## Good News for Property Owners — City Tax Rate Drops

Elmhurst's overall property tax rate decreased from \$5.2178 (per \$100 of equalized assessed value) in 2003 to \$4.9624 in 2004 — a decrease of 4.89%. Only five of DuPage County's 34 communities have a lower overall property tax rate. In addition to the overall tax rate, the municipal portion of the 2004 property tax levy decreased by 5.58%. ## City Receives Municipal Innovation Award

he City of Elmhurst has a long history of intergovernmental cooperation with the city's other public bodies — cooperation

that leads to a stronger community, mutual respect and, in some cases, solutions to potentially serious problems. On June 15, 2005, the City of Elmhurst was recognized by the DuPage Mayors and Managers Conference for an innovative intergovernmental agreement with Elmhurst Unit School District 205. The agreement, approved in March of 2004, resulted when a budget shortfall of approximately \$1.2 million facing the school district was brought to the city's attention. The city's goal, according to

Mayor Thomas Marcucci, was to find an effective means to balance both the need to assist the school district and the need to complete the downtown redevelopment program. Elmhurst officials decided on a creative plan involving the early release of property tax revenue from nine parcels in the Central Business District Tax Increment Financing (TIF) District. This mutually beneficial agreement generated \$900,000 in additional revenue for the school district, while benefiting other taxing bodies as well. The agreement also provided for a 12-year extension of the TIF District to enable downtown redevelopment to be completed. This innovative agreement provided a viable solution to the school district's revenue needs and the city's commitment to complete needed improvements in the Central Business District.





#### **Downtown Sector Plan**

The Zoning and Planning Commission is nearing completion of the City's Downtown Sector Plan review. The current draft plan represents the culmination of the long-term efforts of the commission and Elmhurst citizens, including numerous meetings over the last four years and many meetings for the North Downtown Design Plan. Citizen input provided during these meetings has been of primary importance in plan preparations.

The downtown area review process began in 1998 with The North Downtown Design Plan (and corrresponding C4A District), followed by analysis of geographic areas, or "sectors," as they are referred to in the Plan. This review process included detailed analysis of the area in and around Wilder Park known as the "Cultural Campus," and the Block 300 area where the Crescent Court condominium project is now under construction.

The draft Downtown Sector Plan was formally introduced to the public at a July 14, 2005 public workshop meeting. At this meeting, the city's consultant, Phil Hanegraaf of HNTB in Chicago, made a presentation regarding the plan. The commission also welcomed public comments and discussion during an open house session the same night.

The draft copy of the Downtown Sector Plan is available on the City's website (www.elmhurst.org) and copies are available for public viewing at City Hall and the Elmhurst Public Library. The Zoning & Planning Commission will schedule a formal public hearing in the near future. After this public hearing, the commission's recommendation will be forwarded to the City Council for final action. ## Specialized Rescues, Car Fires and Vehicle Extrications

Earlier this year, the Elmhurst City Council approved two ordinances that will allow user fees to be charged in certain emergency situations involving non-residents, such as car fires, vehicle extrications and other rescue operations which may require the use of specialized personnel. This is good news for Elmhurst taxpayers who have had to shoulder the burden of these costs.

Specialized rescue team responses include tactical rescue, high angle rescue, underwater rescue/recovery, confined space rescue, below grade rescue and trench rescue. The cost to equip and train such teams is significant, but such services usually only benefit a small number of people or entities. The City Council determined that it would be in the best interest of the city and its residents to require those who benefit from specialized rescue efforts to pay fees to help defer the cost of training and maintaining these teams. The fees include: a \$750 basic charge for response, \$125 per emergency vehicle per hour, \$35 per team member per hour, and the cost of all material or equipment necessary to provide the response.

