

City Moves Forward on Several Stormwater Projects

he City of Elmhurst has moved forward on several area stormwater projects designed to reduce flooding. City staff recently held open house meetings with residents concerning the Walnut/Myrtle/Evergreen and the Webster Avenue stormwater projects. Work is expected to begin this fall on both of these projects.

Two additional stormwater projects, Pine/Avon and Crescent/Cambridge, which will utilize Elmhurst Park District land, are in the preliminary design phase, with surveying and geotechnical work completed. Discussions continue with both the park district and school In total, these projects

Survey and design work is also underway on the York/I-290 detention improvements, which will provide additional stormwater storage in this portion of the City.

In total, these projects will create over 55 acre-feet of stormwater detention and help reduce flooding for over 135 homes. Information on all of these and other projects can be found on the City's website at www.elmhurst.org.

Explore Elmhurst Express Free Trolley Service

he City's newly introduced free trolley service, the Explore Elmhurst Express, was officially launched on July 24. The evening of the launch, the trolley put in an appearance at the Elmhurst Cycling Classic where Elmhurst Mayor Steve Morley introduced the Explore Elmhurst Express to the community.

Connecting downtown Elmhurst City Centre with both the Spring Road and York and Vallette business districts in a 30-minute loop, the trolley operates Fridays (6 to 11 p.m.), Saturdays (12 noon to 11:30 p.m.) and Sundays (12 noon to 5 p.m.) and will run through September 13.



Trolley riders are encouraged to walk or bike to the stops and convenient parking is located near most stops. Detailed brochures with a trolley map can be found in weatherproof boxes at each trolley stop.

The new service is a pilot program, which was initiated to connect residents and visitors with shopping, dining and cultural opportunities while offering a "green" alternative to driving.

Fire Prevention Week, October 4-10

"Hear the Beep Where You Sleep: Every Bedroom Needs a Working Smoke Alarm"

According to National Fire Protection Association statistics, half of all U.S. home fire deaths occur at night between the hours of 11 p.m. and 7 a.m., when people are most likely to be sleeping. Having a working smoke alarm in the home cuts the risk of dying in a fire in half. These facts underscore the importance of having working smoke alarms in all bedrooms.

On October 4, residents are invited to an Open House at Elmhurst Fire Station #2, located at 601 S. York Road. Activities will include station tours, the Fire Safety House, the Nicor booth, the AirMed1 helicopter, a fashion show and the Safety Trailer.

Remember, smoke alarms save lives:

- Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside every sleeping area, and on every level of your home, including the basement. Larger homes need more smoke alarms. Mount alarms on the ceiling or high on the wall.
- Test smoke alarms monthly by pressing the test button. Replace batteries regularly.
- Replace smoke alarms every 10 years. Consider interconnecting them so that when one alarm sounds, they all sound.
- When a smoke alarm sounds, get outside and stay outside.

Kids are Back in School

Everyone is reminded to help keep our children safe by driving with care through our neighborhoods, especially when kids head back to school. Their safety should be a top priority for every motorist using city streets near our schools. Children who do not ride a bus are encouraged to walk or bike in groups, or with parents, to alleviate congestion around schools. Parents who drive their children are encouraged to follow established school pick-up and drop-off plans. Residents are also reminded that even hands-free cell phone use is prohibited in school zones.

Learn Not to Burn

The "Learn Not to Burn" program is offered to elementary school children by the Elmhurst Fire Department to teach them how to react appropriately in a fire situation. Lifesaving skills taught include how to call 9-1-1; what to do if a smoke alarm sounds: how to crawl low in a fire; and how to stop, drop, cover, and roll. Parents are encouraged to practice these skills at home with children.

On June 15, a severe storm affecting much of the Chicago area brought approximately five inches of rain to Elmhurst. The heaviest period of rainfall occurred between 4:45 and 5:15 p.m., when more than an inch is estimated to have fallen in 30 minutes.

In preparation for the storm, public works crews checked and cleaned storm drain inlets to be sure they were free of debris, while a supply of sandbags was provided for community use at the Elmhurst public works garage. Sandbags, sand, shovels and extra bags are available for residents at the PW garage at 985 S. Riverside Drive.

Before the storm, City service crews were put on alert and all available City staff, including public works, police and fire crews, were called in to respond to numerous calls for service due to flooding, downed power lines and stranded motorists. Street and overland flooding occurred in many areas of Elmhurst, while approximately 1,700 residents lost power.

