


As Summer Heats Up, So Do Local Improvement Projects!

2019 Contract Paving Program: Work is now officially underway on the 2019 Contract Paving Program. This annual project involves roadway resurfacing throughout the City. The work generally consists of the grinding and bituminous overlay of just under 7 miles of roadway. Included in this year's program will be the installation of a new storm sewer on Virginia Lane in northeast Elmhurst. Work will start from north towards the south and is scheduled to be complete in September.

2019 Watermain Improvements Project: The 2019 Watermain Improvements Project will begin in June. This annual project will involve the replacement and upsizing of 1.6 miles of watermain. This year's program will affect Fremont Avenue (east of York Street), Melrose Avenue (south of North Avenue), and the streets around Edison School and Sandburg Middle School (Huntington Lane, Fair Avenue, and St. Charles Road). The project will be complete in the fall.



IDOT/Tollway Construction Update: Both IDOT and the Illinois Tollway will be commencing major roadway projects this summer that will affect Elmhurst. IDOT will be responsible for the North Avenue pavement resurfacing, Emroy Avenue Bridge over I-290 deck replacement, Brush Hill Road bridge deck replacement and the St. Charles Road Bridge over Salt Creek deck replacement. Additionally the Illinois Tollway has already began initial work on the new I-294 southbound exit ramp to County Line Road and later this year will begin improvements to the County Line Road/North Avenue interchange. Residents should anticipate using alternative routes during these local improvement projects.

Economic Development Update The Mayor and City Council continue to foster economic growth in Elmhurst and as a result reinvestment is happening throughout the community in the retail/restaurant, office, and industrial sectors. To protect and enhance these investments in economic activity, staff, along with the Economic Development Commission, works diligently to both attract new businesses and assist existing businesses with expansion and relocation efforts. Support is also provided to the local economy through overall enhancements to the commercial corridors such as the new pedestrian crosswalks within the City Centre and continued addition of new sidewalks along the North York Corridor, as well as maintaining measured growth of daytime and evening density. For example, Elmhurst based Greenleaf Foods (180 W. Park) has grown their office from 3 to 40 persons in the last year.



Since the start of 2019, Elmhurst has welcomed over 50 new businesses like Emanuele Tuxedo (257 N York), Fadez Chicago (350 N York), Imperial Bag & Paper Co. (750 N. Industrial), and Journey Dental (360 W. Butterfield). In addition to welcoming these new businesses, 2019 has seen a lot of reinvestment from long time businesses such as the York Classic Cinemas (150 N. York) which introduced heated, lounger seats in several of its theaters, and is currently revamping the concessions counter. McMaster-Carr (600 N. County Line) is another growing enterprise, adding a new data center and parking structure to their facility with plans to continue expansion in the future.

Neighborhood Roll Call The Elmhurst Police Department's Neighborhood Roll Call program is returning to a neighborhood near you this summer. This program offers residents the opportunity to meet their local officers in an informal, nonenforcement setting. Occurring on neighborhood corners, officers run



through their roll call briefings as they change shifts. Residents are invited to listen in and get up to speed on recent issues, as well as ask any questions they might have. The program has been very well-received by Elmhurst residents, building greater partnerships between the police and the community. The start of the 2019 roll call season is underway. Curfew Hours Parents and teens are reminded that young people under the age of 18 must abide by City curfew regulations all year. The Elmhurst curfew is enforced from 11pm until 6am Sunday through Thursday, and from midnight to 6am on Friday and

Saturday. Anyone under the age of 18 in a public area after curfew must be accompanied by a parent, legal guardian, or another responsible companion at least 21 years of age who has been approved by the teen's parent or legal guardian the only exception being if they are engaged by a business or occupation approved by the state.


Be Alarmed Program "Be Alarmed!"

is a fire safety education and smoke alarm installation program administered cooperatively between the Illinois Fire Safety Alliance (IFSA) and the Office of the Illinois State Fire Marshal (OSFM). The



program distributes fire safety education materials and 10-year concealed battery smoke alarms to fire departments in the State of Illinois. The fire departments then deliver the education and install smoke alarms in at-risk homes within their communities. Both the educational materials and smoke alarms are provided to fire departments at no cost as a result of funding from both the IFSA and OSFM. The program was developed to educate Illinois residents on the dangers of fire in the home and how to prevent fires from occurring in the home, as well as to ensure there are working smoke alarms properly installed in homes. By providing 10-year concealed battery smoke alarms, it ensures that the power source cannot be removed from the unit and, if properly maintained, will last the life of the device.

Topics covered during the program include the fire triangle, fire classifications, hazards found in the home, escape planning and burn prevention. SCOTT'S LAW - Obey the Rules of the Road

The City of Elmhurst urges all motorists to obey all the rules of the road and stay focused when driving. Scott's Law mandates that when approaching a stationary authorized emergency vehicle, when the authorized emergency vehicle is giving a signal by



displaying alternately flashing red and blue lights or amber or yellow warning lights, a person who drives an approaching vehicle is to proceed with due caution, yield the right-of-way by making a lane change into a lane not adjacent to that of the authorized emergency vehicle. Proceed with due caution, reduce the speed of the vehicle, maintain a safe speed for road conditions, if changing lanes would be impossible or unsafe. An increase in reckless driving on residential streets has been brought to the attention of City Officials. Please SLOW DOWN and DRIVE WITH CAUTION. Safety is a priority; everything else can wait.

