Dear Fairfielders,

With the school year coming to a close and summer officially kicking off on Monday, the Town has many fun, community events coming up organized by our Park and Recreation Department. I know our residents are looking forward to a much better summer than we had last year.

Monday, June 14 was Flag Day, which commemorates when the United States approved the final design for our country's first national flag in 1777. This year, for the first time, we reached out to United Illuminating (UI) to ask permission to install 70 flags along Post Road. This was to not only honor the American flag, but also to decorate our Town in the lead up to Independence Day. I want to thank our Department of Public Works crews who installed them, and I hope that this display of patriotism will bring joy to our community.

Some of our residents reached out to me asking if we could keep the flags up permanently. While I would love to do that, UI only grants usage of their utility poles on a temporary basis, for safety purposes. Next year, I will request additional flags be installed in more areas throughout the Town.

The barbershop has been a beloved small business and well-known Fairfield landmark. Aldo is an Italian immigrant who came to this country at the age of 14. Since becoming the owner of the barbershop in 1970, he has made many sacrifices to support his family while running a small business. I want to thank Aldo, who has cut generations of Fairfielders' hair. I know the Town of Fairfield will greatly miss Aldo and his barbershop. TOWN GOVERNMENT

FILL PILE & REMEDIATION

I wanted to provide several updates regarding remediation activities pursuant to the Consent Order with the Department of Energy & Environmental Protection (DEEP). As of today, remediation at Southport Beach and Lake Mohegan is complete. Next week, remediation work will begin at Jennings Beach for an area around a water line that's north of the parking lot. This work will not have an impact on residents or disrupt use of the beach. After the work at Jennings Beach is completed, the work at Osborne and McKinley Schools will begin. The good news is based on the latest round of testing at both Osborne and McKinley, the scope of the work required is more limited than initially projected by the Town's Licensed Environmental Professionals (LEPs). The Osborne Hill, Jennings, and McKinley sites are anticipated only to take a couple of weeks to complete. At the end of June, remediation work in accordance with the consent order from the environmental agencies is anticipated to commence at Mill Hill School. I will provide an update on the progress in my next newsletter on July 2.

As I shared with you in my <u>March 12 newsletter</u>, the LEP, Weston & Sampson, completed the second round of testing at the fill pile/reclamation yard site, pursuant to a work plan developed with and approved by DEEP and EPA staff. The testing results are being compiled and will soon be shared with DEEP and EPA for discussion about the next steps in developing a remediation plan for the site. After regulators and the Town's advisors develop an agreed-upon remediation approach, a draft plan will be developed. Once the Town has a draft remediation plan, I will host a Town meeting with the LEP and DEEP /

EPA staff, to share the information with our community. This will be an opportunity for our residents to listen to the details of the remediation plan for the fill pile and ask questions. Following the public meeting, the final remediation plan will be developed in concurrence with both the EPA and DEEP, and we will move forward with remediation of the fill pile/reclamation yard site.

Gould Manor

On Monday, the Board of Selectmen and Board of Finance approved funding to remediate Gould Manor Park. Also approved was additional funding to renovate the playground, ball fields, tennis courts, and install a new outdoor fitness park. The remediation portion of the work at the park will take several weeks to complete, and the renovation of the other areas will begin after that. My hope is to have the remediation at Gould Manor begin the end of July, so that the entire park will be fully operational by next spring.

PROPERTY TAX BILLS | A Message from the Tax Collector

Property Tax Bills to be mailed out on June 25th

The 2020 Grand List property tax bills that become due on July 1, 2021 will be mailed out on Friday, June 25th. The Tax Office is open to the public and no appointment is necessary. Once the bills are mailed, you may also look up your bill and pay online by visiting <u>fairfieldct.org/taxpayment</u>. Payments with an original bill coupon can also be made at any People's United Bank location, beginning Thursday, July 1st. You do not need to be a customer.

