The Clinton-Macomb Public Library received the deed to the future Main Library property in a special ceremony held on November 5th. Clinton Township Supervisor Robert J. Cannon handed the deed to Library Board President Donald W. Green, opening the way for construction to begin on the new facility. The property now has the above sign marking the site and an official groundbreaking will be held in the spring.

At its completion, planned for 2003, the new library will occupy 9.3 acres on the west side of Romeo Plank, just south of Canal Road, adjacent to and north of the Clinton Township Civic Center. The library will be a brick and glass building with a metal, pitched roof and, at 82,000 square feet, will be the largest library in Macomb County. Special features of the building include three meeting rooms, five study rooms, a fireplace with casual seating area, a puppet stage, a children's story time alcove and craft area, and a Friends of the Library book store and gift shop.

Did you know that you are part of history in the making? You are what has made this an incredible year at the Clinton-Macomb Public Library! That is because our customersthat's you - borrowed over 500,000 books this year from us, which is more than twice the number you borrowed last year. This makes your library one of, if not the busiest library in Macomb County!

In July we opened our new North Branch; if you haven't seen it you should take some time to visit this friendly facility on 24 Mile Road just west of Romeo Plank Road. This 14,000 square foot library has a contemporary feel and features bright and colorful neon signs, splashy graphic decorations, and a world clock that lets you know the time all around the globe.

But what makes your library a great place isn't just the decorations. The library saw tremendous growth in titles available for you this year. We purchased 41,791 new books, CDs, videos and DVDs bringing our collection up to over 110,000 items. The nice part about our materials collection is that most of the items have been purchased within the last three years so you're getting the latest information on topics that interest you the most such as computers, home decorating, crafts, great fiction, travel, etc. We are seeing increased interest in DVDs, so we are purchasing more to make sure that we have what you want on the shelf. If you receive a DVD player for Christmas, make sure to check out our free DVD collections. In fact, everything is free at your library. You can borrow the most recent best-selling novel, CD, book on tape or CD, video or DVD. There are no rental fees.

You are probably wondering how we accomplished so much. Our success is due to your support and our wonderful staff and board. We currently have over 65 people working to serve you. Our goal is always to find the books and other media that we know you want to read, listen to or view. Our dedicated staff is focused on making your library visit enjoyable and productive. We have librarians with master's degrees in library science, technicians that keep our equipment user-ready, high school students who shelve books, and other friendly folks working around the building to help you find what you need. Our board of trustees contributes countless hours of service to the library and community. In fact, Board President Don Green recently was recognized for his library leadership. Take a moment to read the article to the right for the details.

We are all looking forward to making 2002 our best year ever. One of our goals is to double our circulation so that we can hit the million items borrowed mark. If you are a Clinton or Macomb Township resident and you have yet to visit your library system, you can be the important spark that helps our community make history by coming to one of our three libraries and to get your library card and start borrowing materials. The more items you check out, the more space we'll have on the shelves for new materials. If you don't have a library card, the process of getting one is simple and quick. All you need is some ID showing that you live or work in Macomb or Clinton Township and you'll be able to borrow materials on your first visit. Your library is working hard to make Clinton and Macomb Townships great places to live. We invite you to join us at the library where exciting things are happening and - hopefully - history is being made!

Finding Nonfiction

Here are a few clues ...



So often parents and young people look around the Children's/ luvenile area and ask

where the books on dogs are located (clue: |636.7) because junior wants to get a puppy and needs to read up on the subject. Or the ever in demand dinosaur books are asked for (clue: [567.9]. Most folks don't realize that fairytales and folktales are in the nonfiction section (clue: J398.2), and, poetry is to be found here, also (clue: [811]. Books about bugs, stars, mummies, wrestling and other sports, all written for kids, are located in nonfiction.

One of the reasons we have interfiled the juvenile and adult nonfiction items is because some of the best research and most current information is to be found in juvenile nonfiction! Think about it - publishers want books and tapes that kids will be using for research for homework assignments to be accurate and up-todate. So, if you are looking for reliable information on a certain breed of dog, facts about a state you are thinking of moving to or a bit of civil war trivia, consider looking in the nonfiction section or in the online catalog for call numbers that start with a "J".

If you happen to be in the North Branch, check out the Juvenile New & Featured section, a new section sandwiched between the Juvenile Series and the Reference shelves.