Throughout the storm and into the next day the City maintained contact with DuPage County stormwater officials concerning water levels and the diversion of Salt Creek water to the quarry facility located at West and First Street in Elmhurst.

By 9:30 p.m. on June 15, floodwaters in Elmhurst had receded significantly. ComEd reported all power was restored by 10 p.m. Most Elmhurst streets were reopened by 11 p.m.

City street crews remained on duty overnight to begin clean-up and to monitor conditions and open streets where possible. As designed, the Palmer Drive underpass took on water during the storm, was pumped out and was re-opened the morning of June 16.

During the storm, the City provided flood-related updates via special e-blasts and on the City's website and Facebook pages. Residents were permitted to dispose of flood-damaged property at no additional cost without refuse stickers.

Southwest Wet-Weather Control Facility

The final design phase is now complete for the Southwest Elmhurst Wet-Weather Control Facility (WWCF), a major improvement to the City's wastewater collection system. Construction began in early summer of this year and anticipated completion is winter 2016.

The WWCF includes several improvements that will impact approximately 2,300 homes in southwest Elmhurst, particularly those in the Saylor and Jackson Lift Station service area, generally bordered by York Road, Hillside Avenue and Madison and Van Buren Streets. The most significant improvements will be upgrades to the Saylor and Jackson Lift Station, including an increased wet well volume and pump upgrades estimated to triple the total station output when operating at maximum capacity. To accommodate the additional pumping capacity, an 18-inch diameter wet-weather force main and a two-million-gallon (MG) storage tank at the Elmhurst Water Reclamation Facility (WRF) will be part of the project.

Improvements also include replacement of the existing 10-inch force main (which has been completed from Jackson St. to McKinley on Saylor Ave.) and a deeper, upsized tributary sewer along Jackson St. to provide additional protection from sewer backups to all homes within the lift station service area. The addition of the storage tank will also enable the station's current discharge location at Saylor and McKinley to be suspended during high-flow conditions, thus reducing the risk of sewer backups to all homes in this vicinity and upstream.

Demonstration Environmental Project: Salt Creek Trail

The City of Elmhurst has completed the Salt Creek (Greenway) Trail Pumping Stations Water Quality and Landscape Enhancements project involving improvements at four pumping stations: Harrison, Jackson, Berkley, Adams and McKinley.

The goal of this project is to model the proper use of erosion and sedimentation control techniques using best management practices and educational displays. This work will help to manage sedimentation/siltation, mineral and nutrient mitigation, aid in stormwater detention, promote indigenous plant growth and model sustainable practices for the community of Elmhurst. These improvements can be replicated at individual homeowner's properties within our community to help improve water quality and reduce run-off.

Along the Greenway, you will see a green roof system, porous (permeable)

pavers, rain gardens and exterior native plantings/perennials at the four demonstration sites along Salt Creek on the trail. Copies of these educational panels can be viewed on the City website. This project was undertaken in connection with the settlement of an enforcement action taken by the Illinois Attorney General and the Illinois EPA for alleged violations of the Illinois Environmental Protection Act.

Mayor's Message

Summer included some wonderful events. June Jazz at Elmhurst College was excellent again. The Elmhurst Cycling Classic, in its third year, continues to provide an exciting sporting event to our community. Exhibits at the Elmhurst Historical Museum, Elmhurst Art Museum and Lizzadro Museum of Lapidary Art all drew strong attendance. I saw block parties throughout the city where neighbors enjoyed each other's company in

a relaxed 'street closed' atmosphere. It was a good summer for golf, a garden walk, an architectural tour or even a trolley ride.

Throughout Elmhurst, investment and redevelopment continues in 2015. Elmhurst 255, a 192-unit, luxury apartment complex has started its construction on York Street. Wilder Crossing, a condominium complex, is moving forward on Addison Avenue. The new Addison Avenue parking deck is well on its way and we should be parking in it by the end of this year. Across the street from the deck, a new Fitness Formula Club will take shape next year. The former Plass building will come down soon and be replaced with high-end condominiums and retail. Outside of City Centre, the former Waverton Hotel site is taking on its new form as a location for an LA Fitness, Starbucks and another retail tenant. There are other residential developments at the former Elmhurst Memorial Hospital site, York and Seminole and Evergreen and First Street just to name three. This emerging residential density fits right into our plans for the area and should help drive retail, restaurant and entertainment projects going forward and expand our tax base.