Personnel from the Elmhurst Fire Department perform approximately 40 vehicle extrications and extinguish about 30 car fires each year. A large percentage of these incidents occur on the roads that ring Elmhurst, including I-290 and Roosevelt Road, and involve people who do not live in Elmhurst. As the call volume rises, so do the costs of operating and maintaining an effective, well-trained fire department. The fees for service that have been approved by the City Council are in line with Illinois statutory requirements: \$400 for vehicle extrication and \$200 for extinguishing vehicle fires. These fees will only apply to non-residents and will be billed through the motorist's insurance carrier when a claim has been initiated.



### **Veterans Day Ceremony**

All current and past members of the U.S. military will be honored at a special Veterans Day ceremony at 10:30 a.m. on Friday, November 11th. The ceremony, sponsored by the City of Elmhurst and the veterans' organizations, will be held at the Veterans Memorial in Wilder Park. Residents and friends are invited to attend the ceremony as an expression of appreciation for the dedication and sacrifices of our veterans.

### **Red Ribbon Week**

In an effort to raise awareness of substance abuse and its consequences, and to promote a drug-free environment, Red Ribbon Week will be held in Elmhurst from October 23-31.

Parents are urged to talk to their children about the dangers of drugs and alcohol. Students are encouraged to make a commitment to live drug-free and set an example to their peers. Residents are encouraged to wear a red ribbon to work or school, or tie a red ribbon around their car antenna or parkway trees to show support for the Red Ribbon program.

### **Alcohol and Driving**

In conjunction with Red Ribbon Week, motorists are reminded that the fine for first-time DUI offenses in Elmhurst is \$750. This sizable fine is aimed at getting the attention of individuals who drive under the influence of drugs or alcohol, thereby risking their own lives and the lives of others. The Elmhurst Police Department would like to remind teenage drivers and their parents of the "Use It & Lose It" law that went into effect in Elmhurst in 1995. Also known as "Zero Tolerance," this law gives young people another reason to say "NO" to alcohol. The first offense for a driver under the age of 21 can result in a three-month driver's license suspension. A second offense can result in loss of driving privileges for one year. Suspensions are doubled if the offender refuses to be tested.



## **School Opening Safety Tips**

As the new school year begins, the Elmhurst Police Department offers the following tips to help protect our youngest residents.

- Motorists are urged to drive carefully and watch for youngsters walking or biking to and from school, especially in areas without sidewalks. Drivers must be alert when approaching or following a school bus. Illinois law requires motorists to stop when the flashing red lights and extended stop arm of a school bus warn that students are loading or unloading. Motorists are also cautioned to be alert to changing patterns in school zones. Many schools have special one-way streets and parking restrictions during school hours as well as special restrictions for dropping off and picking up students on the street. Watch for youngsters playing and gathering near bus stops.
- Parents are asked to be good role models and teach their children to always wear a seat belt in the car and a helmet when biking, and to follow pedestrian safety rules. Young children should always be supervised as they walk or bike to school, or as they wait at the school bus stop.
- at crosswalks, obey all traffic signs and lights, and follow the instructions of crossing guards and safety patrol members. When biking to and from school, always wear a helmet. Helmets can prevent up to 85% of head injuries caused by biking accidents. Stop before riding into the street and ride in a straight line on the right side with the flow of traffic. Stop and look both ways at stop signs, stop lights and intersections. Younger children should walk their bikes across busy intersections.

Let's give our youngsters every chance to have a safe and happy school year.

## A Child is Missing — You Can Help

The State of Illinois and the Elmhurst community are now served by an effective program to help locate missing children, as well as disabled or elderly individuals, during the crucial first hours after they disappear. The program is activated by law enforcement when a vulnerable person is reported missing. "A Child is Missing"

"A Child is Missing (ACIM) is a high-tech telephonic system that can place 1,000 calls in just 60 seconds."

