Former City Manager, Thomas Borchert, retired on June 10 after serving the Elmhurst community for 40 years, 27 of them as City Manager. Mr. Borchert and his wife, Joan, are looking forward to spending time with their four children and grandchildren. He will be missed by

all those who worked with him over his long tenure with the city.

Elmhurst Municipal Property Tax Rate Compares Favorably to Area Communities

The city's 2010 property tax rate of \$0.4978 places Elmhurst close to the middle when compared to other city/village rates in DuPage County. However, it is important to consider that fire protection services in many other communities are provided by fire protection districts that levy their own property taxes. Fire protection services in Elmhurst are funded through the city budget.

When this fact is considered in the comparison, Elmhurst has the fourth lowest city property tax rate in the county, with only three communities, Glen Ellyn, Hinsdale and Oak Brook having a lower rate.

Be Prepared with Smart 911

In an emergency situation, informed first responders are better equipped to quickly provide the most appropriate

assistance. With Smart 911, firefighters responding to a house fire have the needed household details to ensure that all family members and pets are rescued. The new system provides paramedics responding

to a medical emergency with critical information, such as a hearing impairment, allergies, heart attack or stroke history, or dementia. When a child goes missing, an Amber Alert can be issued without delay if the police already have the child's photo.

Smart 911 is a new, free, county-wide program available in the Elmhurst community. The information provided by residents is protected and private. The only people who see it are the public safety personnel responding to an emergency 911 call. Your information is never sold or shared with third parties for promotional use.

To register for Smart 911, simply go to the Elmhurst website, www.elmhurst.org, and click on the Smart 911 link on the home page.

Residents who do not have a computer or access to an email address can still participate using a different program known as Premise Alert. Forms are available at City Hall (all counters) and the Police Department (front desk).

The important differences between the Premise Alert Program and Smart 911 are that with Premise Alert, you must come to City Hall or the Police Department in person and fill out the necessary information. Premise Alert only provides information, such as disabilities or special needs, for you or your family. This information is then sent to DuComm to be added to their database, and when there is a 911 call at your residence, first responders are given the information about disabilities or special needs that you provided via the Premise Alert Form.

Prescription Drug Take Back Day, October 29

The City will be participating in a National Prescription Drug Take Back Day on Saturday October 29, 2011, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m in the parking lot of the Elmhurst Police Station. This program is designed to keep unused or expired prescription drugs from getting into our water system when people flush them down the toilet or pour them down drains, potentially creating a toxic cocktail of medicines that can be difficult to remove during the water purification process with the possible result of ending up in our tap water.

2010 Census Shows Population Increase



The U. S. Census conducted in 2010 showed that the Elmhurst population has increased by 1,359 residents since the previous census in 2000, from 42,762 to 44,121. This increase is important since some State of Illinois shared

revenues, such as motor fuel tax and income tax, are distributed on a per capita basis.

A population increase translates into increased revenue for the city, i.e. a bigger piece of the state pie. The population increase also makes it necessary for the city to adjust ward boundaries to even out populations in the seven wards. This adjustment is now in progress and must be completed before the next city election in 2013.

City Council Approves Water/ Sewer Rate Increase

B eginning with utility bills due in July 2011, Elmhurst utility customers noticed some changes to the rates for water and wastewater service. New rates took effect on July 1 and first appeared on the utility bills that were distributed starting in mid-July.

The impact of the combined water and sewer rate adjustments for an average four-person household is approximately \$9.12 per month, which includes a 10 percent increase in the cost of wholesale water from the DuPage Water Commission.

In addition to the rate increase, changes were made in the description of water rates on the utility bill: past utility bills identified the water rate as a "Quantity Charge." Current utility bills will separate the water rate into two categories to give customers more transparency of the costs that make up the rate. These categories and associated charges will be identified as the DuPage Water Comm Charge, which is the wholesale cost to the City of Elmhurst to purchase Lake Michigan water and the Elmhurst Charge, the cost to the City to operate, maintain and replace the entire water system. The existing description for wastewater service as a "Quantity Charge" and "Minimum Charges" for both water and wastewater service will remain the same.

The City has tried to delay and possibly avoid these rate increases by reducing and deferring expenditures. A rate increase, however, was necessary to maintain operations and system reliability. The City is committed to continuing to identify areas to cut or defer expenses without jeopardizing operations and reliability.

