City Considers Economic Development Tools

The City of Elmhurst has traditionally been proactive in identifying areas within the community that would benefit from the use of various economic development strategies, including the use of Tax Increment Financing (T.I.F.) Districts. The goal of economic development is to stimulate private investment by addressing adverse conditions, including obsolete or dilapidated buildings, lack of past community planning, building code violations, excessive vacancies and inadequate utilities. The creation of a T.I.F. District allows the City to capture, for a designated time, the increased tax revenues that result from stimulating private investment in the area. These funds are then used for specific public purposes in that designated TIF area, as permitted by law, including property acquisition, relocation, renovation, demolition, site preparation and professional services. Benefits to the community as a whole include job creation, improved traffic flow and parking, shopping and recreational opportunities, improved public infrastructure, and a stronger and more diversified City tax base as a result of bolstering non-residential property taxes.

There are currently three T.I.F. Districts in Elmhurst that have resulted in the collection of over \$37 million in total cumulative property tax increment and \$5.5 million in sales tax increment. Since 1997, increases in Equalized Assessed Value (EAV) in the three districts have been dramatic, especially when compared to an increase of only 58.4 percent in commercial/industrial areas in the City and 131.4 percent in the City as a whole.

T.I.F. I was established in 1986 in the Central Business District, an area that had experienced EAV decreases during some time periods. The T.I.F. increment funds collected were used to provide additional parking, improve and beautify streetscape, upgrade utilities, acquire property, provide façade enhancement grants to business owners, and encourage economic growth through retail business grants. This area has experienced a 182.6 percent increase in EAV since 1997.

T.I.F. II was created in 1993 in the Lake Street area of north Elmhurst. T.I.F. funds were used here to improve infrastructure, including street lighting and roadways. Investment in this district has resulted in a 191.8 percent increase in EAV with the construction of new businesses, including a hotel, a car dealership and a bank.

T.I.F. III was established in 1996 in the area of Illinois Route 83 and St. Charles Road. T.I.F. funds were used to rehabilitate and renovate the existing shopping center, acquire and demolish certain buildings, build new retail facilities, redevelop the City's Public Works facility and provide appropriate public improvements. T.I.F. III experienced a 164 percent increase in EAV between 1997 and 2010.

The City of Elmhurst is currently considering whether public and private goals could be achieved in other areas from the use of economic development and financing tools, including but not limited to Tax Increment Financing. To assist in this study, the City retained the services of Kane, McKenna and Associates, Inc. (KMA) to determine whether the use of such tools would likely result in beneficial redevelopment

in several potential study areas. Following an extensive review of the study areas, KMA recommended that three areas have the potential to benefit from economic development and warrant further study.

The first area under consideration is North York Street, including the area contiguous to T.I.F. I in the Central Business District and the portion north of the I-290 right-of-way. Conditions that potentially qualify this area for T.I.F. designation or other economic development tools include deterioration, deleterious land use, lack of community planning, obsolescence, excessive vacancies and a lag in EAV. The KMA report suggested that the City might wish to prioritize this area for further study based on the factors mentioned above and the fact that York Street is such an important arterial roadway. There is already the possibility that, with some help, a new super food store will open in this area in the foreseeable future.

The second area under consideration, York Street and Vallette, shows evidence of deterioration, deleterious land use, lack of community planning, obsolescence, excessive vacancies and a lag in EAV, compared to the remainder of the City, according to KMA. Its location along the major north-south arterial and proximity to densely populated residential areas provide the potential for beneficial economic development. Local planning efforts, along with parking and streetscape improvements, would serve to enhance values and existing uses.

The third study area, Riverside Drive, is characterized primarily by industrial and commercial uses, and shows evidence of deterioration, deleterious land use, lack of community planning, obsolescence, inadequate utilities and a lag in EAV. The KMA report suggested the evaluation of new public improvements or land assembly and site preparation. With its frontage and visibility along Route 83, the area could potentially benefit from traffic/intersection improvements, streetscape/gateway improvements and infrastructure improvements, including costs associated with floodplain development.

Ash Borer in Elmhurst

Late this summer, emerald ash borer was discovered in Elmhurst. First identified in Illinois more than five years ago, this destructive pest, native to Asia, attacks Ash trees of all types, eventually killing them. The adult emerald ash borer emerges between May and July, and the female lays numerous eggs in the tree's bark. The eggs hatch into larvae that bore into the tree and chew the inner bark and phloem, creating winding galleries that cut off the flow of water and nutrients. Currently there are no effective treatments that are appropriate for use on a large scale.



