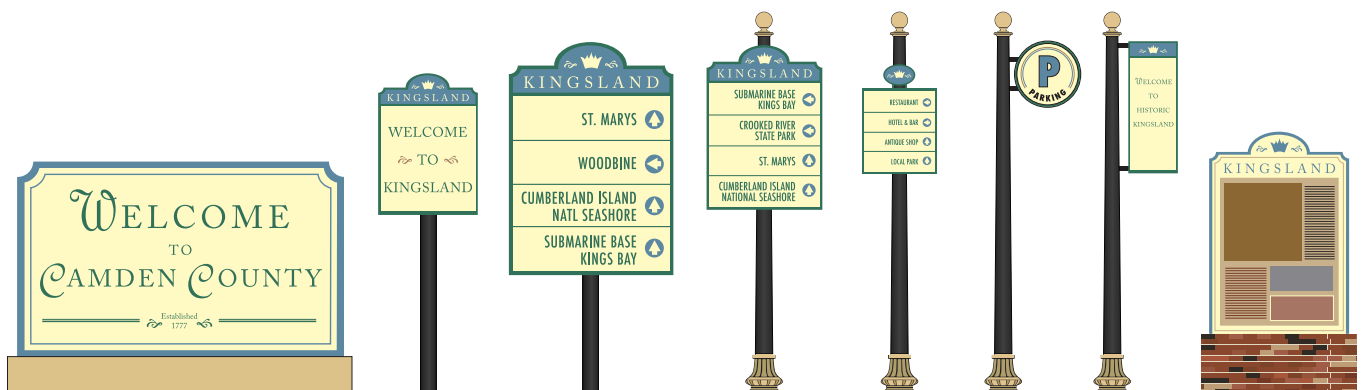

I. INTRODUCTION

In September 2006, the Camden County Board of Commissioners and the cities of Kingsland, Saint Marys, and Woodbine solicited proposals to plan a wayfinding system for the county and its municipalities. The initiative was an outgrowth of the local governments' collective decision to grow clearly and with quality. It was an attempt to retain the historic ease of visiting Camden County while acknowledging, embracing, and harnessing the new energies and resources that greet visitors and sustain local residents.

The wayfinding system was financed by a grant available to communities that have received the Signature Communities designation from the Georgia Department of Community Affairs. Signature Communities are selected based on their record of and potential for real, measurable achievement. Signature Communities are described by the agency as being "serious about improving local quality of life through effective planning, implementation, and taking a comprehensive approach to addressing community improvement issues."

The wayfinding system is just such a project. Identified by the County as a key initiative in its comprehensive plan, the wayfinding system was the subject of a Signature Community grant application. Part of the impetus for the project was a 2005 study prepared by the Georgia Institute of Technology's Center for Quality Growth and Regional Development for the Camden Partnership, Inc., the Camden County Public Service Authority, and the Camden Children's Alliance & Resources, Inc. That study recommended an effective wayfinding system as one component in a comprehensive redevelopment strategy for the county. Similar recommendations were made following a Quality Growth Resource Team visit conducted by the Georgia Department of Community Affairs. That report, produced for the local governments and presented during a public meeting at the conclusion of the visit, noted a need for sign regulations to coordinate and direct the location, size, and appearance of signs as a method of encouraging and managing quality growth. Representatives from each of the four municipalities participated in the stakeholders committee that guided project development.

II. PURPOSE

Wayfinding is the process by which one travels to a destination in an unfamiliar environment. A wayfinding system uses navigational elements to guide travelers, while simultaneously enhancing a municipality's identity. Well-designed, well-placed signs create aesthetic harmony in a community and reinforce a positive sense of place for visitors. In addition, a wayfinding system can:

- ♦ *help visitors and residents find their way.* Historically, major roads have taken visitors to town and city centers. However, bypasses and interstates have changed travel patterns and, today, many major thoroughfares take visitors around downtowns and central business districts. Wayfinding systems help connect their users: tourists and residents are able to locate destinations, goods, and services, and business owners reach patrons;
- ♦ *promote pedestrian friendly environment.* This is especially true at the pedestrian level. Wayfinding systems ease the challenges for visitors associated with traversing an unfamiliar district and help make changes and improvements a positive experience for residents. They orient newcomers, provide updated information to those familiar with the area, and publicize special events for all; and,
- ♦ *reduce congestion.* Wayfinding systems provide guidance at key gateways, interchanges, and destinations that prepares visitors for changes to travel conditions, course, and speed. Successful systems link uses, destinations, and districts, allowing local and visiting patrons to experience the community as the cohesive sum of its parts.

III. OBJECTIVES

In general, wayfinding systems are composed of coordinated informational and directional signs intended to assist visitors on the interstate, county roads, state roads, and city streets. The Camden County wayfinding plan was based on this premise and guided by several specific, defining objectives:

- ◆ to provide visually appealing directional signage that is easily seen and easily read at critical points of travel that guide visitors to historic, recreational and civic destinations;
- ◆ to eliminate redundant and confusing signage, particularly at the base of the I-95 exits;
- ◆ to develop a system of signage that is compatible with GDOT signage;
- ◆ to create a system of signage that is appropriate in Camden County's varied contexts – including historic sites and viewsheds, centers of civic life, and recreational areas – that is both easily distinguished from and complimentary to existing signage; and,
- ◆ to design signs with a scale, typeface, position, and location that render them easy to see, read, understand, and use.

The objectives are all derived from a single goal: to produce a wayfinding system that will serve the present needs of the county and its three municipalities, and that will translate easily to new routes and destinations as the area continues to develop. In order to accomplish the project goals and objectives, the scope of the project included the evaluation of existing wayfinding elements, travel routes, and local destinations within the county and its three cities.

