MINUTES EXETER TOWNSHIP BOARD OF SUPERVISORS MEETING MONDAY, JULY 12, 2021

REGULAR MEETING

The Meeting was opened with the Pledge to the Flag.

Mr. Galtere announced that an executive session was held prior to the meeting to discuss potential litigation.

PUBLIC COMMENTS: Agenda Items

David Hughes; Commented on the golf report. Commented on the RTK report, mentioned appeals that he has filed. Discussed paving item on the agenda, pointed out spelling errors. Asked if we are changing the paving process. Mentioned typos in the minutes.

REGULAR APPROVALS

Regular Minutes – June 28, 2021

Mr. Galtere explained that there were some corrections needed to the minutes as follows:

Page 1, PUBLIC COMMENTS section: Removed sentence stating "Public comments were submitted in advance of the meeting via email and voicemail. The e-mail comments were dictated by computer software."

Page 4, paragraph 4: changed the word "that" to "than".

Page 4, paragraph 7: changed the word "us" to "is".

Page 5, PUBLIC COMMENTS section: Removed sentence stating "Public comments were submitted in advance of the meeting via email and voicemail. The e-mail comments were dictated by computer software."

MOTION of Mr. Speece seconded by Mr. Staub the Board UNANIMOUSLY APPROVED the June 28, 2021 Board of Supervisors Minutes with stated corrections.

Disbursements – July 12, 2021

Ms. Savage reviewed several items included in the disbursements.

Ms. Kircher asked why the golf pencils cost so much money, she was asked by two residents today. **Mr. Staub** stated that this was for 2,880 pencils, they are ordered twice a year. Less than 6 cents per pencil.

MOTION of Mr. Staub seconded by Mr. Speece, the Board UNANIMOUSLY APPROVED payment of the bills presented on the Disbursement List dated July 12, 2021 in the amounts of \$369,564.51 in the General Fund; \$794.58 in the Developer's Escrow Fund; \$14,691.30 in the Golf Fund; \$876.82 in the RCC F&B Fund; \$553,182.04 in the Debt Services Fund; \$217,128.95 in the State Liquid Fuels Fund.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Monthly Golf Report

Mr. Galtere explained that the report is available to view on the township website.

Mr. Staub explained that the golf report does not capture the entirety of the RCC property. It is intended to show profitability of golf operations only.

Mr. Staub stated that it is his understanding that the property was purchased by the township in order to prevent residential development on the property that would have led to increased costs to the township for schools etc. Discussed his recollection of the history of the township's involvement in the property.

Monthly Right to Know Report

Mr. Galtere explained that the report is available to view on the township website. Mentioned that 22 of 30 requests were completed within 5 days.

NEW BUSINESS

<u>Authorize Advertisement of Request for Proposal for Dining Services at the Reading Country Club</u>

Mr. Bartlett explained that the administration will be issuing a new request for proposal for dining services at the Reading Country Club, proposals will be due on August 16th. July 28th and August 3rd will be available for site visits to those who have requested a copy of the RFP. Hope to have operations

up and running by January 1st. Restaurant staffing is currently a concern. Will advertise locally, nationally, and regionally in various publications.

Mr. Staub asked the expiration date of RFP. Mr. Bartlett replied that proposals are due by August 16th.

Ms. Kircher asked where it will be advertised. **Mr. Bartlett** stated that it will be advertised in the Reading Eagle, and other publications like the Philadelphia Inquirer, PA Restaurant Association, National Golf Restaurant Association.

MOTION of Mr. Speece seconded by Mr. Piho the Board UNANIMOUSLY APPROVED Advertisement of Request for Proposal for Dining Services at the Reading Country Club with a due date of August 16th replying to the RFP request.

Consider Awarding Municipal Facility Trash Service Contract to Republic Services in the amount of \$33,767.30

Mr. Bartlett explained that this is for dumpster service at township owned facilities. Four bids were received, the low bid was Republic Services. Administration recommends awarding the contract to Republic. The township will realize approximately \$1000/month in savings.

