 The planning and community development division of RPC seeks to improve household hazardous waste collection options for East Central Illinois, (previously addressed through the Illinois EPA who scaled back services due to funding cuts).

Funding Research: Foundation Example

- The Champaign County Regional Planning Commission (CCRPC) is looking for \$33,000 to improve household hazardous waste collection options for East Central Illinois.
 - Narrow down potential funding sources
 - (Starting local) Lumpkin Family Foundation: Supporting non-profit organizations and units of local government in East Central Illinois
 - "...encourage environmental responsibility..."
 - Letter of inquiry (online), required before full application

Funding Research: Government Example

- The Village of Sadorus needs \$250,000 for critical water system upgrades.
 - Program Clarity
 - Fully understand your organization and motivations

Municipal government

Responsible for public infrastructure

Responsible for health and safety of workers and residents

 Fully understand the project and motivations
 Critical infrastructure upgrades needed to protect local system workers and local residents (resource recipients)

Funding Research: Government Example

- The Village of Sadorus needs \$250,000 for critical water system upgrades.
 - Narrow down potential funding sources (start local)
 - Infrastructure is not a common focus for many foundations
 - Local corporate or organizational donations would not likely contribute this much money
 - State of Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Development: Community Development Assistance Program (CDAP)
 - Units of local government with population of 50,000 or less
 - "...enable grantees to carry out ...activities that will expand economic opportunity, principally for low and moderateincome persons..."
 - 60 pages of instructions, 46 page application

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Common components

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- Organization Information
- Statement of Need
- Project Description
 - Goals
 - Objectives
 - Methodology
 - Sustainability
- Budget
- Evaluation

- Title
 - Direct, clear, comprehensive but not too long
- Executive Summary clear and persuasive
 - Describe the problem and why outside assistance is needed
 - A few key descriptors of your project
 - What makes your project unique or exceptional
 - How is your organization uniquely positioned to carry out the project
 - Identify the amount requested
 - Sometimes the executive summary is easiest to write last, after all other parameters have been defined

Executive Summary: Foundation Example

This project aims to identify a strategy to improve household hazardous waste collection options for East Central Illinois. Leftover household projects that contain corrosive, toxic, ignitable, or reactive ingredients require special care at disposal to protect the health and safety of the region's population and environment. To accomplish this, CCRPC is requesting \$33,000 to cover the estimated 320 hours of staff time necessary to research and compile data and information, inventory available options, as well as interview and subsequently review information with relevant parties.

Statement of Need – Foundation Example

HHW are leftover household products that contain corrosive, toxic, ignitable, or reactive ingredients (e.g., non-latex paints, harsh chemical cleaners, oils, thinners, weed killers, insecticides, and pesticides). HHW requires special care at disposal.

Downstate IEPA HHW collections are <u>inadequate for several reasons</u> (infrequent, expensive, inconvenient, etc.). Local government jurisdictions or agencies requesting a HHW one-day collection are placed on a prioritized waiting list, with amount of local funds provided for the one-day collection as one IEPA selection criterion. For a HHW collection, local funds derived from landfill 'tipping fees' is not available to the great majority of Illinois counties with no landfill. Meanwhile, county and municipal governments and area health agencies constantly receive inquiries from residents about HHW disposal.

Project Description

- Goals related to defined need and target beneficiaries
- Objectives describes the outcomes
- Methodology
 - How will you carry out the tasks?
 - How much time will it take?
 - What resources will be required?
 - In what order do they need to be completed?
- Sustainability how will the impact endure in the future?
- Describe the program in a way that will pique interest
 - Be prepared to sell the "heart" of the program
 - Why should anyone else care?

Project Description – Foundation Example

Counties selected as an initial regional focus will include the East Central Illinois counties of: Champaign, Vermilion, Douglas, Edgar, Coles, Cumberland, and Clark.

Goal

The first phase of this project is the development of a report which contains complete background information and a descriptive inventory of alternatives for HHW collections in the seven east central Illinois counties.

The proposed Phase I Report will include:

Objectives

- 1) <u>a</u> description of state and federal hazardous waste regulations which relate to HHW in Illinois, with particular focus being the selected east central Illinois counties
- 2) a description of what happens to HHW collected in Illinois [generally].
- 3) <u>a</u> description of best management practices/state-of-the-art HHW disposal/recycling/reuse alternatives generally.

