Council Approves Core, Critical and Balanced Budget

he Elmhurst City Council approved a balanced budget for the 2010-2011 fiscal year on April 19, 2010, maintaining core and critical services and support to necessary infrastructure, BUT with significant cuts. Expenditures were limited to slightly less than reasonable anticipated revenues. The cuts necessary to achieve a balanced budget were significant and were applied to every department.

The 2010-2011 budget was prepared with a severe reduction in expenditures in order to provide a slight contribution to fund balance by year end. Reductions in standard operational expense levels in the General Fund will include the elimination of sidewalk repair, concrete roadway repair, an animal control officer, as well as a reduction in street sweeping, storm sewer cleaning and repair and landscape maintenance. A summary of all cuts is listed on pages 401 and 402 of the 2010-2011 annual budget report, which can be seen in its entirety on the City website at www.elmhurst.org.

The across-the-board budget cuts applied to the 2010-2011 budget were designed to allow for a very modest contribution to the City's fund balance. The term "fund balance" is used to describe the difference between assets and liabilities in a government fund. Fund balances increase when revenues exceed expenditures and decrease when expenditures exceed revenues.

According to City Manager Tom Borchert, "The City continues its professional commitment to deliver superior service amid challenging economic times that have necessitated layoffs, vacant positions staying vacant, furlough days, throttled wage adjustments and overtime reduction."

Elmhurst's "Little Engine That Could"

In February of 1921, the City of Elmhurst purchased what was then considered to be state-of-the-art firefighting equipment,

a 1921 Seagrave pumper truck. The cost was \$9,750. That year, Elmhurst press articles dubbed the little truck a "...monster engine..." and marveled that it had the potential to not only draw water from the city's hydrants, but could also "...lift water from the stone quarry or creek at 325 gallons a minute."

The little fire truck faithfully served the community for more than 30 years until it was sold and put on display at a

Wisconsin museum. A private collector purchased it in 1995, and eight years later, sold it to Elmhurst Local 3541 (the Elmhurst firefighters union) for \$5,000. The little fire engine had finally come back home.

Since the truck's return to Elmhurst, its restoration has been a labor of love for many off-duty City employees and volunteers.

> A Seagraves repair company in Mokena learned of the project and donated their services, as well. Funds to complete the

project came through fundraisers and generous donations from Elmhurst businesses, civic groups and individuals. Donations for continued improvements and upkeep of the pumper truck are still being accepted.

On Memorial Day, the dedication, contributions and hard work of many people will finally pay off, and the little Seagrave pumper truck will be proudly driven in the parade – Elmhurst's very own version of "The Little Engine That Could."

Although fireworks are a traditional part of summertime celebrations, residents are cautioned to use only those that can be legally purchased in Illinois. Devices that produce audible or visible displays by means of explosion, combustion or detonation are prohibited. This prohibition includes firecrackers, roman candles, skyrockets, torpedoes and bombs. Children should never be allowed to use fireworks without close adult supervision. Some seemingly harmless devices, such as sparklers, burn at temperatures in excess of 1,000 degrees Fahrenheit and can cause serious burn injuries. Let's have a safe and happy Fourth of July.

Elmhurst Honors Our Armed Forces

Elmhurst has a long and proud tradition of honoring the brave men and women of our nation's armed forces on Memorial Day. The Elmhurst Memorial Day parade

will be held on Monday, May 31, beginning at 9:30 a.m. and steps off from the corner of York and Third. The parade will travel south to Church Street and from there proceed west to the Veterans Memorial in Wilder Park.

A military ceremony with speakers, patriotic music and the laying of wreaths will follow the parade. A special entry in this year's parade will be the newly restored 1921 Seagrave pumper truck that served the Elmhurst community for over 30 years (see article page 1).

The Grand Marshall for the 2010 Memorial Day parade will be Rear Admiral John G. Messerschmidt, past Commander of the Navy Reserve Forces Command. Rear Admiral Messerschmidt, an Elmhurst native, graduated from Immaculate Conception High School, prior to graduating with honors from the U.S. Naval Academy.

City ARRA Funding

In 2009, Congress passed and President Obama signed into law the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (also known as the ARRA or Stimulus). The \$787 billion ARRA package is designed to stimulate the economy and create and save jobs. Along with social welfare and other provisions, the Act makes funds available for infrastructure investment, including energy efficiency and conservation programs, and clean drinking water projects.

The City of Elmhurst applied for "green" funding through the ARRA, and as of last September, had been allocated grants totaling \$205,300 for the following two projects:

- \$50,000 for the development and implementation of energy efficiency and conservation programs for City facilities and buildings.
- \$155,300 for replacement of the methane-fueled generator at the Wastewater Treatment Plant.