The City of Elmhurst has implemented the CodeRED system, a high-speed emergency notification service provided by Emergency Communications Network. The CodeRED system will serve as the backbone of the city's emergency planning and communications outreach, allowing the city to communicate with residents and city personnel by sending telephone calls, text messages, emails, social media and CodeRed Mobile Alert app messages in an effort to effectively inform residents of emergencies to protect life and property. We have an initial database of residential and business telephone numbers; however, all residents living within Elmhurst are encouraged to visit Elmhurst.org and click on the CodeRED logo on the home page to enroll additional contact information, including cell phone numbers, text and email addresses.


We continue to progress on our ongoing stormwater issues, passing a property prioritization buyout plan and continue to work with Elmhurst School District 205 and the Elmhurst Park District on joint utilization of properties for stormwater retention in large rain events. We have started the 2016 city budgeting process which includes the challenge of being in a state without a budget and therefore an uncertain revenue projection picture. We anticipate new O'Hare runways, western airport access and highway construction in Elmhurst's short-range future. Through all of this, we have established overall strong city finances and received a municipal bond rating of AAA, the highest you can secure.

We are pleased with the positive response to the Explore Elmhurst Express trolley, which will run through September 13. Ridership has exceeded expectation and continues to increase every weekend and the trolley will be an item for the 2016 budget discussion.

I am looking forward to the fall season with Homecoming, Bootiful Saturday and the Turkey Trot, to name a few events around the city.

Refuse/Recycling Collection Reminders

Specific regulations apply to the disposal of refuse and recycling in Elmhurst.

- Refuse and recycling should not be placed on the parkway more than 24 hours before your collection day. Recycling bins must be at the curb by 6 a.m. on your collection day to ensure they will be picked up.
- Containers should be removed from the parkway within 12 hours after your pickup day.
- Refuse and recycling should be placed in containers in such a way that the contents can't be scattered by animals or strewn about.
- Electronics of any kind should never be placed out for collection.

No Parking Vehicles across Sidewalks

Residents are reminded that Elmhurst Municipal Code prohibits the parking of vehicles across sidewalks.

Holiday Reminders

On Monday, September 7, City Hall will be closed in observance of Labor Day. The City Council meeting will be held on Tuesday, September 8. Refuse collection for all residents will be delayed by one day during the Labor Day week.

Trick or Treat Hours

Official hours for trick-or-treating in Elmhurst are 3:30-7:30 p.m. on Saturday, October 31. Young children should always be accompanied by an adult and older kids should be warned to approach only well-lit homes, never enter a home to receive a treat,



avoid dark or deserted-looking areas and be aware of vehicular traffic. Parents should inspect children's treats at home.

"No Wake" on Flooded Streets

Residents are asked to help prevent and/or reduce additional damage by not driving on flooded streets following heavy rainfall events that cause flooding. Vehicles can create waves that push water onto areas that might otherwise have stayed dry.

Free Curbside Leaf Collection

A free leaf collection for residents who live within city limits will take place on November 4, 5 & 6, and again on December 2, 3 & 4, on your regular collection day. Leaves must be kept separated from other



yard waste and placed at the curb in clearly marked cans, cardboard boxes, or Kraft paper bags. Cans and boxes will be left on the parkway following collection. Although leaves may be placed in marked cans, please be aware that a combination of precipitation and low temperatures may cause the contents to freeze. Frozen cans cannot be emptied by our service provider.

No Leaves or Grass Clippings in the Street

During periods of heavy rainfall, blocked inlets often contribute to street flooding. This problem is exacerbated during the autumn months when storms are likely and trees are shedding their leaves. City ordinances prohibit raking leaves, grass, or other debris into the street where they can impede the flow of water and/or create hazardous driving conditions. You can help alleviate this problem by keeping storm drain inlets in your neighborhood free of leaves and debris.

Pets Must be Leashed on Public Property

The Elmhurst Police Department would like to remind pet owners that dogs and cats must be restrained at all times on public property and the private property of others. Dogs and cats on the owner's private property must be restrained in such a way that they do not disturb people using public property. Electric or "invisible" fences are not considered an enclosure, confinement or restraint. Dogs on public property must be under the control of the owner or a responsible party by means of a leash that is no more than six feet in length.

Currently there are no off-leash dog parks in Elmhurst and the Police Department may enforce these ordinances at Elmhurst Park District locations. Keeping pets restrained at all times helps to ensure their safety, as well as the safety of others.