IV. METHODOLOGY

In November 2005, Camden County and the cities of Kingsland, Saint Marys, and Woodbine were among the first communities in the state to receive the Signature Communities designation from the Georgia Department of Community Affairs. In their application for the award, Camden County and the three municipalities listed a county-wide wayfinding system among their immediate goals for the community. In November 2006, the county and its cities contracted with Brockington and Associates, Inc. to design the wayfinding system using grant money available to Signature Community designees.

The first phase of the project was completed in January 2007, with the complete inventory, documentation, and analysis of existing conditions throughout the county. Planning for the wayfinding system began in the second phase of the project. A preliminary design for the signage was presented to the steering committee in June; revisions to the design were made immediately, thereafter. As of this draft, two public meetings are scheduled for October 4, 2007. Recommendations and input gathered at the public meetings will be incorporated into the final draft.

Current sign placements within the county and its three municipalities were located and documented using a Global Positioning System. GDOT traffic counts were used to identify and understand key traffic routes. The latest codes, ordinances, and sign standards, as well as the existing graphics, logos, and branding for each municipality were studied. In additions, a comprehensive database of existing tourism resources was compiled to inform Brockington's planning. The Brockington team made four site visits to Camden County between the winter of 2006 and spring of 2007. The goal of these visits was to familiarize the team with the existing conditions in the county and its cities, the types of signage in use, and planned future needs.

Background research and site visits were conducted to gather material for the creation of a database of tourism related resources. The database was used to guide thinking about resource themes as consistent signage hierarchy, usage patterns, and graphic elements were developed. This database can be found in the appendix. Existing signage was photographed and entered into a GPS system using photographs and handheld GPS

units. The information was entered into a database and mapped using a GIS system. The maps generated from the existing signage and resource databases were used as a point of departure in the development of the proposed wayfinding system plan.

In order to gauge local expectations for a wayfinding system, and to gather feedback on proposed designs, interviews were conducted with committee members and community representatives at three meetings during the contract period. Initial findings for routes and sign text were presented to the committee and refined based on members' input. Final designs for the signs were driven by local suggestions and reflect specific feedback. Community-wide feedback will be sought when the draft of the wayfinding plan is presented to the community on October 4, 2007. Feedback from those meetings will be incorporated into the final Camden County Wayfinding and Signage Master Plan.

V. ANALYSIS OF EXISTING CONDITIONS

Site visits conducted by the team revealed several general aspects about the existing wayfinding and signage in Camden County.

- ♦ Corridors are well defined and efficiently transfer travelers to their destination. The exits on I-95 serve as gateways to Camden County, and by process of natural growth, have become the major corridors in the county.
- ♦ A good variety of resources are available in which to “populate” the wayfinding system. Without important cultural, historic and natural resources to serve as destination points, the system cannot function as designed.

Five main issues arose during the initial investigations. The Master Plan seeks to alleviate these problems:

- ♦ The Existing signs, primarily those erected by the Georgia Department of Transportation, lack the community character and sense of place found in Camden County. The proposed graphics seek to establish the communities’ character through signage.
- ♦ Signs clutter many of the main roadways and interstate exits. Much of the clutter observed at key intersections is the result of individual signs, often with a single line of text, occupying individual mounting posts. The plan seeks to combine many of these individual signs, grouping them on a larger sign. The signage inventory took note of these cases.
- ♦ Much of the clutter is also the result of duplicate signs within a relatively small proximity. By inventorying these signs and addressing areas that have redundant signage, the Master Plan reduces the overall number of signs at most locations.
- ♦ The communities of Kingsland, St. Marys, and Woodbine lack adequate signage to individual communities.
- ♦ Gateways are poorly defined or defined by default (e.g. the I-95 interchange).

The existing routes of traffic were located with the assistance of traffic count data available

from the Georgia Department of Transportation. The data reveals that I-95 is the most heavily trafficked road in the county; however, the vast majority of this use is through-traffic that does not stop within the county. Behind I-95 in level of use are State Highway 40, 40 spur, and US 17. These roads serve as the primary arteries for vehicular traffic within the county and create gateways at each exit off of I-95. US 17 also serve as a north-south artery, with gateways at each end of the county. Because of the important role these main roads play in the routing of traffic in Camden County, they are the primary focus of the Master Plan.

VI. COMPONENTS OF THE CAMDEN COUNTY WAYFINDING SIGNAGE SYSTEM

- ◆ Gateway Signs

Gateway Signs announce arrival to a general area. They have the potential to substantially impact visitor and resident perceptions of a particular area, as they serve as an introduction to both the area the wayfinding system.
- ◆ Trailblazer Signs

Aptly named “Trailblazer Signs” guide motorists and pedestrians to general area or proximity of destination. They are, generally, the second largest signs in the system, and are used along major routes, where vehicles travel at higher speeds.
- ◆ Proximity Destination Signs

Proximity Destination Signs are also used to guide travelers, but they are used in areas of slower traffic, and tend to be more specific and smaller than Trailblazer Signs.
- ◆ Parking, Regulatory, and Identification Signs

Parking directional, regulatory, and identification signs familiarize visitors with local regulations and increase awareness of available facilities and parking resources.
- ◆ Pedestrian Signs

Pedestrian signs make areas more accessible to local and visiting users while enhancing sense of place.
- ◆ Kiosks

Sometimes valuable information is too detailed to be included on Gateway, Trailblazer, and other types of signs. Kiosks can provide visitors with specific information about the history, current events, and goods and services available in a central business district.

 - ▶ Kiosks provide a place for the posting of maps that reorient visitors after they have parked and give patrons a feeling for the distance between destinations.
 - ▶ Kiosks are an ideal place presenting historical information that will enhance visitors’ experience.
 - ▶ Kiosks are an easy way for business owners and event planners to disseminate information about local special events and entertainment.
 - ▶ The location and context of the kiosk should be considered when the display material for the kiosk is chosen.

