


Sustainability – For This and Future Generations

Small changes, multiplied by many people, have a significant impact on our environment and often result in cost savings. The ability to provide for the needs of the world's current population without damaging the ability of future generations to provide for their needs is often called "sustainability." A sustainable process is one that can be carried out over and over without negative environmental impacts or impossibly high costs.

The City of Elmhurst does its part to protect the environment and save money by:

- Using Energy Star-rated personal computers.
- Encouraging recycling through its recycling program.
- Providing in city ordinances for personal composting of yard waste and organic materials.
- Adopting building codes that require higher efficiency appliances in new construction.
- Initiating measures to improve Salt Creek conditions and reduce pollutants in runoff.



- Recycling "bio-solids" from the wastewater treatment plant for use on agricultural lands.
- Installing LED traffic signals that use 85 percent less electricity.
- Coordinating signals to reduce traffic backups.
- Replacing some city vehicles with alternative fuel trucks and hybrid vehicles.
- Recycling oil, anti-freeze, old concrete, "white" paper and other materials.
- Passing zoning regulations that allow for higher density residential and mixed-use development in areas close to mass transit.

Homeowners and businesspeople can help protect and conserve our natural resources by making a few simple lifestyle changes.

Conserve energy in your home — reduce power plant emissions that contribute to water pollution and fish contamination:

- Replace ordinary light bulbs with compact fluorescent bulbs that produce significantly less greenhouse gas.

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Sustainability

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- Adjust your thermostat a few degrees up during warm weather and down during cold months.
- When appliances need to be replaced, install energy-efficient appliances.
- Close blinds or curtains on hot summer days to reduce the heat entering the house by about 80 percent.
- Unplug small appliances when not in use to cut down on electricity “leakage” which also increases your electric bill.
- Add more insulation, if necessary, to keep your home warmer in the winter and cooler in the summer.



Conserve water in your home — protect our precious water supply:

- Run only full dishwasher or washing machine loads and air-dry dishes by leaving the dishwasher door ajar.
- Eliminate costly and dangerous chemical fertilizers and pesticides.
- Use professional car washes which recycle water instead of washing your car in the driveway.

Recycle and precycle — reduce waste and reduce your environmental footprint:

- Recycle cans, bottles and paper in the city's recycling program.
- Precycle by making sound choices about packaging waste before you buy.
- Reuse your own grocery bags when you shop.
- Replace household paper napkins and paper towels with cloth.
- Reduce the number of disposable items that you purchase, such as razors and plastic utensils.



Support the local economy — reduce pollution and cost:

- Reduce transportation-related pollution and costs by buying locally grown produce.
- Buy organically grown produce that doesn't rely on dangerous chemicals.
- Landscape with native plants that are accustomed to local conditions, support native wildlife and take less work to maintain.

The actions we take as individuals, families and communities will contribute to fresher air, cleaner and more abundant water, and a healthier lifestyle for this and future generations. For more information, go to www.epa.gov/sustainability. ■

Biking to Work

Although many Americans own bicycles and use them for recreation and fitness, fewer than 10 percent use them to commute to work. If fitness and fun aren't motivation enough, consider the impact on our environment if more people used bikes and fewer people drove cars. In addition, commute times might actually be shorter if you bike, and if not, you might still save time by getting the exercise you need while commuting.

Elmhurst residents are encouraged to participate in the annual Bike to Work Week June 9th through 15th. The event is hosted by the Chicagoland Bicycle Federation and gives commuters the chance to leave the car at home and hop on a bicycle for all or part of their daily trip to work. A commuter station, run by the Elmhurst Bicycle Club, DuPage County, SCARCE and the Chicagoland Bicycle Federation, will be available on June 15th at the Elmhurst Metra station to provide a cool drink of water, a bite to eat, a quick bicycle check or a few safety tips. Following the event, the Chicagoland Bicycle Federation will calculate exactly how many pollutants were not released based on the number of event participants. Reminder: Permits and Codes

The Development Department reminds homeowners that permits are required for decks, patios, porches and fences, as well as for new home construction, attached or detached garages, structure additions, sheds and accessory structures, driveways, air conditioner installation, interior remodeling, swimming pools and hot tubs, and revisions to electrical service, plumbing and fixtures. Be sure to call the Building/Fire Department at (630) 530-3030 before beginning your project.

If your project involves digging or excavation, please remember to call J.U.L.I.E. (1-800-892-0123) at least 48 hours before you dig. J.U.L.I.E. will provide the location of underground utility or cable TV lines.

