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Executive Summary

The City of Elmhurst commissioned the Center for Governmental Studies (CGS) at Northern Illinois University to conduct a mail survey of residents. The purpose of the survey was to determine residents' opinions of living in the City, City of Elmhurst government services, City government customer service, and City government communications. The survey was conducted from April 26, 2022-to July 10, 2022. A total of 609 completed surveys were received.

Key Findings

Quality of Life in the City of Elmhurst

- Almost all (98.1%) respondents rate the City of Elmhurst as a place to live excellent or good.
- When asked what they like most about living in the City of Elmhurst the top responses are the schools (18.7%) and the access to transportation (18.4%).
- One-fourth (24.6%) of respondents comment that what they like least about living in the City of Elmhurst are the property taxes. One-tenth or more of respondents mention they like least the new construction (16.3%), the traffic (12.9%), and the city services (10.1%).
- The respondents believe the most important issues facing the City of Elmhurst are high taxes (37.2%), safety/crime (30.1%), and the schools (21.9%)
- Slightly more than one-half (52.1%) of respondents rate the City as a place to retire excellent or good, more than one-fourth (28.7%) rate the City as a place to retire as fair, and about one-fifth (19.2%) rate the City as a place to retire as poor.

City of Elmhurst Government Services

- Neighborhood street maintenance and repair and stormwater management are rated by respondents as high importance and low satisfaction and are identified as "improvement opportunity" areas.
- The four services below are rated by respondents as high importance and high satisfaction and are identified as areas to "keep up the good work":
 - Police/Public Safety
 - Fire and Emergency Medical
 - Garbage Pickup
 - Recycling
- Nine public safety services were asked about in the survey and all receive high ratings. Nonemergency services response time receives the highest rating (92.8% excellent or good) and local traffic law enforcement receives the lowest rating (75.3% excellent or good).
- The ratings for the five street maintenance and repair services asked about in the survey range from 63.2% excellent or good to 84.9% excellent or good. The condition of sidewalks (63.2% excellent or good) receives the lowest rating. The condition of walking paths or bike

trails (84.9% excellent or good) and the appearance of medians and parkways and parkway trees in their neighborhood (83.4% excellent or good) receive the highest ratings.

• The majority (88.9%) of the respondents rate the overall quality of the services received from the City government as excellent or good.

City Government Customer Service

- Of the 50.0% of residents who contacted the City government in the past 12 months, the majority are satisfied with the customer service they received.
 - > 84.2% indicate the staff were knowledgeable
 - > 90.6% report the staff were courteous
 - > 88.9% state the staff responded in a timely manner
 - > 72.8% rate their overall experience as excellent or good
- More than four-fifths (83.0%) of respondents were able to find the appropriate person to contact and 74.1% indicate that they only had to contact one staff person to get assistance.

City Government Communications

- Three-fifths (61.5%) of respondents report they receive information about the City government from the Front Porch newsletter, with 24.0% stating it is their most preferred source.
- A total of 8.6% of respondents indicate they do not receive information about the City government.
- Three-fourths (75.4%) of respondents think the amount of information provided about City services is about right.
- Three-fourths (75.8%) of respondents rate the quality of the information provided about City services excellent or good.
- The majority (92.0%) of residents are satisfied with the job the City of Elmhurst does in providing information to residents

Special Events and Programs/Elmhurst History Museum

- Most (83.7%) respondents rate the overall quality of community events in Elmhurst excellent or good.
- More than one-third (37.6%) of respondents would be very or somewhat likely to visit the Elmhurst History Museum in the next 12 months, more than one-half (52.5%) would be somewhat or very unlikely to visit the Museum, and 9.9% do not know.

Introduction

Background and Purpose

The City of Elmhurst commissioned the Center for Governmental Studies (CGS) at Northern Illinois University to conduct a mail survey of residents. The purpose of the survey was to determine residents' opinions of living in the City, City of Elmhurst government services, City government customer service, and City government communications. The findings of the survey will be used for future planning.

Methodology

Questionnaire

A 53-question survey was developed by CGS and the City of Elmhurst staff. The following topics Elmhurst were covered in the questionnaire:

- Quality of life in the City of Elmhurst,
- City of Elmhurst government services,
- City government customer service,
- City government communications, and
- Special events and programs/ History Museum.

The questionnaire was formatted for printing and programmed in CGS' online survey software. The questionnaire may be found in Appendix A

Sample

A random sample of 2,400 households in the City of Elmhurst was provided by the Marketing Systems Group, a survey sampling firm. The sample included names, mailing addresses, and email addresses.

Pretest

CGS pretested the questionnaire with approximately 20 households. The pretest was designed to gauge whether the respondents understood the questions being asked and could provide the necessary information.

Data Collection

Each household in the random sample was mailed the questionnaire and a self-addressed, stamped envelope in which to return the questionnaire to CGS. The first page of the questionnaire was a cover letter that explained the purpose of the survey and how the results will be used, expressed assurances of confidentiality, identified the City of Elmhurst as the

sponsor, and provided a web address and unique password for completing the online survey.

Follow-up communications are important to get responses from as high a proportion of the sample as possible, as harder to reach respondents often have different experiences and responses than easier to reach respondents. Therefore, CGS sent out to two postcard reminders to those who did not respond. Additionally, CGS sent reminder emails and made reminder calls to nonresponding households (See Appendix B).

The survey was conducted from April 26, 2022-July 10, 2022.

A total of 609 completed surveys were received. The margin of error for the survey is +/- 3.9 percentage points at the 95 percent level of confidence.

A total of 208 questionnaires were undeliverable and 31 of the sampled households opted out of completing the questionnaire.

Data Analysis

The data was weighted on age, gender, race/ethnicity, educational attainment, and annual household income using information from the 2016-2020 American Community Survey data. Weighting on key demographic variables ensures that respondents to the survey are representative of the population of all adults in the City of Elmhurst and that the findings can be generalized to the total adult population.

Chi-square tests were used to test significance between demographic groups. All demographic differences reported are statistically significant at the $p \le 0.05$ level.

Key Findings

Quality of Life in the City of Elmhurst

The respondents were first asked a set of questions regarding their opinions of the quality of life in the City of Elmhurst. The respondents were asked their opinions of the City of Elmhurst as a place to live and the top three issues the City faces.




Figure 1: Rating of City of Elmhurst as a Place to Live How would you rate the City of Elmhurst as a place to live?

Almost all (98.1%) respondents rate the City of Elmhurst as a place to live excellent or good. A total of 1.9% of respondents rate the City as a place to live fair and none of the respondents rate the City as a place to live poor (Figure 1).

Demographic Differences

- Respondents who have lived in the City of Elmhurst for less than five years (75.3%) are more likely than respondents who have lived in the City five years or more (58.8%) and respondents who have lived in the City more than 10 years (53.3%) to rate the City of Elmhurst as a place to live excellent.
- Respondents who are less than 65 years of age (64.8%) are more likely than respondents 65 years of age or greater (40.7%) to rate the City of Elmhurst as a place to live excellent.
- Respondents who rent their home (80.0%) are more likely than respondents who own their home (55.6%) to rate the City of Elmhurst as a place to live excellent.

• Respondents with children under 18 years of age in their household (63.0%) are more likely than respondents with no children under 18 years of age in their household (52.7%) to rate the City of Elmhurst as a place to live excellent.

Those respondents who rated the City of Elmhurst as a place to live as fair or poor were asked why they gave that rating. A variety of reasons are given, including new high rises and parking structures in downtown and the City being more concerned about developers' and businesses' interests than residents' interests (See Appendix C for verbatim comments).

The respondents were asked to comment on what they like most and what they like least about living in the City of Elmhurst.

When asked what they like most about living in the City of Elmhurst the top responses are the schools (18.7%) and the access to transportation (18.4%) (Table 1) (See Appendix C for verbatim comments).

