Meet the Fire Chief

Congratulations are in order to Jeff Bacidore who was recently promoted to the position of Fire Chief for the City of Elmhurst. Jeff began his career in 1980 as a paid on-call firefighter with the LaSalle Fire Department, after earning his degree in Fire Science Management from Southern Illinois University. He joined the Elmhurst Fire Department in 1985 and has now been with the City for 27 years. He was promoted to lieutenant in 1995, captain in 1998 and deputy fire chief in 2002. In his role as Fire Chief, Jeff will supervise 10 officers, 33 firefighters and 12 contract paramedics.

As far as Jeff's family is concerned, fire service is in the blood. His father was a firefighter with the LaSalle Fire Department for 50 years, serving as chief for the last 20 years of his career. Jeff's

brother is currently fire chief in LaSalle. He also has one cousin and an uncle on the LaSalle Fire Department and one cousin who is a Lieutenant on the Lombard Fire Department. Jeff has been married to his wife Vicki for 23 years. They have two sons — one is pursuing a career in fire service and the other in the military.

Until Jeff's promotion to Fire Chief, Mike Kopp was wearing two hats — fire chief and part-time assistant city manager. Mike is now the City's

full-time assistant City Manager. His duties include coordinating economic development efforts, supervising human resources, information technology, and building and planning.

TIF District Analysis Continues

In TIF Districts, a base equalized assessed value (EAV) is determined and that base is used to allocate property tax revenue to taxing bodies, including school districts, park districts, libraries and cities. Any EAV increase over that base level goes into a special fund for TIF improvements, such as property acquisition, demolition, parking improvements, utility upgrades, professional services, façade renovation, streetscape improvements, and other public purposes as permitted by law. In other words, TIF Districts invest in themselves. Elmhurst has had three very successful TIF

Districts in place for a number of years: TIF I in the central business district; TIF II near Lake and Walnut; and TIF III at Route 83 and St. Charles Road.

The City began review of nine other areas that might be considered for TIF designation.

The review areas were all determined to have significant redevelopment potential, due to adverse conditions, including "...deterioration, deleterious land use, lack of community planning, obsolescence, excessive vacancies and a lag in EAV when compared to the remainder of the City." In 2011, the City retained the services of Kane, McKenna and Associates (KMA), Inc., to evaluate these

other areas within the City that would benefit from the use of economic development strategies.

After a thorough review of the areas proposed for economic development, the north York Street area was determined to have the best redevelopment potential. This area is from the alley south of Hahn Street on the south, to Grand Avenue on the north, including one or both sides of York Street (and other contiguous parcels east and west of York Street). On

July 2 the Joint Review Board (consisting of representatives from other affected taxing districts) reviewed the Redevelopment Plan and Project along with the Eligibility Report and determined it met the requirements of the Illinois State TIF Act. On August 6th a Public Hearing was held to better understand the concerns of the public. The City continues to work with the School District and Park District to ensure the TIF process and designation is a win/win for all those affected by the TIF. The next step in the process is for the City Council to consider the appropriate ordinances to designate the

proposed North York TIF area (TIF IV).

✓ Early Voting

Elmhurst City Hall will serve as an Early Voting location for the November 6th General Election for all registered voters of DuPage County, beginning Monday, October 22, through Friday, November 2, between the hours of 9 a.m. - 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, in the Council Chambers (209 N. York Street). Contact the Election Commission for additional Early Voting locations and hours. To participate in Early Voting, you must be a registered DuPage County voter and present a government-issued photo ID.

✓ Absentee Voting

The DuPage Election Commission offers absentee voting to individuals who will be unable to vote in person on Election Day for one of the following reasons: absent from DuPage County; serving as an election judge outside his/her precinct; observing a religious holiday; performing official election duties or election law enforcement duties; physically incapacitated; pre-trial detainee; or called for jury duty. For information or to obtain an absentee ballot, contact the DuPage Election Commission at (630) 407-5600.

✓ Voter Registration

The City Clerk's Office provides voter registration Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. for all DuPage County residents. When registering, be sure to bring two forms of identification: a current, valid photo identification card with your signature is required, together with at least one item showing your current address. You must register at least 28 days prior to an election in order to vote in that election.