Historic Preservation

The City approved a new Historic Preservation Ordinance in October of 2006 and recently appointed a seven-member Historic Preservation Commission to administer the new ordinance. The Commission will make recommendations regarding landmark designation; hold public hearings and review applications for alterations to local landmarks; and help identify structures, buildings, objects and sites with historical and/or architectural significance. Elmhurst Remembers Our Armed Forces

The 89th annual Elmhurst Memorial Day Parade will be held Monday, May 28th. Residents and visitors are invited to attend and show support to the members of the armed forces serving here and in distant lands, and to remember those who sacrificed so much for our freedoms. The parade will step off at 9:30 a.m. from the intersection at York and Third, and proceed to Wilder Park by way of York Street, Robert Palmer Drive and Church Street. Weather permitting, the Lima Lima Flight Team will conduct a fly-over at Schiller and Palmer Drive at 9:45 a.m. The Grand Marshall for this year's Memorial Day Parade will be retired U.S. Marine Gunnery Sgt. John T. "Jack" Cammack, a 22-year veteran of the Marine Corps and a veteran of Viet Nam, the Persian Gulf and Operation Iraqi Freedom. A full military ceremony with speakers, patriotic music and the laying of wreaths will follow the parade at Veterans Memorial in Wilder Park.

Law Enforcement Torch Run

Each year Elmhurst police officers join officers from around the state in events that increase public awareness and raise money for Special Olympics athletes. The Illinois Law Enforcement Torch Run, the single largest fund-raising event benefiting Special Olympics in Illinois, will be held on June 10th. Thousands of officers statewide will carry the Flame of Hope through the streets of their communities. The Elmhurst police also raised money for Special Olympics last year during "Cop on Top," when officers from Illinois climbed to the roofs of Dunkin Donuts to encourage donations to this worthy cause. Look for them again this year on May 18th on the roof of the Elmhurst Dunkin Donuts at North Ave. and West Ave. from 6 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Fire Department to Conduct Safety Stand Down

During the week of June 17-23, city fire personnel will participate for the third year in the annual International Firefighter and EMS Safety Stand Down, sponsored by the International Association of Fire Chiefs and the International Association of Firefighters. The Safety Stand Down will provide the department with an opportunity to focus on issues relating to firefighter safety, including causes of line-of-duty deaths, condition of apparatus and equipment, protective clothing inspection, health and safety regulations, fire ground safety issues, training exercises and fitness goals.

Look, Listen and Live

Did you ever stop to think . . .

- That your car weighs approximately 3,000 pounds, and when traveling at 55 mph, can stop in about 200 feet?
- That a loaded freight train weighs more than 12 million pounds, and when traveling at 55 mph, requires approximately 5,280 feet to stop?
- That the weight ratio of a train to an automobile is approximately the same as the weight ratio between a car and a 12-ounce can of soda (4,000 to 1)?
- That a train can do to your car what your car can do to a soda can?
- That soft substances (tires or tennis shoes) can stop relatively quickly when traveling on abrasive surfaces?
- That the heaviest vehicle on land, a freight train, has steel wheels that slide on steel tracks when the train needs to stop quickly?
- That, unlike your auto, trains cannot swerve to avoid a collision?



These sobering facts are intended to help motorists and pedestrians understand the importance of exercising extreme caution when driving or walking across or near the railroad tracks that cross our community.

Elmhurst began using a public education program, known as Operation Lifesaver, as part of its railroad safety program in 1994 after three residents were killed in railroad-related accidents in one year. The program's three components – education, engineering and enforcement – are designed to make our nation's railroads and the driving public as safe as possible. Please help keep Elmhurst free of railroad-related collisions by following the Operation Lifesaver motto – "LOOK, LISTEN AND LIVE." Reverse 9-1-1 Used to Warn Residents

The Elmhurst Police Department recently used the new Reverse 9-1-1 system, following a series of more than 35 residential and school burglaries. In some cases, offenders actually burglarized homes while residents were sleeping. The Reverse 9-1-1 system placed automatic calls to more than 3,000 south Elmhurst residents warning them to secure their homes and garages, turn outside lights on and report suspicious activity to the police. The Police Department also provided extra patrols, surveillance and investigative follow-up. The actions of the police and area residents resulted in the arrest of five juvenile suspects, all residents of Elmhurst. Residents are strongly urged to lock homes, garages and vehicles; keep porch lights on at night; and to call 9-1-1 to report suspicious activity.

The Reverse 9-1-1 system is useful in other emergency situations, such as a missing child or endangered senior, a water-boil order or a hazardous materials leak. The city is currently soliciting unlisted and alternate phone numbers, so that all residents and business owners can be contacted in an emergency. The primary phone number included in the Reverse 9-1-1 program must be related to the home location — the location that needs emergency notification. If your phone number is listed, you are already included in the program. An alternate phone number, such as a work number, family member's number or mobile number, may be provided but is not required. Business owners are asked to provide an alternate phone number that bypasses their automated phone system. Phone numbers are for official use only and are kept strictly confidential. Please visit the city's website, www.elmhurst.org, for an online form. The form will also be mailed in future water bills. If you have questions or would like to provide information by phone, please call the Fire Department at 530-3090.





