Flood Mitigation Update

he City continues to work with Elmhurst residents, the Elmhurst Park District, School District and engineering consultants to identify the most effective flood mitigation projects and improvements.

The City has hosted several open house meetings to present conceptual stormwater mitigation projects. The presentations and exhibits can be viewed on the Elmhurst website at http://www. elmhurst.org/index.aspx?NID=1273. In addition, the City has reviewed conceptual plans with the Park District and School District, and answered concerns regarding the use of the park and/or school sites. The City is close to completing engineering work for the Southwest Elmhurst Wet Weather Storage Facility. This project will have numerous positive impacts on the sanitary system in reducing sewer back-ups in southwest Elmhurst. Construction is anticipated to begin on this project in 2014.

Prescription Drug Take-Back Day, October 26



The Elmhurst Police Department will participate in National Prescription Drug Take-Back Day, sponsored by the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), on Saturday, October 26, 2013, from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. in the police station parking lot. Residents are

encouraged to look through their medicine cabinets and bring unwanted and/or expired prescriptions and OTC meds to the police station on Take-Back Day.

One of the fastest growing drug problems in the United States is the abuse of prescription and over-the-counter (OTC) medications, including pain relievers, tranquilizers, stimulants, and cough remedies containing dextromethorphan (DXM).

According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), more than six million people abuse prescription drugs for the first time each year. Prescription and OTC drug abuse can involve taking a medication prescribed for another person; taking a drug in a higher quantity or in a manner other than prescribed; or taking a drug for a purpose other than prescribed.

Teens are likely to consider prescription drugs safer and less addictive since they are prescribed by a physician and dispensed by a pharmacist, not realizing that they can lead to addiction, seizures, lowered heart rate and respiration, decreased cognitive function, academic and social problems, coma, and even death. Teens and young adults may use prescription and OTC drugs to stay awake and focused on studies, to be accepted by peers, to help with anxiety or sleep problems, to lose weight, or to get high.

Proper disposal of expired and unwanted medications is crucial in the battle to end prescription and OTC drug abuse.

Illinois Prairie Path Days

September 30, 2013, marks the 50th anniversary of the proposal to convert the abandoned right-of-way of the Chicago Aurora & Elgin (the "Roarin' Elgin") electric train into a multi-use recreation/nature trail.

The Illinois Prairie Path was the first rail-to-trail in the U.S. The path spans approximately 62 miles as it makes its way through three counties,



thirteen communities, and eight forest preserves. The Prairie Path traverses residential neighborhoods, downtown shopping districts, and rare segments of centuries-old prairie grass.

Residents, friends, and neighbors are invited to celebrate Illinois Prairie Path Days, Saturday, September 28, through Monday, September 30, by enjoying any or all of its 62 miles in whatever way suits you. In addition to going for a walk, run or bike ride, you might enjoy photographing, painting, or drawing wildflowers or trees; looking for wildlife and their tracks; or simply sitting by the path to enjoy its quiet beauty.



Smart911 - Every Second Counts

In an emergency, a few seconds may mean the difference between life and death. Smart911 is a free service that allows residents to create a household Safety Profile containing all the information important to emergency responders. If the Safety Profile is in place and someone calls 911, their profile is immediately displayed to the 911 operator and is used to facilitate the best possible response. The profile can include details about household members, phone numbers, addresses (home, work, vacation homes), as well as details about medical conditions, medications, pets, vehicles, and emergency contacts.

With a Safety Profile in place, firefighters have the information they need to help them rescue all family members and pets. The Profile gives paramedics information about allergies, heart attack or stroke history, hearing impairment, dementia, or mobility issues. Smart911 saves critical minutes when a child is reported missing if police have the child's photo and can issue an Amber Alert without delay. Information provided by residents is private and protected, and is only seen by public safety personnel responding to an emergency 911 call. Keeping Our Schools Safe – A Community Effort

he safety of Elmhurst school children is of great concern to members of the Elmhurst Police Department, as it should be to students, parents, and all members of the community. Tragedies in the recent past have made it

necessary to implement safety precautions that would have been considered extreme when many of us were of school age.