✓ Grace Period Registration

Illinois law provides a grace period to register and vote for individuals who were unable to register to vote or change their address prior to the traditional deadline. The grace period is from the 27th day through the 14th day prior to an election. Registering to vote or transferring a registration and voting during the grace period may only be done in person at the DuPage Election Commission office at 421 N. County Farm Rd., Wheaton, IL.

York Street Repaving Project

he York Street resurfacing project will be underway this fall for improvements from Vallette Street to South Robert Palmer Drive. The project will include removal and replacement of deteriorated sections of curb, gutter, pavement and sidewalk. The final pavement construction will include a three-inch grind of the existing concrete and a three-inch overlay of asphalt. Close to three quarters of the project costs, excluding engineering, were provided through a Federal Surface Transportation Program grant from the DuPage Mayors and Managers Conference. Completion is anticipated by early December.

Fire Prevention Week, October 7 - 11: "Have 2 Ways Out"

Then it comes to fire safety, it's crucial to understand that fire spreads rapidly and can leave a home completely engulfed in smoke and flames in a matter of minutes. You may have as little as two minutes to get your family to safety after the smoke alarm sounds. Without working smoke alarms, you may not even become aware of the danger until it is too late to escape. Unfortunately, most children and many adults do not know how to react in a fire emergency. Creating a fire escape plan and practicing that plan at least once every six months may mean the difference between life and death. Follow these steps to create a fire safety plan for your family:

- ✓ Make sure your home has working smoke alarms, ideally in each sleeping room, outside each sleeping area, and on every level of the home. Push the test button to make sure they are all working.
- ✓ Walk through your home and inspect all possible exits and escape routes. Consider having children draw a floor plan of your home, marking two ways out of each room, including doors and windows. Make sure all windows and doors open easily. Purchase escape ladders and place them near second floor windows. Remember the second way out might be through a window.
- ✓ Select an outside meeting place located within sight of your home but a safe distance from the front door, such as a light post, stop sign or neighbor's porch. Instruct all family members to meet at that spot after they have escaped. Mark the meeting location on your escape plan.

- Make sure your house number is clearly visible from the street to help emergency personnel find your address. Elmhurst Code requires that the numbers be at least four inches high and in a color that contrasts with the color of the building. Avoid spelling out numbers in cursive.
- ✓ Teach family members how to use 911 to call the fire department and make sure they know they should call from a neighbor's house or a cell phone from outside the house.
- √ Teach family members that once they are outside, they must stay outside. Never go back into a burning building. If someone is missing, give that information to the 911 dispatcher. Firefighters have the skills and equipment to perform rescues.
- Practice your plan at least twice a year, making the drill as realistic as possible. Allow children to master the plan and practice it before holding a fire drill at night when they are sleeping. Let them know ahead of time there will be a drill that night. If a family member does not wake up to the sound of the smoke alarm, assign someone to wake that person as part of the drill and in a real fire situation. Practice crawling low under smoke, covering your mouth and nose. Teach family members to always choose the safest escape route the one with the least smoke and heat. As you practice your plan, remember to close doors to slow down the spread of fire and give your family more time to safely escape.

Learn Not to Burn

Keeping children safe is a top priority for members of the Elmhurst Fire Department. "Learn Not to Burn" is a fire safety education program for elementary school children and is based on the National Fire Protection Association curriculum. This highly successful program teaches basic fire safety skills, such as Stop, Drop and Roll; crawl low under smoke; and how to call 911. Each year the Elmhurst Fire Department sponsors a "Learn Not to Burn" poster contest for fourth graders in the community's public and private schools. Congratulations to Katherine from Lincoln School who created this year's first place entry; Arianna from Hawthorne School who took second place honors; and Michael from Immaculate Conception Grade School whose poster took third place. School Safety - More than Fire Drills

School and public safety officials nationwide now take precautions in response to situations once considered unthinkable in our nation's schools — armed intruders or students with guns. Tragedies in recent years have made it necessary to add lockdown drills to the standard drills that have long been part of school safety measures. In a lockdown drill or actual lockdown situation, classroom doors are locked and blinds are closed. Students are instructed to leave their seats and sit in silence away from windows and where they cannot be seen from the door. Two lockdown drills are held each year in Elmhurst schools.

Tragedies in recent years have made it necessary to add lockdown drills to the standard drills.

