## **Elmhurst Named Top 10 U.S. Town for Families**

Elmhurst residents have been saying it for years, and now Family Circle magazine is helping spread the word. The August 2014 issue named Elmhurst as one of the Ten Best U.S. Towns for Families.

"It's an honor for Elmhurst to be recognized as a terrific place to live," Mayor Steve Morley said. "Our City provides superior services, great schools and a robust business climate."

Family Circle worked with Onboard Informatics, a New York City research firm, to compile a list of 4,200 cities with populations between 10,000 and 150,000, and then culled those with a high concentration of households with median incomes between \$50,000 and \$100,000.

The magazine then measured the towns against family-

friendly criteria: affordable homes, quality schools, access to health care, green space, low crime rate and financial stability.

## **Elmhurst Announces New Public Works Director**

The City of Elmhurst welcomes Howard Killian as its new Director of Public Works. Mr. Killian brings to the job 27 years of experience in the public sector, including the municipalities of Hanover Park, Des Plaines, Prospect Heights, Lincolnshire, and Arlington Heights. For his work he has received two Governor's Hometown Awards and the Young Leader of the Year Award from the American Public Works Association (Chicago Chapter) in

"Howard has the background and experience to manage highprofile public projects," said City Manager James Grabowski. "This was a thorough recruitment process, and his expertise rose to the top. His hiring will be key to executing a number of upcoming capital projects."

As Elmhurst's Director of Public Works, Killian oversees engineering, water and sewer operations, city street maintenance, forestry and grounds, electrical and building maintenance, and the Central Garage. He leads a department of 89 full-time employees with an operating budget of \$55.6 million.

Killian holds a Bachelor of Science in Civil Engineering from Bradley University in Peoria, Illinois; he earned his Master of Public Administration degree from Roosevelt University in 2004 and is a registered professional engineer in Illinois. Killian succeeds interim Public Works Director Steve Weinstock.

## **Christmas Trees and Fire Safety**



Although Christmas tree fires are not common, they are likely to be serious or even deadly when they do occur. A burning tree can quickly fill a room with fire and deadly gases. If you plan to decorate with a real tree, make sure it is fresh when you buy it. The trunk should feel slightly sticky to the touch, and the needles should be green and not fall

off when touched. Following are some other recommendations:

- Before setting up the tree, cut an inch or two from the base of the trunk
- Make sure the tree is at least three feet from any heat source
- Place it in a stand that holds an adequate amount of water and add water every day
- Use lights approved by an independent testing laboratory and replace any strings with worn or broken cords, or loose bulb connections
- Never use lighted candles on or near the tree
- Turn off tree lights before leaving home or going to bed
- Get rid of the tree as soon as it begins dropping needles.

## **Premise Alert and Smart 911**

Two free programs available to Elmhurst residents provide potentially life-saving information to emergency personnel when DuComm receives a 911 call. By comparing the two, you can decide if one would be beneficial to your household.

Premise Alert gives residents a way to alert first responders to their own or a family member's special needs, medical conditions, health challenges, or physical or mental disabilities. Having this information in advance enables emergency personnel to respond more appropriately during a crisis. Information provided is entered into the DuComm database and remains confidential. The Premise Alert Program application and other forms can be found under "E-Services" at www.elmhurst.org. Copies are also available at the administration office on the second floor at City Hall.

Smart 911 enables residents to build an online safety profile for their home or cell phones. Vital personal and medical information is then available to emergency responders when a call is placed to 911 from anywhere in the country where Smart 911 is in use. Information may include children's photos, home addresses of mobile phone callers, medical conditions, disabilities, and other information. Smart 911 delivers this information to the dispatcher's work station automatically when a 911 call is received.

The information provided is completely confidential and is used only if a participant calls 911. You can register for this free service at www.Smart911.com.

## **City of Elmhurst Applies for Disaster Relief Funding**

The City of Elmhurst has submitted a request for disaster relief funds to DuPage County for inclusion in the County's Disaster Recovery Action Plan for five proposed public stormwater improvement projects.

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) announced in June 2014 that DuPage County will receive an additional \$18.9 million in disaster relief funds related to the flood event that occurred in April 2013. This funding is in addition to the \$7 million HUD previously approved for the county related to the same flood event.

