IV. Words from Dr. Kevin Ward, Superintendent

New online Academy

Dr. Ward turned the floor over to Mr. Danny McClain.

Mr. McClain offered an overview of the program, Carter County Online Academy. After looking at several different online home school programs, Odyssey Ware was chosen. Odyssey Ware can be accessed M-F through several different programs such as messaging, telephone, Skype and email. It is approved by Advance Ed, NCAA and several others. A parent meeting was held and about 20 parents representing approximately 45 students attended. Phone calls have been received from parents asking for information and to thank the system for making this program available. Enrollment for the program will be advertised in the next week and enrollment will start on July 1 for the coming year. Odyssey Ware will be available to students from Kindergarten through 12th grade and the cost for the program will be about \$2600 / \$2700 per student and the county will receive approximately \$8200 / \$8500 per student enrolled. The students will be able to participate in activities through the physical school they are enrolled in.

Several questions about who could enroll, attendance, diplomas, college preparedness, and oversite of the students, were asked by committee members and were answered by Mr. McClain.

Students inside and outside the county school system and even outside the state can enroll in this program and become a member of the school system. Students enrolled in the program will have to meet the same qualifications for graduation as the on-site students.