- ▶ Because kiosks can take a variety of shapes, sizes, and functions, it is important to select a model that suits the purpose for which it is intended. For instance, maps and business listings are relatively low maintenance, requiring only periodic updates. But, special occasions and current events change regularly; kiosks displaying changeable information place greater demands on their managers. Therefore, a kiosk intended to keep visitors and residents apprised of local events might need to be larger, easier to access, or have more cases than a kiosk with displays that change with the seasons or a change in the business fabric of the downtown.
- ◆ Banners

Banners can be used in groups or individually to announce arrival or create a festival atmosphere. And, they have the potential to make a striking visual statement for a relatively modest expense.

 - ▶ System planners and downtown managers must be mindful of the overall wayfinding system and be sure that plan elements are in place to convey information and that they do not clutter.
 - ▶ Banners should never be used for decoration, alone, as such use confuses the wayfinding system and detracts from the aesthetic fabric of a successful downtown.
- ◆ Branding

Community branding is an important part of wayfinding, but electronic and printed materials are much easier to edit, revise, and redesign than signs, which have an average lifespan of 15 - 20 years. Paper and digital maps, websites, and brochures are key tools for reinforcing a community brand in a wayfinding system. They also help bridge vehicular and pedestrian travel experiences.

However, it is important to brand existing websites, maps, brochures, and other materials and incorporate them seamlessly into the wayfinding system, if they are to bolster the brand and the overall system. It is also necessary for these digital and printed materials to display the same basic symbols as the signage. Additional visual components will clutter the brand, weaken the wayfinding system, and diminish the impact of visitors' experience.

VII. DESIGN VISION

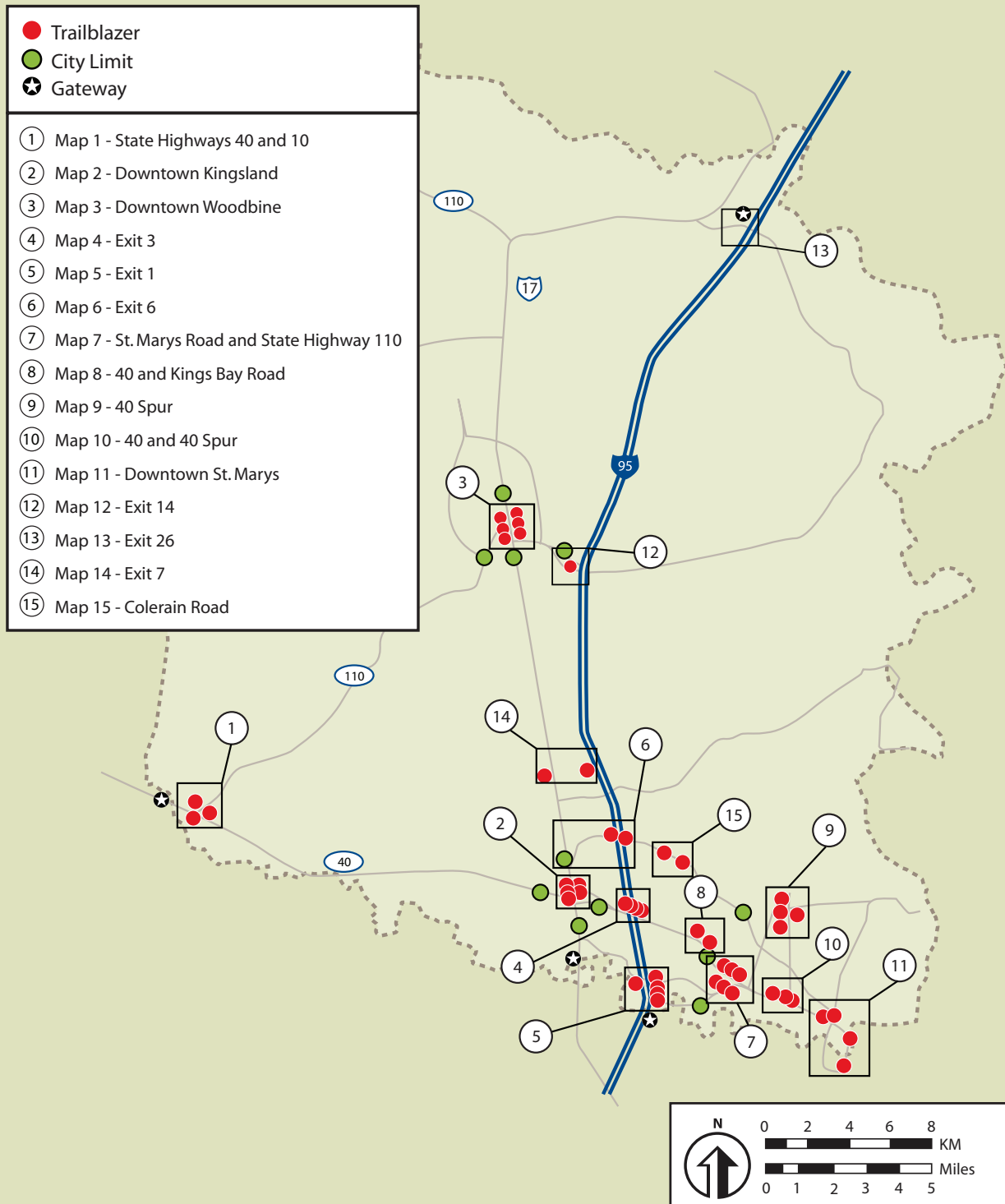
The design vision for the Camden County Wayfinding System was influenced by a set of design criteria, the need for signage in key locations around the county, established and planned routes of travel, and branding graphics. The system's signs will be simply and consistently designed, with a minimum number of unique symbols, like logos, adopted specifically for the community. This will diminish visual clutter along vehicular and pedestrian travel routes and enable visitors to gain familiarity with the system. Other design criteria include:

- ◆ The size and shape of the signs and lettering will be uniform and consistent, in order to better orient visitors and strengthen the county-wide brand.
- ◆ The typeface will be easy to read, with adequate space between letters, words and lines of type.
- ◆ Messages conveyed by the signage will be as clear and concise as possible.
- ◆ The signs will be easily identified in their environment.
- ◆ Recommended placements will be low enough to be read by cars and pedestrians, but high enough to not be obscured by sports utility vehicles, trucks, or other large vehicles.
- ◆ Lettering will be of appropriate scale given the distance the viewer will be from the sign, and reflective material will be used to insure night visibility.

