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VILLAGE BOARD GOALS FOR 2014

In October of 2013, members of the West Dundee Village Board, along with Department Directors, held a workshop to discuss our respective thoughts about the direction of the community in both the short and long term.

One of the outcomes of this meeting was the creation of a set of Village Board Goals for 2014.



While the goals do not capture all of the many activities conducted by the West Dundee staff throughout the year, they do outline some high-level efforts that the Village will strive to undertake. These goals are listed below so that residents and business owners in West Dundee have the opportunity to see what the Village Board's priorities are for the year.

Goal #1: Work with surrounding communities and agencies to identify potential partnerships and efficiencies in the delivery of municipal services, particularly Police and Fire.

Goal #2: Develop a comprehensive downtown improvement/redevelopment plan, inclusive of parking, overall design, public spaces, cultural elements, and riverbank enhancement. (See page 8 for more information.)

Goal #3: Identify, recruit and secure additional and diverse nonresidential tax and employment generators. Formulate and implement an Economic Development strategy that will

strengthen, augment, and diversify the community's commercial tax base. Create a policy and action toolbox for use in discussions with developers.

- Goal #4: Facilitate discussions and strategic plans with Rouse Properties, owners of Spring Hill Mall, to ensure the ongoing vitality of the mall and its surrounding areas. As a function of this, discuss with Rouse the possibility of a public-private partnership aimed at reinventing the site as a retail, entertainment, dining and office destination.
- Goal #5: Implement upgrades to Well #6, and in the process improving water quality and service delivery to residents and businesses within its service area. (Accomplished in early June. See page 11 for more information.)
- Goal #6: Complete annexation agreement for area commonly known as the Galvin Property. Renew annexation agreement for the Haeger Property. Pursue discussion on the annexation of the NW and SW corners of Rt. 72 and Randall Road.
- Goal #7: Complete police contract renewal. (Tentative agreement reached as of April.)
- Goal #8: Revisit Capital Improvement Plan (CIP). Update the CIP and conduct subsequent annual reviews. Coordinate capital improvement projects to address multiple objectives with each activity.
- Goal #9: Continue efforts to share information efficiently with the public, particularly through the use of social and electronic media, as well as through a continuation of the "mobile meeting" platform introduced in 2013. Encourage active participation in the government process by residents and business owners.
- Goal #10: Introduce the ability for Village customers to pay for fees through the use of credit cards. Continue to seek methods to enhance and improve the convenience of municipal processes. (*Credit card acceptance accomplished see page 10 for more information.*)
- Goal #11: Incorporate environment and energy sustainability into Village decisions. Consider Green Council/LEED certification(s) for Village designs and upgrades.
- Goal #12: Facilitate the completion of the upgrades to the intersection of Rtes. 31 and 72. As work is completed, the Village will seek to mitigate the impact on residents and visitors to the area by ensuring that driveways are adequately marked; that uses along the impacted roadways have access to extra signage; and information on project milestones are widely communicated through the West Dundee's "Construction Times" newsletter. (Rtes. 31 and 72 construction to be substantially complete by mid to late June.)

Over the coming months, please be on the lookout for updates on our progress toward achieving these goals.

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FISCAL YEAR 2014-2015 BUDGET

In April of this year, the Village Board approved the operating budget for the 2014-2015 fiscal year. The budget took effect on May 1st. A copy of the FY 14/15 Budget is available at www.wdundee.org.

The budget is one of the primary expressions of Board policy. In it, the Board worked to hold the line on the organization's overall expenditures while keeping service levels high. Concurrently, the document anticipates a loss of revenue due to the closure of the Target store on Rt. 72.

Since the 2008 Fiscal Year, the Village's total General Fund expenditures have increased by 0.1% or a total of \$29,672 for the past 6 year period. Budgeted revenues for this same period increased 6.2%, however, it should be noted that the General Fund's largest revenue source, sales tax, has decreased by 37.2% or \$1,051,000.

To mitigate the burden on residential taxpayers while maintaining high service levels, the Village has sought to reduce staffing, as personnel costs account for 72% of the municipal operating budget. To that end, the Village headcount has dropped from 62 positions to 52 positions today. The remaining staff endeavor to do more with less.

As the Board continues to look for efficiencies to reduce operating costs, it has become necessary to look for additional revenue sources in an effort to maintain traditional service levels. This effort is taking part in a number of ways, not the least of which is through a renewed focus on diverse economic development.

As the benefits of economic development efforts will be realized only over an extended timeframe, the Board sought near-term solutions to address expected revenue shortfalls. Ultimately, the Board chose two fees - a \$0.02 per gallon tax on fuel and a 1% tax on prepared foods and beverages purchased at restaurants and retail outlets - to enhance revenues.

