

AGREEMENT

4.1 Salary: Forseth-Deshais's salary shall be \$219,877.00 gross per year, which is equivalent to \$18,323.08 gross per month, subject to all appropriate deductions and withholdings and payable in bi-weekly installments at the same time and by the same methods as other City employees are regularly paid. Following quarterly performance evaluations set forth in Section 5.1, upon approval of the City Council, Forseth-Deshais will be increased a step level on the City Manager Salary Schedule, which is set forth as follows:



FISCAL IMPACT

DISCUSSION and BACKGROUND

AB 3093 adds two new income categories to the Regional Housing Needs Assessment (RHNA) framework: acutely low-income (ALI) and extremely low-income (ELI). While these new categories are intended to help assess the needs of homeless residents, they fall within the existing very low-income category, which already accounts for the needs of individuals in our cities earning between 0% and 50% of the area median income.

The City of Anderson is concerned that this will only lead to duplicating planning efforts since existing housing element law already requires cities to analyze the special housing needs of homeless residents and assist in developing adequate housing to meet the needs of extremely low-income households. Housing element law also requires cities to identify

sites and encourage the development of various housing, including supportive housing and transitional housing. Through these processes, cities are doing more than ever to plan for the needs of unhoused residents in their communities. The assembly bill is currently being presented to Governor Newsom, and further takes away local control. The draft letter of opposition for AB 3093 recommends veto of the assembly bill.

Dear Governor Newsom,

The City of Anderson, respectfully requests a veto on AB 3093 (Ward), which would require local governments to account for the housing needs of people experiencing homelessness in their housing elements without funding to develop the plans, implement strategies, or support the construction of affordable housing.

The City of Anderson, appreciates recent amendments that clarify the obligations of this measure. However, AB 3093 still adds new duplicative and costly requirements at a time when the state budget includes more than \$1 billion in cuts to affordable housing programs.

Specifically, AB 3093 adds two new income categories to the Regional Housing Needs Assessment (RHNA) framework: acutely low-income (ALI) and extremely low-income (ELI). While these new categories are intended to help assess the needs of homeless residents, they fall within the existing very low-income category, which already accounts for the needs of individuals in our cities earning between 0% and 50% of the area median income.

The City of Anderson is concerned that this will only lead to duplicating planning efforts since existing housing element law already requires cities to analyze the special housing needs of homeless residents and assist in developing adequate housing to meet the needs of extremely low-income households. Housing element law also requires cities to identify sites and encourage the development of various housing, including supportive housing and transitional housing. Through these processes, cities are doing more than ever to plan for the needs of unhoused residents in their communities.

Cities across California are planning and approving millions of new homes at all income levels despite new bills introduced every year that have changed the rules midstream, significantly altering cities' housing element certification process. These complex, multiyear housing plans are laborious, time-consuming, and costly. With many cities still







Chapter 17.60 outlines the permitted uses within residential districts, including the conditions for accessory dwelling units (ADUs).

In recent years, the State of California has introduced multiple legislative measures aimed at addressing the ongoing housing crisis. One of the key pieces of legislation is Section

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66314, which establishes guidelines for local jurisdictions to facilitate and regulate ADU development. The intent behind this law is to promote the creation of additional housing options in residential areas while ensuring that local ordinances align with state law.

Our goal is to ensure that the City's regulations comply with these state requirements, supporting the development of ADUs while preserving the character of our community and addressing local housing needs.

ENVIRONMENTAL DETERMINATION

The City of Anderson finds that this Ordinance is not a "project" according to the definition outlined in the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA"), and, pursuant to CEQA Guidelines sections 15060(c)(2) (the activity will not result in a direct or reasonably foreseeable indirect physical change in the environment) and 15061(b)(3) (there is no possibility the activity in question may have a significant effect on the environment), the adoption of this ordinance is therefore not subject to the provisions requiring environmental review.

SECTION 3. Chapter 17.60 "USES PERMITTED WITH A RESIDENCE OR IN RESIDENTIAL DISTRICTS" of Title 17 "ZONING" of the Anderson Municipal Code is repealed in its entirety and replaced to read as follows:

Chapter 17.60 USES PERMITTED WITH A RESIDENCE OR IN RESIDENTIAL DISTRICTS

17.60.010 Purpose.

Certain land uses may be acceptable within any or certain residential districts; provided, that they meet appropriate standards.

17.60.020 Reserved.

17.60.030 Accessory residential dwelling units.

- A. Intent and General Requirements. It is the intent of this section to meet the housing needs of this community by providing additional housing options for family members, students, the elderly, in-home health care providers, the disabled, veterans and others; and to comply with the requirements of California Government Code § 65852.2 et seq. The following criteria are set forth to allow for the placement of attached or detached second units on lots in areas zoned for residential use. An accessory dwelling unit—attached or detached from the primary residence—shall be permitted upon any lot existing as a legal-lot of record prior to, or after, the effective date of this section.
- B. Specific Requirements for Accessory Residential Units.
 - Use. The lot where the accessory residential unit is located must contain an
 existing single-family dwelling. Accessory units may be occupied only for
 residential purposes and one of the units on the lot shall be owner-occupied at all
 times. No accessory dwelling unit shall be used as a short term rental (less than
 thirty consecutive days).
 - 2. Ownership. An accessory dwelling unit shall not be sold separately from the one-family residence on the same lot, except as provided in Government Code Section 66341. An accessory dwelling unit may be leased or rented provided the lease or

- rental is for thirty consecutive days or longer, unless otherwise permitted by this code.
- 3. Height. The height shall be no more than the limitations set forth in Government Code section 66321(b)(4)
- 4. Size. The floor area for the accessory unit shall not be less than four hundred square feet nor shall it exceed one thousand two hundred square feet. Attached units shall not exceed a maximum of fifty percent of the size of the living space of the primary dwelling. Where fifty percent of the living space of the primary dwelling is less than six hundred forty square feet, the living space of a detached accessory dwelling unit may be up to six hundred forty square feet.
- 5. Development Standards. Unless otherwise stated in Government Code Section 66314, all new construction shall conform to the height, setback, lot coverage, fees and other zoning requirements otherwise applicable to residential construction in the zone in which the property is located. The following standards are also applicable to the construction of accessory residential units. Where there is a conflict between the standards of the zoning district and those that follow, the least restrictive standard shall apply:
 - a. New Detached Units.
 - (1) New detached accessory dwelling units shall not be located within a required setback. Building encroachments of up to two feet that are required to achieve compliance with building or fire code standards may be approved by the director where it can be shown that the encroachment is necessary to achieve compliance with California Government Code § 66314 and the intent of this chapter.
 - (b) Units within or attached to an existing structure:
 - (1) Accessory units constructed entirely within a legally existing structure may be located within a required setback. Modifications to such structures where required to meet building or fire code standards may be approved by the director where it can be shown that compliance with the standard would make the project infeasible. Compliance with the standards of the underlying zoning district for the side and rear lot lines shall not be required for a new accessory dwelling unit that is constructed above a legally established garage or residential accessory building.
- Building Code Compliance. California building code requirements which apply to additions to existing single-family dwellings, as appropriate, will apply to accessory dwelling units.
- 7. Fire Code Compliance. The accessory dwelling unit shall meet all requirements of the fire protection district, as applicable, for the lot on which the unit is located, including adequate access to the accessory dwelling unit for emergency personnel

