

The legislative responsibilities and policy setting authority of the City of Elmhurst rests in the City Council which consists of 14 aldermen representing the 7 wards of the City of Elmhurst. The Council, through its power to pass ordinances; approve the budget; levy taxes; award contracts; appoint certain city officers, committees and commissions, and directs the course of the City government.

When do aldermen meet?

City Council Members meet as a whole at the Regular City Council meetings held at 7:30 pm on the first and third Mondays of each month.

Council members assemble in groups of 3-4 at Committee meetings held at 7:00 pm on the second and fourth Mondays of each month. Agenda topics are assigned to one the following four City Council Committees: Public Works and Buildings (PWB), Public Affairs and Safety (PAS), Finance, Council Affairs, and Administration Services (FCAAS), and Development, Planning, and Zoning (DPZ).

Agenda topics can be found on elmhurst.org under "BoardDocs". If you are interested in providing feedback on a specific agenda topic, it is highly recommended that you attend a Committee Meeting. Committees discuss agenda topics at great lengths. After the Committee has gathered enough information to provide a recommendation, the Committee sends a report to the entire City Council for their vote.

Please check the City's website for meeting dates and times. The City of Elmhurst reserves the right to adjust the meeting date/ time within 48 hours of the specified meeting date.

2020 Voting Information The office of the City Clerk announces that City Hall will be an Early Voting site for the November 3, 2020 General Election. DuPage County residents can visit the Council Chambers in City Hall beginning October 19, 2020 through October 31, 2020 for Early Voting. The hours are Monday - Friday 8:30 am - 7:30 pm and Saturdays 9 am - 5 pm. For additional locations and extended hours, please visit DuPage County Election Website or call DuPage Election Commission at 630-407-5600.

How do I register to vote? Voter registration can be completed online and in person at City Hall with a valid driver's license until 28 days prior to an election. An extended grace period is in place only if you go to the DuPage County Election Commission (421 N. County Farm Road), all early voting locations and the day of the election (must vote immediately after). All registered voters have the option to vote by mail, early vote, or vote in person on the day of the election at their designated polling location.

Where do I find my polling place? Voter information specific to your address including but not limited to polling places, precinct number, representatives and aldermen is located at https://www.dupageco.org/VoterLookup, Just search by address and place your information in the box. * Note this website is case sensitive, do not include the directional in your address.

Where in Elmhurst can I sign up for voting by mail? Mail in ballot request forms are available in the Clerk's office at Elmhurst City Hall or online. To request a mail in ballot online visit https://www.dupageco.org/Election/VoteByMail.

The election commission will now have vote by mail boxes located at City Hall during Early Voting Oct. 19-31.

Can mail in ballots be tracked? Vote by mail ballots can be tracked online at https://dupage.ballottrax.net/voter.

Do you have interest in being an elected official? Local elections are coming up on April 4, 2021. You must be a resident in the specific area designated to that elected position and registered to vote for one full year. The City Clerk's Office will be distributing election packets to interested parties starting Friday, September 4th. Visit elmhurst.org for more information.

PLEASE DO YOUR PART TO HELP KEEP ELMHURST OPEN BY SLOWING THE SPREAD OF COVID-19:

- Wear a face mask when social distancing cannot be maintained and where required, specifically in public places.
- A minimum of 6-ft of social distancing is required from any individual who does not reside in your home.
- Wash your hands often with soap and warm water for at least 20 seconds, especially after going to the bathroom, before eating, and after blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing.
- Clean and sanitize commonly used surfaces.

Impact Your Community:

Complete Your 2020 Census It's not too late to complete your 2020 Census. The results of the 2020 Census will help determine how hundreds of billions of dollars in federal funding flow into communities every year for the next decade. School lunches, housing assistance for older adults, transportation



planning, support for first responders and families in need; these are only a few examples of how Census funding shapes different aspects of the Elmhurst community every day. The 2020 Census is happening now. You can self-respond to the Census online, by phone, or by mail through September 30, 2020.

The 2020 Census asks a few simple questions about you and everyone who was living with you on April 1, 2020. If you are responding for your home, count everyone who was living and sleeping there most of the time as of April 1, 2020. This includes young children, foster children, roommates, and any family members or friends who are living with you, even temporarily.

