

# City and State Cooperate on Downtown Beautification Projects

hanks to State of Illinois transportation grants, the City of Elmhurst has been able to invest significantly in downtown beautification projects. The Police Station plaza redevelopment has been completed and redevelopment of the City Centre Plaza at York and Schiller is well underway. The state grant is supplemented by Downtown Tax Increment Financing (TIF) funds. TIF funds are used for capital improvement projects and are separate from the city's operating funds, which are currently very limited and subject to significant budgetary constraints.


The newly revitalized downtown area, with its beautiful new fountain and other amenities, will make it an attractive destination for pedestrians, visitors and shoppers, and help to increase tax revenues coming from the area. Although the project involves significant utility work, and is subject to seasonal weather limitations and construction contract/great requirements, it is

limitations and construction contract/grant requirements, it is anticipated that the redevelopment will be completed this fall.

# **City and Property Owner Collaborate** on Schiller Walkway Improvements

Early this year, the Elmhurst City Council approved a development agreement with Willis Johnson, owner of the 109 West Schiller/136 North York building. The project involved renovation of the building facade and improvements to the adjacent Schiller Court walkway to be compatible with the Elmhurst City Centre streetscape plan. The improved building facade and walkway will provide an attractive link between York Street and Addison Avenue. The project was made possible through the city's Facade Improvement Assistance Program, which helps property owners improve existing buildings while fostering revitalization of the Central Business District.

Johnson worked with a local architect to design a European-style pedestrian walkway for the Schiller Court side of the building, including an additional entrance to the building from the walkway. The new design employs a variety of colors and textures

to present the appearance of multiple buildings along the existing brick wall. Other amenities include stoops, windows, flower boxes, street lighting and benches.

Another important goal of the city's Facade Program is to bring older buildings up to current fire and life safety codes. To that end, Johnson has installed a sprinkler and fire alarm system in the building, as well as an elevator. The Schiller Walkway project is expected to be complete this fall. As with the plaza projects, the City of Elmhurst's share of expenses for this project comes from the increase in taxes paid by City Centre property owners (TIF funds) and not the city's General Fund.

## **Back to School Safety Tips**



As children and their parents make lastminute preparations for the beginning of a new school year, the safety of our youngsters should be a top priority.

Motorists are urged to drive carefully as youngsters walk and bike to and from school, or wait at bus stops throughout the community. Illinois law requires motorists to stop when a school bus displays flashing red lights and an extended stop arm to warn that the bus is loading or unloading passengers. Parents are reminded to teach their children to wear seat belts in the car and helmets when biking, and to follow pedestrian safety rules. Young children should always be supervised as they walk to and from school or wait at bus stops. Let's give our kids every chance to have a safe and happy school year.

### "Learn Not to Burn"

Without proper training, young children in a fire situation often try to "hide" from the flames under a bed or in a closet, or "run away" if their clothing catches fire. One of the Elmhurst Fire Department's goals is to teach youngsters about fire safety and provide them with the skills and knowledge they need to react appropriately in a fire situation. "Learn Not to Burn" is a fire safety program taught to elementary school age children. Participants are taught about smoke detectors; how to crawl low in a fire; how to stop, drop, cover and roll; and how to call 911 in an emergency.

The Fire Department sponsors an annual "Learn Not to Burn" poster contest open to public and private school fourth graders. The first, second and third place winners in this year's contest were Lauren from Timothy Christian School, Kate from Immaculate Conception School and John from Visitation School. ### Lock It or Lose It

How safe would you feel knowing that a stranger had entered your home through an unlocked door or window while you were sleeping? This actually happened to several Elmhurst residents last spring. Fortunately, no one was hurt and the offenders were apprehended by the Elmhurst police.

These crimes highlight how important it is to protect your family and property by locking your home, garage and vehicles

both day and night, whether you are at home or not. Many burglaries involve unlocked doors and/or valuables left in plain sight in vehicles. Don't hesitate to call 911 to report any suspicious person, vehicle or activity in your neighborhood.

## Alive at 25

If you want to know just how important a driver's license is, ask any American teenager. Parents and young drivers should be aware, however, that 20 percent of all newly licensed drivers are involved in a crash within a year of getting their licenses. Nearly 6,000 teenagers lose their lives in traffic accidents each year and another 326,000 are seriously injured. Some of the variables at play in these tragic statistics include speed, inexperience, impaired driving, risk-taking behavior, distractions, failure to use seat belts, road rage and driving with other teens in the vehicle.

