FROM the DIRECTOR...

The Clinton-Macomb Public Library was recently selected as one of just 50 public libraries from across the nation to receive a grant from the Public Library Association and the Institute for Museum and Library Services for the Inclusive Internship Initiative. The goal of the program is to increase diversity in the library profession by providing the opportunity for young people to experience firsthand the great work that libraries do in serving their communities. Angie Vita, a Macomb Township resident who attends L'Anse Creuse High School North, was selected as our intern to work with mentor Amy Young, one of CMPL's School Outreach Librarians. Angie had

the opportunity to shadow library staff members at all three CMPL locations to learn about the many wonderful things we have to offer in programs, services and collections. She also worked on a major project, which included engaging 4th graders in the six school systems served by the library in reading. The internship grant covered a visit to meet with the other 49 interns from across the country at the Library of Congress in June and a follow-up meeting in Chicago later this fall. Needless to say, we hope that this initiative results in more than one future librarian based on the experience these young people had!

Meeting Angie made me think about my first experience in working in a public library 35 years ago as a page (I think child labor laws were a little laxer in those days....). It didn't take long to figure out that while the library offered a great work environment, it was physically strenuous with lots of walking, stooping, bending, reaching to put books on the shelf; setting up and taking down tables and chairs for the hundreds of programs. When I was promoted to the circulation desk, I experienced the joy of working directly with the public checking out the items I used to shelve and seeing the excitement and joy of kids taking items home, adults having something to read on their vacation, etc. Years later when I became a librarian, I quickly experienced how to become an expert at "finding" things (not necessarily "knowing" things) and the satisfaction of helping people. Today, as the library director of one of Michigan's busiest public libraries for the past 11 years, I could write a book on the amazing accomplishments, experiences and challenges of running this library system. While it may come as a surprise, even 35 years later I still have the same sense of enthusiasm and excitement as I enter the staff door to start my day working at the library.

Have you or someone you know every considered becoming a librarian? It's not the right profession for everyone and just because you like to read books isn't necessarily a good indicator! To start, a master's degree in library science is required; any undergraduate degree is acceptable. We are fortunate to have two library schools (the University of Michigan and Wayne State University; there are also many online programs) in Michigan. Librarians must enjoy working with members of the public of all ages, backgrounds, beliefs, manners and interests. Many of our librarians are responsible for selecting the items for the collection, the quantity, and which items should be removed and when. They do programming, school visits, tours. They are expected to be knowledgeable in finding credible sources of information to answer questions or to recommend a good read. Being able to help with basic questions about eBooks and other electronic resources is becoming a standard part of the job as well. Of course, there are the less glamorous duties which include cleaning up messes, unjamming the copier, and balancing acceptable noise levels for those who believe the library should be absolutely silent and people who let their children run wild or speak too loudly on cell phones. If I've not scared you off and you think a career in libraries may be in your future, feel free to contact me, or any of our librarians at the reference desks, to learn more. Each of us has a different path and story to tell, and we would be happy to share our advice and more about what we do. Future librarian or not, we look forward to serving you soon!