Right now, Census takers are actively visiting households (single family, apartments, condos, townhomes) that have not yet self-responded to the 2020 Census. Census takers will wear masks and follow local public health guidelines when they visit your home. All census takers complete a virtual COVID-19 training on social distancing and other health and safety protocols before beginning their work in communities. If someone visits your home this year to collect information for the 2020 Census, check to make sure they have a valid ID badge with their photograph, a U.S. Department of Commerce watermark, and an expiration date. If you still have questions about their identity, you can contact the regional census center to speak with a Census Bureau representative at (312) 579-1500. Home visits will occur between gam-9pm.

The 2020 Census belongs to us all. If you know someone who has not yet responded, please encourage them to do so today online at **2020census.gov**, over the phone, or by mail. Everyone Counts Elmhurst.

Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan - Submit your photos! The City of Elmhurst is continuously looking for ways to improve the City's sustainability efforts. The update to the City's Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan is one way to encourage healthy and safe modes of transportation while reducing automobile emissions. By making walking and biking safer and more convenient, we can encourage a healthier community and planet. Join us in celebrating walking and biking in Elmhurst by participating in the Walk, Bike, Snap Elmhurst sweepstakes!

How to enter: As Elmhurst's Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan winds down, the City invites residents to hit the streets and snap pictures of their top priorities for implementation.

To participate: Check out the Story Map or view the PDF for detailed improvements recommended for intersections and streets. Visit the site of your favorite improvement (safe walking or biking there is encouraged!). Snap and submit a photo and tell us why it matters to you. All photo submissions will be entered into a sweepstakes with five winners selected at random to win a gift card and goody bag. Select photo entries and stories may also be included in the final plan.

Background on the Plan: In August 2019, Elmhurst began an update of its Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan, with the goal of developing a roadmap for improving streets and intersections for safe walking and biking. During the summer and fall, hundreds of residents, business representatives, and local agencies participated in identifying areas in need of improvement by responding to a survey, an online map, attending the open house, and talking to the project team at community events. Although the city's Bike and Pedestrian Plan is winding down, it's not too late to learn about the recommendations and get involved!

Using feedback from the community, the City and project team developed draft recommendations, which were presented to the community for feedback in the spring and summer of 2020. The input is now being incorporated into a draft plan, which will be available for residents to review early this coming fall at **bikewalkelmhurst.com**.

If you want to provide direct feedback on the plan recommendations, you can still provide feedback on the draft recommendations by submitting a comment to the project site. Once the draft plan is complete, it will be presented to City Council for adoption.

Why did you want to become a firefighter? September 11th had a big impact on me. I was in junior high when it

occurred. I remember hearing about the attacks on my way to school. Watching the coverage of events made me realize how unique the career of a firefighter was. The sense of civic pride and camaraderie displayed in the days, weeks, and months afterwards have always stuck with me.

In your opinion what distinguishes the Elmhurst Fire Department from other fire departments? The employees of the Elmhurst Fire Department distinguish themselves by their level of dedication to their careers, and motivation to strive to provide the best service possible. Smoke detector recycling Residents can drop off old smoke detectors year round at the City Hall Lobby on weekdays from 8:30 am - 5pm.

Fall time change As you set your clocks back one hour on November 2, 2020, remember to check the operation of your smoke detectors. Install additional detectors if needed. Inspect and ready your heating system. Empty the ashes, and clean the soot from your fireplace. Check the weather stripping around doors and windows, and replace those that are worn.

9-11 Ceremony Tune in to ElmhurstTV on YouTube for our annual 9-11 ceremony where we will proudly remember those who gave their lives on that tragic day trying to



save others. This will be a virtual event posted online.

9-11 Memorial The Elmhurst Fire Department is teaming up with the City's Public Arts Commission to find an artist to create the City's 9-11 Memorial. The work will include a 13.5-foot piece of steel rail from the World Trade Center as the focal point. The entire memorial site (landscaping) will also include a timeline of the events that happened throughout that solemn day. The memorial sculpture will give the residents of Elmhurst, as well as many other visitors, a place at which to reflect on this significant day in our Country's history. It will be available for viewing year-round, and be placed in front of Elmhurst Fire Station #2 and adjacent to York Street, a main north/south thoroughfare. The purpose of the Memorial Sculpture is to ensure that the community will have an enduring source of remembrance of the events of September 11, 2001. The sculpture is slated to be complete by September 11, 2021 for the 20 year anniversary 9-11 ceremony.

