Go back in time...

The river, teeming with fish and fowl, was a source of wild game and food plants for the American natives that lived along the shores of the sanctuary for several thousand years. Many of the artifacts collected from this area are on display at the Jesse Besser Museum-just a few blocks from Island Park.

Exploring Island Park

The plants and animals that live within the 1200 square miles of the Thunder Bay River Watershed make this freshwater ecosystem one of the most productive natural communities in northern Michigan. Using your knowledge of geography, see if you can answer the questions below:



1) Name the Great Lake that this river flows into.




2) Draw a star on the map below to show where you are as you complete this activity.




4) Go to an area where you can view the water. In which direction is the current flowing? Draw arrows to show which way the current flows as you walk around the island.