These funds will be reimbursed to the City when the work is complete.

In addition, the City applied for roadway

improvement funding through the ARRA. Elmhurst was successful in receiving ARRA funds in the amount of \$420,000 for the repair of St. Charles Road between York Street and Poplar Avenue, including base failure repairs, grinding of the deteriorated concrete surface and a new asphalt overlay.

The City also received ARRA funds in the amount of \$925,000 for the repairs to Vallette Street between Spring Road and Poplar Avenue, including base failure repairs, portions of curb and gutter removal and replacement, and a new asphalt surface course.





"Buy" Elmhurst: What It Means to our Community

Elmhurst has traditionally relied on sales tax for the largest share of its revenue – nearly 26 percent – and now more than

ever, your community needs your tax dollars. Before you head out of town on a shopping trip, please consider what it means to your community when a share of your tax dollars comes back to Elmhurst. Obviously, purchasing big ticket items (automobiles, appliances and furniture) in town gives the local economy a big boost. But even the purchase of everyday items has the potential to make a huge difference.

For example, a typical household spends approximately \$1,600 each month on everyday purchases, including groceries, clothing, entertainment, restaurant meals, home

supplies, personal care items, and miscellaneous other goods and services. When one household makes these purchases in

Elmhurst, approximately \$28 per month or \$336 per year comes back to Elmhurst. If all 16,000 households made their everyday purchases in town, over \$5.37 million dollars would come back to the city each year – money that can be used to fund critical services, including law enforcement, fire protection and street maintenance.

Elmhurst is home to numerous attractive and convenient businesses, many of which are owned by local residents. These businesses provide employment to some of our neighbors and friends. Your shopping dollars not only help the community as a whole, they also help support local business owners and employees.



Dennis Streicher Retires

Until his retirement on May 6, Dennis Streicher served the City of Elmhurst as Director of the Water and Wastewater Department. He was responsible for the operation and maintenance of the Lake Michigan water storage reservoirs, 12 storm water pumping stations, 10 sanitary lift stations, and the wastewater treatment plant.

Streicher's 38-year history with the City began in 1972 when he accepted a position in the Wastewater Treatment Plant laboratory. He later served as Assistant Superintendent, Superintendent, and Associate Director of Water and Wastewater. He was named as Director of Water and Wastewater in 2001 and has served with distinction in that capacity for the last nine years, overseeing a staff of 17 employees covering three shifts, seven days a week.

One of Streicher's goals during his long tenure with the City was to improve water quality in Salt Creek, which was badly polluted in the past, and to also inform the community that a properly operated wastewater treatment plant is actually a source of clean water. To prove the point, Streicher maintained a fish tank in the lobby of the plant office filled with the same water the plant pumps into Salt Creek. Due to these efforts and those of other plant operators along the creek, water quality in Salt Creek has steadily improved.

In recognition of his outstanding contributions to the field of waste collection, treatment and purification within the state, Streicher was awarded the 2009 Illinois Award by the Illinois Association of Wastewater Agencies. In 2006 he received the William D. Hatfield Award for outstanding performance and professionalism. This award is presented annually by the Water Environment Federation, a non-profit group whose goal is to improve the quality of water supplies around the world. He was

named the 2000 "Operator of the Year" by the Illinois Association of Water Pollution Control Operators. Mr. Streicher served on the Executive Committee of the Illinois Association of Wastewater Agencies, as president of the DuPage River/Salt Creek Work Group, chair of the Central States Education Committee, and a member of both the American Water Works Association and the Water Environment Federation.

Streicher is an avid environmentalist and spearheaded efforts to reduce the City's carbon footprint by reducing carbon dioxide emissions and initiating sustainable practices. In his spare time, he is an enthusiastic birdwatcher. He will be greatly missed.

State Adopts Residential Energy Code

The State of Illinois recently passed Public Acts 093-0936 and 096-0778 (Illinois Energy Efficient Building Act). Illinois municipalities and counties that issue building permits are required to enforce the 2009 International Energy Conservation Code (2009 IECC) for commercial and residential buildings.

With higher energy costs, there is a need to conserve energy by building more energy-efficient homes and businesses. These improvements include additional insulation, tighter sealing windows, energy-efficient appliances and furnaces, and higher efficiency lighting.

This law became effective January 29, 2010, and applies to all remodels, room additions, new homes and new commercial buildings. Elmhurst enforces the new code, as required. The code can be purchased through the International Code Council at www.iccsafe.org or by calling 1-888-ICC-SAFE (422-7233) to order a copy. The new code will result in more energy-efficient homes and businesses.