Veterans Day Ceremony The City's Veterans Commission will host a virtual ceremony on Veterans Day, Monday, November 11th to honor those who have served in our Armed Services. This will be a virtual event posted online. Please visit **elmhurst.org** for details.

"The Portal" Sculpture ... Coming Soon!

The City of Elmhurst's Public Arts Commission is pleased to announce its first addition to public art in Elmhurst. After a thorough review process, the artist Nicole Beck was chosen for her dynamic proposal titled Portal, an O-shaped armature with glass that changes color under certain conditions. Scheduled to be installed late this year in the new Larch Park near downtown, the joyful steel and glass sculpture promises to draw visitors. The artist conceived Portal's 12-foot nexus of colored glass shapes as a way to reflect Elmhurst's interconnected community and a moment of sheer wonder for residents to enjoy.





Clear inlets During periods of heavy rainfall, blocked inlets often contribute to street flooding. This problem is exacerbated during the autumn months when storms are likely and trees are shedding their leaves. City ordinances prohibit raking leaves, grass, or other debris into the street where they



can impede the flow of water and/or create hazardous driving conditions. You can help alleviate this problem by keeping storm drain inlets in your neighborhood free of leaves and debris.

Garbage & Container placement On scheduled pickup days, all garbage and recycle containers must be placed on the City parkway. Containers placed in the street are at risk of not being picked up. Containers must be at least 3 feet apart from each other and 3 feet from any permanent object, such as fire hydrants and street lights.

Republic Services holiday delays

When a holiday listed below falls on a Sunday through Friday, pick-up will be delayed by one day for the remainder of that week. These holidays are:

- Memorial Day
- Fourth of July
- Thanksgiving
- Labor Day
- Christmas
- New Year's Day

The above holidays are the only holidays that the refuse pick up schedule is altered. Saturday holidays do not affect the pick up schedule.

Lock it or lose it It is imperative now more than ever that residents lock their doors for the overall safety of themselves, their neighbors, and the Elmhurst community. You can help yourself, your family and your neighbors by always locking your vehicles, house, garage, and bicycles. Immediately call 9-1-1 to report suspicious noises, people, or cars.

Can we see your house number?

It is so important that your house number is visible from the street. It could mean minutes wasted, and the difference in first responders' ability to get to you in an emergency. Clear away any tree



branches or bushes that may be hindering the view from the street. At night make sure the house numbers are illuminated in some way or reflective to make it more visible. If your house is set back from the street have the address at the beginning of your driveway to make it easier to find your location.

- CodeRED: This notification system is used to distribute emergency messages via telephone, email and text messaging to the entire City within a matter of minutes. When you see 855-969-4636 (General Notifications) or 866-419-5000 (Emergency Notifications) displayed on your caller ID, this call is from CodeRED. If you would like to hear the last message delivered to your phone, simply dial the number back. Messages will also be sent via email and text. Residents must register with their contact information to receive CodeRED notifications. A link to sign up for this service is on elmhurst.org.
- Smart 911: Smart911 allows citizens to enter information online which they would want automatically available to the 9-1-1 operator in the event 9-1-1 is called from their home or cell phones. The additional data is far more extensive than what is typically available to 9-1-1 dispatchers and will help to improve incident outcomes. Sign up at Smart911.com.

Video Sharing Program In an effort to reduce crime by identifying and apprehending individuals involved in criminal activity, the Elmhurst Police Department has implemented a Video-Sharing Partnership with the Elmhurst community. Residents and business owners with private video surveillance cameras taking footage of public areas such as streets, sidewalks, parking lots, etc., are being asked to register the location and direction of their surveillance cameras online for purposes of possibly providing assistance to police in criminal investigations. The program would be used strictly with owners' permission and cooperation, allowing the Police Department to view footage upon request for possible evidence relating to a specific criminal act in an ongoing investigation. This partnership is a way for citizens to work with the

Fall leaf pickup A free leaf collection for residents who live within City limits will take place on November 4-6 and again on December 2-4, on your regular refuse collection day. Leaves must be kept separated from other yard waste and placed at the curb in clearly marked cans, cardboard boxes, or Kraft paper bags. Cans and boxes will be left on the parkway following collection. Although leaves may be placed in marked cans, please be aware that a combination of precipitation and low temperatures may cause the contents to freeze. Frozen cans cannot be emptied by our service provider.