Project Description – Foundation Example

- Convene local stakeholders to educate and explore local options.
- Identify existing reuse, recycling, and composting businesses that would like to expand.
- Perform an analysis to identify wastes that need to be managed differently. This would show development
 potential of enterprises that reuse, recycle, or compost these wastes.
- Identify local resources available and adopt policies in support of this vision of an RR park.
- Contact others who have developed such facilities and learn how they approached the task.
- Target realistic steps for your program, budget for them and make sure they are accomplished.

Methodology

Budget

- Decide how much to ask for
 - Very few funders will fund 100% of a project
 - Look at other grants awarded by agency
 - Apply to multiple sources (if you can find suitable ones)
- Justify all expenses
- Be consistent with the project description
- Parameters to consider:
 - Duration
 - Level of resource commitment from your organization
 - Resource commitment from other collaborators

- Evaluation define the criteria for evaluating the success of your project
 - Three major types of evaluation:
 - Goals-based: have you achieved your objectives?
 - Process-based: analyze strengths and weaknesses
 - Outcomes-based: what is broader impact?
 - Know the project's desired outcome
 - Know the funder's expectations
 - Know how much \$ is available in budget for evaluation

Evaluation – Foundation Example

"Conditions of Grant" contract, 2012:

On or before December 1,2013 provide to The Foundation a report. This report will describe actions taken and review progress toward goals, stating whether or not goals were achieved and explaining reasons for success/failure; describe lessons learned; and provide an accounting of all funds spent with explanation of variances from the original proposal.

Who

The Village of Sadorus owns its own water system and water treatment plant. In 2012, the Sangamon Valley Water District took over operations. During this transition, some major health and safety threats were found primarily in the electrical controls for the water treatment plant. There are direct threats to workers on site at the plant as well as the daily potential for system shut down, which has occurred five times since the Water District took over.

Who

What

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Project Description – Government Example

The control equipment for the various treatment processes is antiquated and needs to be upgraded to ensure reliable treatment for the community. The water treatment plant generator was installed in the 1960s. Replacement parts can no longer be found. It has no automatic control switch, so someone has to go and manually turn it on if needed. Four of the five shutdowns over the last 18 months were because the system lost controls to the water wells; lost controls to the tank that tells the wells when to shut off (twice); and disabled the softener unit's ability to regenerate properly. In addition, the softener does not have a working safety valve, and the valve has been discontinued. The District is unable to repair it. This replacement will require new process piping and valve cluster to maintain operation. The District fears another shutdown any day because of these lifecycle issues.

Goal

Objectives

The water treatment plant also needs upgrades to the building and site to maintain protection of safe drinking water for residents. The project will include installing a metal roof and painting the exterior of the building.

Finally, the Village has proposed upgrades to two sections of water main in the existing water distribution system. These undersized, non-looped water mains are not providing adequate flow, pressures, fire flow and water quality. Replacements are planned for Second Street between County Highway 17 and West Street, and Vine Street south of South Street.

Each application must demonstrate that the proposed project is appropriate and achievable and that all actions have been completed to ensure timely implementation of the project. Specifically, the application must address all of the following, if applicable:

- Status of IEPA permit(s)

 A permit from the IEPA Bureau of Water Construction will be necessary; however, since this grant application integrates design, the permit has not yet been requested.
- Open CDAP grant(s)
 The Village of Sadorus has not received a CDAP grant.
- Easements (number necessary, obtained, and recorded)
 No easements are necessary for this project

The Village finances are insufficient to cover the cost of this project without external assistance. They are going to raise the rates by \$1.60 per household to help offset project costs. They do not have outstanding debt or bonds, and want to be responsible in controlling debt for the community. The CDAP funding makes this project uniquely possible.

Evaluation expectations vary by funder, always use their guidelines – This example is not particularly specific or meaningful:

- What does "construction complete" mean for the beneficiaries (for both employees and households) in terms of health and safety?
- Are there checks/tests the consultant, engineers, or facility workers will perform that could be included here?
- Is there a grade or certification of the system that can be compared before and after the construction?

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General Tips

- Pay Close Attention to Application Guidelines
 - Start the process as early as possible
 - Have another person proofread for grammar and clarity
- Relationship Building
 - Before application
 - Initial contact don't be afraid to cold-call to introduce yourself or ask questions not covered on their website
 - Following up
 - · Call to say "Thank You!" if grant is awarded
 - If application is turned down, stay in contact regarding future opportunities if the funder seems like a good fit
 - Reporting
 - Stay on top of reporting requirements

General Tips

- Know when to ask for help
 - Understanding what you need and where you want to go will save you time and money if you hire outside help.
- Don't be afraid to apply for more than one grant for the same project
 - Few funders are willing to fund 100% of a project