To help keep our young people alive to celebrate their twentyfifth birthdays, police officers from the Elmhurst Police Department teach a program called "Alive at 25." The goal of the program, developed by the National Safety Council, is to teach young drivers to take responsibility for their own driving behavior by making better driving decisions. The class is open to teens who attend local public or private high schools, or are Elmhurst residents. # Safeguarding our Smallest Passengers

Statistics have long demonstrated that seat belts save lives. Adults who choose not to

buckle up in spite of seat belt laws are making a conscious decision, but children rely on their parents to keep them safe. Many of the tragic accidents that claim the lives of children could be prevented by making sure children are always properly restrained in safety seats, boosters or seat belts. Infants should be secured in rear-facing infant seats. Older babies and toddlers should be restrained in front-facing seats, some of which

convert to belt-positioning boosters for use until the child is big enough to use an adult seat belt.

National statistics show that in the vast majority of cases where an injured child was restrained, either the car seat was improperly installed or the child was improperly secured in the car seat. The Elmhurst Fire Department offers free car seat inspections as a community service, which take between 45 minutes and an hour. # **Fire Pit Safety**

When warm days dissolve into chilly evenings, roasting hot dogs and marshmallows over a crackling fire makes for a pleasant time and fond memories. With the growing popularity of backyard fire pits, you no longer have to travel to your favorite camping spot to enjoy such simple pleasures. Before you begin to use your fire pit, however, remember that a one-time-only free permit from the city is required. Along with the permit, you will receive a copy of the City of Elmhurst ordinance that states what can and cannot be burned, and where to safely locate your burn pit. The permit may be revoked if the permit holder does not comply with the following requirements or if the fire is determined to pose a hazard. The permit can be downloaded or picked up at City Hall.



A copy of your permit is sent to DuComm (911), the agency responsible for dispatching the fire apparatus. If a call is received at 911 from a concerned resident or passerby and an address is provided, DuComm can look up the address to see if a Burn Permit has been filed. If there is no address information available, a fire truck will be dispatched to

investigate. However, when the fire is located, even if you have a

Burn Permit, the fire may be extinguished if it is deemed a danger or a nuisance by the fire department. Be sure to follow these regulations:

- Position your fire pit at least 15 feet away from any structure and away from over-hanging branches. The firebox must be located above ground level.
- Use only designated fuels: propane, natural gas, charcoal or seasoned logs. It is illegal to burn yard waste, leaves, lumber, paper, cardboard, unseasoned logs or garbage.
- Keep all flammable liquids and other materials well away from the fire.
- The fire must be constantly attended by a person at least 17 years old until completely extinguished. An adequate amount of sand, dirt or water, or a portable fire extinguisher must be on hand for immediate use.
- Never burn in such a way as to emit offensive or objectionable smoke or odors, or when atmospheric conditions or other circumstances make burning hazardous.

# Why Does a Fire Truck Go on Ambulance Runs?

Residents often ask why a fire truck accompanies the ambulance on some emergency medical calls that are not fire-related. There are actually two reasons. Different types of medical calls require different types of response or treatment levels. Basic Life Support (BLS) refers to the services necessary to secure airway, breathing and circulation – the basics of life. Elmhurst firefighters are trained as Emergency Medical Technicians in Basic Life Support (EMT/BLS). Advanced Life Support (ALS) offers more treatment options, including use of a range of tools, such as defibrillators, medical equipment and medications. Elmhurst paramedics are trained as Emergency Medical Technicians/Paramedics in Advanced Life Support (EMT/Paramedic/ALS).

They are trained in what to use and when to use it in order to sustain life in different types of medical emergencies until the patient can be transported to the hospital where diagnosis and additional treatment can be provided. All ALS calls require at least two additional EMTs to assist paramedics with more advanced medical care. Paramedics are dispatched to all ALS

and BLS calls in the city. EMTs (firefighters) are also dispatched in the fire truck to all ALS calls to assist paramedics.



The second reason for dispatching firefighters on a medical call in a fire truck, rather than a fire department car or SUV, is to save time. If the firefighters and truck are already out on a call, they can be redeployed more quickly to another emergency call.

You may also occasionally notice an ambulance or fire truck from a neighboring town responding to a call in Elmhurst or an Elmhurst emergency vehicle responding to a call in another town. Elmhurst is a member of the Mutual Aid Box Alarm System (MABAS) that dispatches emergency responders from many towns within Illinois to help each other in the event of a large-scale emergency or multiple simultaneous requests for service. Mutual Aid can be employed when Elmhurst paramedics and/or firefighters are on calls and additional calls are received that require assistance from outside the community.

# **Everything You Need to Know About CFLs**



There is no question that compact fluorescent light bulbs (CFLs) reduce energy consumption and greenhouse gas emissions. While the bulbs cost more initially, they use approximately a quarter of the electricity of one incandescent

bulb and last up to 15 times longer, saving you money for the life of the bulb. The key to having well lit homes without the institutional glare normally associated with fluorescent lighting is to select the bulb that best meets your needs – the correct color and proper wattage – and match them to the fixtures.

