Executive Summary

Mr. James Grabowski, City Manager City of Elmhurst

On behalf of the Elmhurst Police Department, I am pleased to present our 2022 Annual Report, which contains current information about the many services we provide to the City of Elmhurst and its residents. The Police Department continues to emphasize our community policing initiatives, and we have included information and photos from the many outreach programs and events demonstrating that focus. In addition, we have an updated statistical section summarizing important data and emerging trends that were identified and tracked during the year.

In 2022, our violent crime rate fell by 33% and our property crime rate increased by 27% compared to 2021. All Elmhurst UCR crime categories fell in 2022 with the exception of the Theft category. We experienced a 20% increase in total UCR crime in 2022 compared to a historically low year in 2021, but levels were still marginally lower than in 2020 and 2019. Over the course of the year, Elmhurst police officers responded to 40,875 calls for service consisting of 18,800 (9-1-1) calls and 22,075 officer-initiated activities. Traffic crashes reported in 2022 rose to 1,307 from 1,256 reported in 2021 but remained well below the pre-pandemic level of 1,717 reported in 2019. Department use of force incidents remained low with 12 occurring in the 40,875 total incidents during the year, an occurrence rate of .0003%, all determined to be within policy.

2022 was a year of significant transition for the Elmhurst Police Department with the passing of Chief Michael Ruth in May and my appointment to Chief of Police in September. Other leadership positions were filled with the promotions of James Gandy to Deputy Chief; Matthew Himpelmann, Steven Mandat, and Matthew McCollum to Commander; and Daniel Bishop & Dorian Jarrette to Sergeant. Our Field Training Officers were active in preparing the next generation of officers to serve our community: 8 full-time police officers, 1 part-time police officer, and 2 community service officers were field-trained during the year. The department also employed two summer traffic safety interns as part of our new Traffic Safety Team Program. Commanders Himpelmann & McCollum and Sergeants Bruckner & Schweik were recognized by Northwestern Center for Public Safety with Executive Leadership Awards for completing all police supervisory courses offered within their program. The Elmhurst Police Department continued to strive for community outreach opportunities by holding a fall session of our Citizen's Police Academy, a Community Public Safety Night event, and reactivating the DARE and Seniors and Law Enforcement Together (SALT) programs after their pandemic pauses. Our award-winning Neighborhood Roll Call program saw just under 1,000 residents in attendance over the summer.

The Elmhurst Police Department remains committed to service and excellence. I would like to extend my personal appreciation to you, Mayor Scott Levin, the members of the City Council, the employees of the Elmhurst Police Department and, most importantly, our residents for their continued support of the professional services we provide to our community.



Office of the Chief


The Elmhurst Police Department is led by **Chief Michael McLean**, who was promoted to Chief of Police in September of 2022 after the unexpected passing of Chief Michael Ruth. Chief McLean rose through the ranks of the Elmhurst Police since being sworn in January of 2000. Rounding out the Executive Management team are **Deputy Chief Brett Kaczorowski**, currently assigned as DC of Investigations & Administration, and **Deputy Chief James Gandy**, who leads the Operations Division since his promotion to DC in November of 2022.

Administrative support services are provided by Jami Carrington, Administrative Assistant to the Chief of Police, and Kerri Chambers, Administrative Assistant to the Deputy Chiefs.



Sergeant Matthew Himpelmann was assigned as the Administrative Sergeant until his promotion to Day Shift Commander in November; Sergeant Steve Mandat was promoted to Night Shift Commander, Sergeant Matthew McCollum was promoted to Detective Commander, and Sergeant Guy Schweik was assigned as the new Administrative Sergeant.

Internal Affairs

To maintain the highest level of public confidence, the Elmhurst Police Department investigates all complaints thoroughly and impartially. In addition, Internal Affairs investigates any instances of employee conduct that could discredit the department or violate policies or procedures. Complaints are presented to the Office of the Chief of Police for a fair review and appropriate action and/or sanction, taking into consideration the complainant, the department, the individual employee and the public trust.

Source of Complaints: Citizen Complaints or Police Agency Complaints

Disposition of Complaints:

Unfounded — The allegation is not factual and/or did not happen as reported.

Exonerated — The officer or the department acted consistently to agency procedures.

Sustained — The allegation is supported by sufficient evidence.

Not Sustained — The evidence is insufficient to prove or disprove the allegation.

In 2022, the Elmhurst Police Department conducted 57 administrative Internal Affairs investigations of which 49 were initiated internally and 8 externally. The internal investigations consisted of Use of Force, Vehicle Pursuits and policy infractions such as squad or equipment damage. All infractions were reviewed and handled with appropriate action ranging from corrective conference to written reprimand or, in some cases, suspension. The external investigations involved 8 citizen complaints against members of the department; upon review, 8 were determined to be unfounded or not sustained.

