Council Member White - Since the last meeting I attended the Budget Fiscal Management Workshop. Very interesting and informative.

Council Member Cook - None

Chief Schrimpscher - We responded to 635 calls for service in the month of July. There were 424 traffic stops resulting in 211 traffic citations and infractions. National night out was a success with five events held. I extended my gratitude to all the hosts for their hard work and also acknowledge Corporal Phan for leading the the organization of the events. Two officers are undergoing field training and both are making good progress. Officer Hardnett is in phase three and Officer Mozafari is nearing completion of phase two. We are gearing up for Algona Day which will involve the entire A-Team's involvement. I have been working on the budget for 2025. We are currently at 59% of our annual budget and are projected to stay within or under budget.

City Administrator, Jessica Griess - Former Mayor Hill's celebration of life occurred on August 10th. With family present, they were invited to do an impromptu ground breaking after the ceremony. The Ellingson Overlay project is set to begin the week of the 12th. Gray and Osborn has started the geotechnical work on our NW property and has installed testing wells. They have scheduled surveying for this month. Algona Days will be on August 24th. Fun for all. Our new phone system was installed on June 17th and 19th. We are not happy with the service provided and are now moving to a different company. The ETA for the new phones is 8/15. The crew rented a street sweeper for two weeks. It has been a great asset for cleaning up the streets after working on ditches and helpful for prepping for Algona Day. Gary officially has a grandbaby. Congrats Gary.

Mayor Linnell - We are still working on the speed limits. My favorite project so far has been what to do with the Hado. We have a commitment from the owner to demolish the building. It should be done within the next six months.

I would like to do something with a 7' to 8' height, whether it mesh or chain link. I would like to see a different code and maybe get some public comment.

Karen Koubele - 35 4th Ave N. I was wondering about the work on the ditch and why change the speed limit on Algona Blvd. Since getting the letter I have been going 25 mph and it is too slow. I think that it is a waste of money to spend on signs and whatever else you need. I just don't think it is right.

Amanda Turner - 218 6th Ave N - Lots of in and out traffic at a certain house. Lots of people doing who knows what. We had someone from that house do damage to our property. He had multiple warrents. This is the second time he has come on our property. He has threatened us. We are asking for more police presence in our area.

ORDINANCE NO. 1238-24

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ALGONA, WASHINGTON, AMENDING CHAPTER 10.40 AMC <u>SPEED LIMITS</u>; REDUCING THE SPEED LIMIT ON ALGONA BOULEVARD TO 30 MILES PER HOUR; REDUCING THE SPEED LIMIT ON RESIDENTIAL STREETS WITHOUT SIDEWALKS TO 20 MILES PER HOUR; REPEALING CHAPTER 10.20 AMC <u>HAZARDOUS STREETS</u>; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City is authorized by applicable state law, including without limitation Title 46 RCW, to regulate local streets and to prescribe vehicular speed limits therefor; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with said authority, the City has established speed limits for City streets and has codified the same at Chapter 10.40 AMC; and

WHEREAS, based on recent engineering and traffic investigations and in consultation with the Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices as adopted by the State Department of Transportation, as applicable, City staff has recommended, and the City Council concurs, that the speed limit on Algona Boulevard should be reduced from 35 miles per hour to 25 miles per hour, and that the speed limit on all residential streets where no sidewalks are present should be reduced to 20 miles per hour; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds and declares that the reduced speed limits established by this ordinance are reasonable and safe, and will serve the public interest by enhancing pedestrian and vehicular safety within the affected areas of the City; and

WHEREAS, the City Council also desires to repeal Chapter 10.20 AMC in order to remove the outdated and obsolete standards and procedures set forth therein;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ALGONA, WASHINGTON DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. <u>Findings</u>. The above recitals are hereby adopted by reference as legislative findings in support of this ordinance.

Section 2. <u>Amendment of AMC 10.40.020</u>. Section 10.40.020 of the Algona Municipal Code is hereby amended to provide in its entirety as follows:

{JZL4895-4619-8738;1/13150.000004/}

10.40.020 Increases and decreases on certain streets.

It is determined that the speed limits of twenty-five miles per hour permitted by this chapter, upon the following streets, are less and/or more than is necessary for the safe operation of vehicles thereon and it is declared that the speed limit shall be as set forth in this section on those streets or parts of streets designated in this section when signs are erected giving notice thereof:

A. That portion of 1st Avenue lying east of the railroad tracks: thirty-five miles per hour;

B. Ellingson Avenue: thirty-five miles per hour;

C. Algona Boulevard: twenty thirty-five miles per hour;

D. Pacific Avenue: thirty-five miles per hour;

E. Boundary Boulevard: thirty miles per hour;

F. Seattle Boulevard: twenty miles per hour;

G. Warde Street: fifteen miles per hour;

H. Washington Boulevard: fifteen miles per hour;

I. Chicago Boulevard: fifteen miles per hour;

J. All east-west residential streets without an abutting sidewalk on at least one side: twenty miles per hour. For purposes of this subsection, "residential street" shall mean a non-arterial street within or abutting a residential zoning district under the city's zoning code.

