Mayor's Message

Spring is upon us, and with longer days and warmer temperatures ahead, we can look forward to the return of outdoor events and activities in Elmhurst. Health experts have indicated that as COVID restrictions subside this Spring, we will move towards what seems to be an "endemic." The pandemic, which seems to have started far longer than two



years ago; has been hard on all of us and has caused some controversies. We must recommit to our strong sense of community. As we look ahead to our future, there is a shared sense of hope that this health crisis will soon be behind us.

The City of Elmhurst has officially started a strategic planning process. The timing is perfect, as we move past the pandemic, to take a fresh look at our strategic plan. This process, last done in 2014, involves identifying a long-term vision, including goals and resource needs during the next 5-10 years. With the input of residents, business owners and other stakeholders, we use this process to review the City's strengths, opportunities, limitations, and threats, and to identify priorities for City Council. The strategic plan is an important document in shaping the future of Elmhurst. The formal plan will be posted on Elmhurst. org and shared through our news outlets.

As we begin our strategic planning, I know that our public safety services will remain a focus. Recently, I had the opportunity to meet with our safety team to discuss the overall crime statistics in Elmhurst. Despite public perception otherwise, the overall crime rate in Elmhurst remains low. Crime statistics in Elmhurst compare favorably to other communities, with rates being flat or within historic norms. We continue to partner with federal, state, and surrounding law enforcement agencies and support each other with mutual aid, including sharing information and responding to major incidents. Elmhurst is an active member of the DuPage County Metropolitan Emergency Response and Investigations Team (MERIT), which provides highly-skilled, collaborative responses to major incidents through shared personnel and resources.

I am proud to say that we are a leader in DuPage County in adopting public safety technologies, such as license plate reader cameras. We started the program more than 5 years ago, and have been able to both prevent and solve significant crimes throughout our community. City Council and staff will continue to look for the best ways to utilize our resources to protect our City and its residents. Remember, we all play a role when it comes to public safety. Simple things like locking your doors. It is remarkable how many thefts from automobiles would have been prevented if the owners had simply locked the doors. And, please do not hesitate to report suspicious activity by calling 911. Our police appreciate these calls, even if it turns out that everything is okay. Let's help police keep ourselves and our neighbors safe.

On behalf of City Council, I wish everyone a safe and joyful Spring season!

Zoning Ordinance Update The City's Planning Department is busy working on updates to the Zoning Ordinance. Visit **elmhurstzoning.com** and stay tuned for additional updates this summer!

Vehicle Sticker Reminder City vehicle stickers must be purchased and displayed by May 1st on all vehicles registered or garaged within City limits. Stickers are sold at a discount from March 1 through April 30. Applications will be mailed to residents, and are available to download at **elmhurst.org**. Stickers can be purchased in person, online or by mail. Money collected through the sale of vehicle stickers goes into the City's General Fund and is used for roadway maintenance and construction.

Keep Inlets Clean To lessen street flooding, the City is asking the public to help clean the inlets and storm drains in front of their residences or businesses. Use a rake or a shovel to clear leaves, limbs, and debris from the storm drain. Do not put your feet or hands



into the storm drain because of potential hazards that have collected in the drain. Do not try to remove the grate, only the debris on top of the grate.

The best time to inspect the storm drain in front of your house or business is prior to a rain event and right after a rain, snow, or ice storm. If a clogged storm drain cannot be cleared, notify the City that help is needed. Please do not rake or blow the leaves from your yard into the street. Bag them at the curb and prepare them for curbside pickup by your garbage hauler. For leaves that have fallen into the street, please keep them out of the channel right along the curb, where they will block the path of rainwater. Rake them at least one foot from the curb.

Coyote Sightings Residents who observe a coyote in their neighborhood are asked to visit **elmhurst.org/elmhurstconnect** and report the sighting and condition of the animal. Residents who have questions about the online reporting process can contact the Elmhurst Police Department at 630-530-3050. As coyotes are wild animals, residents should never actively

seek out or search for them.

Spring Clean-Up The City's annual Spring Clean-Up will be held on the following Saturdays – April 2nd for those with a Wednesday garbage pickup, April 9th for those with a Thursday pick-up, and April 16th for those with a



Friday pick-up. For a complete list of acceptable and unacceptable items, visit the City's website at **elmhurst.org**. Items other than large appliances, furniture and bulk pieces must be placed in bags, cans or boxes weighing no more than 50 lbs. each.

Elmhurst Memorial Day Parade The

Elmhurst Chamber of Commerce & Industry, in cooperation with the City of Elmhurst and Elmhurst veterans organizations, will host the 104th

Starting from Third Street, the parade will head south on York Street to Second Street, veer east along Robert Palmer Drive through the underpass and west back to York Street, south on York Street to Church Street, west on Church Street to Prospect Avenue and north on Prospect Avenue past the Veterans Memorial. Standing Water on Residential Property Seasonally, rain events can cause back yard standing water in areas that are Update The City of naturally low or are part of a natural drainage path. These types of situations are common in the springtime and during seasonal periods of heavy or extended rain. Generally, most backyard

standing water is considered to simply be a nuisance and the water will most likely infiltrate into the soil on its own. Because of this, the City of Elmhurst asks residents to only report standing water that persists for at least 48 hours after the conclusion of a rain event. The exception to this would be if the standing water is causing structural flooding to a home or garage.