(ACIM) is a high-tech telephonic system that can place 1,000 calls in just 60 seconds. The system can process multiple cases at the same time and operates without jurisdictional boundaries. When a police officer relays information on a missing child, or elderly or disabled person to ACIM, a detailed message is recorded, including such information as the missing person's name, age, height and weight, description, medical or psychological conditions, and location where last seen. The message is then sent out by phone to the surrounding community, requesting assistance in the search. Within minutes, residents and business owners begin to check the backyards, sidewalks and shopping areas in their neighborhoods. Residents are encouraged to support this valuable program that gives our law enforcement personnel hundreds of additional pairs of eyes to search for a missing child or person. # **Excellence in Financial Reporting**

For the 15th consecutive year, the city's Finance Department has received the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting for its annual comprehensive financial report. The certificate, presented by the Government Finance Officers Association, is the highest form of recognition in government accounting and financial reporting. The award is based on the readability and clarity of the annual report, and its adherence to all standard accounting guidelines.

### Serving on Boards and Commissions

Elmhurst is a community with a proud tradition of active participation in worthwhile volunteer efforts. Many of our citizens serve without compensation on the city's boards and commissions as a way to give something back to the community. There are currently 13 city boards and commissions, most of which serve in an advisory capacity to the Mayor and City Council. When an opening occurs, a new member is normally appointed by the Mayor with the consent of the City Council. The city boards and commissions are: the Advisory Architectural Commission, the Board of Local Improvements, the Building Code Board of Appeals, the Commission on Youth, the Fire and Police Commission, the Board of Trustees of the Firemen's Pension Fund, the Historical Commission, the Board of Trustees of the Elmhurst Public Library, the Board of Trustees of the Police Pension Fund, the Senior Citizens Commission, the Veterans Memorial Commission, the Zoning and Planning Commission and the Elmhurst Economic Development Commission.

Interested citizens are encouraged to submit an application to serve on a board or commission. Application forms are kept on file until openings occur. The forms are available in the Mayor's office at City Hall or on the city's homepage, www.elmhurst.org. The city's website also contains descriptions of the boards and commissions, lists of current members and meeting schedules.



## Mayor's Message

would like to congratulate our newest member of the Elmhurst City Council, Stephen Hipskind, who was recently appointed to the Fourth Ward to serve out the unexpired term of Brad Walsh who has moved to the Indianapolis area. I look forward to working with Stephen as we move forward on improving the quality of life here in Elmhurst.

We were pleased and proud recently to receive the DuPage Mayors and Managers Municipal Innovation Award for our creative intergovernmental agreement with School District 205. Last year, the district had asked the City for its help in closing a \$1.2 million budget deficit. Elmhurst officials devised a plan for early release of property tax revenue from nine parcels in the City's Central Business District Tax Increment Financing District (TIF). A TIF is a special taxing district established for a set period of time in order to revitalize underdeveloped areas without raising taxes or using general funds. The release of the nine parcels generated an additional \$900,000 for the school district. This was truly a unique solution to an acute problem. The new agreement also provided for a 12-year extension of the TIF District to enable the City to meet its commitment to make needed improvements in the downtown area.

As part of Elmhurst's redevelopment efforts in the downtown, the City recently published the Downtown Sector Plan. This is an update of the City's Comprehensive Plan which outlines planning and zoning goals. The new Downtown Sector Plan is available for review at City Hall and the Elmhurst Public Library. I invite all residents to review the plan and to let your elected officials know what you'd like to see for downtown Elmhurst.

I would like to congratulate Finance Director Marilyn Gaston and her team for receiving the Excellence in Financial Reporting Award from the Government Finance Officers Association for the fifteenth year in a row. We are fortunate to have such a fine staff overseeing the financial interests of our community.

Lastly, I would like to remind everyone that both public and parochial schools are back in session — with many children coming and going on foot and on bikes. "It's our town, let's slow down." The safety of these young people is in our hands.





#### Free Leaf Pick-Up

The City of Elmhurst will provide free leaf pick-up twice this fall through its contract waste hauler (BFI). Leaves placed curbside in clearly marked garbage cans, cardboard boxes or



Kraft paper bags will be picked up free of charge (without yard waste stickers) on your regularly scheduled collection day on November 2, 3, 4 and 30 and on December 1 and 2. Residents are asked not to mix leaves with other yard waste and not to use plastic

bags for leaves. Containers, other than Kraft bags, will be left on the parkway after the pick-up.