The following maps and table depict the proposed signage locations and text for the county's wayfinding system. Also included are designs for the individual signs, with human figures for scale references.

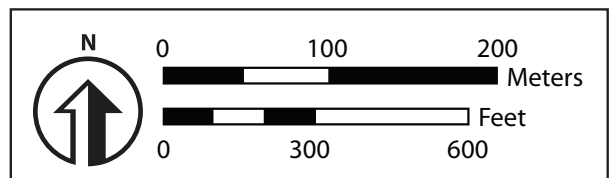
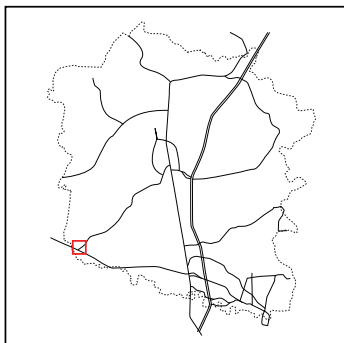
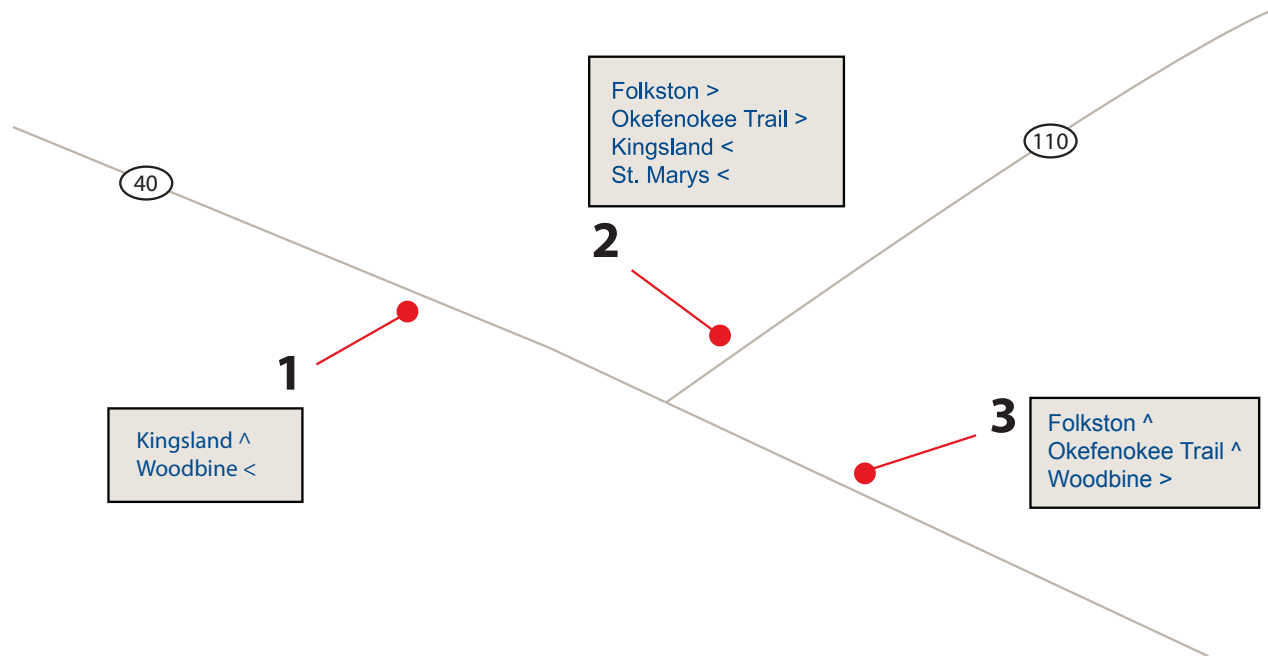
Camden County Wayfinding and Signage Master Plan