Elmhurst officers handled approximately 41,000 incidents last year involving citizen contacts, traffic violations, and criminal activity. Of those incidents only .0002% of contacts resulted in a citizen complaint. Officers needed to use force to effect an arrest only .0003% of the time, and each of the 12 Use of Force incidents was found to be within department policy. Elmhurst Officers also conducted approximately 7,400 traffic stops with 6 reported incidents of vehicle pursuit. In 2022, there were 84 reported vehicles that fled from Elmhurst Police Officers.



Police Operations

Patrol

The uniformed Patrol Division is the backbone of any Police Department. Patrol Officers are responsible for protecting life and property while enforcing the Illinois Criminal Code, traffic laws, and city ordinances. Patrol Officers respond to 9-1-1 calls for service from the public—both emergency and non-emergency—and conduct preliminary investigations of crimes when called to the scene. They proactively address community concerns and help maintain order and safety for all.

In order to provide continuous, 24-hour police service, the Patrol Division is divided into four teams working a 12-hour shift schedule. Officers are assigned to Day, Night, and Power shifts (which provides coverage for the evening shift change and adds back-up for the busier afternoon/evening hours). Each team operates under the supervision of a Sergeant and a Watch Commander and is supplemented by a unit of ten part-time officers. Traditional patrol units are also supplemented with officers trained for specialized functions such as Traffic Unit Officers, Evidence Technicians, Field Training Officers, a K-9 Officer, and Community Service Officers.

In 2022, Elmhurst Patrol Officers responded to approximately 41,000 calls for service which included criminal incidents, traffic crashes, burglar alarm activations, public disturbances, and a wide variety of other events.





Investigations

The Investigations division is made up of five Detectives, a Crime Analyst, two part-time Background Investigators, two School Resource Officers, one Task Force Officer assigned to the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), and an Evidence Custodian. The unit is supervised by a Detective Commander.

In 2022, Elmhurst Investigators conducted 263 criminal investigations. Cases are assigned by an area of specialty or by on-call status as Investigators are subject to call-in 24/7, as needed. Members of the division also work with outside agencies to assist on more serious or complex cases. Two Elmhurst Detectives are part of the Metropolitan Emergency Response and Investigation Team (MERIT), which pools resources from different departments to investigate the most serious crimes in DuPage County. Elmhurst Detectives also assist our Background Investigators in conducting background checks on City police and firefighter applicants.

Crime Analyst

The Crime Analyst provides investigative assistance by developing information from a number of law enforcement resources. By analyzing crime trends and patterns, the Analyst is able to develop statistical probabilities on where and when the next crime in a series may occur, helping to develop leads, apprehend criminals and close cases.


Task Force Officer

One Elmhurst Task Force Officer is assigned to the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) to assist with the investigation of drug-related offenses throughout the Chicago area and the greater Midwest. In 2022, the Task Force recovered almost 2 million dollars in illicitly obtained currency and financial instruments as well as 356 kgs of cocaine, 75 kgs of heroin, 9.5 kgs of fentanyl, and 13.4 kgs of illegal cannabis.



Evidence Custodian

The Evidence Custodian collects and maintains all property submitted into Evidence. The Police Department has more than 19,000 items of evidence housed in the Property Room, the exterior Evidence area, and bicycle storage area. In 2022, there were 4,841 items of property received into the Property Room either as Evidence or Found Property. 187 items of evidence were returned to identifiable owners, 366 items were transferred to the DuPage County or State Police Crime Laboratories for analysis and processing, 207 items were appropriately destroyed, 43 items were auctioned in accordance with applicable laws regarding disposal of found or relinquished property, and 31 items were donated to an approved not-for-profit organization. In addition, over 700 items of digital evidence were prepared for the State's Attorney's Office, the City Attorney's Office and/or as a result of a Freedom of Information Act request.



School Resource Officers

School Resource Officers (SROs) are detectives assigned to liaison with our local schools. The SROs respond to calls for service at the schools and conduct criminal investigations when needed in addition to conducting safety checks at the schools to maintain security. One SRO is assigned to York High School and one SRO services the middle schools. Both SROs service the elementary, private and parochial schools upon request.

Background Investigators

Background Investigators complete thorough background checks on all police and fire candidates and screen City applicants for sensitive positions. They also complete backgrounds on businesses requesting a liquor license or massage permit, applicants for solicitor permits, and organizations applying for raffle permits. In 2022, the civilian Background Investigators completed a total of 95 background investigations.

Administrative Services/Records

The Records Division is a critical support function of the Elmhurst Police Department. The Records Division coordinates the Department's records retention program and is responsible for compiling, maintaining and disseminating copies of Department records concerning crimes, arrests, and traffic accidents to law enforcement agencies, authorized outside agencies, and citizens.