The respondents provide a variety of responses of what they like least about living in the City of Elmhurst. One-fourth (24.6%) of respondents comment they like least the property taxes. One-tenth or more of respondents mention they like least the new construction (16.3%), the traffic (12.9%), and the city services (10.1%). A total of 3.4% of respondents comment there is nothing they like least about living in the City (Table 2) (See Appendix C for verbatim comments).

Next, the respondents were asked to list the three most important issues that the City of Elmhurst faces.

The respondents believe the most important issues facing the City of Elmhurst are high taxes (37.2%), safety/crime (30.1%), and the schools (21.9%). (Table 3) (See Appendix C for verbatim comments).

The respondents were next asked to rate the City as a place to raise children and a place to retire, ease of walking and bicycling in the City, the overall appearance of the City, and the availability of leisure activities/entertainment in the City.




Figure 2: Rating of City as a Place to Raise Children

Almost all (98.9%) respondents rate the City as a place to raise children excellent or good, with more than two-thirds (68.6%) rating the City excellent (Figure 2).

Demographic Differences

- Respondents who have lived in the City of Elmhurst for less than five years (85.1%) are more likely than respondents who have lived in the City five years or more (64.6%) and respondents who have lived in the City more than 10 years (66.0%) to rate the City of Elmhurst as a place to raise children excellent.
- Respondents who are less than 65 years of age (74.1%) are more likely than those respondents 65 years of age or greater (55.3%) to rate the City of Elmhurst as a place to raise children excellent.
- Respondents with children under 18 years of age in their household (79.9%) are more likely than respondents with no children under 18 years of age in their household (58.0%) to rate the City of Elmhurst as a place to raise children excellent.






Figure 3: Rating of City as a Place to Retire How would you rate the City as a place to retire?

Slightly more than one-half (52.1%) of respondents rate the City as a place to retire excellent or good, more than one-fourth (28.7%) rate the City as a place to retire as fair, and about one-fifth (19.2%) rate the City as a place to retire as poor (Figure 3).

Demographic Differences

• Respondents who own their home (51.1%) are more likely than respondents who rent their home (23.7%) to rate the City of Elmhurst as a place to retire fair or poor.

The majority (86.9%) of respondents rate the ease of walking in the City excellent or good (Figure 4).





Demographic Differences

A statistically significant difference is found for ease of walking by the location in the City the respondent lives. Respondents who live in Ward 5 (59.1%) are most likely to rate ease of walking in the City excellent, followed by respondents who live in Ward 3 (52.5%) and respondents who live in Ward 7 (50.7%). Approximately two-fifths of respondents who live in Ward 2 (43.5%) and respondents who live in Ward 1 (39.0%) rate ease of walking in the City excellent. Respondents who live in Ward 6 (32.8%) and respondents who live in Ward 4 (32.1%) are least likely to rate ease of walking in the City excellent.




Figure 5: Rating of Ease of Bicycling in the City

Most (82.3%) of respondents rate the ease of bicycling in the City excellent or good (Figure 5).

Demographic Differences

A statistically significant difference is found for ease of bicycling by the location in the City the respondent lives. Respondents who live in Ward 5 (54.8%) are most likely to rate ease of bicycling in the City excellent. About three out of ten respondents or more who live in Ward 7 (37.5%), respondents who live in Ward 3 (31.6%), and respondents who live in Ward 6 (29.0%) rate ease of bicycling in the City excellent, followed by respondents who live in Ward 2 (21.1%). Respondents who live in Ward 4 (16.9%) and respondents who live in Ward 1 (12.8%) are least likely to rate ease of bicycling in the City excellent.





Figure 6: Rating of Overall Appearance of the City

The majority (94.3%) of respondents rate the overall appearance of the City excellent or good (Figure 6).

Demographic Differences

No statistically significant differences are found for the rating of overall appearance of the • City by respondent's age, gender, race ethnicity, educational attainment, annual household income, whether there are children in the household, length of time living in the City, location of residence in the City, and whether they rent or own their home.

More than four-fifths (83.5%) of respondents rate the availability of leisure activities/entertainment in the City excellent or good (Figure 7).





Demographic Differences

 No statistically significant differences are found for the rating of the availability of leisure activities/entertainment in the City by respondent's age, gender, race ethnicity, educational attainment, annual household income, whether there are children in the household, length of time living in the City, location of residence in the City, and whether they rent or own their home.


City of Elmhurst Government Services

The next series of questions were about the importance of City of Elmhurst government provided services, satisfaction with City government provided services, quality of City government provided services, and perceptions of public safety in Elmhurst.

Six out of ten or more respondents indicate that police/public safety (89.0%), fire and emergency medical (86.9%), neighborhood street maintenance and repair (77.3%), garbage pickup (71.6%), and stormwater management (62.6%) services are very important to their household (Figure 8).

How important or unimportant to you and your household are each of the following City government provided services?




Demographic Differences

- Respondents 65 years of age or greater (54.8%) are more likely than respondents less than 65 years of age (36.8%) to indicate **property maintenance regulation** is very important to them and their household.
- Respondents less than 50 years of age (41.1%) are more likely than respondents 50 years of age or greater (28.8%) to indicate **initiatives to maintain the environment** are very important to them and their household.

Among the City government provided services, fire and emergency medical (80.7% very satisfied) and police/public safety (74.4% very satisfied) receive relatively high satisfaction ratings. Six out of ten or more respondents are very satisfied with garbage pickup (61.0%) and recycling (60.8%) services (Figure 9).

Demographic Differences

- The percentage of respondents who are very satisfied with **garbage pickup** increases with as number of years living in the City increases (less than 5 years, 40.2%; 5-10 years, 52.5%; 10 years or more, 68.4%).
- Respondents who have lived in the City more than 10 years (37.4%) are most likely to be satisfied with stormwater management, followed by respondents who have lived in the City 5 years or less (26.2%). Respondents who have lived in the City 5-10 years (18.7%) are least likely to be satisfied with stormwater management.
- Respondents who have lived in the City less than 5 years (58.4%) are more likely than respondents who have lived in the City 5 years or more (17.5%) to be very satisfied with **business attraction/retention**.
- Respondents who have lived in the City 10 years or more (23.4%) are more likely than respondents who have lived in the City less than 10 years (11.9%) to be very satisfied with initiatives to maintain the environment.

Those respondents who are somewhat or very dissatisfied with a service were asked to explain why. Those respondents who indicate they are dissatisfied with the **police/public safety services** comment they would like to see more police presence. Those respondents who indicate they are dissatisfied with garbage pickup mention the cost. Those respondents who indicate they are dissatisfied with recycling would like to see recycling efforts increased to include other types of materials Those respondents who indicate they are dissatisfied with yard waste pickup comment that it is too expensive and there needs to be more leaf pickup days. Those respondents who indicate they are dissatisfied with **neighborhood street maintenance/repair** mention that there are too many potholes, it takes to long to repair streets, and streets need to be repaved not just patched. Those respondents who indicate they are dissatisfied with the fire and emergency medical services believe the City of Elmhurst should have its own paramedics and not contract out for this service. Those respondents who indicate they are dissatisfied with business attraction/retention mention that there needs to be a greater variety of businesses and that there are too many empty storefronts. Those respondents who indicate they are dissatisfied with planning and zoning report that it takes too long to get permits and permits are too expensive. Also, respondents mention there are too many hi-rise buildings in the downtown area. Those respondents who indicate they are dissatisfied with property maintenance regulation mention there is a lack of code enforcement by the City. Those respondents who indicate they are dissatisfied with stormwater management report that their area still has flooding. Those respondents who indicate they are dissatisfied with initiatives to maintain the environment state they are unaware of what the City is doing (See Appendix C for verbatim comments).

An importance-satisfaction analysis was conducted. The ratings of importance and the ratings of satisfaction with the services provided by the respondents were looked at together. The analysis provides information on how much emphasis the City should place on each service. It identifies those services that require improvement, those that should be maintained, those that are a low priority, and those where emphasis can be reduced. Figure 10 displays the findings of the analysis.