Signage Locations and Text



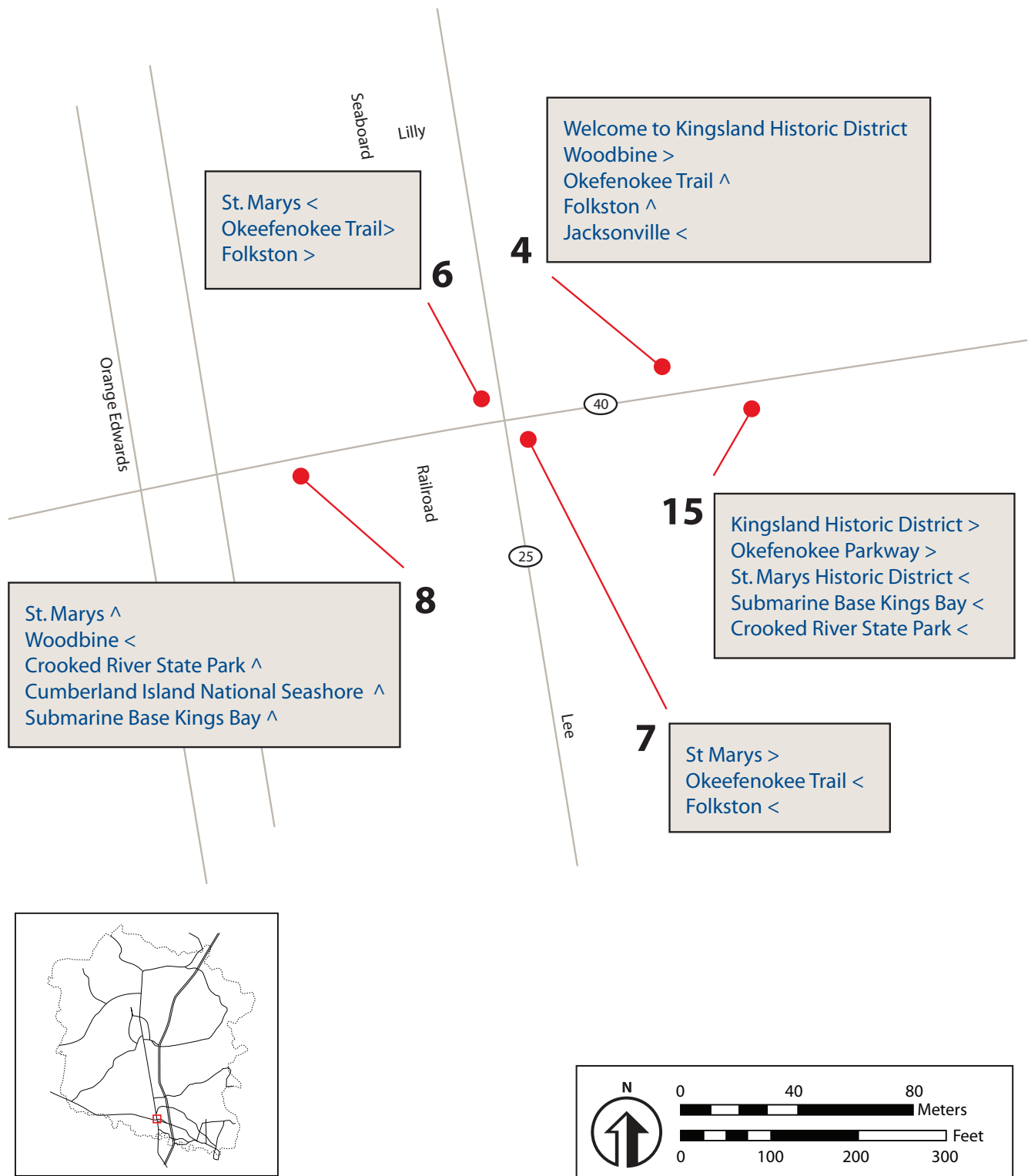
Map 1

State Highways 40 and 110



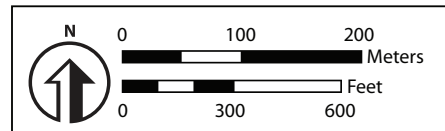
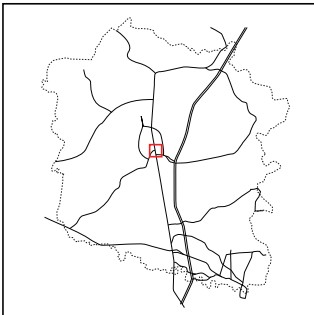
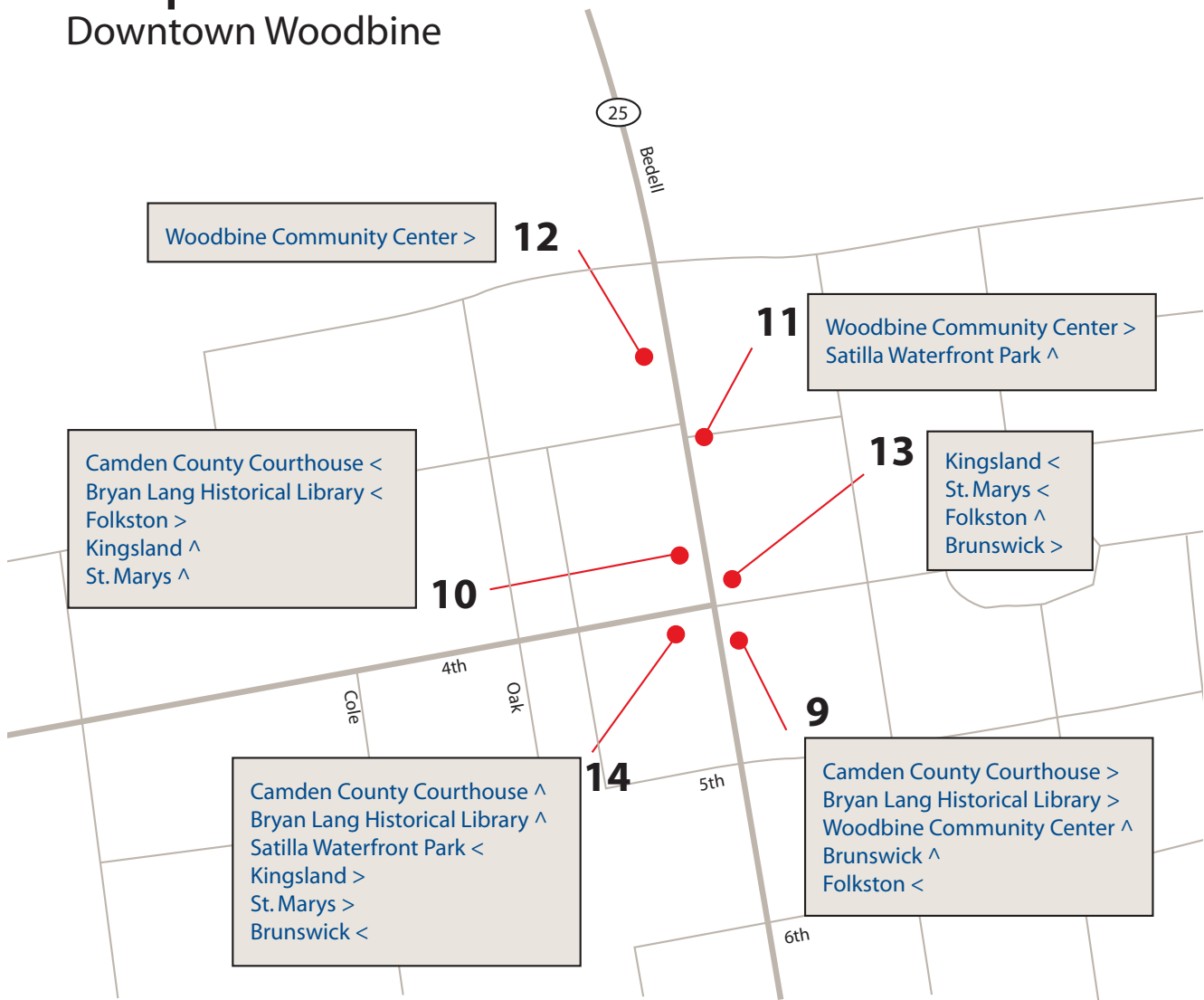
Map 2