In addition to providing assistance to the public, the Records Division is also responsible for a variety of complex and confidential administrative duties for the Police Department, some of which include:

- Maintaining and processing all citations, offense/incident reports, and accident reports in the Department's records management system
- Providing the State's Attorney and City Attorney's Office with crime reports for purposes of prosecution
- Reporting NIBRS crime statistics to the FBI and UCR crime statistics to the State of Illinois
- Preparing statistical reports
- Fulfilling Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) requests
- Processing petitions, seals, and orders of expungement
- Conducting background checks
- Entering sex offender registrations
- Forwarding study data on traffic stops to the Illinois Department of Transportation
- Receiving and processing court notifications to the officers
- Recording and invoicing alarm activations
- Processing warrants and subpoenas
- Providing incident reports to the Press.

Police Department Social Worker

Stephen Buhr, LCSW Hahn & Associates

The Elmhurst Police Department partners with Hahn and Associates to offer counseling services when needed. Stephen Buhr, a licensed clinical social worker, works part-time for the Police Department in addition to providing counseling and social services to the community.



Stephen helps address problems at their core and is on call for Department needs. He has responded to assist in crisis counseling, death notifications, and various types of domestic trouble. Stephen keeps an office at the Elmhurst Police Station where he is able to offer private one-on-one or family counseling to address issues that are uncovered and reported to him by police officers as they respond to calls in the community. In 2022, Stephen provided counseling on domestic violence, child abuse and/or neglect, teenage pregnancy, elder abuse and/or neglect, substance abuse, job loss, depression/anxiety, coping with grief, domestic problems, and juvenile delinguency.

In 2022, Stephen handled 119 cases for the Elmhurst Police Department with a combined total of 83 crisis intervention hours and 402 total hours of in-house, virtual and off-site counseling. Stephen also offers his services to employees of the Police Department who might experience a tragedy of some sort, whether on or off-duty, where they might require help in processing their emotions in order to make a full recovery. We are proud to partner with Stephen to provide these necessary services in Elmhurst, and we appreciate his contributions to keeping our community healthy.



Recruiting

In 2022, the Elmhurst Police recruited at various colleges and universities to find our next group of Elmhurst officers to *Provide the Best*. The Elmhurst Police Department offered the eligibility test three times last year, twice to potential new recruits who had yet to attend their basic police academy training, and once under our new Lateral Hire program for officers from other agencies who are interested in working for the Elmhurst Police Department.



Field Training Program

Field Training is a 20-week in-house training program completed by new police recruits after completion of the initial 16-week police academy training. During field training, new officers "learn the ropes" while rotating through the Day and Night Shifts working with different Field Training Officers (FTOs). In their final weeks of the program, the recruits are "shadowed" by an FTO for evaluation purposes while working independently in preparation for their release to full solo patrol. They remain on probation for a full 15 months after their hiring date.



In 2022, eight full-time police officers, one part-time officer, and two community service officers participated in the field training program after being hired and/or police academy graduation.





Officer Training

In 2022, Elmhurst officers completed approximately 9,800 hours of training on different law enforcement topics. All active, sworn members participated in training to fulfill mandates set forth by the Illinois Law Enforcement Training Standards Board. Last year, the ILETSB updated training mandates for all Law Enforcement officers in Illinois; new mandates were broken down into annual, 3-year and 5-year training requirements that went into effect in July of 2022. The Elmhurst Police Department created a 5-year training plan to meet all of the required mandates on a range of topics including: Law Updates, Use of Force, Civil Rights, Constitutional & Proper Use of Law Enforcement Authority, Cultural Competency, Human Rights, Procedural Justice, Mental Health Awareness and Trauma Informed Response to Sexual Assault. Elmhurst Police Investigators additionally maintain certification in Sexual Assault/Abuse Investigations and Lead Homicide Investigation.

Officers also completed monthly trainings online through the Police Law Institute, which offers training certified through the ILETSB on topics including:

- New Illinois Laws (3 Lessons)
- Use of Force; Deadly Force; Legal Standards
- Drone Law and Use in Law Enforcement
- Hate Crime Law, Investigation and Enforcement
- Landlord-Tenant Law and Dispute Resolution
- Body Cameras
- 2022 U.S. Supreme Court Decisions
- Psychology of Domestic Violence
- Racial Profiling, Implicit Bias, and Cultural Competency
- Law Enforcement Officer Mental Wellness

The Elmhurst Police Department partnered with Elmhurst University and School District 205 for several days of Active Threat training over the summer at Elmhurst schools. In addition, we hosted an OC (Pepper Spray) instructor class in August; pictured above left is Elmhurst Officer Valdez decontaminating a probation officer from McHenry County after the Pepper Spray training deployment.

Monthly In-Service training was conducted by the Department on many topics ranging from Forcing Entry to Trauma Care to Building Searches.