- and equipment. Accessory dwelling units constructed within an existing residence shall not be required to provide fire sprinklers if they are not required for the primary residence.
- 8. Impact Fees. Unless otherwise stated in Government Code Section 66324, public facility development impact fees for an accessory dwelling unit shall be calculated at the same rate as a single-family development only when the accessory dwelling unit is constructed with the single-family dwelling. Payment of public facility development impact fees shall not be required where the accessory dwelling unit is constructed entirely within an existing structure, and such unit does not have a separate sewer lateral which connects to the city wastewater system or a separate water meter or is less than 750 square feet. Payment of public facility development impact fees otherwise required for a residential unit may be waived by the director where the detached or attached accessory dwelling unit does not have a separate sewer lateral which connects to the city wastewater system or a separate water meter.
- 9. Septic Systems. Approval by the county environmental health department is required where a private sewage disposal system is being used.
- 10. Number of Accessory Dwelling Units. There shall be no more than one accessory dwelling unit and junior accessory dwelling unit per legal lot.
- 11. Parking. Off-street parking requirements for an accessory dwelling unit shall be one additional parking space for a studio or one-bedroom unit, and two additional spaces for a unit with two or more bedrooms. Such parking may be provided as tandem parking on an existing driveway. Where the accessory unit is constructed within an area of existing covered parking required for the use of the primary residence by this code, the replacement spaces may be located in any configuration on the same lot as the accessory dwelling unit, including but not limited to a covered space, uncovered space, or tandem space which meets the dimensional and access standards of Chapter 17.46, "Off-Street Parking Requirements". Parking shall otherwise comply with California Government Code § 66314 and all other applicable provisions of this code.
- C. Exceptions. Exceptions may be granted to the development standards set forth in this section if an administrative design review approval is obtained and the following findings are made by the director:
 - 1. The proposed exception from the development standard(s) is necessary due to physical or other constraints on the lot that make the strict application of the standard(s) impractical or inconsistent with existing development on the lot or in the immediate neighborhood; and
 - 2. The proposed exception from the development standard(s) would not result in a health or safety hazard for existing and future residents on the lot or in the immediate neighborhood.

17.60.040 Bed and breakfast.

A bed and breakfast facility may be permitted in districts which provide for them if a use permit is first secured; provided that:

- A. There shall not be more than two guestrooms.

Chapter 17.60 USES PERMITTED WITH A RESIDENCE OR IN RESIDENTIAL DISTRICTS

17.60.010 Purpose.

Certain land uses may be acceptable within any or certain residential districts; provided, that they meet appropriate standards.

17.60.020 Reserved.

17.60.030 Accessory residential dwelling units.

- A. Intent and General Requirements. It is the intent of this section to meet the housing needs of this community by providing additional housing options for family members, students, the elderly, in-home health care providers, the disabled, veterans and others; and to comply with the requirements of California Government Code § 65852.2 et seq. The following criteria are set forth to allow for the placement of attached or detached second units on lots in areas zoned for residential use. An accessory dwelling unit—attached or detached from the primary residence—shall be permitted upon any lot existing as a legal-lot of record prior to, or after, the effective date of this section.
- B. Specific Requirements for Accessory Residential Units.
 - Use. The lot where the accessory residential unit is located must contain an existing single-family dwelling.  - Reserved. Height. The height shall be no more than the limitations set forth in Government Code section 66321(b)(4)
 - 4. Size. The floor area for the accessory unit shall not be less than four hundred square feet nor shall it exceed one thousand two hundred square feet. Attached units shall not exceed a maximum of fifty percent of the size of the living space of the primary dwelling. Where fifty percent of the living space of the primary dwelling is less than six hundred forty square feet, the living space of a detached accessory dwelling unit may be up to six hundred forty square feet.
 - 5. Development Standards. Unless otherwise stated in Government Code Section 66314, all new construction shall conform to the height, setback, lot coverage, fees and other zoning requirements otherwise applicable to residential construction in the zone in which the property is located. 

RECOMMENDATION

The City Manager recommends that the City Council:

- 1. Receive a Staff Report
- 2. Approve the Resolution Declaring Anderson as a "Parent Right to Know" City.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is no fiscal impact associated with this item.

DISCUSSION and BACKGROUND

State Assembly Bill ("AB") 1955, signed into law by Governor Newsom on July 15, 2024 prohibits public schools from adopting or enforcing any policy, rule, or administrative regulation requiring an employee to disclose any information related to a student's sexual orientation, gender identity, or gender expression to any other person without the minor student's consent.

The matters of "student sexual orientation, gender identity, or gender expression" contained in the prohibitions of AB 1955 are not related to "education." but instead are subject matters that are extremely "private" and highly "personal" for the parent and child.

It is the position of the City of Anderson that the State may not claim control over education as a pretext or a guise to invade or regulate the "private" and highly "personal" matters that naturally belong to and should remain within the parent/child relationship. Accordingly, as the State's attempt to legislate the parent/child relationship by way of AB 1955 is an improper interpretation of the California and United States constitutions and not "education," as such, AB 1955 does not preempt local regulation and may be subject to legal challenges of local authorities, parents, and/or children.

Although the State may regulate "education," AB 1955 exceeds the State Legislature's authority to regulate public schools under the California and United States Constitutions and infringes on parents' constitutional rights by prohibiting schools from adopting policies that would require notifying parents of "private" and highly "personal" matters such as when a parents' child may be at increased risk of psychological, emotional, and physical harassment and abuse, and extremely high rates of suicide and suicide attempts, no matter how young the child is, without the child's consent and is not a matter of statewide concern.

Parental rights are not secondary to the desires of government agencies. In *Parham v. J.R.*, 442 U.S. 584, 602-603 (1979), the United States Supreme Court declared, "our constitutional system long ago rejected any notion that a child is 'the mere creature of the State' and, on the contrary, asserted that parents generally 'have the right, coupled with the high duty, to recognize and prepare their children for additional obligations'...[t]he statist notion that governmental power should supersede parental authority in all cases because some parents abuse and neglect children is repugnant to American tradition."

For the reasons outlined above, the City of Anderson City Council has requested that staff prepare the attached resolution to reflect its intent to become a Parent's Right to Know city.