The following services are rated by respondents as high importance and low satisfaction and are identified as "improvement opportunity" areas:

- Neighborhood Street Maintenance/Repair
- Stormwater Management

The four services below are rated by respondents as high importance and high satisfaction and are identified as areas to "keep up the good work":

- Police/Public Safety
- Fire and Emergency Medical
- Garbage Pickup
- Recycling

The following services are rated by residents as low importance and low satisfaction and are identified as "low priority" areas:

- Business Attraction and Retention
- Yard Waste Pickup
- Planning and Zoning
- Property Maintenance Regulation
- Initiatives to Maintain the Environment


No services are rated as low importance and high satisfaction ("exceeding expectations").

The respondents were asked to rate the quality of nine City government provided public safety services. All the services asked about receive high ratings. Non-emergency services response time receives the highest rating (92.8% excellent or good) and local traffic law enforcement receives the lowest rating (75.3% excellent or good) (Figure 11).

Demographic Differences

• No statistically significant differences are found for the ratings of quality of the public safety services by respondent's age, gender, race ethnicity, educational attainment, annual household income, whether there are children in the household, length of time living in the City, location of residence in the City, and whether they rent or own their home.




Figure 12: Rating of Public Safety in Elmhurst How would you rate public safety in Elmhurst?

Approximately nine out of ten respondents rate overall safety in Elmhurst (92.8%), safety in their neighborhood (92.5%), safety in downtown/commercial Elmhurst (91.6%), and safety in Elmhurst public parks (89.7%) excellent or good (Figure 12).


Demographic Differences

• No statistically significant differences are found for ratings of public safety in Elmhurst by respondent's age, gender, race ethnicity, educational attainment, annual household income, whether there are children in the household, length of time living in the City, location of residence in the City, and whether they rent or own their home.

The respondents were asked to rate the quality of five City government provided street maintenance and repair services. The ratings range from 63.2% excellent or good to 84.9% excellent or good. The condition of walking paths or bike trails (84.9% excellent or good) and the appearance of medians and parkways and parkway trees in their neighborhood (83.4%) excellent or good) receive the highest ratings. The condition of sidewalks (63.2% excellent or good) receives the lowest rating (Figure 13).

Demographic Differences

- Respondents who have lived in the City less than five years (87.2%) are more likely than respondent who have lived in the City 5-10 years (73.7%) and respondents who have lived in the City more than 10 years (70.6%) to rate the condition of street pavement and curb in their neighborhood excellent or good.
- Those respondents who rent their home (96.3%) are more likely than those respondents who own their home (59.0%) to rate the condition of sidewalks excellent or good.




Figure 14: Rating of Overall Quality of the Services Received from the City Government How would you rate the overall quality of the services you receive from the City government?

The majority (88.9%) of respondents rate the overall quality of the services received from the City government as excellent or good (Figure 14).

Demographic Differences

 No statistically significant differences are found for rating of overall quality of services received from the City government by respondent's age, gender, race ethnicity, educational attainment, annual household income, whether there are children in the household, length of time living in the City, location of residence in the City, and whether they rent or own their home.

The respondents were asked what additional services or programs they think the City of Elmhurst could provide. The top suggestions are additional/improved Park District services or programs (9.2%), senior services or programs (8.8%), more recycling/recycling education (7.6%), and more yard waste/leaf pickup (5.5%). A total of 16.4% of respondents comment that the City of Elmhurst could provide no additional services or programs and 4.2% did not know what additional services or programs the City could provide. (Table 4) (See Appendix C for verbatim comments).

The respondents were also asked what services or programs they think the City of Elmhurst could cut. Almost one-third (32.4%) of respondents think no services or programs could be cut. About one-fourth (23.4%) of respondents do not know. The top suggestion is to cut vehicle stickers (5.3%) (Table 5) (See Appendix C for verbatim comments).

City Government Customer Service


One-half (50%) of the respondents have contacted the City government in the past 12 months. Those respondents were asked a set of questions about their satisfaction with the customer service they received.

The respondents contacted a variety of departments. Building/Code Enforcement (22.3%) and Public Works (21.1%) are the most frequently cited departments.

Various reasons are given for the contact, including water bill payment (10.2%), permit (8.4%), trees (6.1%), garbage pickup (5.5%), property maintenance violation (5.2%), and police (4.9%).


The majority (83.0%) of respondents did not have difficulty finding the appropriate staff person to contact (Figure 15).

Figure 15: Difficulty Finding the Appropriate Person to Contact




Did you have difficulty finding the appropriate staff person to contact?


The majority (84.2%%) of the respondents indicate the staff are knowledgeable, with 58.2% saying they are very knowledgeable (Figure 17).



Most (90.6%) of the respondents think the staff is courteous, with 75.4% indicating they are very knowledgeable (Figure 18).



Figure 18: Courteousness of Staff




How courteous was the staff?




Figure 20: Rating of Overall Experience How would you rate your overall experience?

More than seven out of ten (72.8%) or respondents rate their overall experience excellent or good (Figure 20).

City Government Communications


The next section of the survey was about City government communications with residents. They were asked their sources of information about the City government, their opinions of the quality and amount of City government provided information, and their overall satisfaction with the job the City government does in providing information to residents.

Three-fifths (61.5%) of respondents report they receive information about the City government from the Front Porch newsletter, with 24.0% stating it is their most preferred source. More than one-half (53.8%) of respondents say they receive information about the City government from family, friends, and neighbors, with 4.9% indicating it is their most preferred source. More than two-fifths (42.5%) indicate they receive information about the City government from the City website, with 15.0% reporting it is their most preferred source (Figure 21). A total of 8.6% of respondents indicate they do not receive information about the City government.

Demographic Differences

- The percentage of respondents who report they receive information about the City government from the **Front Porch newsletter** increases as respondent age increases (less than 50 years of age, 54.3%; 50-64 years of age, 66.7%; 65 years of age or greater, 73.4%).
- Respondents 65 years of age or greater (32.1%) are more likely than respondents 50-64 years of age (22.4%) and respondents less than 50 years of age (22.2%) to state the **Front Porch newsletter** is their **most preferred source** of information about the City government.

- The percentage of respondents who indicate the **City website** is their most preferred source of information about the City government decreases as years living in the City increases (less than 5 years, 29.8%; 5-10 years, 20.8%; more than 10 years, 9.8%).
- Respondents living in the City less than five years (32.9%) are more likely than respondents living in the City 5-10 years (10.0%) and respondents living in the City more than 10 years (2.2%) to report they **do not receive information** about the City Government.




Figure 22: Amount of Information Provided About City Services

Three-fourths (75.4%) of respondents think the amount of information provided about City services is about right (Figure 22).




Figure 23: Rating of Quality of Information Provided About City Services



Do you think the amount of information provided by the City on social media is too little, about right, or too much?



Demographic Differences

 No statistically significant differences are found for the job the City of Elmhurst does in providing information to residents by respondent's age, gender, race ethnicity, educational attainment, annual household income, whether there are children in the household, length of time living in the City, location of residence in the City, and whether they rent or own their home.

Those respondents who are dissatisfied with the job the City does in proving information to residents were asked why. The three most frequent responses are they are unaware of the different methods the City uses to communicate, they want more information about crimes committed in Elmhurst, and they want more information on upcoming city events (See Appendix C for verbatim responses).

The respondents were also asked how can the City government improve communication with residents. A variety of responses are provided. The most common responses are greater/more frequent communication (9.8%), including sending the Front Porch newsletter monthly, improve website (9.4%), use email to communicate (8.0%), send information in print format (7.1%), and make residents aware of communication methods used (6.3%) (Table 6) (See Appendix C for verbatim comments).



Special Events and Programs/Elmhurst History Museum

Next, the respondents were asked about their opinion of the quality of community events in Elmhurst and their sources of information about events. They were also asked their likelihood of visiting the Elmhurst History Museum, their preferred method to learn about museum activities, and topics and themes they would like he Elmhurst History Museum to explore in future programs and exhibits.

Most (83.7%) respondents rate the overall quality of community events in Elmhurst excellent or good. A total of 12.3% of respondents rate the quality fair and 4.0% of the respondents rate the quality poor (Figure 26).