Section 3. <u>Repealer</u>. Chapter 10.20 of the Algona Municipal Code is hereby repealed in its entirety.

Section 4. <u>Severability</u>. Should any section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance, or its application to any person or circumstance, be declared unconstitutional or otherwise invalid for any reason, or should any portion of this ordinance be pre-empted by state or federal law or regulation, such decision or pre-emption shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance or its application to other persons or circumstances.

Section 5. <u>Effective Date</u>. This Ordinance shall be published in the official newspaper of the City, and shall take effect and be in full force five (5) days after the date of publication.



EXHIBIT A

SCOPE OF WORK

CITY OF ALGONA ENHANCED MAINTENANCE PLAN

PROJECT UNDERSTANDING

The City of Algona is interested in a future street sweeper. In order to obtain funding from the Washington State Department of Ecology (Ecology) for this equipment, Ecology requires an Enhanced Maintenance Plan (EMP). This Plan is intended to show how the City's current operations relate to the stormwater system today and how the addition of a street sweeper will improve operations and water quality-related efforts in the future. These preliminary efforts are funded by an Ecology Stormwater Financial Assistance Program Grant. Gray & Osborne will assist the City of Algona with the compilation of the EMP. More specifically, the work will include the following.

Task 1 – Project Management and Oversight

- Objective: Provide overall project management and oversight of the project work by the Project Manager and senior staff members.
 - A. Provide overall project management and oversight services, to include the following.
 - 1. Manage Gray & Osborne staff assigned to the project.
 - 2. Manage and control project budget and schedule.
 - 3. Manage and provide monthly Progress Reports and invoices.

Task 2 – Prepare Enhanced Maintenance Plan

- Objective: Prepare an EMP to meet Ecology guidelines. Submit the EMP to Ecology to obtain approval of the Plan. The Plan is to include the following items.
 - A. Introduction: Describe the City's current stormwater service area and receiving waters, provide an overview of the current Stormwater Plan and its context within the City's larger Water Quality Program, and describe the increase in the benefits expected to be achieved, along with the water quality goals to be obtained by implementing the Plan.
 - B. Pre-Project (Baseline) Program: Describe the City's current stormwater maintenance activities which may include the following.
 - 1. Geographic service area.
 - 2. Frequency of stormwater maintenance activity.
 - 3. Special event (community and/or weather) or spill capabilities.

- 4. Methods and tools used for tracking maintenance activities.
- 5. Management and disposal of decant solids and liquids.
- 6. Methods for load testing for hazardous substances, including frequency, sampling methods, and testing protocols.
- 7. Facilities and equipment used to implement current program.
- 8. Who currently implements each program element.
- 9. Describe the methodology used to calculate the water quality benefits of the current program.
- 10. Discuss short- and long-term costs of operating the current program.
- C. Post Project Program: Describe the specific changes that will be made to the Baseline Program to include the following.
 - 1. Discussion of any additional equipment or facilities required to implement the program.
 - 2. Establish standards and goals that relate to improvements in water quality.
 - 3. Estimate the water quality benefits.
 - 4. Develop short- and long-term costs of operating the proposed program.
 - 5. Develop evaluation and adaptive management procedures.

Task 3 – Coordination Meetings

Objective: Attend coordination meetings with the City during the development of the EMP. This Scope assumes up to two remote meetings.

Task 4 – Quality Assurance/Quality Control

Objective: Oversee one in-house, quality assurance/quality control meeting at Gray & Osborne's office during the course of the Plan. The meetings will include design team members and selected senior staff. Ensure incorporation of relevant recommendations and suggestions into the EMP resulting from quality assurance/quality control reviews.

BUDGET

The maximum amount payable to the Engineer for completion of work associated with this Scope of Work, including contingencies, salaries, overhead, direct non-salary costs, and net fee, is set forth in the attached Exhibit B. This amount will not be exceeded without prior written authorization of the City.

At the conclusion of the developing the Plan and during the course of the process, as applicable, the Engineer will deliver to the City the following documents.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ALGONA, WASHINGTON, AMENDING TITLE 10 AMC BY THE ADDITION OF A NEW CHAPTER 10.46 <u>ELECTRIC-ASSISTED BICYCLES, MOPEDS</u> <u>AND SCOOTERS</u> THERETO; ADOPTING LOCAL REGULATIONS GOVERNING THE OPERATION OF MOPEDS, MOTORIZED FOOT SCOOTERS, AND ELECTRIC-ASSISTED BICYCLES WITHIN THE CITY; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City of Algona is authorized by applicable state law, including without limitation RCW 46.61.710, to regulate the use of mopeds, motorized scooters, and electric-assisted bicycles; and

WHEREAS, the Algona City Council desires to adopt local regulations for such devices within the City as set forth in this ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the regulations adopted hereunder will serve the public interest by helping to ensure the safe and orderly use and enjoyment of streets, sidewalks, and shared use trails within the City;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ALGONA DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. <u>Amendment of Title 10 AMC—New Chapter 10.46 Adopted</u>. Title 10 of the Algona Municipal Code is hereby amended by the addition of new Chapter 10.46 <u>Electric-Assisted Bicycles</u>. <u>Mopeds and Scooters</u> to provide in its entirety as contained in Exhibit A, attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference as if set forth in full.

