Dear Fairfielders,

As we prepare for a long weekend, in observance of Martin Luther King Jr. Day on Monday, January 18th, I hope that we can all reflect on the values and principles Dr. King stood for that united people of all ethnicities, religions, and backgrounds.

*"The ultimate measure of a man is not where he stands in moments of comfort and convenience, but where he stands at times of challenge and controversy."*

As a nation, we have faced many challenges over the last year. We should carry forward Dr. King's legacy by being respectful of our neighbors, especially in the face of political disagreement and divisiveness.

I am thankful to live in a country where we can celebrate leaders like Dr. King, whose work and sacrifice brought long lasting change for generations. We still have a great deal of work to do and we all have a part to play. I know that our newly established Racial Equity and Justice Task Force is working to identify any racial and ethnic inequalities and injustices in the Town with the goal of providing the Board of Selectman improvements to effectively minimize or eliminate them in our community. I hope we can all come together in this New Year with a renewed focus on what unites us instead of what divides us.

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## **COVID-19 UPDATE:**

**Vaccine Information:** My office as well as the Health Department have been understandably inundated with emails and phone calls about COVID-19 vaccinations this week. Our Health Department has been operating a vaccine clinic for the last three weeks but they are strictly limited in vaccinating those groups who have been approved by the State of Connecticut Department of Public Health and registered in the federal VAMS system.

I am very proud to announce our Health Department has administered 2,850 vaccines. They have set up a clinic that's safe, efficient and a model for other towns. They have had a very difficult year throughout this pandemic keeping up with health education for the community, the extraordinary efforts involved in contact tracing, and have now been reenergized by the ability to help vaccinate our community. I hope you will join me in thanking them for their efforts.

Please note that the Fairfield Health Department's vaccine clinic is booked through February 11th at this time.

While I know many of you are watching the news and seeing information put out by the CDC, the Town cannot act on their guidance without authorization from the Connecticut Department of Public Health. The situation is fluid with new information coming out almost daily. We will continue to post the latest information on the Town website, and the social media pages for the Health Department, the Town of Fairfield and my office. **Eligible residents for the COVID-19 vaccinations include all Phase 1a individuals and only those Phase 1b individuals who are 75 years of age and older.**

### **Phase 1a individuals include:**

- \* Healthcare Personnel: all paid and unpaid persons serving in healthcare settings who have potential for direct or indirect exposure to patients or infectious materials.
- \* Long Term Care Facility Residents: adults who reside in facilities that provide a range of services, including medical and personal care, to persons who are unable to live independently.
- \* First Responders at risk of exposure to COVID-19 through their responses to

medical emergencies such as Emergency Medical Technicians, Police, and Fire.

**Phase 1b individuals eligible at this time include:**

**\*Those who are 75 years old and older. Proof of age will be required at the clinic.**

**If you fall under Phase 1a you should be registering through your employer. For those in the Phase 1b category of 75 and older, you must complete the state form:**

**CT Vaccination Phases & Eligibility**

**Those without internet access can call Connecticut's COVID Vaccine Appointment Assistance Line at 877-918-2224.** The phone system was created in partnership with the Department of Public Health and United Way of Connecticut and is specifically targeted to provide support for eligible vaccine recipients who have limited technology access, or who have language, disability, or other barriers that could prevent them from using existing self-scheduling options successfully. The line will take calls on Mondays through Fridays from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and will offer a call-back option when all contact specialists are busy serving other callers. The team will aim to return calls as soon as possible, with the goal of same-day response.

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**Quarantine Guidance:** The Connecticut Department of Public Health has developed new quarantine guidance based on the CDC's recommendations. These recommendations provide options to reduce the quarantine time from the 14-day period to a 10-day period with specific additional criteria, and 7-day quarantine period with a negative test collected day 5, or after an additional criteria. **Town Data:** The Town of Fairfield has had 3,394 cases to date, and 183 of Fairfield residents have sadly lost their lives. 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**Budget Process:** The Fairfield Superintendent of Schools presented his budget proposal this week to the Board of Education with a nearly \$10 million increase. I am meeting with the Superintendent, his team the Chairwoman and Vice Chairman of the BOE and my administration next week take a hard look at the details and identify some ways to save the taxpayers from a large tax increase. I look forward to continuing conversations as we move forward in the budget process. The Board of Education will conduct budget meetings throughout this month and will vote on their budget at their January 28th meeting. 

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## **TAX DEFERMENT**

Governor Lamont's recently signed [Executive Order No. 9R](#) allows towns to again offer deferment for property tax payments. This past spring the Town of Fairfield approved a tax deferment program (for taxes due April 1st and July 1st) that Governor Lamont authorized in response to the pandemic. The new Executive Order allows towns to offer deferment for taxes due January 1. The extension will be for a total of 90 days, (an additional 60 days beyond the normal grace period). The revised due date is April 1. Anyone who fails to pay

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## **BLACK ROCK CHURCH HOT MEAL DRIVE-THRU**

Black Rock Church will resume its Hot Meal Drive-thru beginning Tuesday, January 12. Each Tuesday through March, between 5:00 - 5:30 PM, individuals and families can receive up to six hot meals for their families, along with a bag of groceries for the rest of the week. Reservations are not required, and the dinners and groceries are free. Black Rock Church is located at 3685 Black Rock Turnpike in Fairfield. 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## **WINTER WEATHER**

Per Town ordinance, Fairfield property owners are responsible for removing snow and ice from the sidewalk along their property line within 24 hours after the storm and keeping the sidewalk clear of snow and ice. Heavily used sidewalks near schools and public buildings, and the commercial areas are particularly important. Property owners may be fined and/or charged the cost of removal if the property owners do not comply. Please remember to shovel around fire hydrants.

It is also state law in Connecticut to remove snow and ice from your vehicle before driving on roads. When you fail to remove snow and ice from your vehicle you are putting yourself and others at risk. Penalties can be as much as \$120 fine.

## Contact Tracing

One of the key tools we have to contain the spread of COVID-19 is Contact Tracing. For this initiative to be successful, the Health Department needs the cooperation of residents who test positive for COVID-19. Both Universities were trained and

assisted by our Health Department to manage their own contact tracing for their respective campuses.

The primary purpose of contact tracing is to identify and notify direct contacts of confirmed cases as quickly as possible and to ensure those exposed are self-quarantining. The information provided in the interviews with confirmed cases helps reduce the potential spread of the virus in our community.

Any Fairfield resident who tests positive for COVID-19 and has not received a phone call from the Fairfield Health Department or the Connecticut COVID Tracing system within 24 hours of receiving their result is urged to contact the Fairfield Health Department at 203-256-3022. Calls received after hours or on weekends, will be returned by the next business day.