Mr. Piho asked questions about the contract. **Mr. Bartlett** explained that there is a 6-month buyout should the township terminate services early. Contract will start September 1st, through the end of this year and then another three years. Can be extended by mutual agreement for a year afterwards.

MOTION of Ms. Kircher seconded by Mr. Staub the Board UNANIMOUSLY APPROVED Awarding Municipal Facility Trash Service Contract to Republic Services.

Consider Approving Updated List of 2021 Paving Projects Funded by Liquid Fuels

Mr. Hamm explained that the paving projects that were budgeted for were based on pricing available at the time. Prices for blacktop are low, so the department would like to take advantage of the lower prices.

Discussion ensued surrounding the potential savings. **Mr. Hamm** explained that the liquid fuels money will roll over. **Mr. Staub** asked about the quality. **Mr. Hamm** stated that the paving is much better product than Ralumac.

Mr. Piho asked for clarification on what is being asked. **Mr. Hamm** explained that the state liquid fuels auditors will need to see that there was approval of these specific projects budgeted for so this change needs to be approved.

MOTION of Mr. Piho seconded by Mr. Speece the Board UNANIMOUSLY APPROVED updated List of 2021 Paving Projects Funded by Liquid Fuels.

Approve Appointment to Planning Commission to Fill Current Vacancy

Mr. Bartlett announced that Mr. Culbertson has requested that his name be removed from consideration. A total of 4 individuals submitted letters of interest.

Mr. Staub and Mr. Speece thanked the applicants.

MOTION of Mr. Piho seconded by Ms. Kircher the Board UNANIMOUSLY APPROVED appointing Eric Mountz to the Planning Commission.

Authorize Advertisement of Ordinance Amending the Recycling Ordinance

Mr. Bartlett explained that it has been determined that some definitions in our existing ordinance need to be clarified. This change addresses Home Owners Associations an entity required to recycle under the ordinance. They are not charged by the township and must have their own recycling program.

Ms. Kircher commented on plastic recycling requirements. Would like to make sure it's clarified, also discussed leaf waste and making sure it's known not to comingle. **Mr. Bartlett** stated that a list of plastics can be added, but how to dispose of leaf waste is educational and not an ordinance matter.

MOTION of Mr. Speece seconded by Ms. Kircher the Board UNANIMOUSLY APPROVED Advertisement of Ordinance Amending the Recycling Ordinance.

Adopt Proclamation Declaring July 16, 2021 as Park and Recreation Professionals Day

Ms. Getz explained that July 16, 2021 is Pennsylvania Park and Recreation Professionals Day, which falls in National Parks & Recreation Month. It is an opportunity to recognize the hard work done by Park & Recreation professionals not just in Exeter but also in Pennsylvania and nationwide.

MOTION of Ms. Kircher seconded by Mr. Speece the Board UNANIMOUSLY APPROVED Adoption of Proclamation Declaring July 16, 2021 as Park and Recreation Professionals Day.

Adopt Resolution Supporting the Pennsylvania Commission for the United States Semi-Quincentennial (America250PA)

Mr. Bartlett explained that this is a statewide celebration, the county has asked for ceremonial support by all Berks municipalities as they embark on the planning process. No obligation on the part of the township financially or for resources.

MOTION of Mr. Staub seconded by Mr. Piho the Board UNANIMOUSLY APPROVED Resolution Supporting the Pennsylvania Commission for the United States Semi-Quincentennial (America250PA).

DEPARTMENT REPORTS

Clarence Hamm, Public Works Director: Starting milling on Monday, will be moving into paving after that. Will have 90% of the paving projects completed after this next project.

Joe Rogosky, Township Engineer, Great Valley Consultants: Nothing to report.