Downtown Kingsland



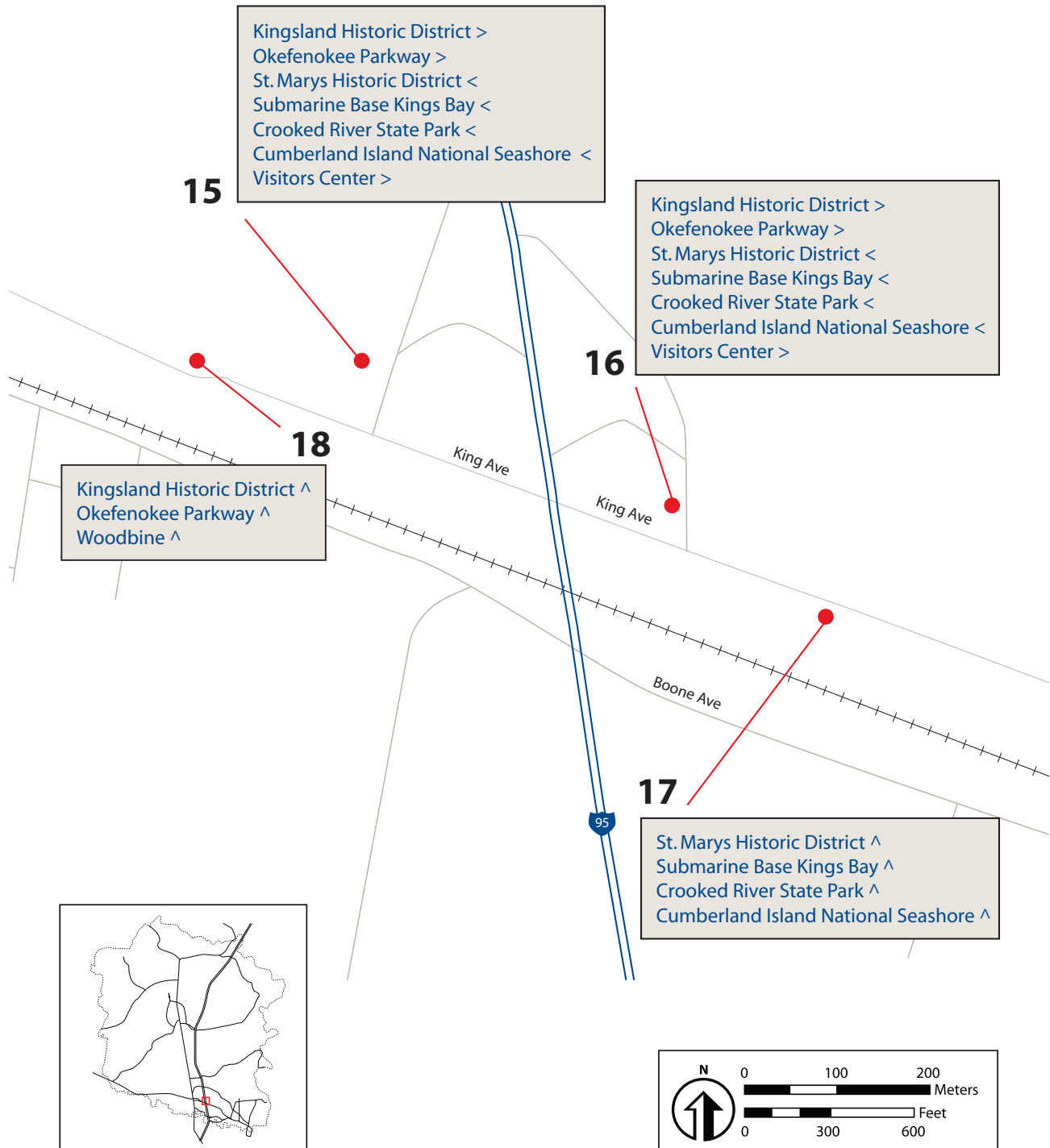

Downtown Woodbine



