

Elmhurst Receives Daniel Burnham Award for Comprehensive Plan


he City of Elmhurst's Comprehensive Plan was recently awarded a 2009 Daniel Burnham Award by the Illinois Chapter of the American Planning Association (APA). The

Daniel Burnham Award recognizes "a comprehensive or general plan that advances the science and art of planning."

There was considerable competition for the annual award, with 35 nominations submitted. Elmhurst's Comprehensive Plan was recognized, along with a Chicago lakefront plan. The Elmhurst Comprehensive Plan combined the efforts of community residents, the Zoning & Planning Commission, city staff, and plan consultant HNTB of Chicago, to create a future vision for the City of Elmhurst. The Plan focuses

on several sub-areas that have the most potential for redevelopment, recognizes and reinforces the stability of Elmhurst's excellent neighborhood environment, and recommends a number of environmentally-focused initiatives for implementation.

City Reviews Financial Task Force Recommendations

A special Financial Task Force was recently assembled by the City of Elmhurst to evaluate the City's finances and make recommendations concerning a projected \$6 million shortfall for the 2010-11 budget year.

The 24-member Task Force was made up of a cross-section of Elmhurst citizens that included financial experts from the private sector. The group conducted an analysis of all of the city's funds, with its primary focus on the General Fund, which provides revenue for city operations and services.

Following this analysis, the Task Force furnished the City Council with a detailed report of its findings, including recommendations both for additional

expenditure reductions, as well as tax increases, in order to close the budget gap.

The Mayor and City Council are currently reviewing the report of the Task Force, and the group's findings will be factored into the tax levy for the next fiscal year, which must be finalized by the end of December. Once the tax levy has been fixed, the City will provide the City Council with its budgetary goals. The Council will evaluate these goals in March and finalize them prior to April 30, the end of this fiscal year.

The City extends its appreciation to the members of the Task Force for the exemplary job they did in assisting the city with this in-depth analysis. The full

Community Safety

Flu Season is Here . . .

. . . And it is important to know about the flu viruses currently circulating, the risks and symptoms of each type, and how you can best protect yourself and your family. A number of different influenza viruses cause the illness normally referred to as the flu.

The two flu strains now affecting people in the U.S. are the seasonal flu and the H1N1 (Swine) flu. Outbreaks of the seasonal flu normally occur from late fall through early spring. The H1N1 flu is a new virus, first detected in the United States in April of 2009. Cases have been reported since April, but an increase is expected during the fall and winter months.

Although most healthy people fully recover from the flu, some individuals are at greater risk for complications, which can be serious or even deadly. Complications can include bacterial pneumonia, ear or sinus infections, dehydration and the worsening of chronic medical conditions.

Approximately five to 20 percent of the population contracts the seasonal flu, resulting in more than 200,000 hospitalizations and approximately 36,000 reported deaths each year. Those individuals most likely to have complications from the seasonal flu include children younger than two years old, individuals age 65 or older, and people of any age with chronic medical conditions.

The H1N1 flu has the potential to create a more dangerous flu season with more illnesses, hospitalizations and deaths than normal. A different group appears to be at greater risk of contracting the H1N1 virus — including children and young people through the age of 24, pregnant women, and adults with health conditions associated with higher risk of complications.

Healthy adults over the age of 25, including the elderly, do not appear to be at increased risk of contracting the H1N1 flu.

Both types of influenza circulating this year are respiratory illnesses that spread from person-to-person. Symptoms can range from mild to fatal, and may include fever, coughing, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, headaches, body aches, chills and fatigue. In addition to these symptoms, the H1N1 flu may cause vomiting and diarrhea.

A vaccination is the best protection available for both seasonal flu and H1N1. Because these are different strains of the influenza virus. each strain requires a different vaccine, although both vaccines can be given on the same day.

Some simple everyday steps are recommended to help protect your health and the health of those around you during flu season.



- Wash your hands frequently with soap and water, especially after coughing or sneezing.
- Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when you cough or sneeze, and avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth.
- If you become sick, stay at home for seven days after your symptoms begin or until you have been symptom-free for 24 hours, whichever is longer.
- If you must be in close contact with a sick person, such as an infant, consider wearing a facemask.

Holiday Fire Safety

Residential fires kill and injure thousands of people annually in the United States. The majority of holiday season fires are caused by improper use of candles. The following reminders about candle safety are provided by the Elmhurst Fire Department to help prevent unnecessary tragedies.

- Keep candles away from flammable items, such as Christmas trees or flammable decorations, clothing, books, paper and
- Place candles on a stable piece of furniture in sturdy candleholders that will not burn or tip over, and are big enough to collect dripping wax.
- Keep candles out of the reach of children, and never allow children or teens to have candles in their bedrooms.
- Extinguish candles whenever you leave a room or when you retire for the night.
- During power outages, use flashlights or battery-powered lights instead of candles.
- Keep the holidays a festive green by using candles carefully and preventing residential fires.



