# Take the Kindergarten Challenge

Welcome to Kindergarten! Your child's educational journey began with you, but it doesn't stop when they go off to the classroom. Continue your journey together at home by taking part in the Kindergarten Challenge.

The Kindergarten Challenge has been designed by the Clinton-Macomb Public Library to assist your Kindergartener in their literacy development. This list of read-aloud books will need to know help your child develop the skills necessary to become a thriving reader. Reading aloud is the single most important activity for building the knowledge required for eventual success in reading<sup>1</sup>. Literacy results in Kindergarten are predictive of reading and writing achievement levels at the end of first grade and research shows that children who begin third grade struggling in reading and writing rarely catch up to their age-appropriate peers and tend to struggle all the way through high school<sup>2</sup>. Working together with your Kindergartener, you can strengthen their literacy skills, instill an importance of reading, and have fun together!





## What to do with the Kindergarten Challenge:

Your child has received the Kindergarten Challenge packet which includes the poster of 100 books to read during kindergarten. Within the titles listed you will see some old classics, some new books, and many concept building books. All book titles located at CMPL are marked with an orange star 👚 to help spot them in the collections.

## Completing the Challenge:

Pick a book to start with and the reading fun begins. Choose a special time for you to read aloud to your child. As your child's reading progresses, take turns reading pages to each other. As you complete reading books, mark off the star next to the title with a marker. Don't forget to talk about the books, helping to reinforce comprehension skills for your Kindergartener.

Once you've completed reading all 100 books, stop by the library to receive your certificate of completion, a free book, and a Kindergarten Challenge Sticker!

## Ways to help your children get the most out of being read to:

- Read slowly, with expression. Try using different voices for different characters.
- Follow the words with your finger as you read. Your child will see that words are read from the left to the right of the page.
- ★ Point to the pictures and say the names of objects and colors.
- ★ Have your child help turn the pages.
- ★ Ask your child to describe pictures, repeat phrases used in the story, and predict what will happen next.
- ★ Take time to answer her questions.