RESOLUTION NO. _____ A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF ANDERSON DECLARING ITSELF A PARENT RIGHT TO KNOW

WHEREAS, State Assembly Bill ("AB") 1955, signed into law by Governor Newsom on July 15, 2024 prohibits public schools from adopting or enforcing any policy, rule, or administrative regulation requiring an employee to disclose any information related to a student's sexual orientation, gender identity, or gender expression to any other person without the minor student's consent; and

WHEREAS, numerous studies assert that transgender and gender nonconforming students suffer from increased psychological, emotional, and physical harassment and abuse, and that transgender youth experience an abnormally high number of suicidal thoughts and make an abnormally high number of suicide attempts; and

WHEREAS, the matters of "student sexual orientation, gender identity, or gender expression" contained in the prohibitions of AB 1955 are not related to "education." but instead are subject matters that are extremely "private" and highly "personal" for the parent and child; and

WHEREAS, the State may not claim control over education as a pretext or a guise to invade or regulate the "private" and highly "personal" matters that naturally belong to and should remain within the parent/child relationship. Accordingly, as the State's attempt to legislate the parent/child relationship by way of AB 1955 is an improper interpretation of the California and United States constitutions and not "education," as such, AB 1955 does not preempt local regulation and may be subject to legal challenges of local authorities, parents, and/or children; and

WHEREAS, although the State may regulate "education," AB 1955 exceeds the State Legislature's authority to regulate public schools under the California and United States Constitutions and infringes on parents' constitutional rights by prohibiting schools from adopting policies that would require notifying parents of "private" and highly "personal" matters such as when a parents' child may be at increased risk of psychological, emotional, and physical harassment and abuse, and extremely high rates of suicide and suicide attempts, no matter how young the child is, without the child's consent and is not a matter of statewide concern; and

WHEREAS, the Fourteenth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution provides that no State shall "deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law." (U.S. Const. amend. XIV.) The United States Supreme Court has repeatedly recognized parents' constitutional right to make decisions concerning the care, custody, and control of their children. (*Troxel v. Granville*, 530 U.S. 57, 65 (2000).) This includes the right to direct their children's upbringing and education. (*Meyer v. Nebraska*, 262 U.S. 390, 400 (1923); Pierce v. Society of Sisters, 268 U.S. 510, 534-535 (1925); and

WHEREAS, parental rights are not secondary to the desires of government agencies. In *Parham v. J.R.*, 442 U.S. 584, 602-603 (1979), the United States Supreme Court declared, "our constitutional system long ago rejected any notion that a child is 'the mere creature of the State' and, on the contrary, asserted that parents generally 'have the right, coupled with the high duty, to recognize and prepare their children for additional obligations'...[t]he statist notion that governmental power should supersede parental authority in all cases because some parents abuse and neglect children is repugnant to American tradition;" and

WHEREAS, based on the above findings, the City of Anderson seeks to declare itself a "Parent Right to Know' city.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ANDERSON HEREBY RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:





Pop Up Market - Road Closure



Professional Services Agreement with PACE Engineering for the 2024 Arc Flash Study.

RECOMMENDATION

The Public Works Director recommends that the City Council:

Authorize the City Manager to execute a Professional Service Agreement with PACE Engineering for the 2024 Arc Flash Study.

FISCAL IMPACT

The Professional Services contract will be funded from the 2024/2025 Wastewater budget (Sewer Enterprise Fund) and the 2024/2025 Water budget (Water Enterprise Fund). The contract is not to exceed \$121,700 without written approval from the City.

DISCUSSION and BACKGROUND

An arc flash is the rapid release of energy resulting from an unintended arc fault or short circuit between live parts, or between live parts and the ground. This energy is released as heat and light, which collide to create a concussive pressure wave that can disperse shrapnel.

ITEM 8.9a

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The Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OHSA) created a requirement for employers to eliminate heat and energy risks in a fact sheet published in April 2014. This bulletin states the following three items.

The employer must assess the workplace to identify workers exposed to flame or electricarc hazards.

No later than January 1, 2015, employers must estimate the incident heat energy of any electric-arc hazard to which a worker would be exposed.

No later than April 1, 2015, employers generally must provide workers exposed to hazards from electric arcs with protective clothing and other protective equipment with an arc rating greater than or equal to the estimated heat energy.

The City does not have a current Arc Flash study in accordance with the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) Standard 70E Article 130.5. This standard states that an arc flash assessment must be updated if a major modification or renovation takes place, and it must be reviewed periodically at intervals not to exceed five years. NFPA 70E requires that all equipment from the main switchboard down to the disconnects for electrical equipment be studied.

The City requested a quote from PACE Engineering to review the following 24 locations: Anderson Waste Water Treatment Plant, 6 Sewer Lift Stations, Anderson Corporation Yard, Anderson River Park Splash Pad, 12 Well facilities, and three reservoir pump stations. Following the Arc Flash Study, the City will receive documentation, including information labels to be placed on equipment that identify the appropriate PPE and boundaries of limits for working on equipment.

THIS AGREEMENT ("Agreement"), made and entered into this _____th day of ______, 2024, is by and between the City of Anderson, a California municipal corporation, hereinafter referred to as "City," and PACE Engineering, Inc., hereinafter referred to as "Consultant."

SECTION 1 - ORGANIZATION AND CONTENTS.

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SECTION 2 - DESCRIPTION OF PROJECT

City desires to undertake that certain project, hereinafter referred to as "project," described in **EXHIBIT "A"** entitled "**DESCRIPTION OF PROJECT"** and to engage Consultant to provide the required professional services relating to it.

SECTION 3 - SCOPE OF SERVICES - BASIC; COMPLETION SCHEDULE

Consultant shall perform those basic services in connection with the project as are set forth more particularly in **EXHIBIT** "B" entitled "SCOPE OF CONSULTANT SERVICES - BASIC; COMPLETION SCHEDULE" and shall complete said services in accordance with the completion schedule for them incorporated in said Exhibit.

SECTION 4 - SCOPE OF SERVICES - ADDITIONAL; COMPLETION SCHEDULE

It is understood by City and Consultant that it may be necessary, in connection with the project, for Consultant to perform or secure the performance of services other than those set forth in **EXHIBIT "B."** In each such instance, Consultant shall advise City, in advance and in writing, of the need for such additional services, their cost and the estimated time required to perform them (if appropriate). Consultant shall not proceed to perform any such required additional service until City has determined that such service is beyond the scope of the basic services to be provided, is required, and City has given its written authorization to perform or obtain it. Each additional service so authorized shall constitute an amendment to this Agreement, shall be identified and sequentially numbered as "Additional Consultant Service No. 1" and so forth, shall be subject to all of the provisions of this Agreement, and shall be attached to **EXHIBIT "C"** entitled "SCOPE OF CONSULTANT SERVICES - ADDITIONAL; COMPLETION SCHEDULE."

