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## DEFINITIONS

#### National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS)

The National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) is a crime reporting system designed to improve the accuracy and depth of crime data collected by law enforcement agencies. Unlike traditional summary reporting methods, NIBRS captures detailed information on each individual crime incident and any related offenses that occur within the same event.

NIBRS data includes:

- Specific details about the crime itself
- Information about victims and known offenders
- The relationship between victims and offenders
- Details on arrestees and the property involved in the crime

Law enforcement agencies across the country report NIBRS data to the **Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) annually**, providing a more comprehensive and transparent understanding of crime trends. By offering a clearer picture of crime at local, state, and national levels, NIBRS helps law enforcement agencies improve resource allocation, crime prevention strategies, and public safety efforts.

## Crimes Against Persons (NIBRS - Group A Offenses)

Crimes Against Persons are offenses where an individual is the direct victim of harm, injury, or the threat of violence. These crimes typically involve physical force or coercion and can result in serious consequences for victims. Under the **National Incident-Based Reporting System** (NIBRS), the following offenses fall into this category:

## Homicide Offenses:

- Murder & Non-Negligent Manslaughter The intentional killing of another person.
- Manslaughter by Negligence The unintentional killing of another person due to reckless or negligent behavior.

## Sex Offenses (Forcible & Non-Forcible):

- Rape Non-consensual sexual penetration.
- Sodomy Oral or anal sexual contact without consent.
- Sexual Assault with an Object The use of an object or instrument to sexually assault a victim.
- Fondling The intentional touching of another person's private parts for sexual gratification without consent.
- Incest Sexual intercourse between closely related individuals where marriage is legally prohibited.
- Statutory Rape Non-forcible sexual intercourse with a minor below the age of legal consent.

## Assault Offenses:

- Aggravated Assault An attack involving a weapon or resulting in serious bodily injury.
- Simple Assault An attack without a weapon that causes minor or no injuries.
- Intimidation Threatening harm to another person without physical attack.

#### Kidnapping & Human Trafficking:

- Kidnapping/Abduction Unlawfully seizing, transporting, or detaining a person against their will.
- Human Trafficking Commercial Sex Acts Forcing individuals into prostitution, pornography, or other sexual exploitation.
- Human Trafficking Involuntary Servitude Forcing individuals into labor or services through coercion, threats, or fraud.

These crimes are taken seriously due to their impact on victims and communities. Law enforcement agencies track these offenses in detail to better understand trends, improve response efforts, and enhance public safety measures.

## Crimes Against Property (NIBRS - Group A Offenses)

Crimes Against Property involve the **theft**, **destruction**, **or unlawful use of property** without causing direct harm to individuals. These offenses can range from fraud and vandalism to

burglary and robbery. The National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) categorizes the following crimes as property offenses:

## Property Damage & Destruction:

- Arson Intentional burning of property, including buildings, vehicles, or other structures.
- Destruction/Damage/Vandalism of Property Willful damage to property, excluding arson.

## Theft & Burglary Offenses:

- Burglary/Breaking & Entering Unlawful entry into a structure to commit a crime.
- Robbery Taking property by force, threat, or intimidation.
- Pocket-Picking Stealing items from a person's pockets or clothing without force.
- Purse-Snatching Taking a purse or bag from someone's possession without force.
- Shoplifting Stealing merchandise from a retail store.
- Theft from a Building Stealing property from inside a building without unlawful entry.
- Theft from a Coin-Operated Machine or Device Stealing money or valuables from vending machines, parking meters, etc.
- Theft from a Motor Vehicle Stealing items from inside a car.
- Theft of Motor Vehicle Parts/Accessories Stealing car parts such as tires, radios, or catalytic converters.
- All Other Larceny Any other type of theft not specifically categorized.
- Motor Vehicle Theft The unlawful taking of a motor vehicle.
- Stolen Property Offenses Possessing, buying, or selling stolen goods.

## Fraud & Financial Crimes:

- Bribery Offering or accepting something of value to influence a person's actions.
- Embezzlement Misappropriating or stealing money/property entrusted to one's care.
- Extortion/Blackmail Forcing someone to give money or property through threats.
- False Pretenses/Swindle/Confidence Game Deceiving someone for financial gain.
- Credit Card/ATM Fraud Unauthorized use of a credit or debit card.
- Welfare Fraud Illegally obtaining government assistance benefits.
- Wire Fraud Fraud committed using electronic communication, such as phone or internet.
- Identity Theft Using another person's identity to commit fraud.
- Hacking/Computer Invasion Illegally accessing computer systems or networks.