Schools housing elementary or secondary students under the age of 21 are also required by state law to hold several other types of drills. There must be at least three evacuation drills to prepare for situations in which conditions outside the building are safer than inside, including fire, bomb threat, suspicious items or hazardous materials. Schools must also hold at least one bus evacuation drill to prepare students and personnel for situations in which conditions outside the bus are safer than inside, such as fire, suspicious items, and incidents involving hazardous materials. At least one severe weather and shelter-in-place drill is also required to prepare for tornados.

Members of the Elmhurst Police and Fire Departments monitor these safety drills, and assist, as needed, as part of a partnership between schools and public safety personnel.





Be Smart with Smart911

In an emergency situation, residents need the most efficient and appropriate assistance that can be provided by responding personnel. Smart911 gives firefighters the information they need to ensure that all family members and pets are rescued. The program provides paramedics with information about allergies, heart attack or stroke history, dementia or hearing impairment. If the police have a child's photo, already supplied through Smart911, this program can help save critical minutes when a child is reported missing, in order to issue an Amber Alert without delay.

Smart911 is a free, county-wide program available in the Elmhurst community. Information provided by residents is private and protected, and is only seen by public safety personnel responding to an emergency 911 call. To sign up, visit the city's website at www.elmhurst.org and click on the Smart911 link on the home page. If you don't have access to the Internet, you can still provide critical information about disabilities or special needs through the Premise Alert Program. Visit the Police Department or City Hall to fill out the necessary form. Information will then be sent to DuComm and added to your database. This critical information is given to emergency responders when a 911 call is placed from your home.

Door-to-Door Solicitation

No Solicitors Invited

Residents are reminded that a permit is required for persons or organizations soliciting door-to-door in Elmhurst.* The application process takes approximately three weeks and includes a background check by the Police Department. The fact that a solicitor has been issued a permit is not a city endorsement of the organization. Once approved, solicitors must wear the photo ID badge issued by the Administration Office while soliciting. Permits are available in the City Clerk's Office for the following purposes:

- ✓ To obtain orders for the purchase of goods, wares, merchandise, food items, or services of any kind.
- To obtain prospective customers for application or purchase of any type of insurance.
- ✓ To obtain subscriptions to books, magazines, newspapers or other publications.
- ✓ To obtain gifts or contributions of money, clothing, or any other valuable things for the support or benefit of a charitable or non-profit organization or project.
- Residents who do not wish to have solicitors on their property may obtain a "No Solicitor Invited" sticker from the City Administration Office at City Hall or on the city's website. Solicitors must immediately leave the premises if a "No Solicitor Invited" sticker is displayed.



Trick or Treat

Motorists are cautioned to watch for small trick-or-treaters in our neighborhoods during the afternoon and evening hours on Halloween. Free Leaf Pick-Up at the Curb

The annual display of fall colors is inevitably followed by piles of leaves to be disposed of. Residents are reminded that the city's waste hauler will offer several free leaf collection periods during the late fall: the first during the week of October 29 and the second during the week of November 26. Leaf pick-up takes place on your regular refuse collection day. Leaves must be kept separate from other yard waste and placed at the curb in clearly marked garbage cans, cardboard boxes or Kraft paper bags. Boxes and cans will be left on the parkway following the collection. Leaves and grass clippings may not be raked into the street where they can easily clog storm drain inlets and obstruct the flow of storm water. Residents can help by raking leaves and debris away from storm drain inlets in their neighborhoods.

Children who do not ride the bus are encouraged to walk or bike in groups, or with parents to alleviate congestion around schools. Parents who drive their children are encouraged to be patient and follow established school pick-up and drop-off plans. Please respect crossing guards, parent volunteers and student patrols, and set a good example for your children.

Remember — it is illegal to use a cell phone in a school zone, unless it is a hands-free model. It is a violation of state law to send or read text messages at any time while driving. You can be pulled over for this offense.