How would you rate the overall quality of community events in Elmhurst?


Demographic Differences

• No statistically significant differences are found for the rating of overall quality of community events in Elmhurst by respondent's age, gender, race ethnicity, educational attainment, annual household income, whether there are children in the household, length of time living in the City, location of residence in the City, and whether they rent or own their home.

When asked about their sources of information about community events more than one-half (54.8%) of respondents report they receive information from the Front Porch newsletter. More than two-fifths (43.6%) of respondents receive information from family, friends, and neighbors. More than one-fourth of respondents receive information from the local newspaper (30.1%) (newspaper most frequently mentioned is the Independent) and City website (26.8%) (Figure 27).

Demographic Differences

- The percentage of respondents who receive information about community events and activities from the **Front Porch newsletter** increases as years living in the City increases (less than five years, 49.2%; 5-10 years 57.8%; more than 10 years, 66.3%).
- Respondents who are 50 years of age or greater (50.0%) are more likely than respondents who are less than 50 years of age (18.9%) to indicate they receive information about community events and activities from the **local newspaper**.
- Respondents who are less than 65 years of age (30.3%) are more likely than respondents who are 65 years of age or greater (15.5%) to report they receive information about community events and activities from the **City Facebook page**.
- The percentage of respondents who state they **do not receive information** about community events and activities decreases as years living in the City increases (less than five years, 23.7%; 5-10 years 14.7%; more than 10 years, 4.2%).




Figure 28: Likelihood of Visiting the Elmhurst History Museum in the Next 12 Months In the next 12 months, how likely or unlikely are you to visit the Elmhurst History Museum?

Next, the respondents were asked how likely they would be to visit the Elmhurst History Museum in the next 12 months. More than one-third (37.6%) of respondents would be very or somewhat likely to visit the Elmhurst History Museum, more than one-half (52.5%) would be somewhat or very unlikely to visit the Museum, and 9.9% do not know (Figure 28).

Demographic Differences

- Respondents aged 65 or greater (46.6%) and respondents aged less than 50 (40.0%) are more likely than respondents aged 50-64 (22.4%) to be very or somewhat likely to visit the Elmhurst History Museum in the next 12 months.
- Respondents with a Bachelor's degree or greater (47.4%) are more likely than respondents with less than a Bachelor's degree (19.9%) to be very or somewhat likely to visit the Elmhurst History Museum in the next 12 months.

Respondents who say they are very or somewhat likely to visit the Elmhurst History Museum in the next 12 months were asked the reason why. Two-fifths (39.5%) comment they would visit the museum to see an exhibit, 15.6% would visit the museum for a program or event, and 10.2% would take a child(ren) to the museum (See Appendix C for verbatim comments).

Respondents who indicate they are somewhat or very unlikely to visit the Elmhurst History Museum in the next 12 months were asked the reason why. More than one-fifth (22.8%) state they are not interested, 12.8% indicate they have no time, 11.7% say the exhibits, programs, or events are not interesting, 11.1% report that they have been there, and 9.4% comment that they

are not aware of the museum or what the museum has to offer (See Appendix C for verbatim responses).

The respondents would be most likely to visit the museum on Sunday afternoon (36.6%), a weekday afternoon (33.1%), and Saturday afternoon (32.2%). A total of 15.7% of respondents would not visit the museum (Table 7).

Demographic Differences

- Respondents who have children under the age of 18 living in their home (54.5%) are more likely than those respondents who do not have children under the age of 18 living in their home (36.3%) to visit the Elmhurst History Museum **on Sunday afternoon**.
- Respondents aged 65 or greater (80.5%) are more likely than respondents aged less than 65 (30.1%) to visit the Elmhurst History Museum on a **weekday afternoon**.
- Respondents who have children under the age of 18 living in their home (50.8%) are more likely than those respondents who do not have children under the age of 18 living in their home (31.6%) to visit the Elmhurst History Museum on **Saturday afternoon**.
- Respondents who have children under the age of 18 living in their home (36.0%) are more likely than those respondents who do not have children under the age of 18 living in their home (19.5%) to visit the Elmhurst History Museum on **Saturday morning**.
- Residents who have lived in the City 10 years or less (25.0%) are more likely than residents who have lived in the City more than 10 years (12.1%) to indicate they **would not visit the museum**.
- Residents who rent their home (38.0%) are more likely than residents who own their home (14.3%) to indicate they **would not visit the museum**.

Respondents mention a variety of topics, themes, events, or services they would like to see the Elmhurst History Museum explore in future programs and exhibits, including the following

- History of Elmhurst/Local History (14.1%),
- Elmhurst Though the Decades (6.5%),
- Elmhurst Residents (6.0%),
- History of Elmhurst Businesses (5.5%),
- Programs for Children/Families (5.5%), and
- History of Specific Areas of Elmhurst (5.0%) (Table 8) (See Appendix C for verbatim comments).

When asked what is their most preferred way to learn about cultural arts/museum activities in Elmhurst. One-third (33.4%) of respondents comment they prefer multiple methods, including print publications (brochure, newsletter), the City of Elmhurst Front Porch newsletter, email blast, and social media. A total of 18.2% prefer print publications, 16.0% prefer the Front Porch

newsletter, 11.8% prefer email blast, and 11.8% prefer social media, with 9.3% preferring Facebook. Respondents 65 years of age or greater (25.7%) are more likely than respondents less than 65 years of age (13.1%) to prefer the Front Porch newsletter.

General Comments

At the end of the survey the respondents had the opportunity to write in additional comments.

The majority of respondents reiterated many of comments they had made earlier in the survey (See Appendix C for verbatim comments).

Conclusions and Recommendations

Almost all residents are satisfied with the City of Elmhurst as a place to live. The residents comment they like the schools, access to transportation, low crime rate, the parks and Park District, the location, and the appearance of the City.

The respondents believe the City government is doing a good job of providing the following services: police/public safety, fire and emergency medical. garbage pickup, and recycling. However, according to the respondents, neighborhood street maintenance and repair and stormwater management services need improvement. The City should improve the condition of street pavement and curb. Respondents comment that there are too many potholes and streets need to be repaved not just patched. Respondents comment that there are still areas of Elmhurst that flood.

Almost one-half of the respondents do not see the City of Elmhurst as a good place to retire. They mention the high cost of living, especially housing, and the lack of services and programs for seniors. The City should study this issue further.

The respondents believe that there is overbuilding in the City. They mention the number of new high-rises that have been built recently. They think the City should consider the consequences of continued building, such as traffic and not being able to provide services to an increased population.

Most respondents who contacted the City government in the past 12 months were satisfied with the customer service they received. They believe the staff were knowledgeable and courteous, and that the staff responded in a timely manner. The City government should continue to provide the current level of customer service.

Most respondents are satisfied with the job the City of Elmhurst is doing in communicating to residents. The City government should continue to provide information using a variety of communication methods.

Almost one-third of residents who have lived in the City less than five years report they do not receive information about the City government. The City should examine ways to communicate with new residents. One suggestion is to send residents information about all the methods the City uses to communicate with residents.

Most respondents rate the overall quality of community events in Elmhurst excellent or good. The City should continue to provide community events of a high quality level. Likelihood of visiting the Elmhurst History Museum is low. The museum should look at ways to increase the number

of residents that visit the museum.

Why are you dissatisfied with the business attraction and retention/economic development services?

All attention goes to downtown Elmhurst when it should be spread evenly around town. South of the Prairie Path and North of Roosevelt Road needs a lot more attention and resources to satisfy the higher population density on the South End of town. It would also alleviate downtown congestion.

All the new businesses seem to be dentist's offices :). Sorry but it would be great to have a Trader Joe's (I know, this one has been beaten to death).

Appears to be high business turnover within Elmhurst; would like more City support to keep business open during crisis times and to help them get back on their feet after a crisis.

As previously mentioned, the main drag (N. York Street) is only a one-way street, taking visitors out of the city instead of into the city. Also, the businesses aren't modern and interesting, so they don't bring people from other places -and- aren't that popular with local residents.