These two fees were chosen due to the fact they have a limited impact on West Dundee residents, with most of the fee payers coming from outside of the community. This path, as opposed to raising the property tax or charging homeowners directly for solid waste collection, limits the financial impact on the average West Dundee resident while maintaining current service levels.

With several exciting developments anticipated for the Village in the coming months, it is expected that the Village will be able to grow its revenue sources through a strengthening of the local economy. Relatedly, the Board has decided to revisit the fees in 14 months and will, at that time, determine if they can be rescinded.

All told, the Village's financial position is sound, with solid cash reserves, sufficiently funded pensions, and a budget that recently received a solid endorsement from auditors and a Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting.




HOW IS THE MONEY SPENT?

Total General Fund Operating Budget has increased only 4.6% since FYE 2008, or an average of 0.5% per year.





A Regional Comparison of Taxes and Fees


As the Village has provided in the past, please find an updated municipal survey of the actual costs passed along to residents and property owners in the Village of West Dundee as compared to our neighboring communities.

We are pleased to note that West Dundee continues to offer the least direct cost to our residents of all of the area municipalities.

For the Village of West Dundee, the \$1,334 per household cost per year pays for all the municipal services that residents receive, including but not limited to refuse collection, snow removal, fall leaf collection, Police, Fire and EMS.

We continue to believe and support that the Village of West Dundee provides better municipal services at a lower cost than most, as a community by community comparison, when taking into consideration all of the actual costs.

CURBSIDE YARD WASTE COLLECTION

Free curbside yard waste collection began the first Friday in April and continues until the last collection date in November. Yard waste is collected on Fridays, along with refuse and recycling.

Organic yard waste materials should be placed at the curb in a Kraft type paper bag or in an open plastic or metal trash container, and must be kept separate from refuse. Cans containing yard waste should be clearly identifiable and set out with the lid off. Yard waste in plastic bags will not be collected.

Brush and tree trimmings must be less than 2" in diameter and should be cut to lengths of 4' or less, tied with biodegradable twine into bundles no more than 2' in diameter. Each bundle shall not to exceed 50 pounds.

Grass clippings may be included as yard waste. Please do not discharge grass clippings into the street when mowing your lawn. Dirt, sod, large branches, tree stumps, rocks, garden vegetables, fruit and non-organic materials are not considered yard waste.

Please be reminded that Saturday refuse collection will occur in the Village of West Dundee after the following major holidays:

Memorial Day 4th of July Labor Day Thanksgiving Christmas New Years Day

DO I NEED A BUILDING PERMIT?

If you are planning a home improvement project, you may be required to obtain a building permit.

Building permits are issued to ensure that work is performed in conformance with fire and building codes, protecting you and your property. Building permit fees are used to offset the cost of the plan review and inspections.



Guidelines for many of the common types of projects that require a building permit are available at wdundee.org under Forms & Applications. These include, but are not limited to the following:

DOWNTOWN REDEVELOPMENT PLANNING

The Village has engaged a consultant team to begin a comprehensive downtown evaluation of the existing marketplace, resources and stakeholder interests in order to create a viable framework for public and private investment over the next 1, 3, and 5 years.

The consultant team from Hitchcock Design Group and Business Districts, Inc. will develop a targeted market (brand) and recommend market-supported commercial, institutional and public magnet attractions and complimentary market-supported commercial, residential, institutional and public uses.

A project task force has been established to aid in the collection of feedback and to aid in the monitoring of the progress of the work product. This task force includes members of the Village staff,

elected officials, representatives of the consultant the consultant team, residents, and downtown business owners.

West Dundee officials are encouraging residents and downtown stakeholders to participate in this process. The first step was an online Consumer Behavior Survey completed during the month of May. Notification of this request for input was released via the <u>Village's website</u>, <u>Facebook</u>, <u>Twitter</u>, Village Newslist email blasts and local newspapers.



Results of the survey will guide community leaders and their consulting team of Hitchcock Design Group and Business Districts, Inc. as they collaboratively evaluate existing conditions and new opportunities for downtown.

There will be additional opportunities for input and participation for residents and frequent downtown visitors to assist the Village in shaping future plans for this area of the community.

A public workshop will be held on Wednesday, June 18, 2014 from 6:30 - 8:30 pm at Emmett's Brewery on the 2nd floor. Please mark this date on our calendar and plan to attend to provide your thoughts.

In addition to the survey and the public workshop, the public will be able to interact with the consulting team through the project website at **www.wdundeedowntown.com** to remain involved and in touch with the project.