SECTION 5 - COMPENSATION; PAYMENT OF FEES

Consultant shall be compensated for services rendered to City pursuant to this Agreement in the amounts, manner and in accordance with the payment schedule as set forth in **EXHIBIT "D"** entitled "COMPENSATION." Amounts due to Consultant from City for services rendered shall be evidenced by the submission to City by Consultant of an invoice, prepared in a form satisfactory to City, setting forth the amount of compensation due for the period covered by it. Each such invoice shall be forwarded to City so as to reach it on the lst day of the month, or other applicable period, for which the services invoiced were provided. All such invoices shall be in full accord with any and all applicable provisions of this Agreement. City will review each such invoice and retain them in accordance with **EXHIBIT "D,"** provided however that if Consultant

submits an invoice which is incorrect, incomplete, or not in accord with the provisions of this Agreement, then City shall not be obligated to process any payment to Consultant until a correct and complying invoice has been submitted.

SECTION 6 - RESPONSIBILITY OF CONSULTANT

By executing this Agreement, Consultant warrants to City that Consultant possesses, or will arrange to secure from others, all of the necessary professional capabilities, experience, resources and facilities necessary to provide to City the services contemplated under this Agreement. Consultant further warrants that Consultant will follow the best current, generally accepted professional practices to make findings, render opinions, prepare factual presentations, and provide professional advice and recommendations regarding the project for which services are rendered under this Agreement. It is expressly understood by all parties to this Agreement that Consultant makes no guarantee or warranty whatsoever to the success of this project.

SECTION 7 - RESPONSIBILITY OF CITY

To the extent appropriate to the project contemplated by this Agreement, City shall:

- Assist Consultant by placing at Consultant's disposal all available information pertinent to the project, including previous reports and any other data relative to design and construction which may be applicable to it.
- <u>7.2</u> Guarantee access to and make all provisions for Consultant to enter upon public and private property as required for Consultant to perform Consultant services.
- <u>7.3</u> Examine all studies, reports, sketches, drawings, specifications, proposals and other documents prepared and presented by Consultant, and render verbally or in writing as may be appropriate, decisions pertaining thereto, within a reasonable time so as not to delay the progress of the work by Consultant.
- <u>7.4</u> Designate in writing a person to act as City's representative with respect to the work to be performed under this Agreement. Such person shall have complete authority to transmit instructions, receive information, interpret and define City's policies and decisions with respect to materials, equipment, elements and systems pertinent to Consultant's services.
- <u>7.5</u> Give prompt written notice to Consultant whenever City observes or otherwise becomes aware of any defect in the project.
- <u>7.6</u> Furnish approvals and permits from all governmental authorities having jurisdiction over the project and such approvals and consents from others as may be necessary for completion of the project.

SECTION 8 - INDEMNIFICATION

Consultant shall hold City, its officers, boards and commissions, and members thereof, its employees and agents harmless of and free from any and all liability arising out of or relating to any negligent act or omission of Consultant or Consultant's employees or agents in rendering the services required by this Agreement and shall protect, defend, and indemnify them against such liability and the legal fees and costs incurred by the City in connection therewith.

SECTION 9 - INSURANCE

Any requirements by City that Consultant carry general liability, errors and omissions, or any other type of insurance in connection with the work to be performed and/or services to be rendered by Consultant pursuant to this Agreement shall be as set forth in **EXHIBIT "E,"** entitled **SPECIAL PROVISIONS.**

SECTION 10 - GENERAL PROVISIONS

10.1 Access to Records

Consultant shall maintain all books, records, documents, accounting ledgers, and similar materials relating to work performed for City under this Agreement on file for at least (1) year following the date of final payment to Consultant by City. Any duly authorized representative(s) of City shall have access to such records for the purpose of inspection, audit and copying at reasonable times, during Consultant's usual and customary business hours. Consultant shall provide proper facilities to City's representative(s) for access and inspection. Consultant shall be entitled to reasonable compensation for time and expenses related to such access and inspection activities, which shall be considered to be an additional service to City, falling under the provisions of SECTION 4 hereinabove.

10.2 Assignment

This Agreement is binding to heirs, successors, and assigns of the parties hereto and shall not be assigned by either City or Consultant without the prior written consent of the other.

10.3 Changes to Scope of Work - Basic Services

City may at any time and, upon a minimum of ten (10) days' written notice, modify the scope of basic services to be provided under this Agreement. Consultant shall, upon receipt of said notice, determine the impact on both time and compensation of such change in scope and notify City in writing. Upon agreement between City and Consultant as to the extent of said impacts to time and compensation, an amendment to this Agreement shall be prepared describing such changes. Execution of the amendment by City and Consultant shall constitute the Consultant's notice to proceed with the changed scope.

10.4 Compliance with Laws, Rules, Regulations

All services performed by Consultant pursuant to this Agreement shall be performed in accordance and full compliance with all applicable Federal, State or City statues, and any rules or regulations promulgated thereunder.

10.5 Conflict of Interest

If City's City Manager has determined that one or several of Consultant's Principal(s) or Project Manager(s) are subject to any provisions of the Anderson Municipal Code relating to conflict of interest, or the provisions of any rules or regulations which may have been promulgated thereunder, then each such person will be required to comply with said provisions in connection with the services they render to the City under this Agreement. City shall advise Consultant of any such provisions prior to the date of execution of this Agreement.

10.6 Exhibits Incorporated

All Exhibits referred to in this Agreement and attached to it are hereby incorporated in it by this reference.

10.7 Independent Contractor

City and Consultant agree that the relationship between them created by this Agreement does not constitute an employer-employee relationship, a partnership or joint-venture relationship of any kind between the City of Anderson and the Consultant. Consultant is not an agent of the City and has no authority to commit the City in any way whatsoever. Consultant shall be solely responsible for the conduct and control of the work performed under this Agreement. Consultant shall be free to render professional consulting services to others during the term of this Agreement, so long as such activities do not interfere with or diminish Consultant's ability to fulfill the obligations established herein to City.

10.8 Integration; Amendment

This Agreement represents the entire understanding of City and Consultant as to those matters contained herein. No prior oral or written understanding shall be of any force or effect with respect to those matters covered in it. This Agreement may not be modified or altered except by amendment in writing signed by both parties.

10.9 Jurisdiction

This Agreement shall be administered and interpreted under the laws of the State of California. Jurisdiction of litigation arising from this Agreement shall be in that state. If any part of this Agreement shall be in conflict with applicable laws, such part shall be inoperative, null, and void insofar as it is in conflict with said laws, but the remainder of the Agreement shall continue to be in full force and effect.

10.10 Notice to Proceed; Progress; Completion

Upon execution of this Agreement by the parties, City shall give Consultant written notice to proceed with the work. Such notice may authorize Consultant to render all of the services contemplated herein, or such portions or phases as may be mutually agreed upon. In the latter event, City shall, in its sole discretion, issue subsequent notices from time to time regarding further portions or phases of the work. Upon receipt of such notices, Consultants shall diligently proceed with the work authorized and complete it within the agreed time period.

10.11 Ownership of Documents

Title to all documents, drawings, specifications, and the like with respect to work performed under this Agreement shall vest with City at such time as City has compensated Consultant, as provided herein, for the services rendered by Consultant in connection with which they were prepared.