Hydrant painting The City of Elmhurst is in the third year of a 4-year contract to sandblast, prime and paint every fire hydrant in the City. Sandblasting, priming and painting was needed on all of the fire hydrants due to years of manually painting, making the hydrant harder to operate. As part of this City-wide project, all newly painted hydrants are color coded to the National Fire Protection Association standard (NFPA) so fire fighters will know the fire flow as they arrive on scene.

Stormwater Management update

The City of Elmhurst, in a continuation of its ongoing Citywide flood-mitigation effort, is currently under construction on yet again a major infrastructure improvement project. The Saylor/Swain/Vallette Stormwater Mitigation Project is underway in the City's southwest side. This project will reduce flooding for 94 homes in this neighborhood that have experienced structural overland flooding over the last 12 years due to significant rain events. To enable the project the City purchased four homes in this neighborhood to accommodate the installation of new underground concrete chamber detention along the east side of Swain Avenue to detain flood waters during significant rain events. Additionally, the City utilized the Crescent Avenue right-ofway, between Saylor Avenue and Swain Avenue, to install additional underground detention for this project. In total 7.27 ac-ft of detention will be created as part of the project. The City expects the project to be completed by the end of

When this project is complete the City will have in total completed 12 stormwater improvement projects, reduced/eliminated structural overland flooding for 447 homes, and have created approximately 120 ac-ft of new detention storage since 2015.

Organic Waste Recycling: Residents have the option to rent a 65-gallon organic waste toter from Republic Services at an initial cost of \$17.50 per month. The toter can be used for leaves, grass and other organic waste (including fruits, vegetables, meat, etc.) as listed below. The organics material will be taken to a composting facility and will not be landfilled. There is no need to purchase yard waste stickers for the toter each week. To utilize this service, contact Republic Services directly at 708-345-7050. The resident will be billed directly by Republic Services for this program. If you choose to use your own container, a yard waste sticker is required.

<u>Cooking Oil Recycling</u>: This is an annual collection of cooking oil that takes place the Saturday after Thanksgiving. On November 28th, bring your used cooking oil to the Public Works Facility at 985 S. Riverside Drive in Elmhurst from 9 am- noon where the oil will be collected and recycled. Dumping in the sewer system can lead to problem with your line or the public system.

<u>Pumpkin Recycling:</u> Elmhurst will again collect used pumpkins the first Saturday after Halloween (Nov 7) at the Public Works Facility, 985 S. Riverside Drive in Elmhurst from 9 am- noon. By recycling your pumpkins, you are reducing the volume in the landfills and the pumpkins are composted for reuse.

<u>Electronics Recycling</u>: The City has partnered with DuPage County to provide a quarterly electronic recycling drop off at the Public Works Facility, 985 S. Riverside Drive from 8 am - noon. The next collection is scheduled for October 24th. While most items are collected free of charge, there is a fee for televisions and monitors.

<u>Paints/Stains Recycling</u>: The City will be hosting a recycling event for latex and oil based paints, primers, stains, sealers and coatings. This event will take place from 9 am - noon on Saturday, October 17th at the Public Works facility, 985 S. Riverside Drive in Elmhurst. There is a fee for recycling these materials. <u>Smoke Detector Recycling:</u> Residents can drop off your old smoke detectors year round at in the City Hall Lobby on weekdays from 8:30 am - 5pm.

<u>Prescription Drug Takeback:</u> Residents can drop off prescription drugs year round in the lobby of the Elmhurst Police Station. Please do not place them in your trash or flush them down the toilet, help to keep the water system drug free. The Elmhurst Police Department will hold a drup takeback event on October 24th from 10am-2pm at the Elmhurst Police Station (125 E. First St).

Creation of activity kits from cookie & cake decorating kits from Smallcakes (623 W. North), to at home painting & craft kits from Pinot's Palette (214 N. York), Do It Together Workshops (578 N. Michigan), and K&T Colors (568 S. York), family pizza making kits from DiLeo's (193 W. Butterfield), craft cocktail kits from Tannins (112 N. York), music making kits from Luscombe Music (122 W. Vallette), and many more.



Sharing of live virtual experiences from concerts at the School of Rock (105 N. Maple) and the Elmhurst Symphony Orchestra (149 W. Brush Hill), to fitness tips and classes from Curves (110 W. Vallette), Ignite Fitness (112 W. North), and Pure Barre (122 Schiller) among others.