All this traffic in the downtown/railway corridor is only going to exacerbate the congestion. When trains are stuck for long periods of time, drivers are weaving through side streets. An underpass on West Avenue would alleviate some of this on the west side of town, but there needs to be other options if this many housing options are coming in. The amount of variances that are permitted for downtown new construction that do not comply with Elmhurst codes and standards. Several new buildings downtown do not comply, yet we're constructed out of cheap metal panels in lieu of brick and stone. It just looks cheap The city is becoming more like a HOA. House next to us has been "under construction" now for 4 years straight which seems to be a result of loose code enforcement and regulations compliance.

I have had multiple neighbors parking and leaving RVs in driveways hanging over the sidewalk on. to the apron for weeks at a time. These types of vehicles can only be parked for 3 days. Any vehicle blocking a sidewalk should be ticketed and nothing is done about this.

I live in Butterfield Towers, where there are health code violations everywhere! Filthy trash chutes, garage area, laundry room, elevators don't work, dark hallways & stairwells. I live next to a hoarder. Poor enforcement.

I read in various local sites about building codes being ignored, makes me think that the builder(s) is tight with City Council therefore getting special favor. I would like to think it doesn't happen, but I never read any rebuttal from city.

I think the grass cutting code is silly and not ecofriendly, we got a notice that our lawn was above 8 inches on May 9th. It had rained significantly, and the grass was too wet to mow. Our grass was not above 8 inches., besides May 9th is early in the season to mow. The city should adopt the No

Mow Til Mother's Day program which lets grass grow to increase natural pollinators and biodiversity. Westmont does this already

In my area, there are a number of cars that park and make the sidewalk unusable. This has been occurring for years, but no code is enforced. Surely this cannot be allowed.

I never received the information requested or feedback that it wasn't available.

I pay all my bills on time. The last water bill never arrived, and the city threatened to shut off my water for 30 days past due.

Inadequate effort made in attempt to locate perpetrator(s) of the crime. Unsatisfactory follow-up to our concerns over this incident.

Inquired reason for only 1 of 2 vehicle stickers arriving in mail. Individual didn't know and wasn't helpful.

Issue not satisfactorily resolved neighbor continues to be an issue.

Issue with air bnb property was not resolved. Do not want to live next to a property that has different people staying every weekend.

It takes too long to get a simple permit, and way too long to get a normal permit.

Limited response "Don't have enough staff, I'll see what I can do."

Never got an answer to my question

No one seemed to be empowered to act

No real response

No response to the problem

No return phone call or follow up

Not able to get information for planning change to deck

Not competent, rude on phone, got conflicting answers. Website poorly designed!

Not knowledgeable as to who I should contact for my situation

Person answering phone had no idea where to transfer me. I left several voicemail messages with different people and finally got a response from someone only to hear it's not their problem. I

pushed back for the city to handle it instead of an individual citizen.

Problem was resolved

Problems ongoing-not solved

Rude, could have saved me a lot of time by telling me I didn't need a permit instead of telling me to fill one out and then calling me back to tell me I didn't need one. Gee thanks.

Rude. Didn't seem to care about broken/dangerous sidewalk. No follow up

Should improve

Slow response time, too much red tape

Staff was nice; courteous, but the solution was out of their control.

Street director promised to clean up repairs. Did a lousy job of cleaning up mess made on parkway and our driveway.

Supervisor was off, subordinate could not handle

Talking to people was fine, their follow up on the issue at hand was poor.

The city staff employee was fine. My disgust was with the elected (and non-elected **[NAME REMOVED]**) people on the planning and zoning boards.

The person insisted on us doing extra above code just because they said so.

The sidewalk "repair" was only a patch to temporarily "fix" the problem. It looks lousy and the overall appearance of the sidewalk lining our street needs to be entirely redone

The woman took our information, but nothing got done. She certainly did not treat us with good customer service. I felt like she was annoyed that I bothered her. Only got sidewalk repaired (it was a tripping hazard) when my alderman noticed and contacted the office. It was fixed within one week. While grateful that it was fixed, I felt like I was just an ordinary citizen and the office woman felt it was okay to ignore me. We pay a lot in taxes we shouldn't have to get politicians to assist for basic needs

These people always act like you are bothering them. They are just plain rude.

Took 2 months to resolve. It seems they hoped I would give up and stop calling.

Took me calling three different times to find a person who could actually help me exchange my trash can for a smaller one. The first two didn't really know what to do and while they said they contacted the trash company; nothing was ever done. The third time it was done properly and quickly.

Took months for problem to be resolved

Tried to get info about shed setbacks. Never received a call back. Had to go in person to city hall to confirm the answers. Staff appeared bothered by my questions.

Verbal abuse from a police officer. Very unprofessional.

We are moving-got a call from City Hall that we had an open file for an inspection for work doneover 1 year ago. We emailed the coy the inspector gave us, but Elmhurst never had it in their file. Went in person for answers to my questions and felt very unsatisfied with front desk.

Why are you dissatisfied with the job the City of Elmhurst does in providing information to residents?

Because I like to know crime, accidents, and what's going on in neighborhood online-it's not provided!

Because I'd like to know more about what is going on. Not everyone on Facebook.

Could use more information on police activities. Hiding real estate deals until the Patch gets ahold of it.

Didn't know of all the options and haven't heard much from the city.

Elmhurst provides a lot of information to its residence, but not necessarily the information desired.

Everything is political.

I didn't know about the different options to learn about what is going on.

In today's world the social media and websites are probably where most people get their information. Newspapers do not go into detail anymore, so a reliable website would be a good way to get accurate information.

In today's world you need someone dedicated to posting on social media to keep us all updated and informed.

Keep residents informed of crimes committed like our neighboring suburb.

More information should be available for upcoming projects and events.

 Main sidewalk to Conrad Fischer School is very narrow. When passing another person, I have to step into grass area (Wilson St. -> from Conrad Fischer to Victory Parkway intersection.)
 The city needs to regulate the footprint of new houses being built and the fact that the builders raise the grade of the lot the house will be on. Both factors contribute to flooding in existing residential lots with no concern for a remedy by the city. We have a lot of expendable income to spend in Elmhurst (seniors.) Find ourselves going to Cook County restaurants for COVID safety protocols and Morton Arboretum to walk. Don't you dare close one of the two pools or the history museum. I was born and raised here and am so incredibly lucky that I was able to move here after college. However, if this cost-ofliving issue is not addressed I am going to be a unicorn and one of the last to be able to do this. We need to fix this cost-of-living issue. Otherwise, we will become less and less diverse and less sustainable and once it hits its breaking point this city fabric and all that makes it great WILL fall apart fast. Rich people will move in, get bored and move out and the city will be neglected and without identity because there won't be families that have roots here to care for it and love it. I love urban planning. The key here is not more development in our parks or "unused" land but in the right kinds of development. We can't keep turning 2 houses that held 8-12 people into homes with 1-3 people. Elmhurst is a diamond in the rough in the United States. Layouts like this are not made anymore, even though they really need to be. Don't let a place like this fall apart by letting it be filled up with only mansions. People don't need that much freaking space. We need better multifamily housing (split levels and granny flats) that don't cost more than most houses to move into.

Elmhurst is a great community with good schools, mostly nice people, and a great geographic location with proximity to Chicago and major highways and tollways. Elmhurst could do more to encourage efforts to support the environment, like solar energy and composting. Elmhurst should do more to improve the York and Vallette business district with restaurants and building improvements. Please focus on keeping ample convenience free parking so residents can support local businesses. Keep offering free entertainment like concerts. The free trolley is nice Elmhurst should continue to prioritize safety of residents to prevent gun violence, burglaries, carjackings, and hate crimes.