CFL Safety and Disposal

Compact fluorescent light bulbs (CFLs) consume much less power and last much longer than comparable incandescent bulbs. CFLs, however, contain a small amount of toxic mercury, sealed within the glass tubing. No mercury is released when the bulbs are intact or in use, but they should be handled carefully while being removed from packaging, and installed or replaced. Always screw and unscrew the bulb by its base rather than by the glass. Never forcefully twist a CFL into a light socket. When a CFL breaks, some of the mercury is released as mercury vapor. To minimize exposure, follow these EPA-recommended clean-up steps. Before clean-up, have all people and pets leave the room. Ventilate the room by opening a window or door for at least 15 minutes. Shut off your central air conditioning or heating. When it is safe to return to the room, put on protective gloves and thoroughly scrape up broken glass and visible powder using stiff paper or cardboard. Use sticky tape to pick up remaining fragments or powder. Never use a vacuum to clean up debris from a broken bulb. Seal the glass and powder tightly in a glass jar or plastic bag. Wash your hands with soap and water after clean-up. Broken CFLs are legally considered a hazardous material and may not be disposed of with regular refuse. Burned out, unbroken CFLs are accepted for recycling at both local Ace Hardware stores (First Street and S. York Street), and at other locations in the area.

What is Public Safety Radio Interoperability?

In 2010, the DuPage County ETSB approved the use of Motorola's StarCom21 digital-trunked radio system to create the DuPage County Emergency Dispatch Interoperable Radio System (EDIRS). The new system provides a single radio network for police officers, firefighters and paramedics to communicate with agencies at the county, state and federal level during day-to-day operations, as well as during disasters.

The StarCom21 system was an existing interoperable radio system used by agencies in more than 24 counties in Illinois, and will be used by more than 61 police, fire and ems agencies in DuPage County. Through the use of state-of-the-art digital radio technology, radio signals on the DuPage EDIRS are greatly enhanced, resulting in clearer, stronger and more effective emergency radio communications

for the Elmhurst Fire and Police departments. A large part of the equipment and operating air time costs are being funded by federal and ETSB grant money.

Prior to the new system going live, tests were conducted in the City of Elmhurst to assess the coverage and clarity of the new system, as well as the efficiency of the new radio equipment. In May 2012, the Elmhurst Police Department became active operational members on the DuPage EDIRS system, with officers utilizing the system daily. The Elmhurst Fire Department is expected to soon follow, with an anticipated switchover in late 2012. The many benefits realized with the new DuPage EDIRS will help the Elmhurst Fire and Police departments to continue to provide excellent service to the residents of the City.

Portable Generator Safety

When using a portable generator during a power outage, it is important to remember that they can be dangerous if used incorrectly. Like all internal combustion engines, generators produce carbon monoxide and must be properly ventilated. Never use a generator indoors or near windows, doors or vents. Do not operate the generator inside the garage, even if the door is open. To avoid electrical shock or electrocution, keep the generator dry and never attach it directly to the home's electrical system without a properly installed transfer switch. Use only undamaged, heavy-duty, three-pronged extension cords. Never store fuel indoors and always shut off the generator before refueling.

Dispose of Expired or Unwanted Medications

Collection Event, Saturday, September 29

f your medicine cabinet contains expired drugs and medications you no longer use, you may be inadvertently contributing to a rapidly growing drug problem – abuse of potentially dangerous prescription or over-the-counter (OTC) drugs. Data from the National Survey on Drug Use and

Health demonstrates that nearly one-third of youngsters who used drugs for the first time in 2009 began by using a prescription drug for non-medical reasons. Many teens consider these drugs safer and less addictive than street drugs because they are prescribed by a doctor and dispensed by a pharmacist. They may experiment with prescription or OTC drugs to lose weight, fit in, have more fun or even to study more effectively. Teens may not even realize they are doing anything illegal and may be unaware of the dangers involved in combining these substances with other drugs or alcohol. Prescription drug abuse can lead to addiction, decreased cognitive function, social and academic



problems, seizures, lowered heart rate and respiration, coma and even death.

Proper disposal of expired and unwanted medications is crucial in the battle to end abuse of prescription and OTC drugs. To assist in that effort, the Elmhurst Police Department will again participate in the

National Prescription Drug Take-Back Day sponsored by the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) on Saturday, September 29, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., in the police station parking lot. During the April collection, 450 pounds of medications were turned in for destruction in Elmhurst alone. Since the event was held in 2010, over 774 tons of medications have been removed from circulation nationwide. Residents are encouraged to look through their medicine cabinets and bring unwanted and/or expired prescriptions and OTC meds to the police station on Take-Back Day. Please note that hypodermic needles are not accepted.

Electronics Recycling



Elmhurst College will host a fourth recycling event on Saturday, October 20, from 9 a.m.

- 12 p.m. in the parking lot of the Mill Theatre at the corner of Myrtle and Park Streets. Electronics of all kinds will be accepted.
