

Dear Fairfielders,

As we head into October, we acknowledge and raise awareness about three significant causes that impact the lives of our neighbors and fellow residents. I hope you will join me in extending compassion and commitment to these important causes. October is:

- Breast Cancer Awareness Month
- Domestic Violence Awareness Month
- National Pedestrian Safety Month

Breast cancer affects one in eight women in the United States each year, and Connecticut bears one of the highest incidence rates of breast cancer in the nation. Throughout October, our town participates in Pink
Pledge, a heartfelt initiative aimed at supporting the Norma Pfriem Breast Center. By contributing to Pink Pledge, you help ensure that the Breast Center can continue to deliver outstanding medical care and compassion to all women, regardless of their financial circumstances.

Domestic violence is a distressing issue that affects millions of individuals across the United States. Shockingly, on average, three women lose their lives each day due to domestic violence. Also, over 15 million children are exposed to domestic violence annually, and a report of child abuse is made every 10 seconds. In our Fairfield County community, the Center for Family Justice provides free and confidential trauma-informed services, orchestrating care for victims and survivors of domestic violence, sexual violence, human trafficking, and child abuse in six towns, including Fairfield. By supporting organizations like The Center for Family Justice, we can contribute to creating safer homes and communities for everyone.

The safety of our residents is of significant importance, especially when it comes to pedestrian safety. In 2021, we witnessed a concerning 12.5% increase in pedestrian fatalities in traffic crashes across the nation, marking the highest number in 40 years. Fairfield has also experienced a rise in pedestrian accidents over the last three years. Fairfield Bicycle & Pedestrian Committee is committed to enhancing safety through education. In this month of awareness and action, please:

- 1. Prioritize your health by scheduling regular check-ups with your healthcare provider.
- 2. Look out for your neighbors, especially those who may need assistance or support.
- 3. Refrain from engaging in distracted driving, and take precautions when walking outside, ensuring our roads are safer for all.

By taking these steps, we can collectively contribute to the safety and well-being of ourselves, our families, and our community.

SISTER CITY IN UKRAINE

Last week we held a press conference to formally announce the Town's partnership with Kostiantynivka, Ukraine, a similar sized city to Fairfield, in the middle of a war-torn country. Our main goals are to help raise money and collect supplies for this struggling city and contribute to fostering a connection between the United States and Ukraine.

It was said best by Marshall Mayer, the President from <u>UAI</u>, if every person in Fairfield donated <u>\$25 dollars</u> we would raise over a million dollars for our sister city.

BOARD OF EDUCATION REDISTRICTING

The Board of Education (BOE) has announced that they are setting aside redistricting, a decision I agree with. According to the Board, under all scenarios presented, there would be six schools that exceed classroom capacity within the next eight school years. The BOE is expected to present its findings to the State Board of Education and work on a solution that will comply with the State's Racial Imbalance Law. I have spoken with the Superintendent of Schools, Mike Testani, and I look forward to working with the BOE and school administration on any further capital planning needs as a result of their findings. DRAFT PLAN OF CONSERVATION AND DEVELOPMENT (POCD) FOR REVIEW AND COMMENT

As I shared in the previous few newsletters, the Town Plan and Zoning Department has presented the draft <u>Plan of Conservation and Development (POCD)</u>. This process began in 2018 with initial outreach to Town Departments and other Boards and Commissions.

DRIVEN TO PROTECT EVENT

Today, I attended the launch of the Driven to Protect initiative, which included a demonstration of the Driver Alcohol Detection System for Safety Program (DADSS) at the Fairfield Ludlowe High School.

The Driver Alcohol Detection System for Safety Program (DADSS) is a public–private partnership between the U.S. Department of Transportation's National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) and the nonprofit Automotive Coalition for Traffic Safety (ACTS) which represents the world's leading automobile manufacturers. The mission of DADSS is to bring to market a first-of-its-kind alcohol detection technology that will passively detect when a driver is intoxicated with a BAC at or above the legal limit and prevent the vehicle from moving. This program is sponsored by a grant through the Connecticut Department of Transportation Highway Safety Office.

I want to thank Superintendent Michael Testani; Principal Dr. Greg Hatzis; Garrett Eucalitto, Commissioner, CT Department of Transportation; George Bishop, Automotive Coalition for Traffic Safety; Bob Garguilo, Executive Director MADD CT; Skip Church, former MADD representative and Fairfield's Stephen Panus, two fathers whose sons were killed in drunk driving crashes, for attending today and making a meaningful impression on our young students.



PENFIELD PAVILION REPAIR

Updates on the project at Penfield Pavilion are provided monthly at the BOS meeting. As we move forward on remediation and repair at this site, the Town will share information we receive on the Penfield Construction Project webpage, you can read here. Monthly updates will continue at Board of Selectmen meetings. An additional update will be given to the BOF at their October 3rd meeting.