National Arbor Day is April 29th!

On this day, we celebrate the importance of trees. Elmhurst is known for its tree lined streets, and we appreciate all that our Forestry Division does to keep those trees healthy and vibrant! Elmhurst has 30 different varieties of trees throughout the City. The Department plants around 650 trees each year and has an ongoing treetrimming schedule with a goal to touch every public tree in Elmhurst at least once every eight years.

When it comes to the health of trees, dangers can include incorrect mulching

and dealing with Emerald Ash Borer and Dutch Elm Disease. Forestry can be a dangerous job and safety is a primary concern when it comes to staff. Residents are urged to call professionals rather than try to trim trees themselves. It is a job that requires experience. Check out ElmhurstTV on YouTube in May for our virtual celebration!

First Street Bridge Rehabilitation Project The

City of Elmhurst is receiving roughly \$3 million between 2020-2022 through the State of Illinois's REBUILD Illinois Capital Program. These grant funds are being provided to the City for specific transportation projects; including bridge work. The City owns two



bridges, the First Street and Park Avenue bridges over Robert Palmer Drive. First Street was built in the 1970's and currently needs a bridge deck overlay to prevent increased damage to the bridge in the future. The City has programmed REBUILD grant funds for the overlay of this bridge deck in the summer of 2022. The scope of the project will include a bridge deck overlay, parapet wall repairs, beam and bearing painting, and sidewalk repairs. The project will take place this summer, with the construction timeline restricted between June 6th and August 5th. During construction, the bridge will be closed to traffic, so a detour route will establish a safe and efficient bypass of the bridge.

Stormwater Project

Elmhurst, in a continuation of its ongoing citywide floodmitigation effort, has plans to construct a new 3 ac-ft dry-bottom detention basin



at the open field north of Jackson School. In this area, the Southwest Elmhurst Stormwater Mitigation Project - Phase III project (as it will be called), will help reduce the 100-year flooding depth by 0.5 feet and will remove an additional nine homes from the potential 100-year structural flooding risk. This new detention basin will be connected to the larger existing City stormwater basin to the west with storm sewer piping and the new basin at the school site will only take on water during larger storm events, not smaller events.

District 205 and the City have partnered on this project through an intergovernmental agreement and the school intends to continue to use the new basin area as a play area for school use. The bottom of the detention pond will be a grass field, approximately 150 feet by 240 feet, that is 4-5 feet below the adjacent playground area and roadways (Jackson Street and Mitchell Avenue). Access to the bottom of the grass detention basin will be provided by a new concrete ramp near the school's existing playground area. After completion of the SESMP Phase III Improvement Project, the City of Elmhurst will have completed 14 stormwater improvement projects which reduce/eliminate structural overland flooding for 473 homes, and will have created approximately 131 ac-ft of new detention storage since 2015.

Citizens' Police Academy,

Spring 2022! The Citizen Police Academy is a 12-week program designed to give Elmhurst citizens a working knowledge of their police department and of general law enforcement practices. The program provides participants with a better understanding of some of the challenges faced by



police officers in the field. Each weekly block of instruction is held from 6:30-9:30 p.m. on consecutive Wednesday evenings. The next session begins on Wednesday, March 9th and continues through May 25, 2022 The program is free of charge but is limited to 25 students per session. Participants must be over the age of 21 and live or work in the City of Elmhurst. Community Safety

Fire Prevention Spring Cleaning

Checklist While spring cleaning allows you to get your home in order, you should also focus on tasks that improve your home's safety. Fires can occur when you least expect them, but you can prevent them by following these safety guidelines for your spring cleaning routine:



Smoke and Carbon Monoxide Alarms -

Replace smoke and CO alarm batteries and test them once a month by pushing the test button. Gently

clean the alarms, but make sure to follow the manufacturer's instructions first.

Kitchen – Keep countertops and stovetops free of grease and clutter. Excess grease on the drip pan or stovetop can easily catch fire. Clean oil and food spills immediately after they occur and wait until the stove is cool to wipe away the oil or grease spills. Keep items that can catch fire, such as oven mitts, towels, or wooden utensils, away from your stovetop.

Electrical Cords – Inspect the electrical cords in your home and replace worn or tattered ones. Avoid running cords under carpets or across doorways to prevent them from being damaged. Use extension cords only temporarily and plug major appliances directly into wall sockets.