Residents are reminded that city utility bills can be paid by E-Z Pay (automatic checking account deductions), by mail, in person or by using the drop box in the City Hall parking lot.

Community Safety

Drive Now. Text Later. You Can't Do Both.



A motorist's risk of causing a serious or even deadly motor vehicle accident is greatly increased by distracted driving. The three main types of distractions are 1) manual, where the driver takes at least one hand off the steering wheel; 2) visual, where

the driver takes his/her eyes off the road; and 3) cognitive, where the driver's mind is not focused on driving. Texting or using a cell phone while driving involves at least two and usually all three types of distractions. Distracted driving takes your mind off the road for approximately four to six seconds. At a speed of 55 miles per hour, that's like driving a distance of one or two football fields without having your eyes on the road.

On January 1, 2010, a new Illinois law went into effect making it illegal to send or read text messages while driving. In spite of the new law, cell phone distractions, including texting, were the primary or secondary cause of more than 1,100 crashes state-wide in 2010. An estimated 28 percent of all traffic accidents – about 1.6 million a year in the U.S. – are linked to texting or talking on cell phones while driving. In 2009, nearly 5,500 people died and nearly 500,000 were injured in crashes related to distracted driving.

A violation of this law is considered a primary offense, which means that police officers can pull motorists over for this offense, just as they can for seat belt violations. Drivers who need to send or receive a text message must put their vehicle in park or neutral if stopped in traffic or on the shoulder. Motorists are also prohibited from using cell phones in any manner in a school or construction zone, unless they are using a hands-free device. We can make our roads and highways safer by refraining from using cell phones while driving.

Protect Your Family from Fire

The Elmhurst Fire Department is teaming up with the National Fire Prevention Association during the week of October 9-15, 2011, to sponsor this year's Fire Prevention Week. The theme for the 2011 campaign is "Protect Your Family from Fire" and the focus will be on preventing home fires caused by cooking, heating equipment, candles and smoking materials. The campaign also urges people to protect their homes and families

with life-saving technology and a home fire escape plan.

Activities during Elmhurst's Fire Prevention Week will include an open house and fire station tours on Sunday, October 2, from noon until 4 p.m. at Fire Station #2, located at 601 S. York Street, and educational, family-oriented activities, including the Fire Safety House, Kiwanis Kids Pics, and the Nicor booth. The Superior AirMed1 helicopter will land at approximately 3 p.m., weather permitting, and if there are no calls. There will also be photo ops with the children dressed in fire gear.

Safe Use of Portable Generators

Portable generators are useful during a power outage or when remote electric power is needed, but they can also be dangerous. The primary hazards to avoid when using a generator are carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning from the toxic engine exhaust, electric shock or electrocution, fire and burns.

Generators can produce high levels of carbon monoxide within minutes if used in a confined space. CO cannot be seen or smelled, and even if you do not smell exhaust fumes, you may still be exposed to CO.

Do not operate the generator indoors or near openings to any building that can be occupied.

Generators can produce high levels of carbon monoxide within minutes if used in a confined space. Generators pose a risk of shock and electrocution, especially if they are operated in wet conditions. If you must use a generator when it is wet outside, protect the generator from moisture by operating it under an open, canopy-like structure on a dry surface where water cannot reach it, or puddle or drain underneath it.

Make sure to use heavy-duty extension cords that are specifically designed for outdoor use when connecting appliances to generators. Use

extension cords that are long enough to allow the generator to be placed outdoors and far away from windows, doors and vents to the home.





"Learn Not to Burn" Poster Contest



City officials and staff would like to commend the fourth grade students who participated in the "Learn Not to Burn" poster contest. This important public safety program, taught by the Elmhurst Fire Department, instructs elementary school-

age youngsters about fire safety and provides them with the knowledge and skills they need to react appropriately in a fire situation, including how to dial 911; crawl low in smoke; and stop, drop, cover and roll.

Congratulations to Colin from Field School who created this year's first place poster; Brooke from Lincoln School for the second place entry; Mary from Immaculate Conception School who took third place honors and all the other participants. Attention: Parents of Teen Drivers

Did you know that 20 percent of all new teenage drivers are involved in a crash within their first year as licensed drivers? Statistics also confirm the tragic deaths of nearly 6,000 teens in traffic accidents each year, along with more than 325,000 serious injuries. The variables at play in these tragedies include impaired driving, inexperience, risk-taking behavior, speed, distractions, road rage, failure to use seat belts and driving with other teens in the vehicle.