Training highlights from 2022:

Sergeants Bruckner and Schweik completed the 3-week Northwestern University Executive Management Program for command staff.

Officers Ostrega, Djukic, and Beyer completed basic SWAT training subsequent to their selection for the Tactical Patrol Officers (TPO) unit.

Two officers completed the 40 hour Field Training Officer course to become FTOs for new officers.

Officer Krupnik completed Police Tactical Firearms Training and the Master Firearms Instructor Apprenticeship at the Police Training Institute at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign.

Officer Velez completed the 40 hour School Resource Officer (SRO) training course; and SROs Velez and Jorgensen attended the Illinois School Resource Officer Association (ILSROA) School Safety Conference.

Officers assigned to the Crisis Negotiator Team (CNT) attended the IL Crisis Negotiators Annual Conference.

Officer Cappitelli and K9 Ozy attended a 3-day advanced Suburban and Urban Trailing course in addition to bi-monthly K-9 Unit training.

Members of the Evidence Unit completed training related to videography techniques for crime scenes, advanced evidence and crime scene photography, and workshops on latent prints, footwear evidence, and bloodstain pattern analysis.





Specialty Units



Tactical Patrol Officers

The Tactical Patrol Officer (TPO) unit is an innovative program implemented in 2021. TPOs are officers who are specially selected, trained, and equipped to respond to in-progress critical incidents that are especially high-risk and/or complex. Such incidents might include an active shooter response, armed offender search, barricaded suspect or multiple-casualty incident.



The primary duties of Tactical Patrol Officers are to maintain the skills and equipment needed to successfully respond to a critical incident and to provide monthly training to fellow police officers to enhance their tactical and emergency medical response skills.

Training is a key component of the TPO program. The TPOs conducted monthly training days for fellow officers in 2022. This annual training plan consists of topics related to searches, building hostage barricaded subjects, rescue, rapid response, officer survival, first aid, and the use of emergency equipment.






Crisis Negotiators

The Elmhurst Crisis Negotiator Team is comprised of department members who have been specially selected and trained in communication and de-escalation techniques. Negotiators can utilize their skills as patrol officers when responding to calls for service or as a team, working in conjunction with the Tactical Patrol Officers during more prolonged and hazardous incidents. The goal in crisis negotiation is to bring about a peaceful resolution to critical incidents by diffusing the intensity of a situation.

The Elmhurst Crisis Negotiator Team frequently attends training seminars and participates in training scenarios, including attending an annual Illinois Crisis Negotiator Conference where they have the opportunity to test their skills in de-escalation tactics during intense training scenarios.

All Elmhurst Crisis Negotiators are trained in FBI Hostage Negotiation classes and Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) courses.







Evidence Unit


Evidence Technicians are officers who are specially trained to document, photograph, and collect evidence left behind at a crime scene. The Elmhurst Police Evidence Unit is comprised of thirteen evidence technicians and an evidence custodian who are supervised by a Commander and Sergeant. Elmhurst Evidence Technicians (ETs) are assigned to all shifts to provide 24/7 coverage for the department.



2022 Evidence Unit Highlights:

- ETs participated in Science Olympiads at various Elmhurst schools
- ET McNeeley attended the 3-day Forensic Science conference
- ETs received fingerprint training from outside instructors
- Sgt Jarrette and ET Valdez were trained in Cellebrite Phone Extraction
- The unit researched and obtained a new FARO digital crime scene documentation system.
- In October, the Evidence Unit, with help from Detectives, conducted a mock crime scene training scenario at the Clarion Inn utilizing the Mobile Incident Command vehicle.







Part-Time Police Unit

The Elmhurst Part-Time Police Unit began as an auxiliary unit in 1953 before later changing to a fully-sworn Part-Time Police unit. Many of our part-time officers are full-time officers with other agencies, which allows Elmhurst to benefit from their experience and training. Part-time officers in Elmhurst are required to attend an Illinois-certified police academy.



In 2022, ten (10) part-time officers provided extra patrol strength mostly on evenings, weekends, and for special events. Part-time officers also assisted at home football games for both York and I.C. High Schools and helped with traffic control on graduation days for both high schools and Elmhurst University.





K-9 Unit

Tracking: 23 (79 %)

The Elmhurst Police K-9 Unit is made up of Officer Cappitelli, K9 handler, and K9 "Ozy." Together, the K-9 Unit performed numerous deployments to track missing or wanted subjects, locate articles of evidence, and detect narcotics.

Deployments were primarily for tracking purposes and broke down as follows:


Patrol Types



The K-9 Unit had a very successful year with 6 suspects located by tracking and seizure of US currency from narcotics trafficking in addition to 32 drug seizures as listed below:

2022 Highlights for the team include:

- Annual K9 Patrol Re-Certification in Tracking, Narcotics, Article Search and Apprehension;
- Earned a Suburban Level 1 Trailing/ Handler certification; and
- Completed Annual State of Illinois K9 Drug Certification.