Dedication to supporting one another – from Studio Preschool's (600 N. Michigan) commitment to buying "local lunches" weekly, to many restaurants including Flavah's (570 S. York) commitment to feeding front line workers, from Prairie Path Foot & Ankle (136 W. Vallette) and Halfway House Golf (555 S. York) participating in matching grant challenges with Elmhurst Walk-in Assistance Network (125 W. Church), to Community Bank

of Elmhurst (330 W. Butterfield) and Lakeside Bank assisting hundreds of Elmhurst businesses secure CAREs Act funding -- countless local businesses committed to supporting one another and stepped up for Elmhurst.



These actions and innumerable others have been celebrated and shared on Explore Elmhurst. Like and follow Explore Elmhurst on Facebook to see the latest offerings from our local business community. Explore Elmhurst likewise highlights new business activity within the community.

While several local businesses sadly closed their doors for good during the pandemic, the economic development team continues to work with businesses actively pursuing locations within Elmhurst. Commercial activity is visible throughout the community with industrial spec buildings underway in our business parks, multi-family projects such as The Flynn (183-191 N Addison) on track for

welcoming new tenants in Spring 2021, and the buildout of new offerings currently happening in the former locations of Flight 112, Rainbow Restaurant, and Pizza Palace. Zazu Salon (191 N. 
Pack Your Bags for the 'Great Midwestern Road Trip'

Fall 2020: Two Exhibits Done Wright

This fall, the Elmhurst History Museum presents a national touring exhibit, Frank Lloyd Wright: Architecture of the Interior, an exploration of the interior design of Wright's houses, often considered his greatest architectural accomplishment. Elmhurst is home to the Henderson House, one of Wright's classic Prairie Style residences, and Wright's architectural influence can also be seen in two Walter Burley Griffin residences and other regional home design as well. The exhibit will be open from October 23-December 20, 2020, and the museum has planned a number of interesting online programs to enhance the exhibit's learning experiences (available at elmhursthistory.org).

The Elmhurst History Museum is partnering with the Elmhurst Art Museum this fall as they present a related Wright-

themed exhibit, Wright Before the "Lloyd." This exhibit is curated by Chicago's cultural historian, Tim Samuelson, and will feature architectural artifacts and images to weave together the story of Wright's early life and career before he made his indelible imprint on the world of architecture. While the Elmhurst History Museum's exhibit is centered on interior design, the Art Museum's exhibit will focus more on exteriors—a perfect complement to make Elmhurst the "Wright" place to be in the coming months! Phase 2 of the Elmhurst Metra Station Improvement Project has begun!

The Elmhurst Metra Station was last updated in the 1980s. The facility currently consists of a depot building with a ticket agent office, waiting room, coffee shop and public restrooms located on the inbound side of the tracks. An open sided shelter is located along the inbound platform east of the existing station and a shelter/pedestrian underpass access area is located on the outbound side of the tracks.

The Elmhurst Metra Station Improvement Project will include the construction of new inbound and outbound stations and warming shelters to expand commuter-waiting areas. A new pedestrian tunnel is proposed at York Street to provide a mid-platform crossing for commuters and a pedestrian bypass at a busy crossing in downtown Elmhurst. ADA access improvements will be added to all areas of the station. Dedicated bus and vehicular drop off zones are proposed to reduce traffic congestion during peak hours. Increased bike parking and improved pedestrian crossings and sidewalks are also proposed to provide safer routes to the new station(s) and warming shelters. The improvements will create more green space, reducing stormwater runoff.

In Phase 1, the project was studied, multiple alternatives were developed, and a preferred alternative was developed with input from the City and residents through public meetings and workshops. In Phase 2, the project will begin final engineering design after City and public involvement to influence the architectural character of the new station. This will begin in late August 2020 and continue through the fall and into winter.

The City received multiple federal, state, and agency grants totaling over \$20M to help fund the project. This includes support from the US Department of Transportation through the Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality program, the Surface Transportation Program, the Illinois Commerce Commission, and Metra. The grants received will provide the majority of funds needed to complete this project.

To help ensure Elmhurst continues to have a vibrant competitive downtown and multi-model transit system, the City is requesting input from residents, the business community, Metra commuters, and others who have a vested interest in the City's future. Stay connected to City news releases and calendar events for upcoming ways to provide input to this important Metra Station improvement project.