10.12 Subcontracts

Consultant shall be entitled, to the extent determined appropriate by Consultant, to subcontract any portion of the work to be performed under this Agreement. Consultant shall be responsible to City for the actions of persons and firms performing subcontract work. The subcontracting of work by Consultant shall not relieve Consultant, in any manner, of the obligations and requirements imposed upon Consultant by this Agreement.

10.13 Term; Termination

The term of this Agreement shall commence upon City's issuance to Consultant of a notice to proceed for all or a portion of the work, as hereinabove provided, and shall end upon City's acceptance and payment for all or such portion of the work as was authorized by such notice, including any and all retentions. Notwithstanding the foregoing, City may, in its sole discretion, terminate this Agreement at any time and for any reason whosoever by giving at least ten (10) days' prior written notice of such termination to Consultant.

10.14 Notices

Any notices required to be given pursuant to this Agreement shall be deemed to have been given by their deposit, postage prepaid, in the United States Postal Service, addressed to the parties as follows:

Nothing hereinabove shall prevent either City or Consultant from personally delivering any such notices to the other.

SECTION 11 - SPECIAL PROVISIONS

This Agreement shall include all special provisions, if any, as are set forth on **EXHIBIT** "E" entitled "SPECIAL PROVISIONS."

EXHIBIT "E"

SPECIAL PROVISIONS

INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS FOR CONSULTANT

CONSULTANT shall procure and maintain for the duration of the contract insurance against claims and injuries to persons or damages to property which may arise from or in connection with the work hereunder by the CONSULTANT, his agents, representatives, employees or subcontractors. The cost of such insurance shall be the sole responsibility of the CONSULTANT.

A. Minimum Scope of Coverage:

Insurance shall cover:

- Professional Liability.
- 2. Comprehensive General Liability.
- 3. Automobile Liability.
- 4. Workers Compensation.
- B. Minimum Limits of Insurance:
 - 1. Professional Liability: \$2,000,000 errors and omissions.
 - 2. Comprehensive General Liability: \$2,000,000 combined single limit per occurrence for bodily injury, personal injury and property damage.
 - 3. Automobile Liability: \$1,000,000 combined single limit per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
 - 4. Workers Compensation: Limits as set forth in the Labor Code of the State of California.
- C. Deductibles:

Any deductibles must be declared to and approved by the City.

D. Other Insurance Provisions:

The Policies must contain the following provisions:

- 1. General Liability and Automobile Liability Coverage:
 - a. The City, its officials, employees and volunteers are to be covered as insureds as respects: liability arising out of activities performed by or on behalf of the CONSULTANT; premises owned, leased, or used by the CONSULTANT; or automobiles owned, leased, hired or borrowed by the CONSULTANT.

The coverage shall contain no special limitations on the scope of protection afforded to the City, its officials, employees and volunteers.

- b. The CONSULTANT's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance as respects the City, its officials, employees and volunteers. Any insurance maintained by the City, its officials, employees and volunteers shall be excess of CONSULTANT's insurance and shall not contribute with it.
- c. Any failure to comply with the reporting provisions of the policies shall not affect coverage provided to the City, its officials, employees and volunteers.
- d. coverage shall state that CONSULTANT's insurance shall apply separately to each insured against whom claim is made or suit is brought, except with respect to the insurer's liability.

2. Workers Compensation:

The insurer shall agree to waive all rights of subrogation against the City, its officials, employees and volunteers for losses arising from work performed by CONSULTANT for the City.

3. All Coverage:

Each insurance policy required herein shall be endorsed to state that coverage shall not be suspended, voided, canceled, reduced in coverage or in limits except after thirty (30) days advance written notice to City by certified mail, return receipt requested.

E. Acceptability of Insurers:

Insurance shall be placed with insurers admitted to do business in California and with a Best rating of no less than A+.

F. Verification of Coverage:

CONSULTANT shall furnish the City with certificates of insurance coverage with the City named as an additional insured, and with original endorsements affecting coverage as required by this Agreement. The certificates and endorsements for each insurance policy are to be signed by a person authorized by that insurer to bind coverage on its behalf. The certificates are to be received and approved by the City before work commences.

G. Subcontractors:

CONSULTANT shall include all subcontractors as insureds under its policies or shall furnish separate certificates and endorsements for each subcontractor. All coverages for subcontractors shall be subject to all of the requirements stated herein.



SUBJECT

Approve a Professional Services Agreement with PACE Engineering for the 2024 Master Water Plan.

RECOMMENDATION

The Public Works Director recommends that the City Council:

Authorize the City Manager to execute a Professional Service Agreement with PACE Engineering for the 2024 Master Water Plan.

FISCAL IMPACT

The Professional Services contract will be funded from the 2024/2025 Water budget (Water Enterprise Fund). The contract is not to exceed \$217,000 without written approval from the City.

DISCUSSION and BACKGROUND

The City's current Master Water Plan (MWP) was completed in 2006 by PACE Engineering. Nine (9) wells serve the City's existing water system with a combined capacity of approximately 11.04 million gallons per day (MGD) and an effective capacity of approximately 5.0 MGD. The wells provide very good water quality, and no treatment is required other than maintenance of a small

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chlorine residual. The City has two water storage reservoirs with a combined capacity of about 3.5 million gallons (MG). Three pressure zones comprise the City's service area, controlled by, 1) tank elevations, 2) hydropneumatic tanks, 3) booster pumps, or 4) wells. The City's water distribution system consists of approximately 38 miles of 2-inch through 14-inch piping made of steel, cast iron, asbestos cement (AC), and polyvinyl chloride (PVC). Approximately 7,000 feet of distribution piping are old steel pipelines that are 55 to 65 years old.

The 2006 MWP reflects an analysis of existing (2004), 10-year (2014), 20-year (2024), and Ultimate development conditions. The existing hydraulic analysis utilized the computer model H20Net, an MHWSoft product. The 2005 model was based on the 1994 model completed in Kentucky Pipe software, which included most of the water mains within the City's water system. This software is not available anymore and needs to be updated. To conduct all hydraulic modeling for developing the master water plan, the consultant shall utilize InfoWater. InfoWater was purchased from Innovyze by Autodesk and incorporated into ArcGIS Pro.

Since the 2006 plan was created, the City has experienced some development and has new projects in various planning and/or construction stages. As such, the City desires to update its MWP, utilizing updated hydraulic modeling software and employing data existing in the City's Global Information System (GIS) database.

The purpose of the Master Water Plan is:

- To provide the City of Anderson with a Master Plan showing water service areas, corresponding development levels, and ultimate development levels as shown on the City of Anderson and Shasta County General Plans.
- To inventory the existing water system.
- To determine deficiencies in the existing water supply system.
- To prioritize improvements needed to improve the existing water supply system.
- To estimate the costs of the recommended water system improvements.
- To provide a plan showing future water system improvements that will be needed as the City develops or looks to annex within the Sphere of Influence.
- To form a solid engineering basis for the future consideration of amending existing water development fees.
- To provide needed background information for pursuing grant financing of water system improvements.