In addition, the K-9 Unit was busy with community outreach events including presentations for the Citizen's Police Academy, talks for Boy Scouts, Girls Scouts and other community groups, and participation in Neighborhood Roll Calls.







Summer Mobile Patrol

The Summer Mobile Patrol (SMP), which is active from May through October, is made up of the Police Bicycle Unit and the electric Side-by-Side Vehicle, allowing officers to patrol less-accessible outdoor areas during the warmer months. The Summer Mobile Patrol is designed for both community outreach and crime prevention purposes, a goal that was accomplished with high-visibility patrols in the City Centre, parks, the prairie path, and other areas as needed.

In 2022, the Bicycle Unit included 18 officers who were used in conjunction with daily assignments when patrol manpower permitted, plus 4 additional officers who operated the electric side-byside vehicle. Bicycle Officers participated in various bicycle safety events, bike rodeos, and the annual Ride of Silence bike ride. The highlight of the unit was the Elmhurst Bike Ride and Safety Day held in May.





The SMP places officers in areas with high levels of pedestrian and bicycle traffic, allowing for more personal interaction with citizens. In addition neighborhood patrols, the unit also covers parades, festivals, Public Safety Night, and special events. SMP officers patrolled these areas and events, met with citizens, and passed out promotional items. The Summer Mobile Patrol Unit logged over 109 total hours of patrol time in 2022.



Traffic Safety Unit

Traffic safety is an area of frequent concern in the community, and the Elmhurst Police have an ongoing commitment to addressing traffic safety. Officers are assigned specific areas of concentration both to address violations and to educate the public.

In addition, the Elmhurst Police Department continues to participate in the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) STEP Grant program, which is a traffic enforcement grant that provides funding for officers to work overtime enforcement details on laws related to dangerous driving behaviors. Enforcement of seatbelt usage, impaired driving and distracted driving is the most effective way to reduce traffic fatalities and injuries on our roads. To maintain safe roadways throughout our community, the Elmhurst Police Department made 224 DUI arrests in 2022 and was recognized as a "Top 10 Department" in the state of Illinois by the Alliance Against Intoxicated Motorists.



The Traffic Safety Unit responded to 52 traffic concern locations pertaining to speeding, stop sign, or other traffic violations. 71 traffic details were assigned to patrol officers for sustained enforcement at the locations of concern. With assistance from two Traffic Safety interns, 31 traffic data recording studies were performed at locations of concern using a combination of traffic data recorders, speed display signs and speed trailers.












Range Masters

The Elmhurst Police Department Firearms program takes pride in a long history of providing high quality firearms and training to our officers. The Firearms Training Unit consists of a supervisor and five firearms instructors. In addition to Range training duties, Elmhurst Firearms Instructors are also certified armorers who perform regularly scheduled maintenance on all department firearms. This results in significant cost savings to the City of Elmhurst and keeps department firearms well-maintained and in good repair.

Range Masters conduct monthly pistol training at the police department range for all officers using a variety of scenario-based methods. Elmhurst Range Masters conduct rifle training on a yearly basis at the St. Charles Rifle Range, an outdoor facility that provides opportunities to engage targets at distances up to 100 yards. Officers receive ongoing training in the use of patrol rifles in order to effectively address armed offenders if necessary. In 2022, Officer Litton was selected as our newest firearms instructor.





Honor Guard

The Police Department Honor Guard demonstrates respect at ceremonies and funerals of officers who have fallen in the line of duty. The unit proudly represents the Police Department at City of Elmhurst events and functions including the annual 9/11 and Veterans' Day Ceremonies. In 2022, the Elmhurst Police Honor Guard Unit served with pride at the memorial ceremony for Elmhurst Police Chief Michael Ruth.



Drug Recognition Experts (DREs)

Drug Recognition Experts (DRE) are officers who receive specialized training to be certified to administer a Drug Influence Evaluation. The evaluation is a 12-step process with a standardized, systematic method of examining a driver suspected of Driving Under the Influence of Drugs to determine A) If the driver is impaired; B) Whether any impairment is due to drug use (as opposed to a possible medical condition); and C) What type(s) of drugs are likely the cause of impairment? The Elmhurst Police Department has three active DREs who serve the Elmhurst Community and assist other Chicagoland agencies. One of these officers is also an instructor responsible for training new DREs. In 2022, Elmhurst was second in the state for total Drug Evaluations performed. Elmhurst DREs conducted 17 total Drug Influence Evaluations with a 100% accuracy rate in determining the category/ies of drugs causing impairment.



Mutual Aid Assignments

The Elmhurst Police Department participates in the following mutual aid groups:

Illinois Law Enforcement Alarm System (ILEAS)

The Elmhurst Police Department is a member of the Illinois Law Enforcement Alarm System (ILEAS). This group is based in Urbana, Illinois, and is the largest mutual aid organization in the United States. ILEAS is responsible for coordinating statewide mutual aid responses when needed.