Elmhurst is a great place to live and raise a family. We have been residents for over 35 years. We love the eclectic neighborhoods and convenient location to Chicago and the suburbs. The parks, schools, downtown, hospital, college are all pluses. We are concerned about the amount of apartment buildings going up in the downtown area. We love Elmhurst it has a Glen Ellyn/Hinsdale feel, not an Oak Park "City" feel. Parking is difficult, traffic is terrible, and the apartments are contributing to these issues. Also, the property taxes have tripled on our home, and we can no longer afford to retire in Elmhurst. The town is losing most residents our age due to excessive property taxes; they are out of hand.

Elmhurst is a great place to live,

Elmhurst is a great town to live in and raise a family. Keep the downtown area thriving Elmhurst is a nice town but needs to continue to grow and expand to meet the needs of residents. It also doesn't have a particularly inviting image to those outside the area. Hinsdale and LaGrange seem to have a better image.

Elmhurst is an ok place to live. Need more senior available resources because overall population getting older. Due to cost of living here and taxes it's pushing the older families out. Elmhurst is extremely livable and a wonderful community. However, I worry about it becoming homogenized and losing its character. Housing is an issue. New houses look the same. Many are ostentatious and have no sense of scale relative to lot sizes. Elmhurst should be concerned about how to attract the kind of people that will support diversity, sustainability, and social justice. Elmhurst is good but could be great. More attention to downtown development. A chain restaurant would not hurt. Also, too many gyms, hair salons, yoga places.

Elmhurst is great-the downtown has a good mix of businesses and restaurants/entertainment. The downtown, especially around food/restaurants, need to be cleaned regularly. The proposed 9-story condo building on York Street between 2nd and 3rd will stick out and negatively impact the character of the downtown. It will set a bad precedent, which will be hard to undo. York should be lower buildings consistently and focus on business and restaurant use.

Elmhurst is not for empty nesters, retirees, or seniors. New construction has created traffic congestion, stormwater problems, overcrowded schools, and overabundance of huge houses on small lots. The city lets the contractors get away with anything. Taxes are through the roof with school building. Doesn't make sense to live here if you don't have children attending schools. The traffic is obscene down York Rd. I can get to Lombard and Villa Park faster than north Elmhurst! Bunch of snobby wannabe Hinsdale people! So Elmhurst wants the small houses gone! Elmhurst is pricing out most seniors that have lived here for years. Taxes skyrocketing and housing stock limited. New homes most above \$1 million. Downtown area going upward (height wise) and even condos >\$700,000. North areas of Elmhurst are neglected compared to south. Crime is worse, but not city's fault. Need to patrol neighborhoods more than currently doing. Elmhurst is still a nice city to live in but can always improve.

Elmhurst used to be a nice and safe place to live. However, for the past 5 years, it has been changing and not for the b4etter. Soon, it will be as bad as Chicago. The new mural on the Elmhurst College building facing the Union Pacific west railroad tracks is an eyesore. I sure hope it's temporary. It really makes Elmhurst look like a trashy place to live. Elmhurst is similar in many ways, as in the community feel, beauty, and schools. It's an easy city to transition to, with everything being so close and accessible. Feels like home here. My son and grandchildren are here, hence the move. Thanks for including me in this survey. I may not be the best source, since I've only been here 4 years.

Have lived in Elmhurst over 50 years. Children born, raised, educated in Elmhurst and they are responsible adults.

I am not a disgruntled old lady. I am highly concerned about how elitist Elmhurst has become. Part of this problem is a matter of teardowns. How many houses that come on the market are bought by builders instead of individuals? Most of the home on my street (Colfax) are still standing and could be sold to first time home buyers with middle class incomes? Want to bet on how many of them are still here in five years? Sad.

I am so glad this survey is finally over!

I appreciate Elmhurst's attempts to embrace flora, it is even in the logo. As my answers show (I hope), there should be more available to the public here in Elmhurst, forums for people to decide what "community" is, gardens to provide a place where food self-reliance is real, and social programs where skilled workers can host events where people can learn new skills.

I appreciate these efforts to promote Elmhurst as a good place to live. My choice to move here 52 years ago was a best choice. RJB (Respondent attached his business card to survey, number 22) I believe a strong community encompasses an open, fluid relationship between the city government, the school district, and the park district. All three entities must be in harmony in order for Elmhurst to be the best it can me.

I did not know about "city weekly e-newsletter" so I went online to try to sign up. The first 2 tires landed on a page that was malformed. On my 3rd try, I was able to sign up. It did not say it would be weekly. One of the places I tried described it as monthly, but that went to a bad page anyway. I don't like how we are giving money away to businesses (unless its in a TIF district), but all in all, I love Elmhurst. I have ancestors who were some of the original employees of the store quarry in the 1880s, who were greenskeepers at the old Elmhurst golf club, and other ancestors who started the Cottage Hill Cafe in 1929 on First Street and then Stevens Steak House in the 1950s. Elmhurst is home to me. I'm not a fan of how much real estate taxes keep going up because that means I'd be an idiot to retire here on a fixed income. My kids might not be able to afford to raise their families in Elmhurst either. I also wish our city leaders cared more about the residents than they did about their resumes.

I feel like the north side is neglected a bit. Our mayor and city council care more about downtown and the southside. It has become very expensive to live in Elmhurst. At the same time, violent crimes is on the rise. We also need a better contract for the garbage. There is no reason for the expensive yard waste sticker and extra can stickers. Many other cities eliminated vehicle sticker and Elmhurst should too. I find it very unprofessional to ask how much a person makes

I have been concerned for many years that the footprint of the new homes does not allow for groundwater to be absorbed. Therefore, all downspouts and sump pump discharge should go into a retention tank beneath their driveway to be held and released after the rainfall. Currently the residential downspouts and sump pumps enter the storm sewer system within seconds during a rainstorm.

I have been in my home for over 50 years. I really love Elmhurst. I originally moved here because my brother lived in area. Also, my husband was a realtor, which was to our benefit! Also, great place to raise children. Now some of my grandkids live in Elmhurst and are getting a great education as well as great opportunities for extra activities. In fact, my 10 year old granddaughter was just given an exemplary youth service award, and she is only in fifth grade.

I have lived in Elmhurst for 70 years. I am dismayed by 2 developments: 1) Building megamansions on lots that are too small and infringing on existing neighborhoods. 2) Destruction of downtown area by building oversized apartment and condo buildings that don't fit and are not attractive. Traffic congestion on York Street gets even worse and cannot be widened. Recycling is available for most everything but paper, especially confidential papers. Please provide this service.

I have lived in Elmhurst for many years. I have seen parts of the area go from country to more city. I find it a good place to raise a family and retire. Neighbors are important. Elmhurst is a caring community. Elmhurst offers many options for families and individuals. The Elmhurst bike paths, parks, museums, and outdoor parks and enjoyed by all. I love Elmhurst, but it seems that it headed in a direction that focuses too much on how we can increase revenue when it should be how can we make Elmhurst the best place for our residents to live.

I love Elmhurst. I can't imagine living and raising my family anywhere else. Politics are very good here. We work through disagreements, may argue a bit, but it's all for the best to be the best city Elmhurst can be. Parks are wonderful. Churches are active and vital. Neighborhoods need to be more connected and human to each other. Happy to walk in neighborhood safely and feel the freedoms of this town and country we live.

I love living in Elmhurst.

I love living in Elmhurst. It really has been a lovely community to raise a family in. I wish the downtown area was a bit more attractive and a bit better utilized; I also wish that police would care a bit more about speeding on my street during certain hours, not just the "wealthier" areas like Vallettte street. Also, I wish that the sidewalks would be better maintained as things are cracking all over the place (I live in Bryn Haven). Overall, though, we have truly loved living in this town.

I paid over \$6,000.00 for a new blacktop driveway. A few months later, the village tore up my new apron to put in new curbs. Instead of replacing the entire apron, they only replaced half of it, so now I have weeds growing up between the two sections, plus they voided my warranty by doing so. After putting in new curbs, the snowplow driver took out a big chunk of the new curb with his plow. it looks worse now than it ever did. So basically, my new driveway was ruined for nothing. I also don't know why they made the intersection of Commonwealth and Butterfield left turn on arrow only. When the light is green, you should be able to turn onto Butterfield. Total waste of time and gas to wait for the arrow without a car in sight.