Members of Elmhurst city staff have created a plan to prepare the community for the eventual economic and environmental impacts involved in removing and replacing approximately 2,300 Ash trees — or about 10 percent of the City's urban forest. While the

realities are discouraging, Elmhurst's sound tree-planting policies have resulted in a significant diversification in tree stock. In some communities, Ash trees comprise as much as 30 percent of the overall tree population.

The obvious economic impacts of removing and replacing so many trees will be compounded by other less visible costs, including loss of shade, water, air purification, beauty, wildlife habitat, infrastructure value and property value.

Based on recommendations from the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the Illinois Department of Agriculture and the Morton Arboretum, the City decided in 2009 to implement a program of preemptive removal and replacement of 115 Ash trees (5 percent) each year for the next 20 years. This plan will allow the City to spread out the cost over a longer period of time and reduce the number of trees replaced in any given year. In addition, the City's tree canopy will be replaced earlier by removing and replacing trees in marginal condition more quickly. It is hoped that these actions will prevent the City from having to work in crisis mode when it becomes necessary to remove a large number of dead and dying trees. Stormwater Comprehensive Plan Update

Following the torrential rains in the summer of 2010, the City Council engaged two engineering firms to help the City resolve its stormwater and sanitary flooding issues. The teams of Christopher B. Burke Engineering, Ltd., and The RJN Group have been working together on the numerous problems that the City experienced as a result of the extremely heavy rain. Christopher B. Burke Engineering has collected information on the City's storm sewer system and created a computer model to analyze potential improvements to help alleviate flooding. The RJN Group has worked on the sanitary side of the problem, constructing a similar computer model of the City's sanitary sewer system. Both firms have collected data via flow meters and inspections to identify sources of clean water coming into the sanitary system. The final report of the Comprehensive Stormwater Management Plan is due to the City Council in December 2011. Smart911 or Premise Alert Which one is right for your family?

There are currently two free programs available to Elmhurst residents that provide valuable and potentially life-saving information to fire, police and paramedics any time a resident calls 9-1-1. Residents are encouraged to compare the benefits of the two programs – Smart911 and Premise Alert – and decide if one of them will meet their needs and the needs of family members.

Smart911

With Smart911, individuals build an online safety profile for their home phone and cell phone. Vital personal and medical information is then available to emergency responders any time 9-1-1 is called. The additional data is far more extensive than what is typically available to 9-1-1 dispatchers and may include medical conditions, children's photos, home addresses of mobile phone callers, disabilities or other rescue-related information.

Smart911 delivers this information to the dispatcher's work station automatically when a 9-1-1 call is received at participating Public Service Answering Points (PSAPs). The service can potentially save lives by providing responders with critical additional information. It also allows citizens to easily provide and manage special needs data. The information provided remains completely confidential and is only available to emergency responders in the event the resident calls 9-1-1. Since Smart911 is a national system, it works nationwide wherever Smart911 is utilized. The same information provided by the registrant in DuPage County is available to 9-1-1

call-takers outside of DuPage County when 9-1-1 is dialed. DU-COMM strongly encourages anyone who lives, works and visits the greater DuPage County area to register for this free service by visiting www.Smart911.com.

Premise Alert

The Premise Alert Program provides residents with a uniform method of alerting first responders about their own or a family member's special needs or disability. With advance knowledge, first responders can respond more appropriately during a crisis, evacuation or disaster. The system is beneficial for anyone with a special need, health challenge or disability, including but not limited to Alzheimer's, autism, mental health challenges, intellectual disabilities, or complex or rare medical conditions. It has been used for family members who need oxygen; for diabetic individuals who may appear to be impaired from drugs or alcohol; for stroke or Alzheimer's patients; for people who need assistance getting out of bed; for individuals who might not respond to spoken language because of a hearing impairment or language difference; and for individuals with developmental disabilities or mental health challenges. Premise Alert also allows individuals to provide valuable information to first responders about their home, such as a Plexiglas window or an indoor lock that could impede rescue. Information provided as part of the Premise Alert Program is entered into the DU-COMM CAD database and remains confidential. Safe Holiday Shopping Tips

Holiday shopping in crowded stores and malls provides ample opportunity for criminals to put a damper on your holiday celebrations. Shoppers may be rushed and less observant. Cars are loaded with gifts and parcels, including valuable items. These suggestions from the Elmhurst Police Department are meant to help keep your holidays from being ruined by having your money or gifts stolen.