SECTION 2 - DESCRIPTION OF PROJECT

City desires to undertake that certain project, hereinafter referred to as "project," described in **EXHIBIT "A"** entitled "**DESCRIPTION OF PROJECT"** and to engage Consultant to provide the required professional services relating to it.

SECTION 3 - SCOPE OF SERVICES - BASIC; COMPLETION SCHEDULE

Consultant shall perform those basic services in connection with the project as are set forth more particularly in **EXHIBIT** "B" entitled "SCOPE OF CONSULTANT SERVICES - BASIC; COMPLETION SCHEDULE" and shall complete said services in accordance with the completion schedule for them incorporated in said Exhibit.

SECTION 4 - SCOPE OF SERVICES - ADDITIONAL; COMPLETION SCHEDULE

It is understood by City and Consultant that it may be necessary, in connection with the project, for Consultant to perform or secure the performance of services other than those set forth in **EXHIBIT "B."** In each such instance, Consultant shall advise City, in advance and in writing, of the need for such additional services, their cost and the estimated time required to perform them (if appropriate). Consultant shall not proceed to perform any such required additional service until City has determined that such service is beyond the scope of the basic services to be provided, is required, and City has given its written authorization to perform or obtain it. Each additional service so authorized shall constitute an amendment to this Agreement, shall be identified and sequentially numbered as "Additional Consultant Service No. 1" and so forth, shall be subject to all of the provisions of this Agreement, and shall be attached to **EXHIBIT "C"** entitled "SCOPE OF CONSULTANT SERVICES - ADDITIONAL; COMPLETION SCHEDULE."

SECTION 5 - COMPENSATION; PAYMENT OF FEES

Consultant shall be compensated for services rendered to City pursuant to this Agreement in the amounts, manner and in accordance with the payment schedule as set forth in **EXHIBIT "D"** entitled "**COMPENSATION."** Amounts due to Consultant from City for services rendered shall be evidenced by the submission to City by Consultant of an invoice, prepared in a form satisfactory to City, setting forth the amount of compensation due for the period covered by it. Each such invoice shall be forwarded to City so as to reach it on the lst day of the month, or other applicable period, for which the services invoiced were provided. All such invoices shall be in full accord with any and all applicable provisions of this Agreement. City will review

each such invoice and retain them in accordance with **EXHIBIT "D,"** provided however that if Consultant submits an invoice which is incorrect, incomplete, or not in accord with the provisions of this Agreement, then City shall not be obligated to process any payment to Consultant until a correct and complying invoice has been submitted.

SECTION 6 - RESPONSIBILITY OF CONSULTANT

By executing this Agreement, Consultant warrants to City that Consultant possesses, or will arrange to secure from others, all of the necessary professional capabilities, experience, resources and facilities necessary to provide to City the services contemplated under this Agreement. Consultant further warrants that Consultant will follow the best current, generally accepted professional practices to make findings, render opinions, prepare factual presentations, and provide professional advice and recommendations regarding the project for which services are rendered under this Agreement. It is expressly understood by all parties to this Agreement that Consultant makes no guarantee or warranty whatsoever to the success of this project.

SECTION 7 - RESPONSIBILITY OF CITY

To the extent appropriate to the project contemplated by this Agreement, City shall:

- Assist Consultant by placing at Consultant's disposal all available information pertinent to the project, including previous reports and any other data relative to design and construction which may be applicable to it.
- <u>7.2</u> Guarantee access to and make all provisions for Consultant to enter upon public and private property as required for Consultant to perform Consultant services.
- <u>7.3</u> Examine all studies, reports, sketches, drawings, specifications, proposals and other documents prepared and presented by Consultant, and render verbally or in writing as may be appropriate, decisions pertaining thereto, within a reasonable time so as not to delay the progress of the work by Consultant.
- <u>7.4</u> Designate in writing a person to act as City's representative with respect to the work to be performed under this Agreement. Such person shall have complete authority to transmit instructions, receive information, interpret and define City's policies and decisions with respect to materials, equipment, elements and systems pertinent to Consultant's services.
- <u>7.5</u> Give prompt written notice to Consultant whenever City observes or otherwise becomes aware of any defect in the project.
- <u>7.6</u> Furnish approvals and permits from all governmental authorities having jurisdiction over the project and such approvals and consents from others as may be necessary for completion of the project.

SECTION 8 - INDEMNIFICATION

Consultant shall hold City, its officers, boards and commissions, and members thereof, its employees and agents harmless of and free from any and all liability arising out of or relating to any negligent act or omission of Consultant or Consultant's employees or agents in rendering the services required by this Agreement and shall protect, defend, and indemnify them against such liability and the legal fees and costs incurred by the City in connection therewith.

SECTION 9 - INSURANCE

Any requirements by City that Consultant carry general liability, errors and omissions, or any other type of insurance in connection with the work to be performed and/or services to be rendered by Consultant pursuant to this Agreement shall be as set forth in **EXHIBIT "E**," entitled **SPECIAL PROVISIONS**.

SECTION 10 - GENERAL PROVISIONS

10.1 Access to Records

Consultant shall maintain all books, records, documents, accounting ledgers, and similar materials relating to work performed for City under this Agreement on file for at least (1) year following the date of final payment to Consultant by City. Any duly authorized representative(s) of City shall have access to such records for the purpose of inspection, audit and copying at reasonable times, during Consultant's usual and customary business hours. Consultant shall provide proper facilities to City's representative(s) for access and inspection. Consultant shall be entitled to reasonable compensation for time and expenses related to such access and inspection activities, which shall be considered to be an additional service to City, falling under the provisions of SECTION 4 hereinabove.

10.2 Assignment

This Agreement is binding to heirs, successors, and assigns of the parties hereto and shall not be assigned by either City or Consultant without the prior written consent of the other.

10.3 Changes to Scope of Work - Basic Services

City may at any time and, upon a minimum of ten (10) days' written notice, modify the scope of basic services to be provided under this Agreement. Consultant shall, upon receipt of said notice, determine the impact on both time and compensation of such change in scope and notify City in writing. Upon agreement between City and Consultant as to the extent of said impacts to time and compensation, an amendment to this Agreement shall be prepared describing such changes. Execution of the amendment by City and Consultant shall constitute the Consultant's notice to proceed with the changed scope.

10.4 Compliance with Laws, Rules, Regulations

All services performed by Consultant pursuant to this Agreement shall be performed in accordance and full compliance with all applicable Federal, State or City statues, and any rules or regulations promulgated thereunder.

10.5 Conflict of Interest

If City's City Manager has determined that one or several of Consultant's Principal(s) or Project Manager(s) are subject to any provisions of the Anderson Municipal Code relating to conflict of interest, or the provisions of any rules or regulations which may have been promulgated thereunder, then each such person will be required to comply with said provisions in connection with the services they render to the City under this Agreement. City shall advise Consultant of any such provisions prior to the date of execution of this Agreement.