These crimes significantly impact businesses, individuals, and communities. By tracking them in detail, law enforcement agencies can develop **better crime prevention strategies** and protect victims more effectively.

## Crimes Against Society (NIBRS - Group A Offenses)

Crimes Against Society are offenses that violate laws intended to **maintain public order**, **morality**, **and safety**. These crimes do not typically involve direct harm to individuals or property but rather **represent acts that are deemed illegal by society**. Law enforcement agencies track these offenses to regulate and control activities that could negatively impact the community.

## Drug-Related Offenses:

- Drug/Narcotic Violations The unlawful possession, sale, distribution, or manufacturing of controlled substances.
- **Drug Equipment Violations** Possession, distribution, or manufacturing of drug paraphernalia, such as pipes, syringes, or scales used for illegal drugs.

## **Gambling Offenses:**

- Betting/Wagering Unlawful participation in gambling activities, including placing bets on sports or other events.
- Operating/Promoting/Assisting Gambling Managing or facilitating illegal gambling operations.
- Gambling Equipment Violations Possession or use of unauthorized gambling devices.
- **Sports Tampering** Altering or interfering with the outcome of a sporting event for financial gain.

## Sex-Related Offenses:

- **Pornography/Obscene Material** Creating, distributing, or possessing illegal pornographic content, including child pornography.
- Prostitution Engaging in or offering sexual services in exchange for money or goods.
- Assisting or Promoting Prostitution Managing, soliciting, or benefiting from prostitution (e.g., pimping or running a brothel).

• Purchasing Prostitution – Paying for or attempting to pay for sexual services.

## **Other Offenses:**

- Weapon Law Violations The unlawful possession, carrying, sale, or use of firearms or other weapons.
- Animal Cruelty Intentionally harming, neglecting, or mistreating animals. These crimes often lead to broader social issues and can be linked to organized crime, drug trafficking, and public safety concerns. Law enforcement agencies track Crimes Against Society to enforce laws that help maintain order, protect communities, and reduce criminal activity.

## Group B Offenses (NIBRS)

Group B offenses are less serious offenses compared to Group A offenses but are still tracked under the **National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS)**. These crimes typically involve violations that disrupt public order or involve non-violent behavior. They are often classified as **misdemeanors** or minor offenses. Here's an overview of Group B offenses:

#### **Property and Financial Offenses:**

• Bad Checks – Writing a check with insufficient funds or with the intent to defraud.

## **Public Order Offenses:**

- **Curfew/Loitering/Vagrancy Violations** Violations related to the restriction of staying in public spaces at certain hours (curfew laws) or loitering without a legitimate purpose.
- **Disorderly Conduct** Engaging in disruptive or offensive behavior that disturbs public peace, such as fighting, making unreasonable noise, or obstructing traffic.
- **Peeping Tom** Surreptitiously looking into private places, such as windows or bathrooms, with the intent to observe or harass others.
- **Trespass of Real Property** Unlawful entry onto another person's land or property without permission, not involving burglary.

## Substance-Related Offenses:

- Driving Under the Influence (DUI) Operating a vehicle while impaired by alcohol, drugs, or any other substance that affects a person's ability to drive safely.
- **Drunkenness** Being visibly intoxicated or impaired due to alcohol, in public places or in a manner that disturbs others.
- Liquor Law Violations Violations of laws related to the sale, consumption, or possession of alcoholic beverages, including underage drinking or selling alcohol without a license.

## Family and Domestic Offenses:

 Family Offenses (Nonviolent) – Nonviolent offenses that involve conflicts or disputes within a family, such as non-violent domestic disturbances, child neglect without physical harm, or parental misconduct.

## Miscellaneous Offenses:

• All Other Offenses – Any other offense that doesn't fall into the categories above but is still recorded under Group B. This can include a wide range of minor offenses that do not cause significant harm to others or property.