THE ILEAS MISSION

We strive to meet the needs of law enforcement throughout the State of Illinois in matters of mutual aid, emergency response and the combining of resources for public safety.

DuPage IMAT

The DuPage Incident Management Assistance Team (IMAT) consists of highly trained supervisors from various police departments throughout DuPage County; Commander Jim Gandy was the Elmhurst representative on the team until his promotion to Deputy Chief. The purpose of the team is to complete or enhance the incident command system for large scale events, emergencies, or disasters requiring numerous police / first responder units.

DuPage Crisis Intervention Team (CIT)



Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) officers receive special training focused on mental health and behavioral health issues—specifically as pertinent to law enforcement officers—including de-escalation techniques. Officers train with behavioral health specialists and learn from individuals with mental illnesses and their family members. Though training cannot prevent all crisis situations from escalating, CIT officers are available as a resource on 9-1-1 calls involving persons in mental health crisis, providing immediate aid in potentially dangerous situations. The Elmhurst Police Department Crisis Intervention Team is part of the DuPage CIT Officers Association, which holds training for DuPage County CIT Officers and provides legal updates and best practice solutions for in the field.

DuPage Public Safety Communications (DuComm)

DuComm is the consolidated emergency call-center and dispatch service for Elmhurst which serves 44 police and fire agencies throughout DuPage County. DuComm answers 9-1-1 calls and dispatches Police, Fire, and Emergency Medical Services. The Elmhurst Police have used DuComm as the primary 9-1-1 call center and dispatch service since 1975 for an average of approximately 50,000 incidents per year.



Metropolitan Emergency Response & Investigations Team MERIT



MERIT was created to provide a single, highly-skilled, collaborative response to major crimes and incidents. The former DuPage County Major Crimes Task Force (MCTF) and Felony Investigative Assistance Team (FIAT) were merged to form the MERIT organization, a county-wide Law Enforcement Major Crimes Taskforce to consolidate efforts and resources for the mutual benefit of every community in DuPage County.

The Elmhurst Police have continued involvement with MERIT since its inception. Elmhurst Crisis Negotiators Officer Corrigan and Sergeant Cuzzone are assigned to the Crisis Negotiations Team (CNT), Officer Hamblin is assigned to SWAT, Detectives Lafin and Kucera are assigned to the Public Integrity/Major Crimes Investigative Unit, Officers Westering and Kefaloukos (DRE) are assigned to the Major Crash Reconstructions Team (MCRT), Officer Cappitelli and K9 Ozy are assigned to the K9 Response Team, and Commander Gandy was assigned to the Incident Management Team (IMAT) until his promotion to Deputy Chief.

In 2022, MERIT CNT responded to 19 call-outs including six to assist SWAT with high-risk search/ arrest warrants; five for persons in mental health crisis; and eight for barricaded/possibly armed subjects. Two of those calls originated with shots fired from/at a

residence and reached peaceful resolution with subjects being taken into custody. One call dealt with a possible kidnapping that resulted in a subject fleeing from a residence but taken into custody later by SWAT and local police in Glendale Heights.







MERIT'S METRO SWAT is comprised of SWAT operators and Crisis Negotiators from 36 DuPage County Law Enforcement agencies. The team responds to high-risk critical incidents and assists local agencies with in-progress crimes and crisis response calls. These incidents require specialized techniques and equipment that teams train with on a monthly basis.

2022 training for the METRO SWAT team included attending the Illinois Tactical Officer Association conference, learning how to use fire department apparatus to fight barricaded subjects setting fires with innocent people involved, and a week of range training at The Site in Mt. Carroll, which included live firearms training, range work and scenarios. SWAT also trained with Superior Ambulance Air Medics on patient evacuation from crisis sites and safe transport to the helicopter in an unsafe environment. Numerous call-outs for the year included barricaded subjects, potential hostage rescue situations and warrant services.









Northern Illinois Police Alarm System (NIPAS)



The Northern Illinois Police Alarm System (NIPAS) covers over 90 communities and offers two units—a special tactical squad known as the **Emergency Services Team (EST)** and a crowd-control team known as the **Mobile Field Force (MFF)**. Elmhurst Patrol Officer Marcin Scislowicz served on the NIPAS EST team, and Officer Leo Elizalde served on the NIPAS MFF in 2022.

NIPAS Emergency Services Team (EST)

NIPAS EST is a full-service SWAT team equipped to handle incidents both large and small. Such incidents include high risk search or arrest warrants, hostage rescues, armed/barricaded mental subjects, area searches and fugitive apprehension, and dignitary protection. The team fields four armored vehicles, an equipment truck, and three rapid response pickups—each of which has the capability to sustain approximately 8 SWAT operators over the course of an incident. The team also has a Command Post and a WMD Air truck allowing officers to respond to incidents involving industrial chemicals, WMD, and Meth labs in fully encapsulated, chemical-resistant suits with breathing apparatus.