A presentation on the final implementation plan will occur at a Village Board meeting in December of this year. Meeting agendas are available online at wdundee.org and are posted on the front door of Village Hall by the Friday before the meeting. Meetings are held on the first and third Mondays of the month, with the Village Board meeting as a Committee of the Whole on the second Monday if needed.

We encourage all residents and anyone interested in shaping the future of downtown West Dundee to participate in this planning process.

ELECTRICAL AGGREGATION PROGRAM EXTENSION

In 2012, West Dundee voters approved a referendum which authorized the Village Board to enact an Electrical Aggregation Program. This type of program allows the Village to use the group purchasing power of its residents to negotiate lower electricity prices.

The Village, through its membership in the Northern Illinois Municipal Electric Collaborate (NIMEC), solicited bids and entered into a two year contract with First Energy Solutions at a fixed rate of \$.049 per kWh of electricity. The prevailing ComEd rate at that time was \$.0602. **During the first 15 months of the contract, participating households saved an average of \$242 in electric supply costs, with a cumulative Village-wide savings of \$600,000.**

These savings were derived from the following rate differences:

First Energy per kWh rate	=	\$0.0490
ComEd per kWh rate	=	\$0.0602
ComEd per kWh rate as of May 1, 2014	=	\$0.0759

In August of 2014, the Village's two-year contract with First Energy will expire. This past April, the Village Board gave the authority to once again solicit bids for Electrical Aggregation.

To protect a municipality from locking into rates higher than ComEd's, NIMEC bids contain an "escape clause". If the ComEd rate is set below the MA rate, or if the rolling 12-month period's savings turn negative, the Village can suspend the program and return all ratepayers to ComEd.

Furthermore, with no early termination fees, residents are free to leave the program at any time, should they determine another offer to be more attractive. Please remember that the Village's program will offer a fixed rate over the term of the contract, as opposed to ComEd's fluctuating rate. This provides the ratepayer with rate stability, as well as easier-to-budget payments.

It is anticipated that bids will be accepted during the month of June and a decision as to whether or not to extend the program will be made then. Depending upon the results of the bid, the Village will either select a vendor or return to Commonwealth Edison.

If a new Electrical Aggregation vendor is selected, an opt-out process will be undertaken - meaning that a mailing will be provided to all eligible residents, and no action will be required to participate in the program. If residents wish to remain with ComEd as their energy supplier, a response to the Village's mailing will be required.

Under the Electrical Aggregation program, residents continue to be billed for their electricity through ComEd, as ComEd will still be responsible for the distribution and maintenance of the lines. As a result, there will be no changes to your ComEd account numbers or payment processes.

Once additional information is known and the results of the bid are available, this information will be distributed through the <u>Village's website</u>, <u>Facebook</u>, <u>Twitter</u>, Village Newslist email blasts.

WATER/SEWER RATE INCREASE

Effective May 1, 2014

In conjunction with the passage of the Village's FY 2014-15 budget, the Village's water and sewer rates were increased as follows. These increases went into effect beginning with the first billing cycle after May 1, 2014.



- The bi-monthly distribution fee of \$23.50 was increased to \$24.00.
- The usage charges were increased by 2%.

A <u>water and sewer rate sheet</u> is available online to further illustrate the effects of this rate change.

Over 65% of Sewer and Water Fund expenditures are attributed to electricity, water treatment salt, wastewater treatment charges and debt service. The Village has little or no control over these costs, which continue to increase, and are in direct correlation to water production and wastewater treatment costs.

The Village Board and administration are always hesitant to increase water and sewer rates. However, deferred maintenance to the water and sewer infrastructure cannot continue. Attention to capital maintenance issues related to the pumps, wells and lift stations are essential to maintaining a reliable water and sewer system for the community.

CREDIT & DEBIT CARD ACCEPTANCE

Illinois E-Pay System

The Village has contracted with the Illinois E-Pay system to provide the convenience of **accepting credit and debit card payments.** Credit/debit cards can now be accepted **online and in person** at Village Hall and both the Public Safety Centers.

Payments can now be submitted via credit/debit card for the following:

- Water/Sewer Bills
- Dog License Fees
- Parking Tickets
- Ordinance Violations
- Administrative Processing/Towing Fees
- Miscellaneous Payments

Please note that there is a **convenience fee** of 2.35%, or a minimum of \$1.00, that is charged for using this system. This fee is not charged or collected by the Village of West Dundee.



The Illinois E-Pay System is a safe and secure electronic payment program that allows you to

pay bills any time of the day or night from the convenience of your home or any internet enabled mobile device. The service is provided by the State Treasurer's Office to over 650 local governments and state agencies in Illinois.