As a result, the police always see an increase in thefts and burglaries to homes and automobiles during warm weather. Unlocked doors, garages and vehicles are like an open invitation to the criminal element to help themselves to your valuables. Almost half of burglaries to homes and vehicles involve unlocked doors and/or valuables left in plain sight. Residents are encouraged to lock their homes, garages and vehicles day and night, whether at home or away.

D.A.R.E. to Say "NO"

Congratulations are in order to Elmhurst fifth grade students who recently completed the D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) program. These youngsters have made a commitment to live free of the negative influences of drugs and alcohol and should be commended for their dedication. They have learned to recognize and resist the subtle pressures to experiment with harmful substances. The efforts of Elmhurst police officers to keep kids away from harmful substances are appreciated, as well.

Mayor's Message



The City's 2010-2011 budget was passed unanimously by the City Council on April 19. In these most challenging of economic times, passage of this budget came only after weeks of deliberation.

I want to commend the City Council — and each individual alderman — for their diligent and tireless efforts. The annual review of the proposed City budget is a tedious and detail-driven project. Many hours are spent in public discussion and many more are spent in reading, researching and reflecting on the budget. I want to further commend the City's excellent staff — and especially City Manager Tom Borchert — in the careful creation of the originally submitted budget, the exhaustive analysis of each department, the openness to questions and suggestions posed and shared for all to hear and learn from for future years.

As many are aware, the City's revenue streams and reserve funds have all been in decline. Sales tax revenue shortfalls have hit Elmhurst very hard, due in large part to the problems of the automobile industry and dealers. As a result, dramatic measures were required, including significant cutbacks in the City's budget, staffing and services. A tax levy increase was also necessary. The tax levy increase, although significant, leaves Elmhurst in an enviable tax levy ranking for 2010-11, at fourth from the lowest rate in all of DuPage County (see exhibit page 10). Other cuts and revenue enhancements may still be needed as we go forward through the coming year.

At the same time, there is reason for optimism. The Elmhurst Economic Development Commission, the Elmhurst Chamber of Commerce and Industry, the Elmhurst Business Alliance and all of the business sectors of our City are working hard to improve the business climate in Elmhurst. We are making retention visits throughout the City and striving to recruit new businesses as well. We are exploring a "Buy in Elmhurst" program directed at keeping sales and thus, sales taxes, in the City for the benefit of

Through all of this, many of you have told me how proud you are to live in Elmhurst. You have shared your own stories of dealing with hard times and shortfalls. You have offered your help and understanding. You have also conveyed the value you place on the quality of life we enjoy in Elmhurst. To the best of my ability, I promise to work to maintain that quality of life.

Elmhurst remains a unique place. Since 1836, we have had residents who are interested in a robust and vibrant environment, together with economic strength, family orientation, security and safety, cultural amenities, education and neighborly good will. Almost 175 years later, these elements remain true and at the core of our community. While we do have problems to solve and to overcome, I know that we will do so.

As the weather warms, I hope you enjoy a wonderful summer season. As you can see by the Community Calendar in this issue of *The Front Porch*, there's lots to do in Elmhurst for everyone of any age.

Test Your Home for Radon

Residents are encouraged to have their homes tested for elevated levels of radon. Radon is the leading cause of lung cancer among non-smokers, claiming more than 20,000 deaths annually in the U.S. Although radon cannot be seen, smelled or tasted, it may be present in your home at dangerous levels. Vehicle Stickers Required

Residents are reminded that May 1 was the deadline for vehicle stickers to be purchased and affixed to the lower right corner of the windshield. Stickers are required on any vehicle registered or principally housed in Elmhurst. Failure to comply with this city requirement can result in a \$25 fine in May and a \$50 fine thereafter.

Under 18? Be Home by Curfew

School will soon be out for the summer, but parents and teens are reminded that young people under the age of 18 are required to abide by City curfew regulations year round. The curfew in Elmhurst is from 11 p.m. to 6 a.m. Sunday through Thursday and from midnight on Friday and Saturday until 6 a.m. the following morning. A minor in any public area in the City after curfew must be accompanied by a parent, legal guardian or responsible companion at least 21 years of age and approved by the teen's parent or legal guardian. Teens who are engaged in a business or occupation authorized by the state for a person under the age of 18 to perform are permitted to be out after curfew.

Schools Are Out: Watch for Sammy ——

Sidewalk Sammy is a colorful, childlike figure that reminds motorists to slow down and be aware of the presence of children playing outdoors. If you would like to invite Sammy to visit your neighborhood, feel free to pick up an application at City Hall or the Police Station.