While Group B offenses are not typically as severe as Group A offenses, they still play an important role in maintaining **community safety** and **order**. Tracking these violations allows law enforcement to identify patterns in public behavior and address issues such as substance abuse, disturbances, and public safety threats.

CALLS FOR SERVICE

The Craig Police Department consists of both sworn officers and civilian staff working together to serve the community. The civilian employees include two administrative staff members, one evidence technician, and two code enforcement/animal control officers.

In 2024, the department received a total of **16,322 incidents**. These calls cover a wide range of issues, including **criminal offenses**, **non-criminal complaints**, **animal concerns**, **code violations**, **traffic complaints**, **civil disputes**, **medical assistance**, and many more.

This high volume of calls reflects the **dedication and tireless efforts** of both sworn officers and civilian staff to respond to the diverse needs of the community and maintain Craig as a safe and secure place to live and work.



The above chart shows the calls for service broken down by month. July was our busiest month with 1,565 noted incidents.

## CRIME

Crime in this report is categorized into two groups: Group A Crimes and Group B Crimes. (For further explanation, please refer to the definitions on page 3). These groups follow the national NIBRS (National Incident-Based Reporting System) reporting standards, which were formulated by the FBI.

The **total crime calculation**, or **crime per capita**, is determined by dividing the total number of crimes by the total population. For reference, the **FBI** uses a standard population of **100,000** for its crime rate calculations.

## **Employees**

## Training

Law enforcement training in Colorado is regulated by the Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST), a division of the Attorney General's Office.

Under Rule 28, all law enforcement officers in the state must complete 24 hours of training annually, with a minimum of 12 hours dedicated to perishable skills—arrest control, driving, and firearms—and at least one hour in each category.

The Craig Police Department utilizes a wide range of training methods permitted under POST Rule 28, including:

- Basic Academy Training
- Computer or web-based training
- Viewing law enforcement-related audiovisual materials
- In-person training
- Accredited college or university courses related to law enforcement or criminal justice
- Simulator training
- Conferences and workshops

In 2024, officers of the Craig Police Department collectively completed **2,574** hours of training. This included topics such as:

- CPR/First Aid/AED
- Firearms proficiency
- Driving techniques
- Arrest control tactics
- Investigative procedures
- Leadership development

- Taser operation
- Community policing
- Anti-bias training
- And much more

This ongoing commitment to professional development ensures that our officers remain highly skilled, well-trained, and prepared to serve the community effectively.

## **Staffing Levels**

When at full staff, the Craig Police Department employs a total of 29 personnel from within the community. This includes:

- 23 sworn law enforcement officers
- 6 civilian (non-sworn) employees

At the beginning of 2024, the department faced significant staffing challenges, operating at approximately 21% below full capacity. However, by the end of the year, the department made remarkable progress, reducing vacancies to just three (3) open positions.

This improvement reflects ongoing efforts to recruit, train, and retain dedicated professionals committed to serving the citizens of Craig.

## **Property / Evidence Review**

## 2024 Year-End Summary – Evidence

This past year was exceptionally **busy** for the **Craig Police Department**, with a **high volume of police activity** throughout **2024**. To highlight the work done in **evidence management**, the following is a year-end summary:

## Evidence.Com Usage

- In 2024, a total of 24,426 files were uploaded to Evidence.Com, marking the highest and most accurate count to date.
- Of these, **187 files** were personally uploaded.
- Since its inception, the system now stores 112,281 files, reflecting an increase of 9,937 files from the previous year.
- Evidence.Com continues to be a valuable time-saving tool for the department.

## **Case Management & Evidence Sharing**

- 506 cases were created and shared with the District Attorney's Office via Evidence.Com.
- Additional evidence-sharing download links were generated for individuals and other government agencies, though these are not reflected in the above total.

## **Needy Assistance Program (NAP)**

- 7 vouchers were awarded to individuals in need, all for lodging, totaling \$294.00 in assistance.
- The current balance for NAP stands at \$3,440.76, so an application for additional funding through the United Way Human Resource Council will not be submitted this year.
- The Christian Church continued its monthly donations to support the program.

## **Petty Cash Expenditures**

• The department utilized \$85.00 from the Petty Cash account for various necessary items.