Chief Morris; Police Department: Department conducted a DUI checkpoint over the holiday weekend, 627 vehicles were contacted, 8 DUI arrests, 11 drug arrests, 25 citations issued. Were recently awarded a \$15,000 grant for the K9 program. Advised residents that complaints are being received regarding fraudulent unemployment benefits. If residents receive notice in the mail regarding unemployment benefits that were not applied for to please alert the department.

Elizabeth Magovern, Solicitor: Nothing to report.

Jeff Bartlett, Township Manager: Township just received notice that \$1.2 of the American Rescue Plan Act funds will be received this week. The Board will be discussing at future meetings how the money will be spent. It is earmarked for certain uses by the government. We will receive the second half of the money a year from now. Discussed using the money for unfunded mandates.

PUBLIC COMMENT – General Comments

Mr. Galtere made an announcement regarding general public comments. Thanked everyone for attending and stated that he is sure many are here to discuss the serious incident that occurred over the 4th of July holiday. Expressed that the Board wants to hear concerns. Asked for understanding that the Board will not comment on the incident as it is currently under investigation. Representatives of the Administration will be meeting with the Home Owners Association to discuss the matter. Discussed public comment procedures, asked that all speakers stay to 3-minutes or less.

John Sneeringer: Asked that Sarah McHenry be able to speak first.

Sarah McHenry; Stated that on July 4th a 50 caliber bullet hit her home, melted the siding. Her daughter and a neighbor were in the pool at the time, and other family members were in the room just below where the bullet hit. The University Rifle Club was hosting a machine gun shoot at the time, a club representative came to her home to apologize for the incident and told her that the bullet came from a semi-automatic 50 caliber rifle being used by a shoot participant. Exeter PD told her that it would have killed someone had it not hit a person and not the house. URC offered to fix the damage and make changes to the range but they would continue to shoot these types of weapons. Knew when they bought the house that there was a gun range nearby, but it has changed significantly over the years. Would like to know what the Board will and has done to protect safety of the residents. Asked that gun range operations be ceased until safety measures can be guaranteed.

David Hughes; Discussed the liquid fuels item, thinks that a budget amendment should be done. Stated that Mr. Galtere accused him of giving false information to the public. Commented on the election and complaints filed.

Craig Moritz; Stated that he has been a lifelong member of the University Rifle Club. Club has been in its current location for 67 years. They prioritize being a good neighbor. Stated that they have not expanded, are still within its original borders. Have made improvements inside the range for safety, and have had it inspected by experts who determined it was safe. Welcome a full investigation into the possibility that a projectile left the property. Stated that there is indication that the projectile did not originate from the rifle club. Would like to see the firearm identified. Pledged cooperation and if found responsible will make changes accordingly.

Russ Magazzu; Asked that Georgiana Coe be allowed to go before him.

Georgiana Coe: Understood when she moved in that she lived near a rifle club. Since that point it has grown and trees have been removed. Direct line of sight now exists directly from her home. Would like to know if proper permits and rules followed. The second phase was already approved before they moved into their home. Concerned with proximity of range to neighborhood. Forest used to exist between the property. Gun club apologized for the incident on the 4th of July and acknowledged that the

bullet came from their property and offered to pay for the repairs. They said it was a ricochet. Ms. Coe isn't sure that's true because the bullet was intact. Her son was inside the room that was struck by the bullet. Her daughter was in the pool where the bullet passed over their heads. No issue with guns, feels there must be a responsibility to safety.

Russ Magazzu; HOA board member, has been asked to speak on behalf of the residents of the neighborhood. Provided a handout of aerial shots of the neighborhood. Stated that the range has changed significantly over time. What it looks like today is nothing like it did in 2006 when many bought their home. In 2014 all homes were completed and sold, is also when URC started extensive excavation and construction. Reviewed a continued timeline of expansion.

Mr. Galtere stated that the 3-minutes has expired, mentioned their upcoming scheduled meeting. **Mr. Magazzu** asked for additional time to complete his presentation. Ms. Kircher stated that she would like him to finish. **Mr. Galtere** allowed another resident to give up his time to Mr. Magazzu.