The Elmhurst Police Department offers a special program called "Alive at 25" to teach young drivers to make good driving decisions that will help keep them alive to celebrate their 25th birthdays. The class is open to all teenagers who attend local public and private schools, or who live in Elmhurst. Parents are encouraged to familiarize themselves with and follow the established pick-up and drop-off plan at their children's schools. It is particularly important to always keep school fire lanes open for use in an emergency situation.

Mayor's Message



With our new City Manager James Grabowski now on board, we will continue to move ahead with several important initiatives. Many of them will be familiar, while others are still quite new and not fully reviewed at the time of this writing.

The City Budget for 2012-2013 The budgeting process for a complex city like Elmhurst requires a long period of time for

staff to craft it, the City Manager to review and recommend it, and the City Council to assess and approve it. That process will start very soon. We look forward to an improving financial environment that can lead to a budget that is balanced, provides expected services and prepares for the future.

Comprehensive Flood Task Force

As part of the budgeting process, the recommendations of two consulting firms with which the City has contracted, as well as input from members of the Flood Task Force, will be included in the budgeting plans. It is anticipated that these initiatives will make up portions of several annual City budgets years into the future as we work together to solve these flooding problems. Our ongoing discussions with ComEd regarding the power outages experienced in Elmhurst are a part of this overall effort, as well.

Economic Development

City sales tax revenues, while rebounding somewhat, still lag from past years as we continue to emerge from the recession. We are not alone in this and many municipal mayors have expressed their concern about having adequate revenue to provide traditional municipal services.

In Elmhurst, our retail and industrial vacancy rates remain quite constant and near their historical levels. We have suffered certainly, but conditions are improving. Ongoing efforts within the retail and manufacturing areas are always active and often successful, such as the new shopping area under construction at St. Charles Road and Scott Street near Route 83.


The City's economic development efforts continue with our three existing Tax Increment Financing Districts (TIFs) within City Centre, on Lake Street and at Elmhurst Crossing, which have performed well. The Economic Development Commission, an appointed group of twelve individuals from the broader business sector, recently furnished their recommendations for additional TIFs in Elmhurst. Areas currently recommended for further study are North York Street, York and Vallette, and Riverside Drive. The review process is anticipated to take several months.

New TIFs are only one consideration within this vital area. Public-private partnerships will also be important as they have been in the past as we strive to stabilize and increase our revenue sources.

I hope that the summer months provided some opportunities for each of you to enjoy your families, your personal pasttimes and some time to relax. As the fall begins, be assured that your Mayor and City Council will continue to be engaged and proactive in the pursuit of achievements and accomplishments for Elmhurst. We look forward with great confidence.

Street Flooding

During the autumn months, inlets can be easily clogged with leaves and other debris, causing street flooding. You can help prevent this problem by raking leaves and other debris away from the storm drain inlets in your neighborhood.

Free Leaf Pick-Up at the Curb

Leaves will be picked up without charge on your regular collection day: November 2, 3 or 4 and November 30, and December 1 or 2. Residents who wish to participate are asked to place leaves on the parkway only in clearly marked garbage cans, cardboard boxes or Kraft paper bags. Leaves may not be raked into the street or mixed with other types of yard waste. Garbage cans and containers other than Kraft bags will be left on the parkway after the pick-up.

Please note that in order to save the cost of printing and mailing and in the interest of being green and using less paper, the city will not be mailing out brochures regarding this

pick-up as in the past.

City Working to Become More Bicycle-Friendly

Elmhurst received an honorable mention from the League of American Bicyclists for its work toward creating a more bicycle-friendly city. Although the award fell short of the city's ultimate goal of being designated as a Bicycle-Friendly Community, cycling enthusiasts in Elmhurst are determined to continue working toward that goal.

An Important Parking Reminder

The Elmhurst Police Department reminds motorists to park within a foot of the curb, especially in areas where parking is allowed on both sides of the street. This requirement is particularly important in an emergency situation when a fire truck must be able to pass safely between the parked cars. Additionally, parking is not allowed within 15 feet of a fire hydrant, within 20 feet of an intersection or across sidewalks.



Community Safety

Are Your Alarms and Fire Extinguishers Still on the Job?

Smoke alarms, carbon monoxide detectors and fire extinguishers should be part of the safety equipment in every household, but they can only protect your family and home if they are operational when you need them. The average life span and replacement recommendations vary according to type, age and manufacturer, but the following information can be used as a general guideline.