Members of the Elmhurst Police Department assist local schools in conducting lockdown drills each school year to prepare for the possibility of an armed intruder or a student with a weapon. Lockdown drills and actual lockdown situations involve locking classroom doors, closing blinds, and instructing students to leave their seats and take a concealed position of safety.

As required by state law, several other types of drills are conducted in schools housing elementary or secondary students under the age of 21. Evacuation drills are conducted to prepare for a situation during which conditions outside the school building or outside the school bus are considered safer than inside, including fire, smoke, hazardous materials, and suspicious items. At least one severe weather or

shelter-in-place drill is conducted to prepare for the possibility of a tornado or other severe weather event.

Public safety personnel and school officials urge members of the community to be vigilant, and report threats or suspicious activity immediately by calling 911. Parents and visitors to our schools should always follow their school's visitor check-in policy. Keeping our school children safe is a community effort.

Getting Kids Safely to and from School

Before long school children will be making their way to and from school along our city streets and sidewalks. School officials and public safety personnel encourage children who do not ride a bus to school, to walk or bike in groups, or with parents — to ease congestion problems around the schools. Parents who must drive their children to and from school are encouraged to follow the established school drop-off and pick-up plans, and to respect student patrols, crossing guards, and parent volunteers.

Motorists are asked to be particularly vigilant as they drive in school zones. Remember — it is illegal to use a cell phone in a school zone, unless it is a hands-free model. It is illegal to send or read text messages at any time while driving.

Yield to Emergency Vehicles

Scott's Law was passed in 2002 after Scott Gillen of the Chicago Fire Department was struck and killed by a drunk driver while assisting at an accident scene on a Chicago expressway.

Scott's Law requires that when approaching a stationary emergency vehicle using visual signals, motorists must yield, change to a lane away from the emergency vehicle, and proceed with caution. If a lane change is not possible because of heavy traffic, drivers must reduce their speed and proceed with caution. Violations of Scott's Law carry a mandatory fine of \$100. Higher fines, up to \$10,000, can be imposed if a motorist's actions cause an accident.

Driving under the influence would be considered an aggravating factor, calling for a higher fine. Driver's license suspension is also imposed: 90 days in cases involving property damage; 180 days if the motorist's actions cause an injury; and two years if the accident results in a death.



Motorists are also reminded that when they are approached by a moving emergency vehicle using audible and visual signals, they are required to immediately pull as far to the right as possible and wait for the emergency vehicle to pass. If stopped at an intersection with two-way traffic, motorists are required to remain stopped until the emergency vehicle has passed. These regulations are designed to protect emergency personnel who risk their lives to serve the public.



"Learn Not to Burn"

Young children tend to react in a fire situation by "hiding" from the flames in a closet or under a bed, or "running away" from them if their clothing catches fire.

The consequences of these natural tendencies can be tragic. Elmhurst Fire Department personnel provide elementary school students with the knowledge and skills they need to react appropriately in a fire situation through the "Learn Not to Burn" fire safety program.

Participants are taught potentially life-saving skills, including how to call 911; what to do if a smoke alarm sounds; how to crawl low in a fire; and how to stop, drop, cover, and roll.

The annual "Learn Not to Burn" poster contest is open to fourth grade students in Elmhurst public and private schools. The winners of this year's contest are Julia from Visitation School, 1st place; Hannah from Lincoln School, 2nd place; and Kate from Timothy

Cooking Safety

Cooking has been the leading cause of home fires for many years, accounting for more than 150,000 such fires reported in the U.S. annually. Cooking fires result in hundreds of deaths, thousands of injuries, and approximately \$1 billion in direct property damage each year.