NIPAS EST also provides security and intelligence support to the NIPAS Mobile Field Force during incidents, responds to special events like the Chicago Marathon, and assists statewide with natural disasters.

NIPAS Mobile Field Force (MFF)

The mission of the NIPAS Mobile Field Force is to effectively deal with events and conflicts by providing a rapid, organized, disciplined response to civil disorder, crowd control, and other tactical situations that can arise from civil unrest. Identical to the Emergency Services Team, the Mobile Field Force follows the original principles of NIPAS agencies: Pooling resources to provide the best service possible for member communities by retaining local control and offering cost savings by sharing specialized equipment. Member agencies participate in the Mobile Field Force voluntarily, and agencies that choose not to supply members to the team do not receive services from the MFF.

The NIPAS Mobile Field Force provides its member agencies with a planned, organized, and rapid response to:

- Control unruly crowds (either hostile or passive);
- Seal off problem areas;
- Rescue citizens or officers from crowds;
- Clear an area of hostile individuals using proactive tactics; and
- Apprehend multiple offenders when required.



Community Engagement Programs

The Elmhurst Police are actively committed to community outreach opportunities and utilize a number of different programs to engage with residents. Citizen's Police Academy, Neighborhood Roll Call, Summer Mobile Patrol, Police Explorers, Peer Jury, DARE, School Visits, Station Tours for scouting groups, Walk & Talks—these are just some of the many opportunities our officers take to connect with members of the community.

Citizen's Police Academy

The CPA program is a 12-week program that offers citizens a chance to go "behind the scenes" at the police department and learn more about how the department operates. The CPA curriculum includes classes on Investigations, Evidence Processing, Drug Awareness, the K-9 Unit, and a Law Review. The program provides plenty of hands-on experience as well as opportunities for roleplay scenarios, giving participants a better understanding of Emergency Response and the challenges involved in making split-second decisions. The Elmhurst Police Department has run a total of 29 sessions of this popular program, and graduates are invited to participate in the Elmhurst Citizen's Police Academy Alumni Association to continue their CPA experience if they wish.









Police Explorers

The Police Explorers is a leadership program for youths, aged 14 to 21, which provides an opportunity to explore career options in Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice. The Explorer program is designed to foster responsibility and leadership skills, and a number of former Elmhurst Police Explorers have been hired by Law Enforcement agencies around the U.S.—including Elmhurst Police Chief Mike McLean!

The Elmhurst Police Explorers program conducts team-building exercises throughout the year and continues to excel at Explorer competitions. For more information on the Elmhurst Police Explorers, please visit our website: www.ElmhurstPoliceExplorers.com.









Neighborhood Roll Call

The Elmhurst Police Neighborhood Roll Call program began in 2014 and has been a huge success from its inception. Outdoor Roll Calls provide opportunities for police officers and residents to meet face-to-face in a relaxed environment to discuss local crime trends, concerns, and general crime prevention, which strengthens the overall relationship between the police department and the community. In 2022 alone, over 900 residents attended a Neighborhood Roll Call, and nearly 7,000 residents have attended since the program began!





















Public Safety Night

The Elmhurst Police and Fire Departments once again partnered with the Elmhurst Park District for our second annual Public Safety Night at Berens Park. The event included lots of family fun with a dunk tank, a bouncy house, remote-control police cars, a firehose game, free hotdogs, tours of police and fire vehicles and even a Superior Ambulance helicopter!













Other community programs that the Elmhurst Police participate in include:

- **D.A.R.E., Drug Abuse Resistance Education,** which is taught during the school year to 5th graders at Elmhurst schools, both public and private, by our DARE officers.
- **Peer Jury**, which provides juvenile offenders with the option of having their misdemeanor or status cases heard by a jury of their peers instead of going through the juvenile court system. The juveniles conference with the Peer Jury and arrive at various forms of restitution, helping them to better understand the consequences of their actions and accept responsibility for them.
- Alive at 25 is a safe driving course administered by the National Safety Council. Taught by
 our officers, the class helps younger drivers improve decision-making skills for safer
 driving. The program is utilized by the City Prosecutor as a diversionary program for
 young traffic violators to educate them to be safer drivers.
- BASSET, a State of Illinois training program run by the Illinois Liquor Commission for servers and/or sellers of alcoholic beverages that aims to educate them in responsible service and sales—including the prevention of underage alcohol consumption. In 2022, a total of 14 classes were held and 155 servers / sellers completed the program.
- Administrative Hearings, like Peer Jury, offer an alternative to going through the circuit
 courts for adjudication of minor ordinance violations. The Police Department partners
 with the City Clerk's Office, the Finance Department, and the City Attorney on
 Administrative Hearings to adjudicate minor offenses including parking violations, vehicle
 equipment violations, and other minor ordinance violations such as curfew and loud noise
 complaints.
- Prescription Drug Take-Back, in cooperation with the Drug Enforcement Agency, several collection events are held each year for residents to dispose of unused prescription drugs, which could lead to accidental poisoning, misuse, or overdose if left in the medicine cabinet. In 2022, the Police Department collected a total of 792 lbs. of prescription drugs between our lobby dropbox and collection events.