The Town has begun removing equipment and closing down Penfield Pavilion to prepare for construction. The building has been winterized, the site fence is going up, and remediation will begin in the coming weeks.

UI | FAIRFIELD TO CONGRESS SUBSTATION BRIDGEPORT RAILROAD TRANSMISSION LINE REBUILD PROJECT

Yesterday, State Senator Tony Hwang, State Representatives Jennifer Leeper and Cristen McCarthy Vahey, the town's legal counsel and I, met with UI's President Frank Reynolds, and the UI project team at Town Hall regarding their application. The meeting was very productive. UI has agreed to work with the Town and its departments to identify problematic areas in UI's proposal. It is our hope that working collaboratively, we will be able to identify and implement reasonable and prudent alternatives. Rep. Leeper and Senator Hwang offered to work with me, intervening parties and our legal counsel to create a list of priority areas that UI agreed to discuss with all of us further.

Parallel to this collaborative work with UI, the Town is still pursuing the opportunity to present evidence to the Connecticut Siting Council. The Council holds exclusive authority over utility proposals, statewide. Yesterday, the Siting Council agreed to grant the Town an additional hearing in November, which is very good news.

I also asked UI, and they agreed, to host a Town Hall meeting on October 4th at 6:00 p.m., where they will present their plans to our community, and answer questions. The meeting will take place at the Regional Training Fire School at 205 Richard White Way.

NATIONAL PEDESTRIAN SAFETY MONTH

The Fairfield Bicycle & Pedestrian Committee is committed to improving safety through education, such as the recommendations listed below, as well as support for implementation of traffic calming measures, striving to achieve a "Vision Zero" goal. Vision Zero describes a belief that even one life lost in a vehicular accident is unacceptable, and that resulting deaths and injuries are preventable using all available tools to eliminate conditions and behaviors that lead to serious injuries and death. Please also support National Walk to School Day on October 4th.

Below are a few critical items that pedestrians should follow to improve their walking safety:

- Walk on sidewalks whenever they are available, don't walk in the road if one is available.
- If there is no sidewalk, walk on the left side, close to curb, facing traffic. In fact, it's a State of CT Statute 14-300(c), violation of which can result in an infraction.
- Cross streets at crosswalks or intersections, DO NOT cross between parked cars.
- Increase your visibility when walking at night by carrying a flashlight and wearing reflective clothing, such as reflective vests. Avoid wearing dark clothing.

If we all follow these few simple suggestions, we can improve our individual safety while enjoying the benefits of walking and enjoying our town.

NEW POLLINATOR POCKET PARK

In continuing its mission of planting trees and promoting awareness and appreciation for their environmental, economic, and cultural value in Fairfield, the volunteer Fairfield Forestry Committee, specifically Chairwoman Mary Hogue, Tree Planting Program Director Tom Corell, and Tree Warden Jeff Minder, collaborated on revitalizing an idle downtown space into a vibrant pollinator pocket park.

This beautiful revitalized park, which was completed in May of 2023, features new sidewalks, nine benches, five shade trees (two Chestnut Oaks, two Patriot Elms, and an American Sycamore), 69 various ornamental trees and shrubs, 100 various perennials, and over 3000 flowering bulbs. The plantings will have some flowers in bloom every month of the year. The native and pollinator plants will provide habitat and food for native fauna.

NO ONE HAS TIME FOR THE FLU, GET A FLU SHOT

The Fairfield Health Department is urging all residents to receive the flu vaccine. The single best way to protect yourself and those around you from the flu is to get vaccinated. It is recommended that everyone over the age of 6 months receive the flu vaccine every year. It takes about 2 weeks after the receiving the flu vaccine for the body to develop protection against the flu virus so now is a good time to get vaccinated.

The Health Department will host four flu clinics this season for adults and children age 3 and older. These clinics will be held on:

ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS FOR HEATING AND UTILITY BILLS

As the seasons change, we want to inform our community about two valuable assistance programs that can provide support with heating and utility bills.

- 1. **Connecticut Energy Assistance Program (CEAP)**: CEAP offers aid for primary heating costs. This program ensures that you can keep your home warm during the colder months.
- 2. **Operation Fuel:** Commencing in August, Operation Fuel offers help with utility bills, primarily focusing on past-due balances for electric bills. Please remember that eligible applicants for Operation Fuel can only receive benefits once per calendar year. For example, if you received benefits in April 2023, you will be eligible to apply again in April 2024.

Our dedicated Fairfield Social Services staff is now scheduling appointments. To determine if you qualify for either program and to set up an appointment, please contact them at 203-256-3170.

LAKE MOHEGAN CASCADES