Maintaining your homes exterior

City code requires all surfaces of your home, (including but not limited to) doors, door and window frames, porches, trim, decks and fences be maintained in good condition. Exterior wood should be protected from the elements by paint or other protective covering or treatment. Peeling or chipping paint on any exterior wood surfaces must be removed and the surface repainted. All exterior metal surfaces must be maintained and kept free of rust or corrosion.

Address Numbers

Address numbers must be installed on the front of all buildings. Municipal code states that the address numbers shall be a minimum of 4 inches tall and $\frac{1}{2}$ inch thick, of a contrasting color, facing the street and readily visible for emergency vehicles.

Leaves/grass into streets

During periods of heavy rainfall, blocked inlets often contribute to street flooding. City ordinances prohibit raking leaves, grass clippings, or other debris into the street where they can impede the flow of water and/or create hazardous driving conditions. You can help alleviate this problem by keeping storm drain inlets in your neighborhood free of debris.

Call J.U.L.I.E. before you dig

If you are planning any home improvement projects that involve digging, remember to call J.U.L.I.E. (811 from a cell phone or 800-892-0123) before beginning work. J.U.L.I.E. will notify member utility companies to send locators to mark their underground utilities with paint and/or flags. Once you know the approximate location of utility lines, you can dig

safely.

Garbage and Recycle Containers

On scheduled pickup days, all garbage and recycle containers are to be placed on the City's parkways. Containers placed in the street risk not being picked up. Containers must be at least three feet apart and three feet from any permanent objects such as fire hydrants and streetlights. **Under no circumstances should electronics be left on the curbside**.

Keep FOG Out of Our Sewers

Buildup of Fats, Oils & Grease (FOG) in the sewer system's pipes is the leading cause of sanitary sewer overflows. FOG is composed of animal and vegetable fats and oils used to prepare food. FOG enters into the City's sanitary sewer system through commercial and residential plumbing. FOG is commonly improperly discarded through the kitchen sink, garbage disposal, and toilets. FOG, food scraps, and used cooking oils should be thrown in the trash, not down the drain. Please keep FOG out of our sewers. No FOG, No CLOG. Keep it flowing!

Stormwater project update

The City continues to focus on Stormwater Management Projects aimed to mitigate overland flooding. New underground storm sewer piping is now complete as part of the Southwest Elmhurst Stormwater Mitigation Project (SESMP) - Phase I. This project will provide flood reduction benefits for the neighborhood along Jackson Street between Mitchell and Bryan. During a severe rain event, flood water will be directed through these new storm sewers to a new detention basin south of Butterfield Road. Miscellaneous work related to the project, including landscape restoration, will continue throughout the summer.

Additionally the Southwest Elmhurst Stormwater Mitigation Project (SESMP) - Phase II, located adjacent to Jackson Middle School, is complete. This new detention basin will also take flood waters during extreme rain events. Collectively, these two significant projects will assist 121 homeowners in the southwest side of Elmhurst; which has been the largest area affected by overland flooding over the last decade. The SESMP-Phase I project has a 19.6 acre-foot detention basin located on City-owned property south of Messiah Lutheran Church along Butterfield Road and the SESMP-Phase II (next to Jackson School and Christ United Church) has a 11.8 ac-ft detention basin.

In total the City has completed 11 projects since 2015. Including these 2 current projects, the City will have spent over \$25M in construction costs to help over 350 homes.

Census 2020

A permit to solicit door-to-door is required for any and all persons and organizations that are seeking to obtain orders, prospective customers, subscriptions, gifts or contributions. If a "No Solicitor Invited" notice is displayed, the solicitor must immediately leave the premises. Residents can request a "No Solicitors Invited" decal from the City Clerk. Residents are encouraged to ask solicitors for their City issued identification card with their names and information.

If you have any concerns regarding any person soliciting in your neighborhood, please call 9-1-1. Let them know your location and that there is a solicitor in the vicinity who may be in violation of the City's Municipal Code. By reporting the violation immediately, an officer can respond when the solicitor is in the area.

Mosquito Control

Each year, the City helps control the spread of mosquito-borne illnesses by reducing the mosquito population through operations that include surveillance, monitoring, and spraying. Mosquito spraying operations within the Elmhurst Community are performed by Clarke Mosquito Control Company and are



performed using environmentally sensitive agents. Residents can help reduce the potential for mosquito borne illnesses by eliminating standing water where mosquitoes breed and by using a DEET insect repellent when outdoors. This is especially true during dawn, dusk, and early evening hours. For more information or to be notified of upcoming spraying events, call Clarke directly at 800-942-2555.



Sign Up for WaterSmart

Residents are able to actively manage their water usage by viewing their hourly consumption from the convenience of their mobile device through the WaterSmart program.

WaterSmart provides a secure, web-based portal with your hourly and historical water usage, as well as leak notices. You can also

set water-use alerts, based on your preferences, at any time. This service is part of our commitment to provide you with the best tools to manage your water use and bill.

Vehicle Sticker Reminder

May 1st was the deadline to display the new City of Elmhurst vehicle sticker and affix it to the inside lower right corner of the windshield on any vehicle registered or principally housed in Elmhurst. Failure to comply may result in a \$25 fine in May and \$50 thereafter.