The leading cause of fires in the kitchen is unattended cooking, usually on the stovetop. The following tips will help keep you, your family, and your home safe while cooking:

- Stay in the kitchen whenever you are frying, broiling, or grilling food. If you must leave the kitchen, even for a short time, turn off the stove. If a small grease fire starts in a pan, smother the flames by carefully sliding a lid over the pan. Turn off the burner and leave the lid on until the pan is completely cool.
- When simmering, baking, roasting, or boiling food, check the food regularly. Remain in the home while food is cooking and use a timer as a reminder.
- Keep anything that can catch fire including oven mitts, towels, food packaging, wooden utensils, etc., away from the stovetop.
- Enforce a "kid-free/pet-free zone" of at least three feet around the stove and areas where hot food or drink is prepared or served. If you have small children, cook on the back burners whenever possible.
- Turn pot handles away from the stove's edge.
- Wear clothing with short or tight-fitting sleeves when cooking.
- Clean up food and grease from burners and stovetops.

Attention: Parents and Teen Drivers


ne in every five teenage drivers is involved in an automobile accident within one year of getting his or her driver's license. Sadly, statistics also confirm that nearly 6,000 teen drivers are killed and more than 325,000 are seriously injured on our streets and highways each year. Teens face significant risks when it comes to driving, including inexperience, driving under the influence of drugs or alcohol, speed and other risk-taking behavior, distractions, failure to use seatbelts, and driving with other teens in the car.

The "Alive at 25" program is offered free of charge by the Elmhurst Police Department and teaches young drivers to make good driving decisions that will help them stay alive to celebrate their 25th birthdays. The class is open to all teens who attend local public and private schools, or who live in Elmhurst. Sump pump discharge that is above ground must be directed to an area on your property that can absorb this water before it reaches any adjacent properties or a city sidewalk. All property owners must do their very best to manage the water that is generated from their property.

No Leaves or Grass in the Street

Blocked inlets often contribute to street flooding during periods of

heavy rainfall, especially during the autumn months when trees are shedding their leaves. Residents are reminded that city ordinances prohibit raking leaves, grass clippings, and other debris into the street where they impede the flow of stormwater and create hazardous conditions for motorists. You can help prevent flooding problems by keeping storm drain inlets in your neighborhood free of debris.



No Wake

You can help prevent and reduce additional flooding damage to your neighbors by avoiding driving down flooded streets. Driving on a flooded street creates waves and pushes water higher, flooding areas that otherwise would have stayed dry. Please be courteous to your neighbors and do not drive down a flooded street.



bombings or the Texas fertilizer plant explosion. Often, the phony "charity" name is similar to that of a well-known charity. Check out the charity on the Better Business Bureau website at http://www.bbb.org/us/charity before making a contribution.

- *Phishing Scams* use fraudulent emails disguised as official requests to trick people into providing sensitive information, including credit card or banking details. The fake website may look almost identical to the official site. Never respond to unsolicited emails or click on links they contain.
- *Emergency Scams or "Granny scams*" involve a caller claiming to be a relative, often a grandchild, who is out of town and in trouble, and asks you to wire money to them. Contact another relative to check out the story.
- Sales Scams include door-to-door, telephone or Internet solicitors selling various types of services or merchandise. Never let a door-to-door salesperson in your home. Never provide financial or personal information over the phone or via the Internet unless you initiated the contact. Don't make purchases without checking out the company and the product.
- *Home Repair Scams* are common following a devastating flood, hurricane, earthquake, tornado, or other disaster. Check the Better Business Bureau at www.bbb.org for reliable contractors in your area.
- *Lottery Scams* request that you send a fee so that you can claim your prize. Never pay money to claim a prize or enter a sweepstakes.
- *Prepayment Scams* request a payment to "secure" a nonexistent loan. Never wire or send money to someone you don't know.
- *Fake Check Scams* offer money to put an advertising logo on your car. Be aware that the check is likely to bounce.
- *Employment Scams* generally offer easy work and quick money with no experience or skill necessary. Research the job and the company to make sure they are legitimate.