Clothes Dryers – Excess lint in the dryer is the number one cause of clothes dryer fires. Clean the lint that has been collected around the drum before or after each load of laundry. Always use a lint filter and clean it regularly. Move combustible items like boxes and clothing around your dryer to a safer area.

Grilling – Clean the grease or fat build-up after every use. Doing so not only decreases the risk of fire but also helps the food cook better. Check the propane tank, hose, and all connection points for leaks. If you smell gas when the grill is on, turn off the tank and burners immediately. If you have a charcoal grill, use only charcoal starter fluid.

Escape Plan – You should have an escape plan in case of a fire or other disaster. The plan should include a map of each home level with two escape routes in each room. Discuss and practice the plan with everyone in the household, including children, and add pets to the plan.

No biking on business district

sidewalks As a reminder, biking on sidewalks in business districts is prohibited. Bike racks are available throughout the shopping districts. Now more than ever patrons and our businesses appreciate this courtesy with the expansion of their use of outdoor space.

Severe Weather Warnings Spring weather can bring severe storms to the area. When severe weather, such as a tornado threatens the community, outdoor warning sirens will be activated. If severe weather is approaching Elmhurst, and the warning sirens are heard, seek shelter immediately and monitor a television or radio for further instructions. The City activates a monthly scheduled test of the City's emergency warning siren system at 10 a.m. on the first Tuesday of every month. If you hear the alarm at this time, please be reminded that it is only a test. Sign up at **weather.com** to get notifications of severe weather conditions, and the City's CodeRED notification system for emergency alerts.

Video Sharing Partnership Residents and business owners with private video surveillance cameras taking footage of public areas such as streets, sidewalks, parking lots, etc., are being asked to register the location and direction of their surveillance cameras online for purposes of possibly providing assistance to police in criminal investigations. This partnership would not be intended for active or live-feed surveillance, or for monitoring neighborhood activity-the Police Department would never have remote access to any private video systems. The program would be used strictly with owners' permission and cooperation, allowing the Police Department to view footage upon request for possible evidence relating to a specific criminal act in an ongoing investigation. All registration information will be kept confidential, and registrants can unsubscribe at any time. This partnership is a way for citizens to work with the Police Department to help keep our community safe. To share video footage, please fill out a form on **elmhurst.org**. Drug Take Back Day The

Elmhurst Police Department will hold a Prescription Drug "Take Back" on Sat. April 30th 10:00 a.m. - 2:00 p.m. in the Police Station Parking Lot (125 E. First St.). This opportunity allows residents to take



advantage of "drive through drop-off". A small tent will be set up in the west lot and staffed by police personnel for easy drop off of prescription drugs without leaving your vehicle. For more information, call 630-530-3050.





Rain Barrels The City of Elmhurst, in cooperation with the Conservation Foundation, offers rain barrels for purchase at a discounted rate. These 55-gallon barrels are reclaimed and "up-cycled" former food shipping containers. At approximately 48" tall and 24" in diameter, each rain barrel has the ability to divert and store approximately 50 gallons of rainwater. This stored water is ideal for lawn and garden watering. Included with the barrel is a screened lid to prevent leaves and other debris from

gathering in your rain barrel and to keep insects such as mosquitoes from living and breeding in your rain barrel. Barrels can be purchased at City Hall, 209 N. York at the Finance Counter for \$57 – delivery to your Elmhurst address is included. If you have questions or need information, please City Hall at (630) 530-3779.

Are you thinking of installing a patio, pool, driveway or fence this Summer? Think ahead and get your permit request to the City this spring. Please plan accordingly for a 6-8 week permit approval process.

Reminder on building and work permits If you acquired a new patio, fence or any other construction permit, please contact your contractor to make sure that a final inspection has been requested. In order to close out the permit, a final inspection is required.

Sign Up for WaterSmart, a secure, web-based portal with your hourly and historical water usage, as well as leak notices. You can also set water-use alerts based on your preferences at any time. This service is part of our commitment to provide you with the best tools to manage your water use and bill. People of the Prairie: 12,000 Years in DuPage County This spring, the Elmhurst History Museum is turning an archaeological lens to take visitors on a journey that goes back 12,000 years to gain an understanding of the Native people who lived in the Elmhurst area before the arrival of Euro-American settlers.

The exhibit, "People of the Prairie: 12,000 Years in DuPage County," uses the scientific methods of archaeology to unravel clues about our state's earliest inhabitants and considers how they lived, how they ate, and how they interacted with their neighbors. Visitors will explore displays including a timeline comparing tribes from different archaeological eras; a digital map depicting the displacement of Native people in the 18th and 19th centuries; an archaeology "lab"; artifacts from various archaeological sites in northeastern Illinois including tools, arrowheads, pottery and more. The exhibit is generously sponsored by Feze Roofing.

"People of the Prairie" will be open at the Elmhurst History Museum through June 5, 2022. During this time, the museum will be hosting many related programs including family-focused activities during spring break week, a gallery talk with curator Dan Bartlett, lectures, book discussions, and more.