10.6 Exhibits Incorporated

All Exhibits referred to in this Agreement and attached to it are hereby incorporated in it by this reference.

10.7 Independent Contractor

City and Consultant agree that the relationship between them created by this Agreement does not constitute an employer-employee relationship, a partnership or joint-venture relationship of any kind between the City of Anderson and the Consultant. Consultant is not an agent of the City and has no authority to commit the City in any way whatsoever. Consultant shall be solely responsible for the conduct and control of the work performed under this Agreement. Consultant shall be free to render professional consulting services to others during the term of this Agreement, so long as such activities do not interfere with or diminish Consultant's ability to fulfill the obligations established herein to City.

10.8 Integration; Amendment

This Agreement represents the entire understanding of City and Consultant as to those matters contained herein. No prior oral or written understanding shall be of any force or effect with respect to those matters covered in it. This Agreement may not be modified or altered except by amendment in writing signed by both parties.

10.9 Jurisdiction

This Agreement shall be administered and interpreted under the laws of the State of California. Jurisdiction of litigation arising from this Agreement shall be in that state. If any part of this Agreement shall be in conflict with applicable laws, such part shall be inoperative, null, and void insofar as it is in conflict with said laws, but the remainder of the Agreement shall continue to be in full force and effect.

10.10 Notice to Proceed; Progress; Completion

Upon execution of this Agreement by the parties, City shall give Consultant written notice to proceed with the work. Such notice may authorize Consultant to render all of the services contemplated herein, or such portions or phases as may be mutually agreed upon. In the latter event, City shall, in its sole discretion, issue subsequent notices from time to time regarding further portions or phases of the work. Upon receipt of such notices, Consultants shall diligently proceed with the work authorized and complete it within the agreed time period.

10.11 Ownership of Documents

Title to all documents, drawings, specifications, and the like with respect to work performed under this Agreement shall vest with City at such time as City has compensated Consultant, as provided herein, for the services rendered by Consultant in connection with which they were prepared.

10.12 Subcontracts

Consultant shall be entitled, to the extent determined appropriate by Consultant, to subcontract any portion of the work to be performed under this Agreement. Consultant shall be responsible to City for the actions of persons and firms performing subcontract work. The subcontracting of work by Consultant shall not relieve Consultant, in any manner, of the obligations and requirements imposed upon Consultant by this Agreement.

10.13 Term; Termination

The term of this Agreement shall commence upon City's issuance to Consultant of a notice to proceed for all or a portion of the work, as hereinabove provided, and shall end upon City's acceptance and payment for all or such portion of the work as was authorized by such notice, including any and all retentions. Notwithstanding the foregoing, City may, in its sole discretion, terminate this Agreement at any time and for any reason whosoever by giving at least ten (10) days' prior written notice of such termination to Consultant.

10.14 Notices

Any notices required to be given pursuant to this Agreement shall be deemed to have been given by their deposit, postage prepaid, in the United States Postal Service, addressed to the parties as follows:

Nothing hereinabove shall prevent either City or Consultant from personally delivering any such notices to the other.

SECTION 11 - SPECIAL PROVISIONS

PROPOSAL FOR ENGINEERING SERVICES

Master Water Plan

PACE Engineering, Inc. (PACE) is pleased to provide this proposal to the City of Anderson (City). It is our understanding that the City desires to complete a Master Water Plan. The City's last Master Water Plan was completed in 2006 and, since then, the City has made significant modifications to its water system. As a result, a new Master Water Plan is needed to re-evaluate the current water system and guide the City's future improvements. Our proposed Scope of Services is shown below:

SCOPE OF SERVICES

TASK 100 - CITY DATA REVIEW

The City has developed a Geospatial Information System (GIS) that includes their water system. The data contained within the water system GIS can be used as the basis for a hydraulic model; however, it is our understanding that the accuracy of this data varies widely depending on location. A review of this data is necessary before it can be used in a hydraulic model. The effort required to perform this task depends on the accuracy of the initial data, which is unclear at this time. The following item will be completed:

1. PACE will review existing City water system GIS and compare it to mapping provided by the City.

TASK 200 - MAPPING UPDATE

PACE will prepare an updated dataset for use in the hydraulic model. This effort will include:

- 1. A kickoff meeting with City staff to review existing system and needed information.
- Development of a simplified water system backbone based on data developed in Task 100.

TASK 300 - HYDRAULIC MODELING

Based on the data developed in Task 200, the following hydraulic models will be developed using AutoDesk's InfoWater Pro and Esri's ArcGIS Pro:

- 1. Base Model PACE will develop a Base Model that represents the existing system and will be calibrated (refer to Task 400). The Base Model will include:
 - a. Existing peak daily and hourly demands.
 - b. Existing water mains, storage, and pumping facilities.
 - c. Calibrating the model based on data collected in the field.
 - d. Assumed required fire flow based on City-provided requirements.
 - e. The Base Model will be used to propose water main, storage, and pumping facilities to remediate existing and near-term water system deficiencies.
- 2. 2044 Model PACE will develop a 2044 Model that will:
 - a. Utilize the Base Model as a starting point.
 - Include 20-year water demands based on input from the City. These demands will include planned developments and/or infill within the existing service area boundary.
 - c. Calibrate the model.
 - d. The 2044 Model will be used to propose water main, storage, and pumping facilities to remediate 20-year water system deficiencies.
- 3. Ultimate Model PACE will develop an Ultimate Model that will:
 - a. Utilize the 2044 Model as a starting point.
 - b. Include ultimate water demands based on permissible development densities and input from the City.
 - c. Calibrate the model.
 - d. The Ultimate Model will be used to propose water main, storage, and pumping facilities to remediate ultimate water system deficiencies.

TASK 400 - MODEL CALIBRATION FIELD WORK

Based on the data developed in Tasks 100 through 300, the Base Model will be calibrated to the degree practical from data collected in the field. This will largely be based on fire flow information. This effort will include the following:

- 1. PACE will review the fire flow data provided by the City.
- 2. PACE will field test the fire hydrants with the City's assistance.
- 3. PACE will finalize the hydrant curves for the Base Model.

TASK 500 - REPORT

Based on the models developed in Task 300, a draft Master Water Plan report will be developed. The report will include following:

- 1. Summary of the Existing Water System:
 - Supply
 - Treatment (general description)
 - Pressure zones

- Storage
- Booster pump stations
- Pressure reducing and automatic valves
- Distribution system
- Fire flow and system analysis
- 2. Future Water Demands:
 - Service area
 - Growth projection
 - Projected water demands
- 3. Analysis and Recommended Improvements:
 - General
 - Supply
 - Treatment (general evaluation)
 - Pressure zones
 - Storage
 - Booster pump stations
 - Pressure reducing and automatic valves
 - Distribution system
 - Fire flow
 - Monitoring, alarm, and control systems
- 4. Cost Estimates and Financial Considerations:
 - Basis
 - Improvement costs
 - Financial considerations
- 5. Supporting Figures, Tables and Plates

Five hard copies of the draft Master Water Plan will be submitted to the City for comment. City comments will then be incorporated into a final Master Water Plan, of which twenty hard copies will be submitted to the City. PACE will be available to present the final Master Water Plan to the City Council.

