

Priority Definitions

Priority 1: These calls are deemed to be in progress or less than five minutes old. An immediate police response is necessary to preserve life, or where an immediate response would be essential to apprehend a felony suspect. (e.g., Murder, Robbery, Carjacking, Rape, Burglary in Progress, Domestic Violence, Injury Accident, etc.)


Priority 2: Incidents that have just occurred (within 15 minutes) that do not pose an immediate threat to life, or where the apprehension of a suspect is likely and the threat to public safety is present. (e.g., Family Disturbance, Welfare Check, Suspicious Person/Vehicle, In Progress Theft, Threats, Mental Complaint, etc.)

Priority 3: Incidents that require a police response, where there is no immediate or expected threat to the safety of the public or responding officers. (e.g., Alarm Call, Animal Complaint, Noise Disturbance, Loitering, Panhandling, Public Assist, Civil Problem, Keep the Peace, etc.)


Priority 4: Incident reports that require police contact for documentation or report taking. In all instances, these are past calls with no suspect present. (e.g., Past Burglary Report, Past Theft Report, Court Order Report, Fraud, ID Theft, Graffiti, Lost Property, etc.)

Priority Definitions

Priority 1, 2, 3, 4: See definitions on Page 3 (Response Times).

Priority 5: Incidents that are "Officer Initiated" where the dispatch and on scene times are simultaneous. (e.g., Traffic Stop, Pedestrian Check, Business Check, etc.)


Priority 6: Response or information calls with no holding time limit. (e.g., Administrative Files, Surveillance, Training, etc.)

Priority 7: Report Writing, Follow-up Investigations, and other police activities that occur during a work shift.

Priority 8: Vacation Checks and YANA Checks (You Are Not Alone Program). This call type was created in January 2024.



POLICE INCIDENTS JANUARY 2026 >1










CURRENT CASE LOAD






MONTHLY TRAINING TOPICS



HIGHLIGHTS / SUMMARY

On January 28, 2026 ACET, MCSO and CPD conducted a joint high visibility enforcement operation targeting traffic and other criminal violations. Approximately thirteen Officers and Deputies were involved in the operation. Briefing was held at 11:00 am. The enforcement period ended at 8:30 pm with a thirty-minute post-op briefing afterwards.

Approximately 31 contacts were made between 11:30 am and 8:30 pm. During the operation the following enforcement actions were taken:

- 6 suspects were issued summons for possession of small amounts of drugs and traffic violations.
- Male suspect was arrested with 3.48 grams of suspected methamphetamine that was packaged in three separate baggies.
- Male suspect was arrested with 3.5 grams of suspected methamphetamine.
- Male suspect was arrested with 4.64 grams of suspected methamphetamine.
- Male suspect was arrested on a warrant.
- Miscellaneous drug paraphernalia was seized with no further action taken.
- Approximately 16 K9 deployments, all resulted in positive indications.

Training for the month of January included SWAT training, Taser 10 training, Leadership training, K9 training, Media Relations in Crisis Situations, and State Mandated Training. The State of Colorado through POST, mandates a minimum of 24 hours of training for officers yearly. Of these trainings, 12 hours must be in perishable skills such as driving, firearms, and arrest control.