In addition, you can also reduce your risk of falling victim to a scam or fraud by taking these precautions.

- *Register your phone number* with the National Do Not Call Registry at 1-888-382-1222.
- Opt out of pre-approved credit offers by calling 1-888-567-8688. This type of correspondence can be stolen out of your mailbox or your garbage and used by unscrupulous people.
- *Keep your Social Security card* in a safe place. Don't carry it with you.
- Check your bank and credit card statements each month.

 Review your credit report annually.
- *Sign up for direct deposit* rather than having Social Security, retirement or disability checks mailed to you.

Remember you are the first line of defense against scams and frauds. Protect yourself by being alert and aware, by asking questions, and by checking things out for yourself.

Traveling Exhibit on "America's Greatest Generation" Makes Midwest Debut

ho speaks for the experiences of a generation and their impact on the world around them? What experiences help to create a sense of shared identity?

The Elmhurst Historical Museum presents the Midwest debut of a national traveling exhibit focused on these questions. *Our Lives, Our Stories: America's Greatest Generation*, which is open August 30 through October 20, 2013, explores the life arc of a single generation—the stories of their lives, told in their words—from birth to old age. The exhibit draws on memories and oral histories gathered by the Minnesota Historical Society to help understand who these people really were.

Born in the 1910s and 1920s, this generation was decisively shaped by their experiences during the Depression and World War II. They went on to make the Baby Boom, shape the economic boom of the postwar era, and to become some of the 20th century's most influential figures. Today—well into the 21st century—we are all living with their legacy.

Our Lives, Our Stories features a variety of domestic and cultural objects and multi-media interactive displays. In addition, the Elmhurst Historical Museum staff is adding a local connection



Using Portable Generators Safely

ortable generators are internal combustion engines used to generate electricity during power outages or when remote power is needed. To remain safe, be aware of the inherent hazards associated with the use of portable generators, including shocks and electrocution; carbon monoxide poisoning; fires; and noise and vibration.

Shock or Electrocution

- Never attach a generator directly to a structure's electrical system unless a qualified electrician has properly installed the generator with a transfer switch.
- Always plug electrical appliances directly into the generator using the cords supplied by the manufacturer or other grounded (i.e. three-pronged), heavy-duty cords. Never use frayed or damaged extension cords.
- Keep the generator dry by protecting it with a canopy in rainy or wet conditions. Never manipulate a generator's electrical components if you are wet or standing in water.

Carbon Monoxide Poisoning

- Make sure your generator is properly ventilated. Never use it
 indoors or in an enclosed space, such as a garage, basement, or
 crawl space. Make sure the generator has three to four feet of clear
 space on all sides and above to ensure proper ventilation.
- Never place a generator near a door, window, or vent that could allow carbon monoxide to enter and build up in occupied spaces.



• If you or others exhibit symptoms of CO poisoning, such as headache, dizziness, nausea, or tiredness, get to fresh air immediately and seek medical help. Do not re-enter the area until trained personnel have determined that it is safe.

Fire Hazards

Generators get hot while in use and remain hot for long periods after use. Fuels can ignite when spilled on hot engine parts. Before refueling, shut down the generator and allow it to cool.

- Store and transport gasoline or other fuels in approved containers that are vented and labeled with their contents.
- Keep fuel containers away from flame-producing and heatgenerating devices, such as the generator itself, water heaters, cigarettes, lighters, and matches. Never smoke near fuel containers. Vapors can travel long distances to ignition sources.
- Never store fuel in your home.

Noise and Vibration Hazards

The excessive noise and vibration produced by a generator can cause hearing loss and fatigue. Keep portable generators as far away as possible from work and gathering areas. Wear hearing protection if this is not possible.

When using a portable generator during a power outage, it is important to remember that they can be dangerous if used incorrectly.