ITEMS NOT INCLUDED

The following items are not included in the above Scope of Services:

- 1. Groundwater assessment
- 2. Supplemental Water Supply Feasibility Analysis
- 3. Urban Water Management Plan
- 4. Environmental documentation
- 5. Consultation with authority(ies) having jurisdiction
- 6. Final design of proposed improvements
- 7. Cost estimates with accuracy beyond budgetary

FEE

Our proposed fee for completing the identified Scope of Services is shown below. Refer to attached Fee Estimate and Person-Hour Breakdown. The fee assumes the majority of the Scope of Services will be completed in 2025 and accounts for typical inflationary increases in our standard rates. Given the uncertainty surrounding Task 100, it will be completed on a time-and-expense basis not to exceed without prior approval. The remainder of the task will be billed on a percent complete basis.

SPECIAL PROVISIONS

INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS FOR CONSULTANT

CONSULTANT shall procure and maintain for the duration of the contract insurance against claims and injuries to persons or damages to property which may arise from or in connection with the work hereunder by the CONSULTANT, his agents, representatives, employees or subcontractors. The cost of such insurance shall be the sole responsibility of the CONSULTANT.

A. Minimum Scope of Coverage:

Insurance shall cover:

- 1. Professional Liability.
- 2. Comprehensive General Liability.
- 3. Automobile Liability.
- 4. Workers Compensation.
- B. Minimum Limits of Insurance:
 - 1. Professional Liability: \$2,000,000 errors and omissions.
 - 2. Comprehensive General Liability: \$2,000,000 combined single limit per occurrence for bodily injury, personal injury and property damage.
 - 3. Automobile Liability: \$1,000,000 combined single limit per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
 - 4. Workers Compensation: Limits as set forth in the Labor Code of the State of California.
- C. Deductibles:

Any deductibles must be declared to and approved by the City.

D. Other Insurance Provisions:

The Policies must contain the following provisions:

- 1. General Liability and Automobile Liability Coverage:
 - a. The City, its officials, employees and volunteers are to be covered as insureds as respects: liability arising out of activities performed by or on behalf of the CONSULTANT; premises owned, leased, or used by the CONSULTANT; or automobiles owned, leased, hired or borrowed by the CONSULTANT.

The coverage shall contain no special limitations on the scope of protection afforded to the City, its officials, employees and volunteers.

- b. The CONSULTANT's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance as respects the City, its officials, employees and volunteers. Any insurance maintained by the City, its officials, employees and volunteers shall be excess of CONSULTANT's insurance and shall not contribute with it.
- Any failure to comply with the reporting provisions of the policies shall not affect coverage provided to the City, its officials, employees and volunteers.
- d. coverage shall state that CONSULTANT's insurance shall apply separately to each insured against whom claim is made or suit is brought, except with respect to the insurer's liability.

Workers Compensation:

The insurer shall agree to waive all rights of subrogation against the City, its officials, employees and volunteers for losses arising from work performed by CONSULTANT for the City.

3. All Coverage:

Each insurance policy required herein shall be endorsed to state that coverage shall not be suspended, voided, canceled, reduced in coverage or in limits except after thirty (30) days advance written notice to City by certified mail, return receipt requested.

E. Acceptability of Insurers:


Insurance shall be placed with insurers admitted to do business in California and with a Best rating of no less than A+.

F. Verification of Coverage:

CONSULTANT shall furnish the City with certificates of insurance coverage with the City named as an additional insured, and with original endorsements affecting coverage as required by this Agreement. The certificates and endorsements for each insurance policy are to be signed by a person authorized by that insurer to bind coverage on its behalf. The certificates are to be received and approved by the City before work commences.

G. Subcontractors:

CONSULTANT shall include all subcontractors as insureds under its policies or shall furnish separate certificates and endorsements for each subcontractor. All coverages for subcontractors shall be subject to all of the requirements stated herein.

RECOMMENDATION

The Public Works Director recommends that the City Council:

- 1. Award the McMurry Drive Rehabilitation Project contract to J.F. Shea Construction, Inc. for \$777,747.00.
- 2. Authorize the City Manager to execute the contract upon receipt of the required insurance certificates, payment bond, and performance bond.
- 3. Authorize the Public Works Director to approve change orders not to exceed 20% of the bid amount.

FISCAL IMPACT

The Engineers Estimate was \$1,000,000 and will be funded from the Regional Surface Transportation Program, SB1 Gas Tax, and Local Transportation Funds. The lowest responsible bidder had a bid of \$777,747.00. Change orders as a contingency not to exceed \$155,549.40 (20% of \$777,747.00). The total fiscal impact is estimated to be \$933,296.40

DISCUSSION and BACKGROUND

Historically McMurry Drive has been a two-lane road but is classified as a minor arterial connecting Balls Ferry Road to North Street. With the construction of Interstate 5, McMurry Drive became the arterial between the Northbound Interstate 5 off-ramp and Northbound Interstate 5 on-ramp. As additional developments occurred, frontage improvements were made to construct curb, gutter, and sidewalk. As these developments were completed, the road was widened to match the 84' Right of Way. However, as this was done, the layout of travel lanes did not change, except for the Southerly section below Ganyon Drive to Balls Ferry Road. When Rite Aid was developed on the Northerly section, a second lane was added from their parcel limit to North Street. The layout and capacity of the road didn't change again until Quick Quack was developed in 2022.

On July 5, 2022, a reimbursement agreement with Quick Quack was approved to design, construct, and install off-site improvements to provide continuity for McMurry Drive. This extended the arterial design that Rite Aid had started back in 2006. This design established two 12' travel lanes and a 4' bike lane consistent with the City of Anderson Construction Standards 112.70 and the General Plan Circulation Element.

At the June 4, 2024, City Council meeting, the task order for GHD's proposal to create a 100% plans, specifications, and exhibits (PSE) package for the rehabilitation of McMurry Drive was approved. This design creates a well-defined roadway with two travel lanes and a 4' bike lane for Northbound and Southbound directions. The exception to this design is for three parcels created by Parcel Map 22-02. To complete the gap between Anderson Walk-In Clinic and Round Table Pizza, the developer was conditioned to construct complete frontage improvements, including curb, gutter, sidewalk, and paving. This area will be designed and designated to be constructed privately. This design will be provided to the developer to aid in their construction efforts. Completing this during the overall design process ensures continuity throughout the project.

At the August 20, 2024, City Council meeting, staff was directed to advertise the project for bid. The project was advertised on August 21, 2024, on CIPList. Sealed bids were opened on September 11, 2024, in the City Council chambers, and the lowest responsible bidder was J.F. Shea Construction, Inc., with an apparent low bid of \$777,747.00.