I think Elmhurst is building too many apartment buildings and it bothers me a lot that we must pay extra for extra yard waste and garbage pickup when we pay more taxes then surrounding towns with lower taxes that didn't have to pay. City stickers included also.

I think property values are concern of Elmhurst citizens, and Elmhurst citizens do not welcome diversity or welcome any events that might bring minorities to town. Ordinances are too stricte.g., no chickens in backyard. Elmhurst schools want to turn out students who reflect parental values-not students who love thinking and learning. City services are good, people feel safe. Elmhurst citizens for the most part like ambience of the town.

I think that Elmhurst is a good suburb, but the reason I moved here was the town look and feel. The building that is going on in and around the town have changed that. I think they should limit the amount of permits to build these giant homes in the neighborhoods. They make the taxes escalate for anyone with a moderate sized home.

I think the city has great schools and is aesthetically lovely. It needs to focus on its soul. Where do we want to be in the fight for climate change, health equity, social justice, and education? We need to be leaders in implementing alternative energy, inclusive programs, promoting business safety in the context of COVID, and protecting our children from hate. This means not banning books in schools, promoting school and community mental health programs, restricting the militarization of our police and instead funding social services and ensuring we promote racial, ethnic, and socioeconomic diversity in our town. This all requires creativity, open-mindedness, and competent administration.

I think the police are overzealous on issues that do not post significant risk to the general public and are more nuisance in fractions. I would prefer that they spend more time and energy on keeping our town a safe place to live and preventing theft

I truly think that adding racial and economic diversity in Elmhurst (both in terms of residents and businesses) is vital to keeping the city attractive to newcomers in the coming years. It looks stale and dated as is -- like an out-of-touch relic.

I would like to see a "no left turn" sign going south on Prospect and Cottage Hill at the St. Charles intersection during rush hours. Good job overall.

I would like to see an actual investigation of the police leadership. I have read articles and think the city isn't being responsive or responsible with our tax dollars. Also, from what I hear, we are having a hard time recruiting police. Perhaps this is due to the reputations of the police leadership. I would also like to see more money invested in our town-especially in indoor sports centers/pools and performing arts center. We have a lot of tax dollars, and the community should be benefitting. Also, we need to stop allowing large/oversized houses to be built on small lots. Small underground water storage and a fine paid isn't forward thinking. We need to plan for the next 50-100 years, not be short sighted.

I would like to see center medians with plantings on Third and West Ave. and on Second and West Ave. Traffic has become deplorable! I've lived in Elmhurst going on 53 years. Born, raised, and live on the property I grew up on. Love this town. Graduate of York and Elmhurst College.

If laws or codes are going to be ignored, do away with them.

It is a shame to have lived in Elmhurst most of my life but have to move when retired due to tax burden.

It seems like Elmhurst still operates under certain rules and restrictions from the past. It would be beneficial for it to consider modernizing some of those restrictions to allow for growth of businesses and attract the influx of varying families that are looking to move to the suburbs from the city. Consider opening a children's museum in addition to the WIP performance arts center. Lower taxes, tell the snowplow people to stop blocking my driveway, and build bridges over railroad tracks in the downtown area. Finally lower taxes once again.

Move forward and respect the past. Listen to feedback and apply it. Don't ask for it and ignore it .Do not let the train station look like it doesn't belong. Look at Glen Ellyn and Hinsdale. Don't misstep like the Marke again

My biggest complaint with the city is poor street maintenance and no salt in winter. My street (200 block of North Clinton) is worse than a parking lot paved with speed bumps due to every other house getting knocked down and rebuilt with mansions. The builders do cuts for water, sewer, and gas that leave the street like a minefield. n the winter, go for a drive across the 290 in Berkeley a few hours after a big snow. For a town with far less resources, Berkeley seems to find a way to add salt and make roads passable, whereas Elmhurst secondary streets are skating rinks. My other concern is with all the new homes, the tax collections double or triple. My entire street is practically rebuilt. With an average increase of 10-15k per home, why is my street pavement so horrendous? What is the town doing with all the extra revenue?

My comments currently are jaded by a bad neighbor. Disappointed that city was unable to rectify situation.

My husband and I do not like at all what is happening in the downtown area. The new buildings are monstrous. They are way too big, ugly architecture. The zoning committee does not care at all about the concerns of people who actually live in this town. Objecting does absolutely no good. What about the people on Hoven Street who are now going to be looking at a huge brick wall. What about the people on Eggleston who now have to endure Roberto's parking lot. And what about the people on Addison Street in the development that was called Fountain Square because they were supposed to be looking at green space with a fountain not looking out their living room windows at an ugly condo building instead.

My wife and I have lived here in the same house 52 years! We raised our two adopted Korean boys in this house. We love the schools, the parks and recreation opportunities (such as courts and the excellent public library), access to major highways and public transportation (Metra), feeling safe when walking on the streets (sidewalks), access to good shopping-a lot to like about Elmhurst! Elmhurst Symphony-outstanding! We don't enjoy so many huge, lot-filling houses going up where some older but still good homes were before-a new house next to us is only about 10 feet from ours, blocking some of our light and exposure. Thankfully the family who lives there are very neighborly and have become a real asset to the neighborhood as well. We enjoy watching their three children grow and develop!

Need more senior services and explanation of services on paper (Note: Do not have a computer).

No performing arts center at the proposed center of town location! Terrible location for a performing arts venue. Do not support performing arts at the location on 1st St. Full support of our police and fire departments.

No sidewalks in my area is dangerous. I live next to a park. Park draining water on my property causes flooding and danger because in a heavy rain no emergency vehicles can get to my house. Most of Elmhurst has sidewalks. Why is Ward 3 neglected.

On weekend nights, the music blaring from cars on North Avenue is very loud. It's probably impossible to stop, but thought I'd mention it. It would be nice to have a Michael's Arts and Crafts store in Elmhurst.

One of the great parts of Elmhurst is that it is affordable for all people regardless of income. It's best when it's not an elitist community such as Hinsdale and anyone can afford to live here. Find more ways to reduce the property tax burden that has skyrocketed and forced out too many good, hard-working, blue-collar people.

Our only real complaint is speeders with damaged/missing mufflers. During construction, dirt, speeding on Addison is a significant problem.

Overall Elmhurst is a great place to live and raise a family. Our location is in the center of almost everything. If I have a concern, it is the changing political landscape of our county and the crime that is moving into our community from Chicago.

Overall, the city does a great job. A few tweaks to some services (Park District) would go a long way.

Police-Fire Department: outstanding in concern and care. Prompt (fast) to help. City service is outstanding and do their best to help. Most concerned and caring. Property owners take pride (care) about how their home looks. Elmhurst is a good place to live. I've raised our family in Elmhurst and both our daughters are doing well. One daughter had 3 boys. One a West Point grad. One with a PHD from yale and one an actuary. Our other daughter has been a store manager for Home Depot, Michaels, Lowes, and now CEO for Lowes. Elmhurst has good schools, outstanding fire department and police department. You feel safe walking and at the park. Real estate taxes too high. City government too large. School district too wasteful.

Roads need a lot of work. Need to work to regulate freight rail traffic. Too much, too often and loud. Add restaurants, shops and entertainment. Follow what Evanston is doing in this respect. Sell water department and allocate those resources elsewhere

Seniors should be assessed different from families with kids. They use the schools. We should pay as well, but at a lower rate. If not, provide health club facilities at no charge in exchange for all we pay for schools we don't use.

Should improve

Sidewalk water, the stretch of sidewalk in front of our house fills quickly with an extensive pool of water any time it rains a fair amount. Pedestrians have to walk around it. This can last for hours, even into the next day. We have contacted the city about this more than once, but it has not been palpably mitigated. Problem existed when we moved here in 2004 and still does. Re #27 [Amount of information provided by City services]: the issue is not only the amount of information but timeliness as well (for future reference in survey construction. The evolution of Elmhurst, especially the replacement of older homes by larger homes that blot out most of their yards, and scale and look of the downtown build-up, have to my mind made the town less desirable to live in. Construction of rental townhomes directly across from us, with destruction of a decent wooded area-and more of the same to come in the next year or two-has had the same effect for me. Also, loss of wildlife habitat in the area as a result.