Section 2. <u>Severability</u>. Should any section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance, or its application to any person or circumstance, be declared unconstitutional or otherwise invalid for any reason, or should any portion of this ordinance be pre-empted by state or federal law or regulation, such decision or pre-emption shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance or its application to other persons or circumstances.

Section 3. <u>Effective Date</u>. This ordinance or a summary thereof shall be published in the official newspaper of the City and shall take effect and be in full force five (5) days after the date of publication.

Chapter 10.46 ELECTRIC-ASSISTED BICYCLES, MOPEDS AND SCOOTERS

10.46.010 Purpose.

The purpose and intent of this chapter is to establish local regulations governing the use of electricassisted bicycles, mopeds, and motorized foot scooters on city streets, sidewalks, and shared use trails.

10.46.020 Definitions.

"City street," as defined in <u>RCW 46.04.120</u>, means every public street located within the city limits of the City of Algona. For the purpose of this chapter, city streets include the shoulder of such streets and public alleys, but not sidewalks.

"Electric-assisted bicycle," "class 1 electric-assisted bicycle," "class 2 electric-assisted bicycle," and "class 3 electric-assisted bicycle" shall have the meanings set forth in RCW <u>46.04.169</u> as now adopted or hereafter amended.

"Moped" is defined as set forth in RCW 46.04.304, as now adopted or hereafter amended.

"Motorized foot scooter" is defined as set forth in RCW <u>46.04.336</u>, as now adopted or hereafter amended.

"Shared use trail" means a paved path, track, or right-of-way built for travel and recreation by pedestrians, bicycles, and other modes of transportation other than motor vehicles, but does not include a sidewalk or walkway constructed for the exclusive use of pedestrians. Without limitation of the foregoing, "shared use trail" includes specifically includes the Interurban Trail within the City of Algona.

"Sidewalk" means the area of the public right-of-way generally reserved for pedestrian use.

10.46.030 City Streets and Sidewalks.

A. Operation of a moped on a sidewalk is unlawful.

B. Operation of a motorized foot scooter on a sidewalk is unlawful unless there is no alternative for a motorized foot scooter to travel over a sidewalk as part of a bicycle or pedestrian path.

C. Operation of class 3 electric-assisted bicycles shall be limited to City streets. Without limitation of the foregoing, operation of a class 3 electric-assisted bicycle on a sidewalk is unlawful.

10.46.040 Shared Use Trails.

A. Operation of a moped or a class 3 electric-assisted bicycle on a shared use trail is unlawful.

B. Operation of class 1 and class 2 electric-assisted bicycles and motorized foot scooters on a shared use trail in accordance with this chapter is permitted.

C. A person who uses or travels in any manner on a shared use trail shall travel at a speed of fifteen miles per hour or less. In addition, a person shall not travel at a speed greater than what is reasonable and prudent under the conditions with regard to the actual and potential hazards then existing.

D. A person who uses or travels in any manner on a shared use trail shall exercise due care and caution to avoid colliding with or otherwise endangering any other trail user, and shall travel in a consistent and predictable manner. Trail users should be aware of the potential for travel conflicts between different uses of the trail.

10.46.050 Parental Responsibility.

A parent or guardian who has custody of any child or ward under the age of eighteen (18) shall not authorize or knowingly permit any such child or ward to violate any of the provisions of this chapter.

10.46.060 Violation—Penalty.

A. The city of Algona police department shall be responsible for enforcing the provisions of this chapter. Upon determining that a violation of this chapter has occurred, law enforcement officers may, at their discretion, issue a civil infraction in the amount of \$250 to any person, including a parent or guardian where applicable pursuant to AMC 14.46.050, violating any of the provisions of this chapter.

B. Any person who has violated the provisions of this chapter on at least two prior occasions shall be guilty of a misdemeanor for the third and any subsequent violation.

10.46.070 Authority preserved; conflicts.

The penalties and remedies set forth in this chapter are nonexclusive and are without prejudice to any and all other applicable penalties and remedies under state law and/or this code. If any provision of this chapter irreconcilably conflicts with any provision of the Algona Municipal Code, including without limitation any provision adopted by reference thereunder, the most restrictive provision shall govern to the extent permissible under state law.
