On 06/15/2024 at approximately 0312hrs, Officer Laabs and Officer Baker were dispatched to a male bleeding in the 400 blk of Russell St. When they arrived, a male party exited the residence and had fresh blood smeared on his torso. The male was holding a towel on his left wrist in an attempt to stop the bleeding. When he removed the towel to show officers the wound, it began to spurt blood, consistent with an arterial bleed.

Officer Baker handed Officer Laabs a CAT tourniquet, and Officer Laabs applied the tourniquet to stop the bleeding. Officer Laabs and Officer Baker spoke with the male to keep him calm and gather pertinent information, and then assisted him in walking to the ambulance. The male was transported by EMS to MRH for treatment.

The male in question later sent a comment to the Craig Police Crimewatch page stating: "I'm forever grateful for the officers who responded quickly on June 15th at 3am. Chief Cochran:

I am submitting this request on behalf of Sgt. Brian Soper.

On 02/23/2025 at approximately 0053hrs, Sgt. Soper was dispatched to the 400blk of Yampa Ave for a male party that was bleeding. He was in the area and arrived on scene quickly.

When Sgt. Soper arrived, he observed a male party that was bleeding profusely from an injury to his right arm. From the amount of blood visible in Sgt. Soper's Body Worn Camera footage, it appears obvious the male was likely only a few minutes away from bleeding to death. Multiple bystanders were on scene with the male, and 2 citizens had removed their belts and fashioned makeshift tourniquets out of them. Despite their efforts, the male was still bleeding profusely from the injury to his arm.

Sgt. Soper retrieved a CAT tourniquet and applied it to the male's arm, effectively stopping the bleeding. The male was transported emergent to MRH by EMS and taken into surgery.

It was later determined that the male had severed an artery in his right forearm. Without Sgt. Soper's quick thinking in utilizing a tourniquet to stop the bleeding, the male would have likely died.

Based upon the above information Sgt. Soper should receive the lifesaving award.