The Threat of Identity Theft

mericans have every reason to be concerned about the possibility that a criminal will steal their identity and open a bank account in their name and write bad checks, run up charges on their credit card, establish utilities in their name, or drain a bank account by cloning

an ATM or debit card and making electronic withdrawals. The Federal Trade Commission estimates that as many as 9 million Americans have their identities stolen every year. The most common forms of identity theft are credit card fraud, telephone or utilities fraud, and bank fraud. These crimes are relatively easy to commit, but complex and time-consuming to investigate and prosecute.

The terms identity theft and identity fraud refer to utilities fraud, and any crime in which someone wrongfully obtains and uses another individual's personal information bank fraud. (i.e. name, address, Social Security number, credit card number, bank account information, etc.) to commit fraud or deception, typically for financial gain. Skilled identity thieves use a variety of methods to obtain personal information, including the following:

- Rummaging through trash for bills or papers containing personal information;
- Stealing credit or debit card numbers by using a special storage device when processing your card;
- Pretending to be a financial institution or a legitimate company, and "phishing" for information by sending spam or pop-up messages to your computer;
- Diverting billing statements to another location by completing a change of address form;
- Stealing wallets, purses, mail, pre-approved credit offers, check orders or tax information;
- Stealing personnel records or bribing employees who have access to personal information; or
- Using a method called "pretexting" to get personal information from you and then using that information to call your financial institution, and get bank or credit card account numbers, information from your credit report, or the size of savings and investment portfolios.

Unfortunately, many victims of identity theft don't find out their identity has been stolen until considerable damage has been done.

Awareness is the most effective weapon against many forms of identity theft. Educate yourself, your family and your friends about the tactics used by these criminals. Safeguard your personal information by shredding documents before throwing them away, ignoring pop-ups and spam on the computer, and never giving out personal information to someone who calls pretending to be

a legitimate company or institution. Monitor credit accounts and bank statements every month. Check your credit report regularly for fraudulent or inaccurate information, including credit accounts you did not open or debts you can't explain. Follow up immediately with creditors if bills don't arrive on time.

> If you discover that your identity has been stolen, take the following steps right away.

- Review your credit reports and place a fraud alert on these reports.
- Close any accounts that were opened fraudulently or that you believe have been tampered with.
- File an Identity Theft Complaint with the Federal Trade Commission.
- File a report with the local police or the police in the community where the identity theft took place.

Earlier this year, the Elmhurst City Council approved an "Identity Theft Program and Prevention Policy," as mandated by the Federal Trade Commission. The policy's goals are to protect the city's customers (water and sewer customers) from identity theft and damages related to the loss or misuse of sensitive information, and to protect the city from potential loss from fraudulent new accounts.

Studies Find Cell Phones and **Driving Increase Accidents**

Motorists may be surprised to learn that drivers who talk on cell phones while driving are four times more likely to be involved in an accident. Studies have found that cell phone use contributes to more than 600,000 crashes, over 300,000 injuries and approximately 2,600 deaths annually.



In spite of the risks involved, 81 percent of cell phone users (approximately 100 million drivers) reported in a 2008 survey that they use their phones while driving. One of five reported that they send text messages and drive at the same time. Hands-free cell phones are no safer to use while driving than traditional phones because the principal risk is the cognitive distraction of the conversation. Motorists are encouraged to keep cell phone usage to a minimum while driving or, better yet, to pull over and park before making or receiving a call.



This department of the city assists in promoting awareness of Elmhurst and its amenities to visitors to the community. The phone number for the Visitor and Tourism Office will remain the same and is 630-530-3312.

City Hall Holiday Hours

The offices at City Hall will be closed on Thursday, November 26, and Friday, November 27, for the Thanksgiving holiday. City Hall will also be closed at noon on Thursday, December 24, and all day on Friday, December 25, and Friday, January 1. Meetings of the City Council and the standing committees will not be affected by the holidays. Normal City Hall hours are from 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Leaf and Yard Waste Reminders

The final free leaf pick-up for 2009 will take place on December 2, 3 or 4, whichever is your regular refuse collection day. All yard waste collection for the year will end after the week of November 30 — with the exception of the free leaf pickup — and resume during the first week in April.



Please remember that it is illegal to rake leaves and debris into the street. Serious street flooding can result when wet leaves block the city's inlets, preventing storm water from draining into the storm sewer system. This practice can also create hazardous driving conditions for motorists. Violations can result in fines of up to \$500.



Disposing of Holiday Trees and Refuse

Christmas trees will be collected without a refuse sticker on your normal collection day during the

first and second weeks in January. After that, a sticker is required. Please remember to remove all ornaments, lights and nails. Do not put the tree in a plastic bag. Wreaths, garlands, gift paper and packing peanuts may be included with regular garbage. Boxes are recyclable if they are flattened, bagged or bundled, and measure no more than three by three feet.