Please note that according to State Statute, tax payments are due July 1st with a grace period until August 2nd. Interest begins to accrue on Tuesday, August 3rd at a rate of 1 1/2% per month, dating back to July 1, 2021.

FAIRFIELD CITIZEN POLICE ACADEMY

The CPA provides deep insight into the relationship between law enforcement and the community it serves. The comprehensive program includes a wide array of topics and presentations across all divisions of the Fairfield Police Department. The CPA not only provides an opportunity for residents to get to know our Officers, but also for our Officers to have additional opportunities to interact with our residents. "As I close, I want to give thanks. As a citizen, I want to thank every officer and member of the FPD for their service. -As a person of color and an immigrant, thank you for the willingness to have the difficult and very real conversations about race and justice. And for working to hire a diverse and talented force that embodies the highest standards in the profession.

-As a not-for-profit leader that works with communities in need, I thank you for the work your department does to address all aspects of abuse and domestic violence.

-As a cyclist and motorcyclist, I thank you all for making our roads safe for everyone, and for helping to bring facts and closure when accidents happen.

-As a human, I thank you for the awareness and care for the mental health issues that affect so many having that bad day. There is so much to give thanks for and to take away from our 11 weeks together.

We will all drive a little slower. We will lock our cars at night. We will be more mindful and observant. And when we thank an officer, we will do so with a lot more understanding and appreciation."

AAA BOND RATING

I'm proud to announce that after several meetings with the rating agencies, the Town of Fairfield unanimously received a AAA rating from the top three rating agencies, Moody's Investor Services, and S+P Global Ratings and Fitch Ratings. I look forward to the bond sale, at which time the Town will award the bond issues to the bidder who provides the lowest interest rate. This enables the Town to borrow money at a low rate, saving taxpayer dollars.

On Tuesday of this week, the Senate voted unanimously, followed by the House on Wednesday, to establish June 19 "Juneteenth" as a United States federal holiday. The bill was then sent to President Biden's desk where he signed it into law Thursday afternoon. Juneteenth commemorates the day Union soldiers rode into Galveston, Texas and announced the end of the Civil War and the end of slavery in the United States on June 19, 1865. If you'd like to celebrate Juneteenth, Fairfield county is hosting a Juneteenth Parade and Festival at Seaside Park at 12:00 PM on Saturday.



RENTERS REBATE PROGRAM

The Assessors Office is now accepting applications for the Renters Rebate Program. Applications are accepted between 9am and 4pm. The deadline to apply is October 1, 2021. Generally applicants need to be 65 years of age as of December 31, 2020 or be disabled, have income not exceeding \$37,600 if single or \$45,800 if married and have resided in Connecticut for one year prior to applying. SOCIAL SERVICES

EMERGENCY RENTAL ASSISTANCE: If you have been financially impacted by COVID-19, and are struggling to pay your rent and utilities, you may qualify for financial assistance through a new program opened up on March 15th called UniteCT. Eligible applicants include both eligible renters as well as landlords on behalf of eligible tenants.

EMERGENCY BROADBAND BENEFIT

The Emergency Broadband Benefit program provides a discount of up to a \$50 per month toward broadband service for eligible households. The benefit also provides up to a \$100 per household discount toward a one-time purchase of a computer, laptop, or tablet if the household contributes more than \$10 and less than \$50 toward the purchase through a participating broadband provider. A household is eligible if one member of the household meets at least *one* of the criteria. Eligible households can enroll through a <u>participating broadband provider</u> or directly with the <u>Universal Service Administrative Company (USAC)</u> using an online or mail-in application.

RECYCLING DO'S AND DONT'S | SUSTAINABLE FAIRFIELD TASK FORCE Fairfield pays close to \$700,000.00 a year for our recycling programs, but a lot of our Town recycling is contaminated - in other words there are multiple items in the blue bins that CAN NOT Be recycled. Our recycling processor says that close to 25% of our recycling is contaminated - sometimes it is as simple as residents putting their recycling into plastic bags (which the processor then treats as waste even though the materials inside might be good recycling containers).