UPGRADES TO ONLINE SERVICE REQUEST SYSTEM

Mobile App and Location Services Now Included

The Village of West Dundee is pleased to introduce YourGOV, an innovative citizen service request application that allows community members to conveniently **report non-emergency issues and service requests using the web, a smartphone or an iPad.**

In just three steps, YourGOV users can submit common issues — such as street light repair, tree inspections, water quality concerns, potholes, grass height complaints and more — complete with location, details and photos. Once submitted, YourGOV will automatically deliver requests to the Village's Public Works Department where they are reviewed and routed for proper handling.

The Village also utilizes Cartegraph, a leading operations management system. Cartegraph gives the Village of West Dundee powerful tools for managing its day-to-day operations. Working in tandem, YourGOV and Cartegraph will help the Village of West Dundee manage citizen requests and resolve them more efficiently than ever before.

WATER TREATMENT SYSTEM MODIFICATIONS

Hydrogen Sulfide Mitigation

The Public Works Department continues to address water quality concerns related to the existence of hydrogen sulfide in the water supply in the western portion of the Village.

Last spring, the Village entered into a contract to conduct two significant water treatment plant modifications at the Randall Road water treatment facility. The first consisted of installing a mixing system within the elevated storage tank. This system will continuously blend the stored water within the tower, which will enhance the quality of the water by eliminating the natural settling and stratification of the hydrogen sulfide gas present in the deep well water supply.

The second modification is a reconfiguration of the treatment process. This new configuration within the existing treatment process will allow the hydrogen sulfide to be trapped prior to its discharge into the distribution system. It is anticipated that 95% of hydrogen sulfide present in the system will be eliminated from the water being distributed to the community.

These modifications are now online and improved water quality is expected going forward.

Source of Drinking Water

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and groundwater wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pickup substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.

Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial, or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.

Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff, and residential uses.

Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, and septic systems.

Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. Source Water Assessment

The source water assessment for our supply has been completed by the Illinois EPA. Based on information obtained in a Well Site Survey published in January 1990 by the Illinois EPA, twenty-five potential sources or possible problem sites were identified within the survey area of West Dundee's wells. Furthermore, information provided by the Leaking Underground Storage Tank and Remedial Project Management Sections of the Illinois EPA indicated several additional sites with ongoing remediation which may be of concern. The Illinois EPA has determined that West Dundee's Wells #1 and #5 source water are not susceptible to contamination. This determination is based on a number of criteria including; monitoring conducted at the wells; monitoring conducted at the entry point to the distribution system; and the available hydrogeologic data on the wells.

2014 STREETS & INFRASTRUCTURE PROGRAM

Roadway Patching and Resurfacing Projects

Within the 2014-15 Budget, the Village Board has reestablished a Capital Improvement and Replacement Program with \$800,000 budgeted for roadway patching and resurfacing.

Competitive bidding will take place this summer, with the anticipated roadway projects to be completed this fall. Four areas have been identified for completion this year:

1. Huntley Road - Extensive patching of Huntley Road will be completed between Tartans Drive and Sleepy Hollow Road. In order to complete this project in the most cost-effective manner, a portion of the work will be completed utilizing the employees of the Public Works Department staff, with the balance to be completed by a contractor.

During the course of the project, Huntley Road will be closed to through traffic between the hours of 9am and 3pm. The closure of the roadway will not only enhance worker safety, but also worker productivity.

- 2. Kittridge Drive Kittridge Drive will be resurfaced between Tartans Drive and Sleepy Hollow Road. This project will include removal of the existing road surface and installation of a new roadway. It is anticipated that some curb and sidewalk replacement will be also be completed. Access to Kittridge Drive will be limited while this work is completed.
- 3. South Fifth Street South Fifth Street will be resurfaced from South Street to Edwards Avenue. This project will also include removal of existing road surface and installation of a new roadway. As with Kittridge, isolated curb replacement and sidewalks will be completed as warranted.

This roadway project will be conducted immediately adjacent to Dundee Highlands Elementary. The Village staff will coordinate with the Dundee Highlands administration to facilitate access to the school. We strongly encourage that residents avoid using this road segment while work is underway.



4. **Fairhills Drive** - The last significant project for 2014 includes the patching of Fairhills Drive between Angle Tarn and Boncosky Road. A patch approximately 200' by 40' will be replaced.

Due to the nature of the road surface being concrete, the northbound lane of Fairhills Drive will be closed to traffic for the duration of the project.

In addition to the above projects, the Village will continue roadway patching though the community, as well as pavement marking and sidewalk/bike path maintenance, as time and resources allow.