Raking leaves, grass clippings and other debris into the street is prohibited by city ordinances. This practice can create hazardous conditions for motorists and impede the flow of stormwater into the city's storm sewer system.

#### **Preventing Street Flooding**

Residents can help prevent street flooding in their neighborhoods by raking leaves and debris away from the storm drain inlets in front of their homes, especially during periods of heavy rainfall. Clogged inlets impede the flow of stormwater into the city's storm sewer system, especially during the autumn months when leaves are falling.

### **Senior Chore Days**

The City of Elmhurst sponsors Senior Chore Days each fall to help Elmhurst seniors living on a limited income with yard work and storm window installation. Volunteers are needed to help our seniors with this important work. Senior Chore Days will be held during the first three weekends in November — November 5 and 6, 12 and 13, and 19 and 20. If you are a senior and need assistance, or if you can volunteer to help a senior anytime during this three-week period, call the DuPage Senior Citizens Council at (630) 620-9794.

#### **Trick-or-Treat**

Motorists are reminded to be on the lookout for little ghosts and goblins this Halloween as they go door-to-door in our neighborhoods. Trick-or-treating will be on Monday, October 31, from 3:30 to 7:30 p.m. The Police Department encourages a parent



or other adult to accompany young trick-or-treaters and instruct them to cross streets only at intersections, approach only well lit homes and inspect all treats at home. Have a safe and happy Halloween!

#### **Holiday Reminder**

Residents are reminded that City Hall will be closed on Monday, September 5, for the Labor Day holiday. The City Council meeting will be held on Tuesday, September 6. Refuse collection will be postponed by one day during Labor Day week due to the holiday.

#### **Disposing of Non-Recyclable Items**



The City of Elmhurst provides an effective recycling program that helps divert tons of materials away from area landfills. The residents of Elmhurst have demonstrated a commitment to recycle the items that are accepted through the city's program. However, city offices receive frequent inquiries about

items that residents can't or don't want to put out for collection with their regular refuse and recycling.

- Usable items, such as books, clothing and shoes, computers and other electronics, furniture, sporting goods, toys and small appliances can be donated to resale shops or donation organizations for use by others.
- Some materials, such as automotive batteries, tires or fluids; propane tanks; some paint; and household hazardous waste, cannot be recycled or disposed of with regular refuse. There are companies in DuPage County that accept these items and handle them appropriately.
- Other items, such as scrap metal, wood and other building materials, can often be reused or converted into usable products.

### **Outdoor Fireplaces**

The Elmhurst Municipal Code places certain restrictions on open burning and portable outdoor fireplaces in order to protect lives and property. The restrictions summarized below do not apply to fireplaces, grills, burners or similar devices when used solely for cooking food.

- A permit from the Elmhurst Fire Department is required for open burning. The permit may be revoked if the permit holder does not comply with the following requirements or if the fire is determined to pose a hazard.
- Outdoor or portable fireplaces may be used only with approved fuel: propane, natural gas, charcoal or seasoned logs. It is illegal to burn yard waste, leaves, lumber, paper, cardboard, unseasoned logs or garbage.
- An outdoor or portable fireplace must be located and used at least 15 feet from any structure. The firebox must be located above ground level.
- The outdoor or portable fireplace must be constantly attended by a person over the age of 17 until the fire is extinguished. An adequate amount of sand, dirt or water, or a portable fire extinguisher with a minimum rating of 4-A must be on hand for immediate use.
- No outdoor or portable fireplace may be used in such a way as to emit offensive or objectionable smoke or odors, or when atmospheric conditions or other circumstances make such fires hazardous.