Pay by check or credit card rather than carrying large amounts of cash. Keep your wallet in your front pants pocket or coat breast pocket. Carry your handbag in front of you and close to your body, covering the flap or clasp with your arm.



Never leave a spare key in your car. Never park your car in a dark or deserted location, and always lock the doors and close the windows. Don't leave valuables in your car, either at the mall or in your driveway. Don't leave parcels visible in your car while you shop or after you get home.

Be alert and walk confidently. Notice anyone who passes you or is walking behind you. Be especially careful on crowded trains and buses, or in crowds of shoppers. If you lock parcels in the trunk of your car while you continue shopping, make sure no one is watching you.

Don't overburden yourself with bags and parcels that would make it difficult for you to keep track of your handbag or wallet, or respond to a threat. If you notice anyone who looks suspicious or appears to be watching you, report the person to the police or mall security.

If you are shopping with children, instruct them to go to a security guard or store clerk if you become separated. Tell them not to go to the parking lot to look for you or your car.

Be careful and watchful as you shop this season. Don't let a crook take the joy out of your holidays.



Holiday Food Drive

City employees and officials are involved during the holiday season and throughout the year in efforts to assist local needy families. Since 2004, the Public Works Garage has provided a safe and clean place for the United Community Concerns Association to store and sort donations collected during the annual holiday food drive. City employees and elected officials assist each year as food and supplies are distributed to area families. Several other food drives, sponsored by the Northern Illinois Mobile Food Pantry, and staffed by volunteers from United Community Concerns, are also held at the Public Works Garage.

City Receives IDOT Grant



Statistics show that 85 percent of child safety seats are improperly installed by parents. It is the goal of the Elmhurst Fire Department and the Illinois Department of Transportation's Highway Safety Project to eliminate this alarming statistic. With that goal in mind,

the Elmhurst Fire Department applied for and received an IDOT grant that will be used to provide additional training and supplies for our certified car seat technicians to aid in the correct installation of child safety seats.

The child safety seat inspection program is one of the most popular programs provided by the Elmhurst Fire Department. Last year alone, over 200 child safety seats were inspected by the department's certified technicians. Technicians are available to inspect the installation of your child's safety seat by appointment only on most Mondays, Fridays and Saturdays. To make an appointment, please call 630-530-3090. 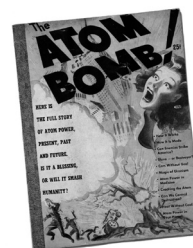

City Hall will be closed on Thursday, November 24, and Friday, November 25, for Thanksgiving. City Hall will close at noon on Friday, December 23, and will be closed all day on Monday, December 26, and Monday, January 2. Meetings of the standing committees, normally held on the fourth Monday, will be held on Tuesday, December 27. The first City Council meeting for 2012 will take place on Tuesday, January 3.



Leaf Collection and Yard Waste

For 2011, yard waste collection will end the week of November 28 and resume during the first week in April 2012.

The last free leaf collection will be on November 30, December 1 or 2, whichever is your regular collection day. Please remember that it is a violation of city ordinances to rake or blow leaves into the street where they often block storm drains or create unsafe driving conditions. Violations can result in fines of up to \$500.



Winter Weather Reminders

The winter season, with its snow, ice and cold, can create unique challenges and hazards for motorists, pedestrians, residents and city workers. The following tips can help keep the wintertime safer for all.

Snow Removal

During and after snowstorms, and depending on the size and severity of the storm, a full-scale snow removal fleet of 30+ vehicles is used to clear streets and keep them open for motorists.

Typically, snowplow operators remove snow from the center of the street to the curb in a series of four passes. Main roads are cleared first, followed by neighborhood streets and other less-traveled roadways.

During heavy snowfalls, especially if the snow is accompanied by windy conditions, the operation can be time-consuming, and continues day and night until completed. Because it is inevitable that snow will be pushed onto driveway approaches, homeowners are encouraged to wait for city crews to complete their work before clearing private property approaches. Residents are asked not to blow or shovel snow onto the street when clearing sidewalks and driveways. Parking on the street is not allowed for eight hours following a snowfall of two inches or more.