Bulbs marked "daylight," "cool, white light" or "noonday light" give bright, faintly blue light. CFLs marked "yellow" or "warm light" are closer in color to traditional lighting. Some bulbs have a Color Rendering Index (CRI) number — the closer that number is to 100, the more the light appears like natural daylight. Other bulbs are labeled using the Kelvin scale to express the light source color and sense of warmth or coolness

it will provide. A bulb labeled between 2,700 and 3,000 kelvins more closely resembles the light provided by a traditional light bulb. Bulbs labeled "sunshine" or "daylight" are between 5,000 and 6,000 kelvins.

People often make the mistake of choosing a CFL that is too bright, since CFLs provide more intense light than traditional bulbs. Replace traditional incandescent bulbs with a CFL that is one-third to one-fourth the wattage. For example, replace a

60-watt bulb with a 23-watt or even a 13-watt CFL.

The last step is to match the bulb to the fixture. CFLs work well in fixtures with upright, opaque shades that hide the coils and diffuse the light. Reflector or flood CFLs can be used to replace standard floodlight bulbs and are more efficient in recessed can lights than coils. For outdoor use, select a bulb designed for temperature extremes.

By selecting the right CFL, you can have a beautifully lit home, save money and help protect the environment.



# Mayor's Message

The City of Elmhurst recently assembled a special Finance Task Force to evaluate the finances of the City. Made up of 25 members of our community, we are fortunate to have the talent and expertise of these individuals. Led by chairperson Kevin Diamond and co-chair Scott Levin, the task force is made up of businesspeople

who are CPAs and MBAs, as well as seniors and young people. Some are lifelong residents, while others are fresh faces who have moved here within the last five to ten years.

The quality of life that we know and enjoy: safe neighborhoods, excellent schools, beautiful parks, together with effective city services, are all being pressured by revenue declines — with the largest shortage primarily coming from sales tax losses in the automotive industry, which ironically matches, nearly dollar-for-dollar, next year's projected shortfall in the City budget.

The good news is that this year's budget is close to balanced after many cuts were made by the City Council. Unfortunately, these cuts are short-term "bandaids" that will eventually have long-term effects on our community without balancing next year's budget.

On a more upbeat note — for the first time in nine years — a capital bill has been passed in Springfield funding many local projects, from the historic "One Room Churchville School House" to the revitalization of Spring Road sidewalks, repaving West Avenue, improvements to the dangerous State of Illinois scissors ramp at Lake Street near York and the renovation of Plunket Park.

Successful grant applications have been instrumental in our ability to rebuild our downtown fountain and police station areas and have relieved us, the taxpayers, of using money from our already strained General Fund to maintain an attractive downtown. Special thanks to Senator Dan Cronin and Representatives Reboletti and Biggins for sponsoring these grants. Also special thanks to Senator Carol Pankau who is diligently working on a commuter deck parking grant with Metra, since we are at capacity on commuter parking.

I'd also like to invite your participation in two upcoming events. ECAF will be holding their auction of rain barrels on Saturday, Sept. 12, 6 p.m., at the Diplomat West. On the following day, the second annual Brianna & Friends "Walk to Talk" benefiting CSLD will take place on Sunday, Sept. 13, at 10 a.m. in Berens Park. With over 100 Elmhurst children dealing with autism, as well as a large population of special needs youngsters, these two organizations need your help.

As Mayor, it is my commitment to keep you informed and aware of what's happening in our great community. Your input is always important, so please feel free to contact me by phone or e-mail with suggestions or ideas.

As summer comes to a close, I'd like to remind you that our children are returning to school. Please take extra precautions as our students travel to and from school.

## **House Numbers Reminder**



Time can be critical in an emergency situation and responding fire and police personnel must be able to find your address before they can provide assistance. The

Elmhurst Municipal Code requires that numbers be attached to every building in the community "in a conspicuous place at the side of or above the front door of the building." Although the code requires numbers to be at least three inches in height, the Police and Fire Departments strongly urge residents to use four-to six-inch-high numbers in a color that contrasts with the color of the building. Numbers in cursive are especially difficult to read at night or during stormy weather.

Many senior citizens live on limited incomes and need help with yard work and storm window installation before winter arrives. Senior Chore Days this fall will be held during the first three weekends in November. If you need help with these chores, or if your family or organization would like to volunteer, please call the DuPage Senior Citizens Council at 630-620-9794.

## **Rates for Ambulance Usage**

The City of Elmhurst contracts with Metro Paramedic Services for ambulance service. Paramedic Billing Services (PBS), a division of Metro Paramedic Services, provides the billing for these services. Once insurance information is given to PBS, PBS will

seek payment from the insurance provider. For Elmhurst residents, except for the deductible and coinsurance, any payment from insurance providers shall, in all cases, be full and final payment of all charges due PBS for the person to whom the service was rendered. The rates for ambulance transport are established based on level of care and comparable rates for area departments.