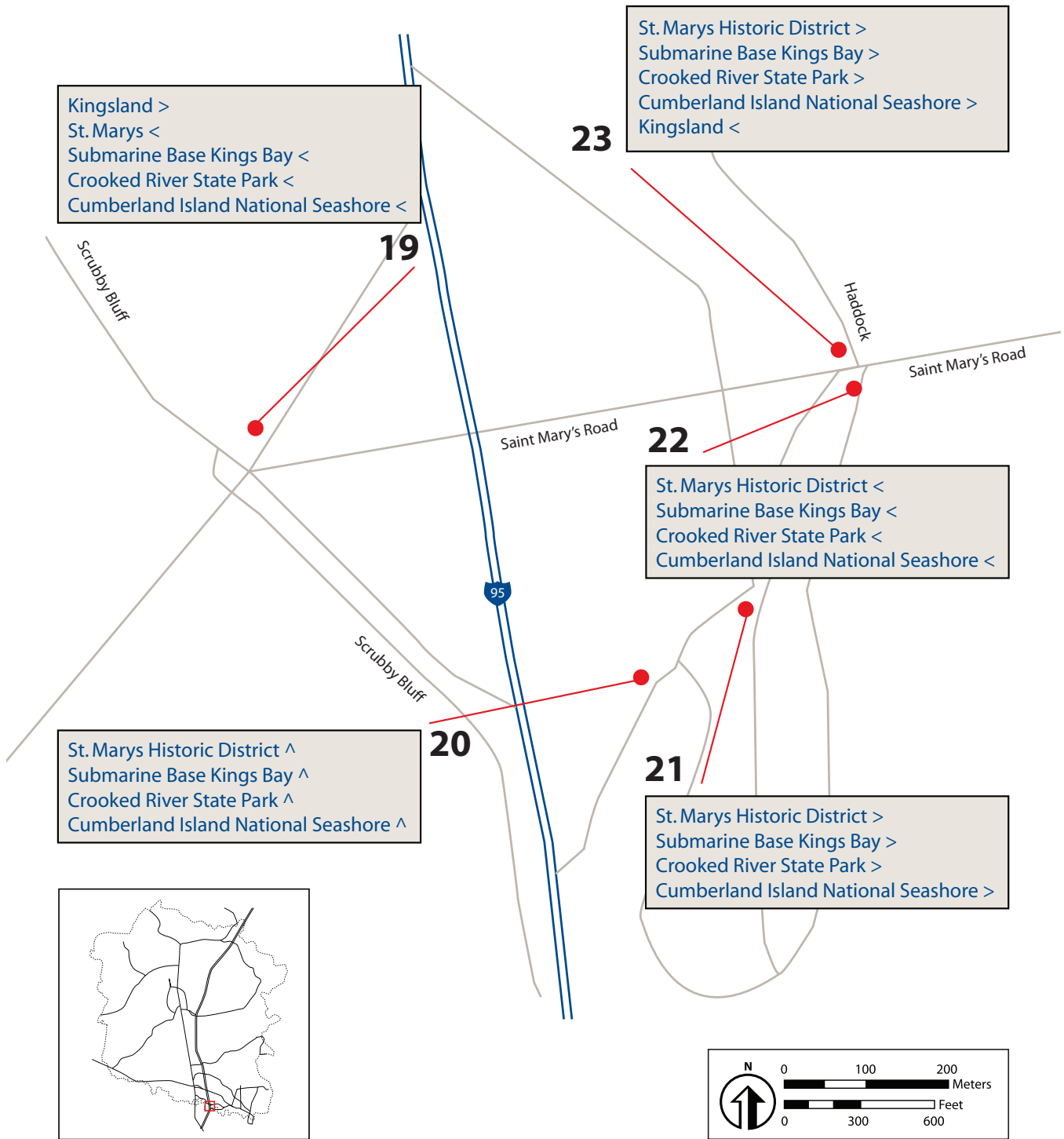

St. Marys Road and State Highway 110



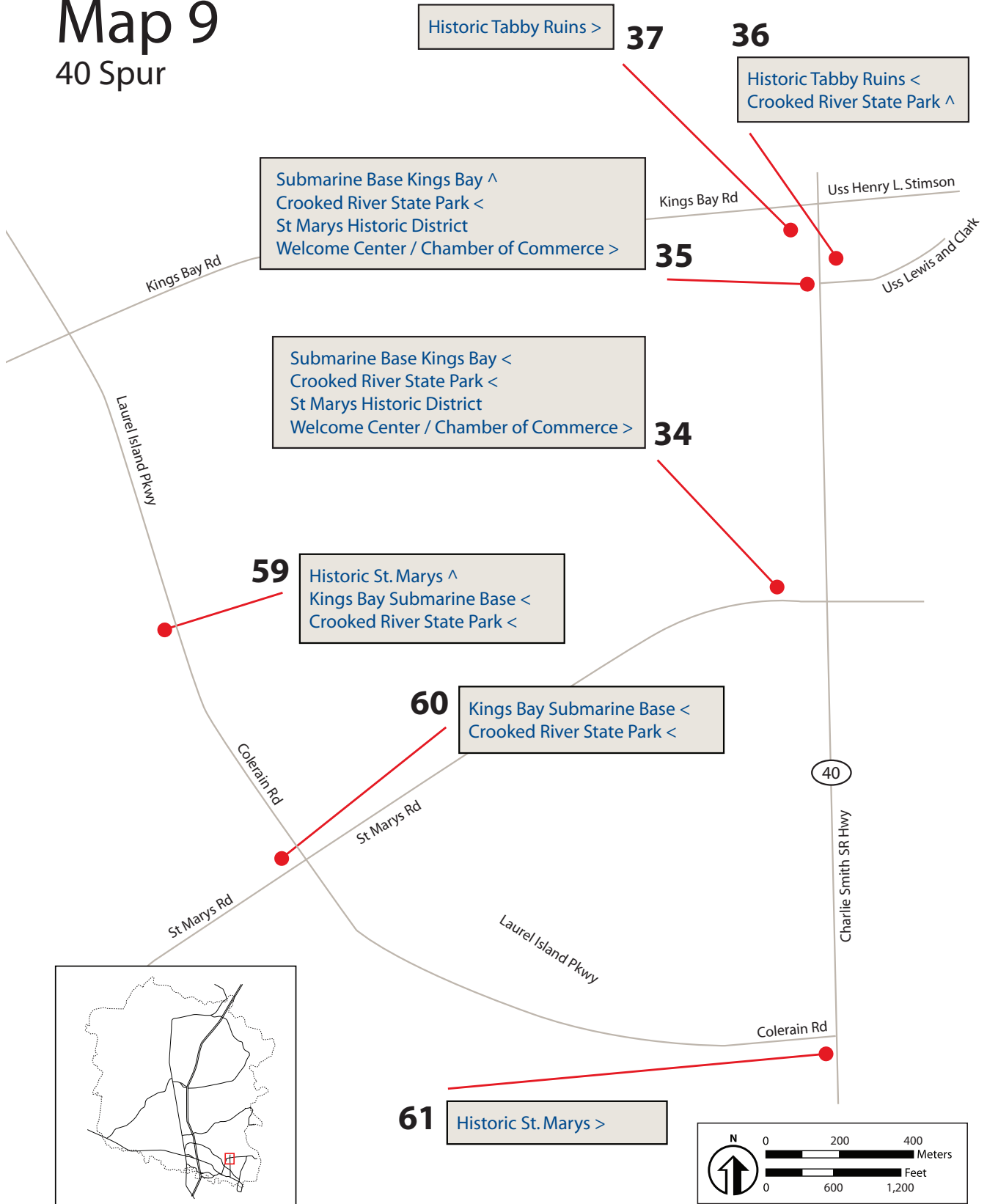