Wipers and Lights

Motorists are reminded that Illinois Vehicle Code 12-201 (b) requires the use of headlights, not only from sunset to sunrise, but also any time snow, rain, ice, fog or other weather conditions require the use of windshield wipers. Headlights must also be used any time a person or vehicle on the highway is not clearly visible at a distance of 1,000 feet.

Sump Pumps

Allowing sump pumps to discharge water onto city streets or sidewalks is illegal and can create icy and dangerous conditions for motorists and pedestrians during periods of cold weather.

Safe Wintertime Driving

Snow and ice present unique challenges and often dangerous driving conditions. Remember to buckle up, keep windows free of snow and ice, adjust your speed and following distance, and allow extra time to reach your destination safely.



Fire Hydrants

Unfortunately, fires don't take a holiday during the winter months and it is vital for Fire Department personnel to be able to locate fire hydrants quickly during emergencies. Please keep hydrants visible by clearing away snow and ice.

Community Safety

Holiday Fire Safety Tips

Every year during the holiday season, fires in the U.S. claim the lives of more than 400 people, injure over 1,600 and result in more than \$990 million in property damage. You can greatly reduce your chance of becoming a holiday fire casualty by following some important precautions from the Elmhurst Fire Department.

Christmas trees can become completely engulfed in flames in a matter of minutes, rapidly filling a room with fire and deadly gases. Select a real tree very carefully, making sure the needles are green and don't break easily. The trunk should be sticky to the touch. Bounce the tree on the ground. If many needles fall off, the tree has probably dried out and is a fire hazard. Keep the tree away from heat sources and always keep the tree stand filled with water. Don't keep a tree up any longer than two weeks.

Before putting up holiday lights, inspect them carefully for frayed wires, bare spots, gaps in insulation, broken or cracked sockets, and excessive kinking or wear. Use only lighting that has been approved by a testing lab. Don't link more than three light strands together unless the directions indicate that it is safe to

do so. Check the wires periodically – they should never be warm to the touch. Turn holiday lights off when they are going to be unattended.

Use only non-flammable or flame-retardant holiday decorations. Never place decorations near heat vents, candles or fireplaces. Never put holiday wrapping paper in a fireplace where it can throw off dangerous sparks and embers, or cause a chimney fire.

Play it safe by not using lit candles as decorations. If you do light candles, make sure they are in stable holders where they cannot be easily knocked over. Keep them away from other decorations, including greenery. Never leave the house or retire for the night with candles burning. Never go near a real tree with lit candles, lighters or matches.

Make sure you have a working smoke alarm on every level of your home. Test your alarms monthly, and keep them clean and equipped with fresh batteries.

Play it safe by not using lit candles as decorations. If you do light candles, make sure they are in stable holders where they cannot be easily knocked over.

Holiday Refuse Collection

During Thanksgiving week, refuse collection will be delayed by one day for residents whose normal collection day is either Thursday or Friday. During the Christmas and New Year's weeks, refuse collection will be delayed by one day for all residents.

Christmas trees will be collected without a refuse sticker on your normal collection day during the first and second weeks in January. Please remember to remove all ornaments, lights and nails. Do not put trees in plastic bags.

Holiday wreaths, garlands, wrapping paper and packing peanuts may be discarded with regular household refuse. Gift boxes that measure no more than three feet by three feet are recyclable if flattened and bundled or bagged.

House Numbers

Time can be a critical factor in an emergency situation, but before firefighters, police officers or paramedics can provide the needed assistance, they must be able to find the right address. Elmhurst Municipal Code requires that numbers be attached to every building in the community "in a conspicuous place at the side of or above the front door of the building." The code requires the numbers to be at least six inches in height in a color that contrasts with the building color. Please avoid using numbers spelled out in cursive since they are particularly difficult to read at night and during stormy weather.

Dan Gibbons Turkey Trot

Every Thanksgiving morning since 1984, Elmhurst residents and friends have gathered at the starting line to burn off some calories, and also raise money

to help the hungry and needy. The first Turkey Trot, held 27 years ago, included 74 runners and walkers, and brought in just over \$500. Last year's event brought in over \$140,000, with thousands of participants flooding the streets of Elmhurst. In the last 22 years, the Turkey Trot has raised over \$1.5 million to support the food pantries of the Chicago Anti-Hunger Federation, the homeless shelters of DuPage PADS, and the needy families and seniors identified by United Community Concerns.