Making the Holidays a Little Brighter

Unemployment and other economic problems have left many area families struggling to simply provide for basic needs. Financial



hardship can put a damper on the holidays for local families in need. You can make the season a little brighter for a child (infant to age 17) by donating a new toy or game — or a little warmer for a senior, by donating a soft, warm fleece blanket. A donations

drop box, sponsored by United Community Concerns Association (UCCA), will be located in the police station from November 27 - December 10. UCCA is a not-for-profit all volunteer organization that has been assisting Elmhurst School District 205 children, their families and Elmhurst residents with financial needs for over 30 years. Last year, UCCA provided over \$56,000 in food and food certificates to more than 240 families and 80 seniors who experienced setbacks in their daily lives. In addition, a drop box sponsored by the Toys Express Children's Charity will be located in Elmhurst City Hall throughout the month of December.

Elmhurst Police on Twitter

The Elmhurst Police Department is now using "Twitter" to communicate with citizens and the community. Twitter is a free social networking service that enables users to send and receive messages of up to 140 characters. If you would like to be a follower, simply go to the Police Department's "Twitter" site and follow the instructions to sign up. You will then receive "tweets" or short messages of interest to the community and links to all press releases issued by the Police Department. Ambulance Service in Elmhurst

The City of Elmhurst contracts with Metro Paramedic Services to provide ambulance service. The rates for ambulance transport are based on the level of care provided and are comparable to rates for ambulance service in other communities in the area. Paramedic Billing Services (PBS), a division of Metro Paramedic Services, provides billing for ambulance services. Once insurance information is given to PBS, PBS will seek payment from the insurance provider. For Elmhurst residents, except for the deductible and coinsurance, any payment from insurance providers shall, in all cases, be full and final payment of all charges due PBS for the person to whom the service was rendered.

Thieves are particularly active during the holiday shopping season – any time homes are left unlocked, and when gifts and valuables are left in plain sight in locked or unlocked vehicles. The Elmhurst Police Department reminds residents that you can help keep your valuables safe by simply locking the doors and windows to homes, garages and vehicles. Nearly half of home and vehicle burglaries involve unlocked doors



or valuables left in plain sight. The police are involved in an ongoing community effort to educate residents about locking their homes, garages and vehicles day and night, whether they are at home or not. Anytime you see suspicious activity, no matter how minor it may appear, dial 9-1-1 right away. Let's do all we can to prevent criminals from putting a damper on our holiday spirit.

No Idle Zones = Cleaner Air

Vehicle exhaust is the leading source of toxic air pollution in many parts of the country – pollution that increases the risk of cancer, heart and lung disease, asthma and allergies (according



to the American Cancer Society). Unnecessary engine idling is a major contributor to this pollution. One hour of idling uses up a gallon of fuel and produces about 20 pounds of

carbon dioxide, the principal greenhouse gas contributing to climate change. Idling for 20

minutes generates the same amount of dangerous emissions as driving nearly 320 miles.

Some common myths about idling should be dispelled.

First, do automobile engines need to be warmed up, especially on cold days? The truth is that the best way to warm up your car is to drive it. Modern engines need no more than 30 seconds of idling before driving, even during the winter.

Second, is idling good for your engine? Actually your engine is not working at peak operating temperature when it's idling, and incomplete fuel combustion can leave spark plugs dirty and engine oil contaminated.

Third, is turning your car on and off hard on the engine and does it require more gas than leaving it running? The truth is that frequent restarting has little impact on engine components,

such as battery and starter motor. Wear caused by restarting is estimated to add \$10 per year to the cost of driving, an amount several times less than the amount you save in fuel.

Here are some simple steps that will lead to cleaner air and a healthier community. 1) Reduce warm-up time to 30 seconds. 2) If you are stopping for more than 30 seconds, unless you are in traffic, turn the engine off. 3) Whenever possible, carpool, walk, bike or take the bus or train. These simple changes multiplied by many drivers will result in less pollution and cleaner air for this and coming generations.



Winter Weather Reminders

The winter season's snow, ice and cold create unique challenges for everyone, including motorists, pedestrians, homeowners and city workers. Please keep the following tips in mind to help make the winter season safer for everyone.

Wipers and lights

Motorists are reminded that Illinois Vehicle Code mandates the use of headlights any time when rain, snow, fog or other atmospheric conditions require the use of windshield wipers. Headlights are also required at any other time when, due to insufficient light or unfavorable conditions, persons and vehicles on the highway are not clearly visible at a distance of 1,000 feet.

Snow removal

Homeowners are reminded not to shovel or blow snow or ice into city streets when clearing driveways and sidewalks. To avoid having to clear your driveway approach twice,

wait until the street has been cleared before clearing it. City crews remove snow from the street in a series of passes from the center to the curb. During this process, it is inevitable that snow will be pushed onto private driveway approaches.

Parking on the street

Street parking is not allowed for eight hours following a snowfall of two inches or more, or during the snow removal process.

Fire hydrants

If you have a fire hydrant in front of your home, remember to keep it free of snow and ice so that it is clearly visible and accessible to emergency personnel in case of fire.

Discharging water onto streets or sidewalks

Sump pumps that are not connected to city storm sewers may not discharge water onto streets or sidewalks. This illegal practice creates hazardous conditions for motorists and pedestrians.

Following these simple suggestions will help reduce the inconveniences of the winter months.