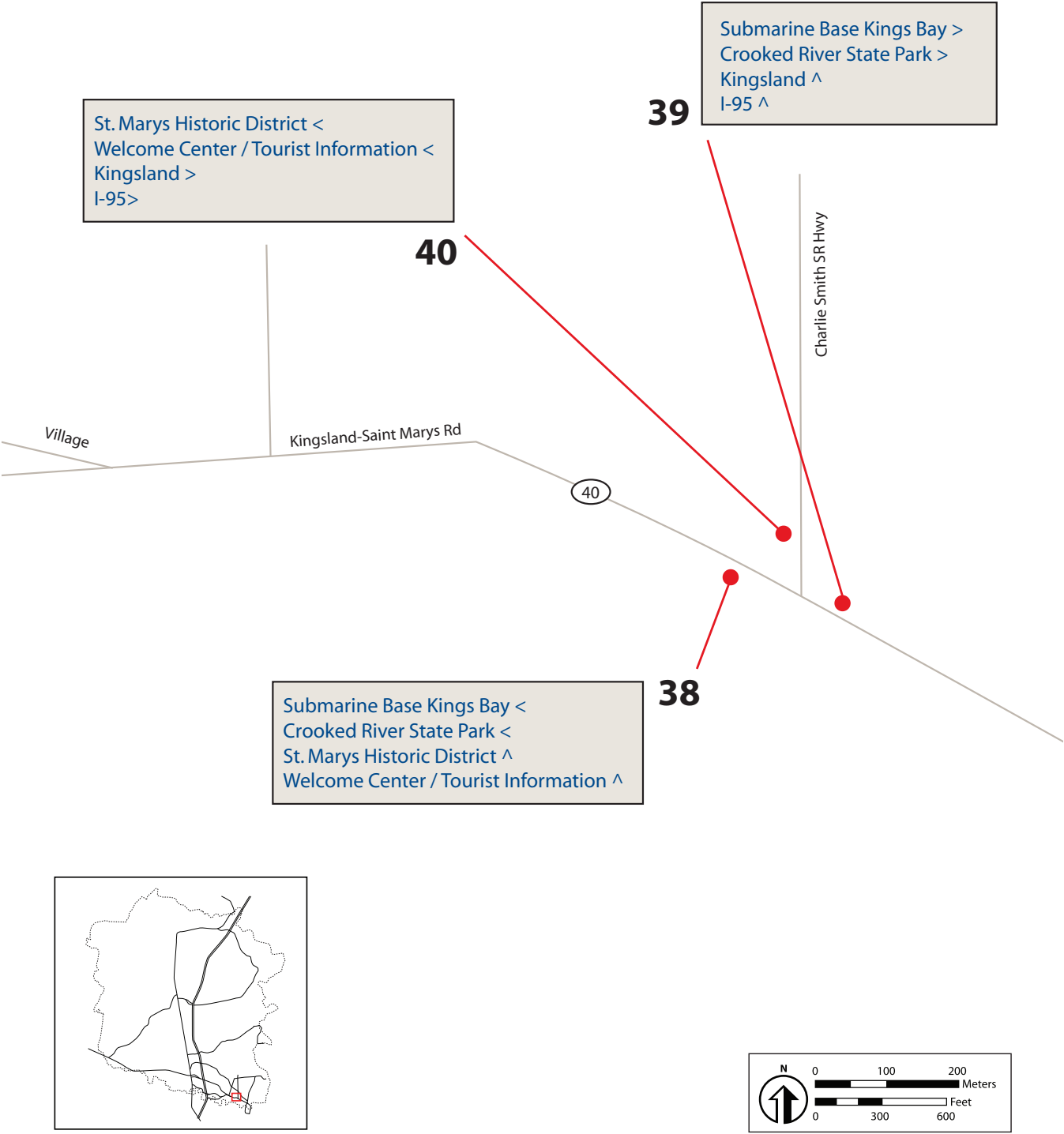

VIII. ENGINEERING SPECIFICATIONS