Park District Installs Lightning Prediction System

Lightning is a serious hazard, especially during the spring and summer months when people are enjoying the outdoors. The Elmhurst Park District has installed lightning prediction systems in five of its major parks and playgrounds (Eldridge Park, Butterfield Park, Plunkett Park, Berens Park and Sugar Creek Golf Club). The system is 97 percent accurate within a two-mile radius and predicts a potential lightning strike 8 to 20 minutes before it occurs. City Council Approves Budget

The 2007-2008 City of Elmhurst Budget was approved by the City Council on April 2, 2007, and has now become the city's operating plan for the current fiscal year. The Budget was prepared to address the operating, maintenance and capital expenditure needs of the city while maintaining a minimum three-month General Fund operating expenditure balance.

In the area of expenditures, municipal employees are both the city's greatest asset in providing community services and the greatest area of expense. The 2007-08 Budget continues to focus on increasing the skills of city employees. The IT portion of the Budget allows for redevelopment of the city's website, the creation of an Intranet for city employees and the implementation of a document imaging system. Along with the traditional neighborhood street repair program, the 2007-08 Budget provides for the renovation or replacement of Fire Station 2, ongoing construction at the Churchville One-Room School, Wilder Mansion improvements per agreement with the Elmhurst Park District, preliminary Salt Creek engineering, as well as a preliminary engineering study, in cooperation with School District #205, concerning the feasibility of a pedestrian underpass for St. Charles Rd. at York High School.

Sales, utility and property taxes comprise nearly one-third of the city's total revenues. Sales tax continues to recover as a result of the general economy and significant business expansion, although the upward adjustment continues to fall nearly \$500,000 below the 1999-2000 high. The utility tax, the city's second largest revenue source, is collected on telephone, electricity and natural gas usage. The property tax levy is budgeted to generate a 4.5 percent increase in property tax revenue; however it is anticipated that the tax levy increase will be outpaced by an increase in equalized assessed value, resulting in a slight reduction in the city's portion of the total property tax rate. The City's portion of the property tax last year was only 5.75 percent. Revenue from vehicle license fees is used for street improvements, while fees for building permits are used to help fund the departments involved.

The goals of this and previous city budgets are to provide operating services to the community, fund projects necessary to maintain the city's infrastructure and provide a three-month General Fund balance. Anticipated budget deficits in fiscal 2007-08 and 2008-09 are limited by not funding a number of worthy programs, services and grant requests that would benefit the community if funds were available. The City Council and staff will continue to make policy decisions directed to correcting the current General Fund structural deficiency in revenue to expenditures. Using tax dollars and other revenues wisely, and operating the city in a fiscally responsible manner, are a top priority for the city's elected officials and appointed staff members. Speeding in Your Neighborhood?

As in earlier surveys, many respondents to the 2006 city survey indicated dissatisfaction with traffic levels and traffic speed. Interestingly, respondents communicated consistently lower levels of satisfaction with traffic speed compliance in their own neighborhood than in other areas of the city.

Speeding is not just a city government problem and the problem is not limited to particular neighborhoods. Since the vast majority of motorists ticketed for speeding are Elmhurst residents, it is OUR problem. The city has initiated a number of programs to address speeding concerns, including the Pace Car Program, use of two trailer-mounted speedometers, the "It's Our Town, Let's Slow Down" program and stepped-up enforcement. But with more cars and more people traveling by car than ever before, speeding continues to be perceived as a problem. In fact, the city receives complaints of many vehicles traveling at 50 miles per hour or more in various neighborhoods. In reality, although some motorists are clearly exceeding the speed limit, few are going 50 mph. The city urges motorists to be mindful of the 25 mile per hour speed limit throughout the community. Remember – IT'S OUR TOWN. LET'S SLOW DOWN.

New Sidewalk Installation Policy

Babcock residents are enjoying new sidewalks recently installed under the city's sidewalk installation policy. Final parkway restoration, including tree planting where necessary, will complete the project this spring. The new sidewalk policy allows for 50/50 cost sharing between the city and property owners on full blocks where sidewalks do not currently exist. The city will advance 100 percent of the project costs and establish procedures for collecting the homeowners' portion as part of the annual property tax over a period of not more than ten years.

Procedures for having sidewalks installed under the new policy include the following steps:

- Signatures are collected on city-provided petitions of homeowners willing to participate in the program.
- City staff verifies signatures and determines whether the 50 percent threshold has been met.
- The city holds an informational open house to discuss details of the proposed project with affected property owners.
- City staff sends an official city survey to affected property owners.



- Survey results are reviewed by the Public Works and Buildings Committee. If more than 50 percent of affected property owners support the project, the Committee makes a recommendation to the City Council. If the project has less than 50 percent support, the issue is considered closed for two years.
- If the Council approves the Committee's recommendation, staff is directed to create a Special Service Area (SSA), and property owners are provided information via a public hearing.