City staff previously contacted the County as disaster relief funds were made available,

but Elmhurst-specific projects could not be submitted due to HUD grant income thresholds. As a result of recent application modifications made to the Community Development Block

Grant (CDBG), the City of Elmhurst may be eligible for this grant funding. These projects, which previously failed to qualify, are being submitted as municipal needs.

The five projects being submitted are Golden Meadows Park Stormwater Improvement Project, Madison Early Childhood Center Stormwater Improvement Project, Bryan Middle School Stormwater Improvement Project, York Commons Stormwater Improvement Project, and the Elmhurst Chicago Stone Quarry Stormwater Improvement Project.

"City staff will aggressively pursue grant opportunities," City Manager Jim Grabowski said. "The County's grant program provides

another possible outlet as we look to fund stormwater improvement projects."





# **Elmhurst Police Department Wins Municipal Innovation Award**

The Elmhurst Police Department's new Neighborhood Roll Call program was recently awarded the DuPage Mayors and Managers Conference's "Best Innovation" award.

The Neighborhood Roll Call program, launched in the spring, has been a huge success, bringing police officers and residents together in local neighborhood settings. Neighborhood Roll Calls are held two to three times a week at various locations. The briefings increase police visibility and transparency as officers

discuss emerging trends and recent service calls, and answer residents' questions in a non-enforcement environment.

"The roll calls have had a huge positive response, building greater partnerships between the police and the community," said Elmhurst Police Chief Michael Ruth. "We've reached about 800 residents in person. Having the officers

interacting with our residents in their neighborhood and in front of their homes has been very well received and new partnerships and friendships have developed. This type of interactive partnership is great for our department and the community."

## **Snow Removal**

Severe winter storms often require a full-scale snow removal fleet of 30 or more vehicles operating around the clock to clear city streets and keep them open for motorists. Snow is typically removed from the center to the curb in a series of four passes. Main roads are cleared first, followed by neighborhood streets and other less-traveled roadways. Since it is not possible to complete the operation without pushing some snow onto driveway approaches, please wait until city crews have completed their work before clearing your driveway approach. Be careful not to blow or shovel snow onto the street when clearing your property. In order to keep City Centre traffic moving, windrows may be created in the center of the street and then removed during the nighttime hours when there are fewer vehicles to impede the process. Residents can help by clearing snow from fire hydrants to enable firefighters to locate them quickly in a fire emergency. Please do not park on city streets for eight hours following a snowfall of two inches or more.

#### "Let Children Be Children: Lewis Wickes Hine's Crusade Against Child Labor'

A telling look at the industrialization of America. this exhibition reveals the circumstances that poor working children endured until legislation against child labor prevailed as late as 1938. Lewis Wickes Hine (American, 1874-1940) was a sociologist who was hired by the National Child Labor Committee (NCLC) in 1906 to document the harsh conditions in which children worked. Hine spent ten years photographing in the canneries, coal mines, cotton mills, farms, and sweatshops common during the early 20th century. Through the use of photography, Hine and the NCLC endeavored to gain the attention of the government and arouse public sentiment against U.S. child labor practices.

In cooperation with the University of Illinois at Chicago (UIC), Elmhurst Art Museum presents the first museum exhibition of Richard Koppe's inventive work in more than forty years. Including 70 rarely seen paintings, prints and drawings, the exhibition highlights Koppe's signature canvases from the mid-20th century - from his earlier compositions of stylized fish and birds to his distinctive versions of abstract expressionism and hard-edge abstraction. This exhibition is largely drawn from UIC's Campus Collection, to which Koppe's estate donated nearly one thousand of his works shortly after his death. Koppe's modernist practice and legacy are of particular interest to EAM as we continue to explore art, architecture and design of the mid-20th century.

### Hands on the Wheel and Eyes on the Road

The Illinois law banning the use of hand-held mobile phones to talk or text while driving took effect almost a year ago. Motorists can talk and drive only if they use hands-free devices. Violators face fines starting at \$75 and repeat offenders risk having their driver's license suspended. **Winter Weather Reminders** 



Old Man Winter, with his snow, ice, and cold, creates challenges and hazards for motorists, residents, pedestrians, and city workers. The following tips can help make the winter season safer and more convenient for everyone.