Grass – How High is Too High?

Residents are reminded that the City passed an ordinance several years ago requiring that grass (with the exception of ornamental grasses) be kept trimmed to eight inches or less in height.

Call JULIE Before Digging

If you are planning a home improvement project, installing a fence or deck, or just planting a tree, don't forget to call 811 (from a cell phone) or 1-800-892-0123 before you begin any project that involves digging. JULIE will notify its member utility companies who will send a locator to mark their underground facilities using paint and/or flags. Once marked, you will know the approximate location of your utility lines so that you can dig safely. The call to JULIE and the utility locating service are free. Digging without

making that call may result in service disruption to an entire neighborhood, injuries to yourself or others, and/or potential fines and repair costs.

Parking Across Sidewalks Prohibited

The summer months always bring an increase in the number of people using City sidewalks, including walkers, joggers, and parents pushing strollers or walking with small children. Residents are encouraged to avoid parking across neighborhood sidewalks. Offenders may be ticketed and fined.

Managing Wildlife Problems

For tips on managing wildlife problems on your property, go to the City website at www.elmhurst.org and click on "Wildlife Management" under "Quick Links." You'll find simple ways to make your property less attractive to wildlife.

Responsible Pet Ownership

If you own a pet, please be aware of City ordinances:



- Owners are required to clean up after their pets when walking them on public sidewalks, parkways, in City parks or along the Prairie Path.
- Pets may not be allowed to trespass on private property anywhere in the City.
- Dogs must be properly restrained by means of a leash or chain attached to the collar or harness any time they are off their owner's property.

Keep in mind that violations may result in a ticket and a court-ordered fine of up to \$1,000.

Mosquito Spraying


As the mosquito population increases during the summer, so does the potential for an increase in cases of West Nile Virus. Residents can help by eliminating standing water where mosquitoes breed. You can reduce your personal risk by using insect repellent containing DEET when outdoors, particularly during dawn, dusk and early evening hours. Elmhurst helps control the spread of this potentially serious illness by reducing the mosquito population through operations that include surveillance, monitoring and spraying. The operations are performed by Clarke Mosquito Control Company, using environmentally sensitive agents. Garage Sale Sign Changes

Garage sales provide a great opportunity to sell items you no longer want, make a little tax-free income and socialize with neighbors. Municipal regulations allow up to two garage sales in a calendar year. Signs advertising such events may be placed on your own private property or that of others with their permission, and now may be placed on City parkways no more than 24 hours before the garage sale begins and must be removed no more than 12 hours after the sale ends.

Going Green — Rain Barrels

The City of Elmhurst, in cooperation with The Conservation Foundation, has developed a program whereby the City will sell plastic rain barrels to residents at a discounted rate. The rain barrels are pre-used shipping containers (typically for food transport) and have been saved from going to landfills.

Rain barrels help homeowners divert water from downspouts for use in landscape and garden irrigation. This diversion reduces water consumption and saves homeowners money.

The black plastic barrels hold 55 gallons and measure approximately 48 inches high and 24 inches in diameter. All necessary hardware, together with a screened top, is included. The cost is \$90. Beware of Scams

The spring and summer months inevitably bring an increase in cases involving con artists who prey on seniors and uninformed citizens. These

unscrupulous individuals are actually professional criminals. They knock on doors and identify themselves as City utility workers, roofers, water contractors, driveway sealers or tree trimmers.

Their goal is to steal money, either by charging exorbitant rates for inferior or non-existent work, or by stealing money or valuables hidden in the house. Their methods include frightening the resident by saying there is a serious problem that needs to be fixed immediately or tricking the homeowner into leaving the house while an accomplice enters the unlocked home.

Here are some tips to protect yourself and help the police catch these criminals.

- **1.** Never open your door to a stranger or let a stranger into your home. Call 911 immediately if someone pushes their way in.
- **2.** Never leave your home unlocked or go into the backyard with a stranger.

- **3.** Never hide large sums of cash in your home. These criminals know how to find your best hiding places.
- **4.** Never hire a stranger who appears at your door to do unsolicited work in or around your home. Reputable contractors do
- **5.** Ask for identification from anyone claiming to be a City employee or a contractor. If they refuse, call 911 immediately with a description of the person and their vehicle.

not sell their services door-to-door.

- **6.** Call 911 right away if you observe suspicious activity or see a strange vehicle parked or cruising around in your neighborhood.
- **7.** Since these criminals tend to victimize seniors, keep a protective eye out for your older neighbors.