## **Evidence & Property Management**

- A total of 162 items were sent or hand-delivered to the Colorado Bureau of Investigation (CBI) for analysis.
- Evidence submissions for 2024:
  - 601 items from the Craig Police Department
  - o 529 items from the Moffat County Sheriff's Office (including ACET)
  - Total: 1,130 items submitted

## **Property Statistics for 2024**

- **142 items** were returned to their rightful owners.
- 508 items were destroyed, with 443 removed from BEAST inventory.
- 162 items were sent to CBI via USPS/UPS or hand-carried.
- **7,203 items** are currently stored in the **evidence facility**.

## Upcoming Evidence Room Inventory

• The **2025 Evidence Room Inventory** has **not yet been scheduled**.

## Use of Force Review

## **Use of Force Description**

Use of Force refers to the level of effort required by law enforcement officers to gain compliance from an unwilling subject. Officers are trained to use force in a measured and justified manner, following department policies, state laws, and national standards to ensure the safety of the public, officers, and suspects.

The use of force continuum typically progresses from least to most severe:

- 1. Officer Presence The mere presence of law enforcement can often deter crime or deescalate situations.
- 2. Verbal Commands Clear and direct instructions aimed at gaining voluntary compliance.
- 3. Empty-Hand Control Soft techniques (grabs, holds) or hard techniques (strikes, takedowns) used to restrain a subject.
- 4. Less-Lethal Methods Includes tasers, chemical agents (pepper spray), impact weapons (batons), and bean-bag rounds.
- 5. Lethal Force The use of firearms or other means that may result in death or serious bodily injury, only justified when an officer reasonably believes there is an imminent threat of serious harm to themselves or others.

Every use of force incident is documented, reviewed, and evaluated to ensure compliance with laws and departmental policies. Officers receive ongoing training in de-escalation tactics, crisis intervention, and proper force application to minimize risks and uphold public trust.

## 2024 Use of Force Summary

In 2024, the Craig Police Department recorded a total of 56 Use of Force incidents. Below is a breakdown of the types of force applied:

## **Breakdown of Use of Force Incidents:**

- Empty-Hand Control:
  - o Soft Techniques (grabs, holds, joint locks): [12] incidents
  - Hard Techniques (strikes, takedowns): [17] incidents
- Less-Lethal Methods:

- Taser Deployment: [13] incidents
- **OC/Pepper Spray Use:** [0] incidents
- o Impact Weapons (batons, bean-bag rounds, firearms drawn): [13] incidents
- Lethal Force (firearms discharged): [1] incidents

NOTE: Each Use of Force incident was thoroughly documented, reviewed, and evaluated to ensure compliance with department policies and state laws. Officers continue to receive ongoing training in de-escalation, crisis intervention, and appropriate force application to minimize the necessity of force while ensuring public and officer safety.



Professional Standards exist to enable CACP and CSOC members to achieve a "Professional" status. The adoption of minimum professional standards is necessary for Colorado Police and Sheriff Organizations to achieve the status of "Professional".

## **Glossary of Terms**

**Group:** The term used when referring to your police department's portal on CRIMEWATCH.

**Impressions:** How many times your content appeared in a social feed, even if the viewer was not directly connected to your department. For example, if a follower on Facebook or Twitter sees a post that interests them and shares that post to their personal page, each time that post is seen is an "impression". Users do not have to follow your page or live locally to interact with your content and generate "impressions".

Total Visits: The number of unique devices/people that visited your CRIMEWATCH portal. These visits come from social media, search results, and/ or news media articles linking back to your portal. Good headlines, photos, videos, mugshots and sharing CASES asking for assistance (tips) are a great way to build visits. Posting Incidents with only text summaries and no photos is proven to generate less engagement and fewer total visits.

Actions: "Actions" are a measure of engagement on the CRIMEWATCH portal itself. When someone visits, are they clicking through to see more content? Are they submitting tips, making contact, etc.? All these additional clicks are summarized by using the category "Actions". A good relative metric is to see a higher count of actions than visits, indicating a strong level of engagement when your audience visits the portal

**Content:** The comprehensive total of everything you share. This includes, Arrests, Warrants, Incidents, Cases, New Posts, etc.

**Subscribers/Members:** The total number of users receiving real-time notifications (emails). This number includes all local media subscribers as well. This does not include mobile users that follow your group or mobile users that have push notifications enabled for your group.