Diving Into Databases

Libraries have changed a lot in the last decade. Access to materials is faster, more



convenient, and more inclusive in the current online environment. Nowadays databases complement and in some cases have replaced print resources. There are numerous benefits with this type of electronic resource including 24/7 access, space-saving advantages, and ease-of-use.

Did you know there are databases for finding the complete articles from a variety of magazines and newspapers? There are also databases geared towards specific subjects such as business, health, or genealogy research. There are even databases that have images as well as text. Some databases are designed for specific users such as children who might need to find information for their homework assignment. In many cases the information found in online databases is the same information that can be found in print resources; it is simply the means of delivery of that information that is more versatile. Online databases are accessed via the Internet, but don't be confused—information found in databases is not the same as finding material on the Internet-at-large. Information that is made available in databases has been selected, reviewed, and organized in such a way that makes it authoritative and easy-to-use.

The Clinton-Macomb Public Library (CMPL) is pleased to offer a variety of these online databases at their public computers through a fast and direct cable connection to the Internet. There are four public computers at the Main Library, eight public computers at the South Branch in addition to a networked computer that provides access solely to the databases, and four public computers at the North Branch with additional wireless online access via laptop computers coming in the near future.



The library has recently subscribed to databases that are helpful for researching companies, finding literary or biographical information, and completing homework assignments. CMPL is also very fortunate to be a participant in AccessMichigan, a statewide service of the Library of Michigan giving every library and resident of the state access to a core set of database resources. Here is a sampling of the many databases you can access at any of the CMPL locations:

- AncestryPlus (genealogy research)
- Biography Resource Center (biographical information)
- New York Times and more (120 national and international online newspapers)
- Electric Library Elementary (great for kids!)
- Health and Wellness Resource Center (medical and health issues)
- Hoovers (business and company research)
- InfoTrac General Reference Center Gold (covers numerous topics from popular periodicals, newspapers, and reference resources)
- Literature Resource Center (literary criticism and author information)
- NetLibrary (access books online including CliffNotes)
- Student Resource Center Junior (great for kids!).

Many of these electronic resources can be accessed from the comfort of home as well as within the library. Call your local library and ask the librarian if the database you'd like to use from home has remote access available. You can find these databases



via the library's web site at http://www.cmpl.org (just click on the database link at the top of the screen). If you've never tried using the databases before or you're not sure which one would be best for your information needs, please stop in at one of our branches, and a librarian would be happy to demonstrate how to select the best database for your needs, how to search for information within the database, and how to use its feature to get the most out of your information quest.

Happy Birthday Curious George!

Curious George, one of the most popular children's characters of all time, turned 60 in October. His books have sold over 25 million copies and have been translated



into 14 different languages. Through six decades, he has been to the zoo, the hospital, the fire station, the beach, ridden a bike, gone camping, ridden a rocket, and much more!

Curious George was created in 1939 while Hans and Margret Rey lived in Paris. Their first book, *Raffy and the 9 Monkeys*, included a curious little monkey named Fifi (George). It was at this time that the Nazi army was going to invade Paris so the Reys set off on bicycles with warm coats, a little bit of food, and five stories about Curious George. They left just in time, because Paris was invaded later that day. They rode their bicycles to the Spanish-French border, where they sold their bikes for train fare to Lisbon, Portugal. They eventually made their way to New York City, where they became famous children's authors.

The Curious George Foundation was founded in 1989 by Margret Rey and funds programs for children that emphasize ingenuity, opportunity, determination, and curiosity in learning and exploring. These are the same qualities that made Curious George so lovable. Most of their giving is centered on programs that prevent cruelty to animals and community outreach for family programs.

Children around the world have been reading his books for many years. Some favorites include: The Cat in the Hat, Green Eggs and Ham, Horton Hears a Who and And to Think That I Saw It On Mulberry Street, to name a few.

To honor Dr. Seuss and promote the importance and enjoyment of reading, the National Education Association celebrates this day with an event called Read Across America. Begun in 1998, with almost 10 million children and adults celebrating the joy of reading the program continues to grow as many more schools, libraries and other organizations participate each year.

The Clinton-Macomb Public Library will again join with libraries across the country to celebrate reading and Dr. Seuss' birthday. 