Suggestion: 1) County clean at 290/294 ramp entrance/exit. Looks so bad entering North Avenue into Elmhurst. Trash, etc., bushes. Bad entry area. 2) Love Elmhurst. Taxes keep going up and going up. Sad.

Taxes are terrible. New constructions are treated like residents and residents are treated like pests. Landscapers are like hells angels blocking streets corners, fire hydrants. Working early or late or several hours in one location.

The aldermen in our ward are underwhelming.

The biggest driver of property values in Elmhurst is public school quality. This quality is going downhill. The school board should be asked quarterly what they are doing to improve student outcomes and not be Oak Park or Lyons Township idiocy. The library seems to do a lot of meaningless programming. More local meeting/event space for residents to use or access would be appreciated. Love the police meet and greets in the neighborhood. Include fire as well? The city does a fine job providing services for our residents. My only wish is that our spring cleanup date would fall in May not April or it be scheduled in the fall September or October. We used to have a cleanup day in both spring and fall.

The city is well managed. We would like to see hoop houses become acceptable for those who want to garden with them. The Schiller Parking Deck stairwells are very dirty and need power washing.

The city of Elmhurst is a wonderful place to live. Unfortunately, on a fixed income, the tax burden is too high. Police, fire, and paramedic are all outstanding. The city hall staff is exceptional. The people who plow the streets are just phenomenal.

The city staff is great. Our public works dept is excellent. Our police dept is the best.

The differing tax rates across Elmhurst is unfair and doesn't make sense. Even though I live here, I do not recommend Elmhurst to friends and co-workers moving to Illinois

The parks are one of the greatest features in Elmhurst. I'd like to commend the park district management. They are well maintained and regularly updated as needed. Use them all the time! Could offer a better discount for seniors at Courts Plus! Really wish there was more racial and economic diversity.

Too many new buildings over 4 stories has detrimentally changed the character of the Downtown shopping district. New business license for banks and hair stylists should issued. Too many already that reduce sales tax income. Sell weed instead.

types of stores in downtown; too much same; not enough variety. Elmhurst is a wealthy community, yet no shops such as high-end chocolatier (not Kilwins; a chain); bread/sweets

bakery. I miss these types of stores I can just walk to. The entire downtown, with the exception of the restaurants, are nail spas, health gyms. Not enough interesting like gelato shop; gourmet chocolates; fresh baguettes/bakery. Too much same, same. Let's attract some new and interesting vendors!

Very disappointed in construction, both downtown and residential. Too many high-rise multi-unit buildings-what happened to green space around residential homes? What happened to height limitations on buildings-zoning changes to accommodate developers?

We chose to move to Elmhurst when we were having our first child 43 years ago. My husband grew up in Oak Park, but we fell in love with Elmhurst for its green space and small-town feel. Our kids could walk to the movies on their own safely and everyone kept an eye on everyone's kids. We are so sad to see the loss of lawns and sunlight to mega-mansions and the high-rise apartments with a transient population who have no incentive to invest in our town. You cannot drive around town between 3-6 PM. The Hagans Avenue development project was the final straw-allowing outside developers to skew "front + side" definitions to the detriment of the town is disingenuous. We thought the 2016 downtown plan was to prevent monstrosities after the Elmhurst Place Apartments were built.

We have lived in Elmhurst over 30 years and have seen many changes. It is important to maintain a mix of affordable housing, including rental, condos/townhomes and single-family homes for all levels of income. I don't want to see Elmhurst become a rich people's town. Elmhurst is a great location. Its challenge is maintaining a sense of community, limiting congestion and overbuilding, and keeping the trees!

We love Elmhurst! We have safety concerns regarding recent thefts. We appreciate the police department and its vigilance. The emergency (ambulance) services are outstanding. The library is the star of Elmhurst.

We love living in Elmhurst. We just don't want to see it lose its charm by overdeveloping and driving / pricing out ordinary folks.

We need more EV fast charging stations.

We need more museums to replace the Lizzadro. I would love to see even more family-owned businesses downtown. Elmhurst really needs a European bakery/cafe—not a chain like Panera Buildings that are in bad shape, like the one next to Edible Arrangements should be revived or town down at owners' expenses. A wider variety of restaurants would be attractive: Indian, Middle Eastern, Greek, Scandinavian. How could more interesting stores be attracted to Elmhurst: antique store, gift shops? We need a bed and breakfast or hotel. I've spoken to many people who would like to see a Trader Joe's in Elmhurst. Create permanent outdoor seating areas and wider sidewalks downtown; the orange plastic barriers are not very pretty. Have more outdoor art installations. Example: the installation by the Marke is very nice. Need more like this. Elmhurst could steal some ideas from Carmel, Indiana to attract visitors."

We need to maintain our conservative roots. The community used to have a very strong faith base. We need to get back to that and be proud of it.

We should bring back the 4th of July parade.

We would answer this survey much differently pre-COVID, pre-teardown of hospital and neighbor houses. Pre-teardown of York High, Hawthorne, and Lincoln Schools. Don't like the move to make downtown more like Oak Park. Don't like tall building, traffic they bring and darker downtown. Especially hate view from passenger train of downtown featuring Beerhead and other less quaint businesses. Dislike the no parking areas by restaurants-due to COVID, less safe sidewalks, less safe parking garages. If I wanted to live in a town like Oak Park, I would have bought there. Dislike ruined streets from teardown and rebuild of houses-especially on my street now. Husband pressing to move out of Elmhurst after over 70 years living here!

We would like for Park District to offer more picnic areas that have electricity and shelter areas to be cleaner and tables not chained down. Also-Aurora, Naperville, Plainfield, all have huge facilities to go walk, exercise, sign up for fitness classes, teams, volleyball, basketball, pickleball etc. Berens Park sand volleyball nets should offer teams that can have friendly weekly tournaments like neighboring Berkley and Naperville do.

We would like to see better enforcement of the 4-way stop at Madison and York. We rarely are in the city center except for visits to the library and post office. We are still not eating in restaurants and don't shop at boutiques in town, so it is hard to rate city center.

When I moved to Elmhurst in 1978 the city recommended using a water softener. Since that time the quality of water has failed to improv on a sustained basis. Buildup is often visible on faucets and shower heads, and anyone with a sense of taste and smell feels compelled to buy bottled water. Per the city's own website, the level of water hardness exceeds the USGS limits that distinguishes hard and soft water. For all the tax money we pay it's incredible that the city fails in this most basic matter.

When we first moved in, the parkway outside of our home was well-maintain lawn. The city had to make repairs (sewer? gas?). After the repairs, their repair of the parkway was abysmal. They did not use enough dirt, so the level is now lower than the curb. They used grass seed that was loaded with weed seed. Parkway now looks awful and is a poor visual to people entering downtown Elmhurst. In addition, it makes it difficult to place our garbage cans there as the terrain is uneven and, when wet, it is a virtual mud pit. If the city cannot afford to replace the parkway to its original condition, they should just brick it in, as right now it looks terrible. While we don't take advantage of all the Elmhurst has to offer, we are glad to know what's out there if we need it.

Why do you allow Dulles Cleaners to monitor that 10-minute parking spot and call the police on days and times that the store is not even open?? and allow him to call the police?

Will elaborate on streets. On all streets there is parking on both sides of the street and when you drive down and someone is coming from the other direction, if there is no place to park, you must back down the street. Especially Second and Third Avenue. The school busses have trouble getting down the streets, too!

Would be great if Elmhurst offered activities for adults aged 65+.. Not everyone retires and gets older and does nothing. Staying active and learning how challenges keeps us health, not drugs from doctors because a person does nothing to be creative, strong etc.

Would like to see more police patrolling speeds by Eldridge Park. Lots of speeding down spring road.

Would like to see Trader Joe's move into the city limits.