### **Testing for Radon Gas**

Radon gas, which results from the natural breakdown of uranium in soil, rock and water, can get into the air we breathe in our homes and workplaces. This gas typically moves up through the ground to the air above, getting into buildings through cracks and holes in the foundation. Once inside a building, the gas becomes trapped and can build to unsafe levels. The greatest exposure is in the home where people normally spend a great deal of time. The U.S. Surgeon General has warned that radon gas is second only to smoking as a cause of lung cancer and results in thousands of deaths each year. Smoking and exposure to high levels of radon gas combine to create an especially serious health risk. Although you cannot see, smell or taste radon gas, homes, offices and other buildings can easily be tested for its presence. Fortunately, testing is easy and inexpensive. If your home is found to have high levels of radon gas, there are radon reduction systems that are extremely effective and reasonably priced. ## **Zoning Ordinance Text Definitions – Senior Housing**

The City's Zoning & Planning Commission is currently evaluating the City's zoning ordinance for text changes regarding senior housing. The Commission, in conjunction with city staff, recognized recent industry changes that have resulted in new and different types of senior housing.

The Commission has held five public meetings regarding senior housing text definitions. During these meetings, the Zoning & Planning Commission received presentations from members of the Senior Citizen Commission and reviewed senior housing definition information

from state statutes, other communities and the American Planning Association. The Commission has used this wealth of information to draft a set of definitions to use as a basis for the text amendment public hearing process.

The Zoning & Planning Commission will hold a public hearing on September 22, 2005, at 7:30 P.M. to discuss the proposed senior housing zoning ordinances text changes. For further information, please contact the Department of Planning, Zoning and Economic Development at (630) 530-3100.

### **Citizens Police Academy**

The program is free and provides hands-on experience in many aspects of police work — from dusting for fingerprints to identity theft, and much, much more. The Citizens Police Academy is designed to improve communication, confidence and cooperation between the police and the community. The program is limited to 25 students per session and there are still openings in the 13-week class scheduled to begin on September 21 and end on December 7th. One block of instruction will be offered each Wednesday from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m., with each block providing hands-on training and an indepth view of a particular division within the department. ### **CPR for Family and Friends**

The primary goal of the Elmhurst Fire Department is to protect the community and its residents, and public education is a vital part of that goal. In its ongoing effort to teach potentially life-saving skills, the department will again offer "CPR for Family and Friends," an American Heart Association non-certification class, during 2005. A class will be held at Fire Station #1 (404 N. York) on Tuesday. November 1 from 6:00 to 10:00 p.m. The class includes CPR for infants, children and adults, as well as clearing foreign body airway obstructions. Students will receive a textbook for use during the class and a course completion card at the end of class. The class is limited to 25 students, age 12 and older, and there is a \$5.00 charge for materials. Call 530-3090 weekdays between 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. for more information or to make a reservation.

### **North York Street Resurfacing**

The North York Street Resurfacing Project is anticipated to begin in August 2005. The contractor is K-5 Construction Corporation. This project will resurface approximately 0.89 miles of pavement on York Street (between I-290 and Grand Avenue). This section of York Street has a pavement structure which is commonly referred to as composite pavement. Composite pavement consists of a concrete base and a bituminous asphalt-wearing surface. The asphalt-wearing surface has reached the end of its service life and will be removed and replaced. The existing roadway will not be reconfigured. Two-way traffic will be maintained during construction. The project should be completed by late fall.

### Historic Preservation Advisory Committee

The Historic Preservation Advisory Committee has completed its yearlong task of identifying and exploring a range of historic preservation methods that might be suitable for adoption by the City of Elmhurst. The Historic Preservation Advisory Committee has met monthly since May of 2004 to discuss historic preservation. Over this time period, the Committee has received presentations from professionals in the field of historic preservation, as well as presentations from the Elmhurst Historical Museum and city staff about Elmhurst's local historic preservation resources.

The Committee developed a final report that related to the goals developed by the Development, Planning and Zoning Committee. The Historic Preservation Advisory Committee presented their findings to the Development, Planning & Zoning Committee on July 25, 2005.