According to the Consumer Product Safety Commission, twothirds of home fire deaths occur in homes without
smoke detectors or without working detectors.
Approximately one-third of smoke alarms in the
U.S. are past their recommended life span. The
National Fire Protection Association recommends
that residential fire alarms be replaced according to
manufacturer's instructions or after ten years (the
average life span of newer models).

After ten years, alarms accumulate significant levels of dust, dirt and air-borne impurities that can affect the sensors. Replacing smoke alarms every ten years also allows you to upgrade to current models with a variety of new options and improvements. Write the purchase or replacement

date with a marker on the inside of the alarm. Batteries should be replaced every year.

Approximately one third of smoke alarms in the U.S. are past their recommended life span.

Carbon Monoxide detectors should be replaced at least every five years, unless the manufacturer specifies a shorter or longer life span. Some have an average life span of only two years, while others last as long as 10.

It is important to be aware that the test button on a CO alarm only tests the battery and circuitry – not the sensor. Testing at least once

a month is important, especially during heating season when doors and windows are normally closed.
Batteries should be replaced and the unit should

be cleaned with a vacuum annually. The sensor component of the detector should be replaced every two years. Most units sound an alarm when the sensor needs to be replaced.

Fire extinguishers should be replaced according to manufacturer recommendations, generally between three and twelve years, depending on the manufacturer and model. An annual visual inspection should include the following steps:

- Check to ensure that the pull pin is firmly in place
- Check the pressure gauge to make sure the needle is firmly planted in the green
- Check the nozzle to make sure it is free of debris and insects
- Visually inspect the extinguisher for dents, leakage and corrosion
- Make sure the unit is within the manufacturer's recommended life span. The life span is usually printed somewhere on the label and the year of manufacture on the bottom of the cylinder.

If your extinguisher fails even one of these steps, it should be replaced.

Proper disposal of smoke alarms, CO detectors and fire extinguishers is important. Smoke alarm batteries and plastic covers can be recycled, and the unit can then be sent back to the manufacturer via surface mail or UPS Ground.

Carbon monoxide detectors can be disposed of with normal trash once the batteries have been removed. Dispose of batteries with other hazardous waste. For fire extinguishers, follow instructions on the unit, or contact the manufacturer for information on proper disposal.

Elmhurst Historical Museum portrays a house divided through two new exhibits

n 2011, citizens of the United States marked the 150th anniversary of the commencement of the Civil War, a conflict that nearly destroyed the country in its infancy. Here in Elmhurst, residents have attended a number of lectures, book discussions, films and programs, to try and gain more understanding into the events and differences that pitted countrymen against each other.

As part of this continuing exploration of Civil War history, and to bring the year of remembrance to a fitting close, the Elmhurst Historical Museum is proud to present two tandem exhibits with a common theme: communication during the Civil War. One exhibit transports visitors to the 1860s through the photographer's lens; the other interprets an intimate collection of letters from a local family through the perspectives of Elmhurst artists.


Both exhibits will be on display from September 27 through December 11 at the Elmhurst Historical Museum. Following is a brief summary of these two different yet related exhibits:

Between the States: Photographs of the American Civil War from George Eastman House

The George Eastman House International Museum of Photograph and Film in Rochester, New York, is known throughout the world for its vast collection, which includes more than 400,000 photographs and negatives dating from the invention of photography to the present day.

"Between the States" is a traveling exhibition commemorating Mr. Lincoln's War through a selection of facsimile photographs of historical Civil War sites and circumstances. The exhibit features rare photos by some of America's earliest photographers including George Barnard, Mathew Brady and Alexander Gardner.

Letters from Home

The importance of letter writing in history comes home as visitors experience the Civil War from a local perspective through original artwork created by the Elmhurst Artists' Guild and inspired by the Elmhurst Historical Museum's collection of Civil War era letters. These letters – from area resident and Civil War veteran Frederick Fischer and his family members – are on exhibition for the first time, and offer a vivid and intimate depiction of the ordeals experienced by soldiers in battle and their families on the homefront.

Recorded excerpts from the letters will be heard in the gallery with details of skirmishes with confederate soldiers, the drudgery of daily duties, and even the sad news of a sibling's death in the line of duty. This exhibit is sponsored by David Pezen, MD, Board Certified Dermatologist.