Mr. Magazzu continued to review the Google Earth photos of the URC and residential development over time. Showed the final plan of the development, there are 60 notes on the left side of the plan. Note 32 states a deed note explaining that the purchaser is aware of the URC and its grandfathered permitted use. Stated that those words are not in his deed even though it says on the plans that it should be. Feels that per the note the URC should not have been able to expand beyond the way it existed initially.

Charles Boyer; Is an HOA board member. Discussed the incident, wants to know why shooting was permitted to continue that evening. Discussed the safety of the residents, stated it is the township's responsibility to ensure the safety of its residents. Safety was compromised. Doesn't believe this is the first time that a round has left the gun range. Discussed how close Owatin Creek school is. Stated that the township and the builder are responsible. Urged a thorough investigation.

Leslie Sees: Vice President of the University Rifle Club. Discussed the incident. Stated that a member was shooting on the property on July 4th when he was notified by police that a projectile was lodged in a nearby home. Expressed that the URC is not certain that the bullet came from its property or when it happened. Do not know how it could have happened. URC and its insurer are still fact finding. If the projectile came from URC, they apologize and have already offered to pay for repairs to the homeowner. Take safety very seriously. Stated a theory that a resident could have fired a bullet into the sky. Stated that URC has also expressed concerns with the development surrounding the club.

John Dever; Thanked the Board members for responding to his emails. Discussed size and scope of the URC, when he moved into the neighborhood the size and scope was nothing like it is today. Would like to see a creative solution to this issue. Is not against the gun club, would like to see a solution.

Michael Good; Has lived in the neighborhood for 10 years. Was not aware that there was a gun range when he purchased his home. Was not always as busy as today. Never a fear of stray bullets before, there is now a concern. The club has changed over the years. Not asking for the club to close, concerned about safety, maybe limiting what can be shot there. That bullet could have taken someone's life.

Alan Bollendorf; Gave his time to John Sneeringer.

John Sneeringer: Stated that this bullet passed right over his home, as well as the home right across from him and hit the third home within three feet of a 10-yr old. Stated that he and his wife signed a waiver about the club in 2013 when they built their home. The club was mostly a field at that time. Over

the past few years, he believes an illegal expansion has occurred. Since this incident his wife takes their dog into the basement when there is shooting because she is fearful.

Kiel Richmond: Commented on the University Rifle Club. Stated that when he bought his home in 2013 he didn't hear any gun shots, didn't realize there was a range. No problem with guns. Agrees with the other commenters that it has expanded over the years, thinks Berks Homes should also be involved in something more than just a sound barrier. Thinks they can operate responsibly, but need to take some responsibility for this incident. Doesn't believe it was a ricochet.

Mr. Galtere thanked everyone for their respectful participation. This is the beginning of the investigation into this matter. Encouraged residents to submit any concerns or questions to the township.

SUPERVISOR REPORTS:

Mr. Piho: Thanked the residents for coming, introduced himself as a new supervisor.

Ms. Kircher: Thanked everyone for coming and sharing. Stated that no one should feel unsafe. Stated that she is sure something can be done.

Mr. Staub: Thanked everyone for coming and understands the emotion of this incident. Asked about the e-newsletter, is the subscription increasing?

Ms. Getz stated that we would like to continue to encourage more residents to sign up.

Mr. Staub asked that a mid-year budget synopsis be presented at the next meeting.

Mr. Speece: Thanked everyone for coming out and for their understanding of the ongoing investigation into the rifle club matter.

Mr. Galtere: Thanked everyone for respectful participation. Read a statement on behalf of a quorum of the supervisors in response to some questions stemming from the June 28th meeting. The questions concerned the approval of the steps being installed between the Dunn Community Center and the library. Summarized the requirements for the project and how the Township followed all requirements.

ADJOURNMENT

MOTION of Ms. Kircher seconded by Mr. Piho the meeting adjourned at 8:34 PM.