• Turkey Trot watering hole—In conjunction with the iconic Dan Gibbons Turkey Trot, volunteers from the Police Department turned up to pass out water to runners and walkers as they passed by the police station on Palmer Drive.



Cop on a Rooftop—In partnership with Dunkin' Donuts, the Elmhurst Police participate in this annual fundraiser event for Special Olympics Illinois. Volunteers from the Police Department and our Citizen's Police Academy Alumni Association (CPAAA) raised \$6,508 to help send local Special Olympics athletes to the Illinois games.





- **Explore Elmhurst Trolley**—To with our community, connect several officers took a turn reading children stories on the City-Explore **Elmhurst** sponsored Trolley, which transported residents and visitors to various locations around town over the summer.
- Shop with a Cop and Toys for Tots—Officers were involved in both of these annual
 charity events; Shop with a Cop involves taking children in need to enjoy breakfast,
 games, and a visit with Santa before caravanning to Meijer to shop for gifts for their
 families. Toys were collected in the police station lobby for the U.S. Marine Corps Toys
 for Tots program, and officers then delivered two carloads of collected toys to the
 Toys for Tots collection center.





In addition to the many programs we sponsor and/or participate in that offer opportunities for interaction with members of the community, a key philosophy of the Elmhurst Police is to actively initiate positive contact with our residents.







Opportunities abound to achieve this goal—Station tours and school visits, or just taking time for a patrol stop in a park, the City Centre, at a block party, or at parades, runs, and other types of special events.
































SERVICE WORKLOAD




ASSIST OTHER AGENCIES



In 2022, there was an increase of 369 Calls to Assist compared to 2021.


ALARM CALLS



In 2022, there was a decrease of 478 Burglar and Hold Up Alarm calls compared to 2021.




TRAFFIC COLLISIONS — TOTALS



The total number of Traffic Collisions in 2022 increased by 51 crashes from 2021.


TRAFFIC COLLISIONS — OTHER




CITATIONS

CHRONIC NUISANCE PROGRAM



The Chronic Nuisance Ordinance improves quality of life for residents and businesses in Elmhurst. Since the program started in 2008, there have been 280 cases successfully resolved, with only 28 cases receiving a second violation and only 5 going to a third. The Police and Building Departments work together to enforce concerns related to issues with construction. In 2022, there were 18 Chronic Nuisance cases administered.

2022 AWARDS & RECOGNITION

There were 59 departmental awards presented in 2022, including 3 Life-Saving Awards, 1 Official Commendation, 4 Letters of Recognition, and 7 Unit Citations honoring a total of 51 individual officers for excellence in police work.

Sergeants Bruckner and Schweik completed the Executive Management Program offered by the Northwestern University Center for Public Safety. This three-week course is the third and final class in an Executive-level training program totaling 15 weeks. The EMP program was hosted by the Elmhurst Police Department and was attended by police supervisors from agencies throughout the U.S.





Award Certificates from the Alliance Against Intoxicated Motorists (AAIM) were issued to Officers Hoye, Gryczewski and Kuper in recognition of their outstanding DUI enforcement. Of the 235 DUI arrests made on Elmhurst roadways last year, these three officers were responsible for 130 of them!





In November, Officer Cappitelli was presented with a Department Life-Saving Award and medal for putting his own life in danger to assist a woman in escaping from a burning automobile.

Sergeants Himpelmann, McCollum, Bruckner and Schweik received the Executive Leadership Award from the Northwestern University Center for Public Safety. Eligibility for this award requires completion of a three-part series of Supervisory level courses totaling 15 weeks of training that prepares law enforcement managers for advanced responsibilities by combining academic principles with practical police applications.





Promotions

The Elmhurst Police saw a number of promotions in 2022 to fill supervisory positions vacated by retirements. Officers Daniel Bishop and Dorian Jarrette were promoted to the rank of Sergeant; Sergeants Matthew Himpelmann, Steven Mandat, and Matthew McCollum were promoted to the rank of Commander; Commander James Gandy was promoted to Deputy Chief of Operations, and Deputy Chief of Operations Michael McLean was appointed Chief of Police after the loss of Chief Michael Ruth. Congratulations to these employees as they move up the chain of command.
