10/15/2021 - 10.15 Penfield Pavilion Update



Dear Fairfielders,

I am sending out an interim update to clarify some misconceptions about the future of Penfield Pavilion, which I know was all over social media the last few days.

This week, I met with my administration and our relevant department heads to determine a timeline for when we should stop taking reservations for events at Penfield Pavilion. This is due to the ongoing environmental testing and remediation required by law, and knowing that we will have to do something with the building since it was constructed in 2017 in violation of the regulations of the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), under FEMA. In simple terms, the placement of the horizontal grade beams in the foundation of the building are against FEMA regulations and will have to be addressed.

My administration has been in discussions with FEMA since they notified us in late June, to determine which engineering solutions would be in compliance. Once we have an idea of what FEMA will allow, I will present several options to our community during public hearings to get resident's input regarding the best path forward. Penfield Pavilion has been rebuilt twice and frankly, I want this to be the last time we have to do anything to this building for a very long time.

I join our residents in their frustration that this was allowed to happen under the previous administration. The time and resources diverted for this entire remediation mess is a disservice to our community. The Town Attorney has been looking into what legal recourse we may pursue regarding the pavilion.

Unfortunately, I had to come up with a timeline, based on the information we have

been receiving from our Licensed Environmental Professionals (LEPs) and FEMA, on when action plans may be signed off on and when we can begin remediation and construction. We therefore have decided to stop taking reservations at Penfield Pavilion after October 31, 2022. I do want you to know that Jacky Durrell will not be affected and can still accept reservations for events.

As I shared in last week's newsletter, the Board of Finance (BOF) met to discuss the Town's \$9.3 million surplus, which was largely created from the Town budgeting for a lower tax collection rate than was actually collected. The Town also achieved savings on the expense side, mostly due to lower personnel costs. The BOF voted to transfer \$1.3 million of the expense surplus to contractual commitments for the retired Town employee healthcare fund. This left approximately \$1.7 million of the \$3 million expense surplus that they voted to transfer to the Town's Fund Balance.

During the meeting, I provided the Board of Finance with an update on the ongoing expected costs related to the fill pile contamination and public corruption that occurred under the former administration. You can watch that portion of the meeting <u>here</u>. While it would have been my preference for the Town to use the remaining approximately \$6 million in revenue surplus to reduce the tax burden on our residents, I felt it was important to recommend the remaining surplus be set aside into the Town's fill pile fund, towards the mounting costs for remediation.

I realize some elected officials may be concerned we don't have definitive financials on these items yet. The projected contamination costs I presented are estimates based on preliminary evaluations by environmental consultants. Even at the low end of the range of costs, the numbers are high and will far exceed the \$6 million in surplus that I am proposing we set aside in the fill pile fund. I feel it would be irresponsible not to recommend that these funds be set aside for this purpose.

My goal is to be proactive as we know these bills will be coming due. We did put \$1 million aside from ARPA funds towards the fill pile remediation and we are awaiting another \$1 million in state bonding. To date, the Town has spent \$2.9 million in testing, remediation and legal fees.

The Board of Selectmen will have a voting item on the agenda for Monday, October 18 to set aside the \$6 million in surplus to the fill pile fund, and I will ask the BOF and RTM to do the same.

I will continue to work on this unfortunate situation and will update you going forward.

#### FAIRFIELD PUBLIC LIBRARIES

The Fairfield Public Main Library building is open Monday, Wednesday & Friday 9am - 5pm and Tuesday & Thursday 9am – 7pm. Woods Branch Library is open Monday &

Veterans and Service Members Student Loan Relief: Veterans and service member with student loans may be eligible for special programs that forgive interest on loans, or even cancel the loan entirely. The Department of Education is working with government agencies to automatically apply these benefits to all eligible loans, but for more information, contact your lender.

The VA is trying to get everyone to file their travel claims online via its new Beneficiary Travel Self Service System, or BTSS. However, travel claims may also be filed at kiosks located in VA medical centers, help desks, or patient services offices at many VA hospital or local clinics.

#### **Commission on disAbilities Seeking Volunteers**

Applications are currently being accepted for volunteers to join the newly established Fairfield Commission on disAbilities, a group intended to promote the inclusion and integration of differently abled people in community activities, services, and employment opportunities. #### **Rental & Utility Assistance**

Tenants and property owners may be eligible for up to \$10,000 towards overdue rent and \$1500 towards utility payments through UniteCT. Apply online at <u>www.bit.ly/UniteCT</u>, or call 1-844-864-8328 for assistance.

#### UniteCT will now:

- Cover arrears accrued since March 13, 2020, rather than only those accrued in last 6 months
- Pay landlords for 100% of covered arrears, rather than only 85%
- Cover 3 full months of prospective rent
- Protect tenants from evictions for nonpayment of rent during the months covered by the prospective rent payments
- Continue to consider waiving the \$10,000 limit on rent assistance, on a case by case basis, for households with extenuating circumstances
- Rely where possible on information about an applicant's enrollment in other state programs to streamline the application process

Please Note: Anybody without a social security card or ITN number may call CIRI (Connecticut Institute for Immigrants and Refugees) for rental assistance at 203-336-0141.

Additional Utility Assistance Through CEAP: Connecticut Energy Assistance Program (CEAP) is underway for 2021/2022. Alliance for Community Empowerment, Fairfield's local Community Action Agency (CAA), is now accepting early intake applications. Contact Alliance at 203 384-6904. If you are unable to apply for energy assistance on your own, you may also apply with the help of the Department of Social Services beginning September 1<sup>st</sup>. Please call 203-256-3170 to make an appointment.

**Emergency Lien Assistance Program: Beginning October 1** Public Act 21-44 will establish an emergency lien assistance program within the Connecticut Housing Finance Authority's Emergency Mortgage Assistance Program. The program is designed to offer loans to homeowners facing foreclosure due to liens from municipal water or sewer charges, municipal tax debt, or association assessments and fines accrued at condos and similar types of housing.

**Eviction Help:** For those facing the possibility of eviction, legal services are available at 1-800-453-3320 (toll free). Important Change for SSI Recipients and Applicants: The Social Security Administration (SSA) recently changed its rules about how pandemic-related financial assistance is considered, such that it will no longer count pandemic related financial assistance against an applicant's eligibility or benefit amounts. The SSA is now reviewing applications, redeterminations, appeals, and other records going back to March 2020. To access or restore benefits, you do not have to wait to be contacted. #### FAIRFIELD CARES RECEIVES \$635K YOUTH DRUG PREVENTION GRANT