## **Trick-or-Treat Hours**

Motorists are reminded to watch for small trick-or-treaters on Halloween as they go door-to-door in our neighborhoods. The



official time for trick-or-treating will be from 3:30 to 7:30 p.m. on Saturday, October 31. Parents are encouraged to accompany small children and instruct all children to cross streets only at intersections, approach only

well-lit homes and inspect all treats at home. Happy Halloween!

## Free Leaf Pickup – at the Curb, Not in the Street

The warm, sunny days of summer are inevitably followed by cooler days and the glorious colors of autumn. Once the annual fall color show is over, residents are left with piles of leaves to dispose of. The city's contract waste hauler will again



offer residents within city limits several free leaf collection periods during the late fall. This year's leaf pick-ups will be held during the weeks of November 2 and November 30 on your regular collection day. Residents are reminded to keep

leaves separate from other yard waste and place leaves at the curb in clearly marked garbage cans, cardboard boxes or Kraft paper bags. Cans and boxes will be left on the parkway following the collection. A reminder: City ordinance prohibits raking leaves, grass clippings and other debris into the street where they impede the flow of storm water and create hazardous conditions for motorists.






# **Reducing Water Use**



The DuPage Water Commission (DWC) and DuPage County public water suppliers recently initiated the Water Conservation and Protection Program, pledging to reduce water demand by 10 percent over the next ten years and conserve

valuable Great Lakes water. The DWC expects to accomplish this goal by educating consumers about water conservation techniques, eliminating leaks and other sources of water loss, using native plants that demand less water and practicing other conservation measures.

As residents of Elmhurst, we can all help make this goal a reality by reducing water consumption in and around our homes. The city is leading the way by initiating changes to reduce water consumption in city buildings and on city property, and by helping educate residents about conservation measures. Visitors to the City Centre this summer undoubtedly noticed the beautiful, hand-painted, 55-gallon rain barrels that were the main attraction of Cool Kiddie Art. These barrels will be auctioned off with proceeds benefiting the Elmhurst Children's Assistance Foundation. Residents who would like to use rain water for outdoor use can purchase a 55-gallon rain barrel from the city for \$80. The barrels are made of recycled plastic from pre-used shipping containers, and come with screened tops and all the necessary hardware. The city's annual review of municipal water and sewer rates revealed that expenses associated with providing these services to the community have increased, including the water consumption rate from the DuPage Water Commission and budgeted infrastructure improvements and replacements. These increases made it necessary for the City Council to adjust both water and sewer rates. The good news is that by conserving water in and around your home, your water bill could potentially go down.

## "Rockin' the Schoolhouse!"

Judging from the faces of these Churchville School students in 1895, a one-room schoolhouse was probably not a "rockin" place in its day. On November 7, however, that reputation will be history as the people of Elmhurst kick up their heels at a very special evening, "Rockin' the Schoolhouse!"

This festive event will be presented by the Elmhurst Heritage Foundation – the fund-raising and support organization for the Elmhurst Historical Museum and the Churchville Schoolhouse – to celebrate the refurbishing and eventual reopening of this historic building. The Churchville Schoolhouse is owned by the City of Elmhurst, operated by the Elmhurst Historical Museum and listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

The Churchville Schoolhouse is slated to reopen in 2010 with a number of events

# **Property Tax Freeze for Historic Homes**

The Elmhurst City Council has approved a State of Illinois Property Tax Freeze

Program for local residences designated as historic structures. The program allows for an eight-year freeze on assessed property values following an investment of 25 percent of the home's value in home restoration. To qualify for the Property Tax Assessment Freeze Program, a residence must be designated as a local historic landmark by the City Council, following a recommendation by the Elmhurst Historic Preservation Commission. # **Becoming a Bicycle-Friendly Community**

People nationwide want many of the same things, including less stressful lives, a cleaner environment, affordable transportation, and better health for themselves and their families. Bicycling can contribute to these quality of life issues. Biking for recreation and/or transportation benefits both the body and mind by providing a great cardiovascular workout and reducing stress. Biking is a clean and efficient form of transportation that gets you where you want to go without burning fossil fuels, emitting pollutants into the environment or increasing traffic congestion. Biking also reduces the cost of transportation – second only to the cost of housing for most Americans. Most of us spend more on transportation than we do on health care, education or food.

Elmhurst city officials are looking into becoming certified as a "Bicycle Friendly Community" through the League of

American Bicyclists. Elmhurst bicycling enthusiasts may already have noticed that additional convenient bike racks have been installed along the railroad tracks and in retail districts. Certain streets have been designated as "bike friendly." City officials encourage both motorists and bicyclists to observe all traffic control signs and motor vehicle laws, and to be courteous to all others who use the streets. Officials are also considering other recommendations made earlier this year by the Bicycle Task Force appointed by former Mayor Thomas Marcucci.