Police Department Drug Take Back Day, Saturday, September 26

Residents are reminded that the City of Elmhurst offers an easy, secure and safe way to dispose of prescription drugs. A prescription pill and medication drop box is housed in the lobby of the Elmhurst Police Department, 125 E. First Street.

Residents can also drop off unwanted medications for the City's next DEA Drug Take Back Day on Saturday, September 26. On that day, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., City of Elmhurst police officers will be accepting unwanted prescription medications in the parking lot of the Elmhurst Police Station, 121 E. First Street.

The following items are accepted: prescription and over-thecounter medications, pet medications, samples, vitamins, liquids and creams. Items not accepted include needles, IV bags, biohazardous waste, thermometers and hydrogen peroxide.

If at all possible, medications should be left in their original containers. Place any loose medications into sealed plastic bags. Ensure any liquid medication is enclosed in secure containers and placed in a plastic bag prior to deposit. Drop them off on September 26 or place them in the collection box located inside the lobby of the Elmhurst Police Station, available 24/7.

It's important to keep unwanted, expired or unused medications out of the hands of individuals who might otherwise abuse them. Many abusers, a high percentage of whom are teens, report having obtained these controlled substances from the homes of family and friends. An added benefit of this service is the removal of these substances from the water supply. When improperly disposed of in the toilet or other outlets, synthetic chemicals can bypass the normal water-treatment process and leak into our environment and groundwater supplies.

EHM Brews Up A Refreshing New Exhibit

Beer Chicago opens Sept. 18-Feb. 14

Beer seems to be absolutely everywhere these days. From craft breweries popping up in Chicago and its suburbs, to home brewers working in their basements, Chicagoans seem to have an unquenchable thirst for beer.



Beer has always been a part of Chicago's history. German immigrants established Chicago's first brewery in 1833, serving its beer to the 200 residents drinking in the city's three taverns. Beer has been a component of

Chicago's colorful fabric ever since and it continues today with the emergence of a vibrant craft beer industry.

The Elmhurst Historical Museum is brewing up an exciting new exhibit to share Chicago's beer, brewery and tavern history. "Beer Chicago: A Refreshing History" runs September 19, 2015, through February 14, 2016, and taps into the history of Chicago and its connections to beer. The museum is partnering with Liz Garibay, a Chicago beer and tavern historian and author, who has led many a tour throughout the city for the Chicago History Museum. Exhibit highlights include an interactive "bar" featuring a bartender who will test visitors' knowledge of Chicago beer history, a science of beer-making hands-on activity station, a feature on Elmhurst's own beer brewing and tavern history, and much more. The exhibit is scheduled to travel throughout the region in the coming years as part of the Museum's touring exhibit program.

To complement the exhibit, the Elmhurst Historical Museum is planning a number of programs, including Thirsty Thursday Beer Talks & Tastings, Brewery Tours, a September 19 Craft Beer Fest, and a Western 'Burbs Pub Crawl on October 24. The Museum is also creating a Chicagoland Craft Brew Map, which will be available to visitors at the gift shop. Oily Rags Can Ignite Spontaneously

A variety of factors can cause spontaneous combustion, but the most common cause is improperly disposed of oil and stain-

soaked rags. Examples of these products are oil-based paints and stains, teak and linseed oils, varnishes and polyurethane, paint thinners and the like.

Spontaneous combustion of oily rags occurs when a rag or cloth is slowly heated to its ignition point through oxidation. A substance will begin to release heat as it oxidizes. If this heat has no way to escape, the temperature will raise to a level high enough to ignite the oil and ignite the rag or cloth. The fire from this can spread quickly to other combustibles and cause great damage to your home or property.

Prevention of spontaneous combustion fires begins with good housekeeping. A clean work area can prevent a fire from spreading and getting bigger by not allowing the fire fuel to burn. Also, understanding the potential for self-heating of rags soiled with oils, such as linseed oil and turpentine, is a key step in eliminating these preventable fires.

To properly and safely dispose of oily rags:

- Use a container with a tight fitting lid. A metal can is preferable but a plastic can or zip lock bag can work if nothing else is available.
- Place soiled and used rags inside and then fill the rest of the way with water, seal the top and do not open it. This will prevent the oils from oxidizing, and thus keeping the rags from heating up and igniting.
- Soiled and used oily rags should be disposed of at a hazardous waste collection event. The City of Naperville hosts a hazardous waste collection site at 156 Fort Hill Drive, Naperville, Saturdays and Sundays, from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. year-round.