### **Heating Season Safety**

The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) warns that December, January, and February are the peak months for home heating fires. The main cause of home heating fires is placing things that can burn — including upholstery, curtains, Christmas trees, or clothing — too close to heating equipment. Keep flammable things at least three feet away from heating equipment, such as fireplaces, furnaces, wood stoves, and space heaters. Stationary or portable space heaters are responsible for an estimated three out of four deaths occurring in home heating fires. You can keep your home safer by turning off space heaters before leaving the room or

Mulliner, Patrick Wagner retiring for the night. Install sturdy screens on fireplaces to keep sparks from flying into the room and burn only dry, seasoned wood. Allow ashes to cool before disposing of them in a metal container that is kept a safe distance from your home. Install smoke alarms and test them at least monthly. Stay warm and stay safe this winter by heating your home safely.

### **Frozen Pipes**

Once the temperature starts dropping outside, you should take measures inside to keep your pipes from freezing. Although some methods may go against your instinct to conserve water and heat, the extra expense may prevent a hefty repair bill. The pipes most likely to freeze are those on outside walls or where the water service enters the home through the foundation. These steps will help prevent the problem.

#### Preventing Frozen Pipes

- If there are water supply lines in your garage, keep the outside door closed as much as possible.
- If you plan to travel during cold weather, set your thermometer no lower than 55° F.
- If you have kitchen or bathroom plumbing against exterior walls, open cabinet doors to allow warmer air to circulate around the pipes.
- If severe cold is forecast, let cold water drip from all faucets served by exposed pipes. Even a trickle of water helps prevent pipes from freezing.
- For a long-term solution, add insulation to your attic, basement, or crawl space to help maintain higher temperatures in those areas.

#### Thawing Frozen Pipes

If you turn on the water and get only a trickle, it is likely that your pipes are frozen. Keep the faucet open to help melt the ice in the pipe and get the water flowing again.

Apply heat to the frozen pipe by wrapping it in an electric heat pad or towel soaked in hot water, or by applying

warm air using a hair dryer or a portable space heater. Continue to apply heat until full water pressure is restored. Never use any device with an open flame, such as a blowtorch, charcoal stove, or propane or kerosene heater.

Check all other faucets in your home. If one pipe freezes, others may also be frozen. If you are unable to locate or access the frozen area, or if you are unable to thaw the pipes using these steps, call a licensed plumber.



## **Refuse and Recycling Reminders**

### **Deep Frying a Turkey?**

What NOT to Do with the Oil
If you plan to deep fry a turkey this holiday season, it's important to know what NOT to do with the oil after Thanksgiving dinner.



First — never pour oil or grease into a sink or toilet.

Greasy substances, such as vegetable oil, lard, butter, margarine, or shortening, have been found to be one of the main culprits in blocking sewer pipes and causing backups. Grease clings to the inside of sewer pipes and, over time, will build up and block the pipe. Garbage disposals do not prevent grease from building up in your pipes. Greasy substances should be collected in a disposable container and discarded with your regular refuse.

Second — never pour oil or grease into a storm drain.

Many people erroneously believe that storm drains are connected to the sanitary sewer system and that storm water is treated at sewage treatment plants. This is not true – storm water is not treated. Everything that goes into storm drains, including cooking oil, motor oil, grease, chemicals, pesticides, household cleaners, and solvents, is transported by water into creeks, streams, and lakes where it poses a serious risk to birds, fish, and other aquatic life. You can help keep our waterways pollution-free by properly disposing of polluting substances.

### **Christmas Tree and Holiday Light Disposal**

Christmas trees will be picked up without a refuse sticker on your regular refuse collection day during the first and second weeks in January. After that, a sticker will be required. Trees may not be placed in plastic bags, and all ornaments, lights, tinsel and nails must be removed. Boxes can be recycled if they measure no more than three feet by three feet, have been flattened, and then bagged or bundled. Gift wrap, packing peanuts, garlands, and wreaths may be included with regular refuse.

The City of Elmhurst and Elmhurst Park District are partnering with SCARCE (School & Community Assistance for Recycling & Composting Education) and Elgin Recycling for the fifth annual holiday lights recycling program. Acceptable items include Italian mini-lights, traditional lights, extension cords, rope lights, and LED lights in both working and non-working condition.
