Dear Fairfielders,

On March 16, 2020, I signed a declaration of a State of Emergency for the Town of Fairfield as COVID-19 was descending upon our community. It enabled the Town to do many things at the height of the pandemic to keep our residents safe. One such example was being able to limit the use of our beaches to residents only on the weekends. Thankfully, we are well past those days and have a much better understanding of COVID-19, as the rate of hospitalizations and deaths have significantly declined. FIREWORKS AND FUN FACTS

I am so glad we were able to come together and celebrate Independence Day as a community. In continued celebration of Independence Day and our Town, the Fairfield Museum and History Center has put together some fun facts about Fairfield's history that I wanted to share with you:

1. In 1774, at a Fairfield Town Meeting on December 29, held in what's now Old Town Hall, residents voted to support the cause of the American Revolution and the Continental Congress. Later, Fairfielders went on to send large quantities of food supplies to Boston, to help those who were under siege by the British. From early in the Revolutionary period, Fairfield's Town Green was the center of our community's support for American Independence.

2. The Declaration of Independence was read on Fairfield's Town Green, although

we don't have the exact date when it occurred. Most likely it was publicly read sometime in mid-late July, 1776.

3. On July 7, 1779 Fairfield, a Patriot stronghold of prominence was invaded, looted and burned by British troops for over a day, in what is described as "one of the worst experienced [raids] by Connecticutans throughout the entire Revolutionary War.

TOWN GOVERNMENT

AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT FUNDING

Fairfield will receive \$24.8 million over two years from the federal government as part of the Federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA).

On Monday, July 19 at 5:30 PM, the Board of Selectmen, Board of Finance and Representative Town Meeting have been invited to participate and provide input on a list of priorities I have assembled together with our Town's Department Heads at an online, informational workshop. Members of those boards, along with the public, are encouraged to offer their input on projects during the meeting and in continued conversations over the next month and a half.

In September, a final list will be presented to each board for a vote of approval.

There are six main areas of focus for the projects I selected: social services and mental health, economic development, public safety, the environment, quality of life: recreation, arts & culture, and town modernization and infrastructure.

FILL USE REMEDIATION AND FILL PILE UPDATE

Since my last update, the remediation work at Osborne Elementary, Southport Beach and McKinley School is complete. The final step for those locations is to put down clean top soil and lay down sod which will occur in the coming weeks. At Mill Hill School, all the Julian Fill has been removed, but some further work will be done by the school administration. The work at Jennings Beach began on Tuesday of this week and should be finished by early next week. Letters were also mailed to affected homeowners on Sunset Avenue; certain areas where Julian Fill was used in connection with a curbing project will be remediated during the week of July 19.

Testing for a sight on Old Dam Road, where Julian Fill was used, was recently completed where PCBs were originally identified. The Licensed Environmental Professional is working on a remediation plan, which the Town will consider in the coming weeks and review with environmental regulators.

My last correspondence on the fill pile remediation was in the [June 18](#) newsletter. The only update I have to share on the fill pile since then, is that the Town is scheduled to meet with regulators in early August. We will discuss the next steps in the process to address this site. I will continue to keep you updated as I have more information.

GOULD MANOR UPDATE

We are still waiting on final sign off from the Department of Public Health before remediation work will begin at Gould Manor. Remediation work will likely begin the first week of August and take 3-4 weeks to complete. Then renovations of the playgrounds and tennis courts will begin. We still are planning for a reopening of Gould Manor by spring 2022.

It will look a bit different but rest assured, proceeds will continue to help feed, house and counsel our neighbors in need and you are guaranteed to find some treasures.

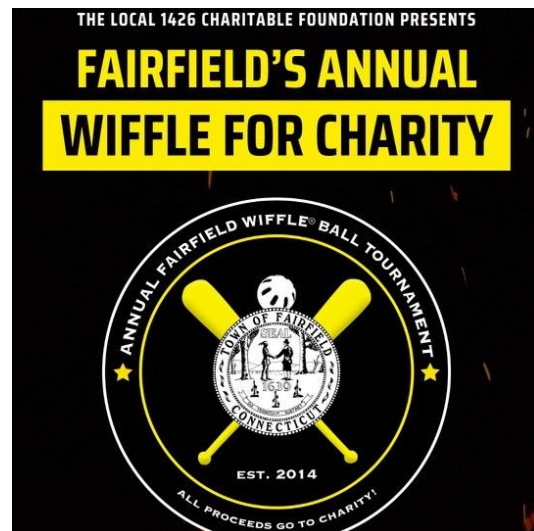

JULY UPDATES

ROAD CONSTRUCTION AT THE TRANSFER STATION

Construction is underway on Richard White Way from 7 AM - 3:30 PM, Monday through Friday. Residents should expect delays, and when possible, plan trips to the transfer station Mondays and Saturdays. Next week the water and gas companies will be relocating their utilities and the pile driver will be driving steel sheets at the WWTP, to protect the neighborhood from flooding. Neighbors should expect to feel some vibration from this work.



BIRD FEEDING HALT FOR SUMMER

The Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection recommends that you remove birdfeeders and bird food from **late March through November**, due to increased reports of black bear sightings in heavily populated residential areas -- 24 specific sightings in Fairfield.



Anyone who sees a bear in Fairfield can contact animal control at 203-254-4857. If the animal is behaving aggressively or refusing to leave a residential area, people should call the police department at 203-254-4800. RENTERS REBATE PROGRAM

The Assessors Office is now accepting applications for the Renters Rebate Program. Applications are accepted between 9am and 4pm. The deadline to apply is October 1, 2021. Generally applicants need to be 65 years of age as of December 31, 2020 or be disabled, have income not exceeding \$37,600 if single or \$45,800 if married and have resided in Connecticut for one year prior to applying. PROPERTY TAX BILLS | A Message from the Tax Collector

Property Tax Bills were mailed out on **June 25th**

The 2020 Grand List property tax bills that become due on July 1, 2021 will be mailed out on Friday, June 25th. The Tax Office is open to the public and no appointment is necessary. Once the bills are mailed, you may also look up your bill and pay online by visiting fairfieldct.org/taxpayment. Payments with an original bill coupon can also be made at any People's United Bank location, beginning Thursday, July 1st. You do not need to be a customer.

Please note that according to State Statute, tax payments are due July 1st with a grace period until August 2nd. Interest begins to accrue on Tuesday, August 3rd at a rate of 1 1/2% per month, dating back to July 1, 2021.

ADVANCE CHILD TAX CREDIT PAYMENTS BEGIN JULY 15

Important changes to the Child Tax Credit: Parents of children 17 years old and younger will soon receive advance monthly payments on half of the total credit amount between July and December 2021. The other half may be claimed when 2021 taxes are filed.

What this means: Families get the full tax credit if they make up to \$150,000 for a couple, or \$112,000 for a family with a single parent (also called head of household). In other words, over the next 6 months, these families will get \$250/month for each child between the ages of 6 – 17, and \$300 per month for each child under 6. Families with higher incomes may be eligible for reduced payments.

How it works: Automatic payments will begin July 15th for those who filed a tax return in 2019 or 2020, and claimed the Child Tax Credit. Automatic payments will also go out to those who received a stimulus check during the pandemic.

PLEASE NOTE: Advanced payments will be sent out to income eligible parents who were not required to file. However, for parents who did **NOT** file tax returns in 2019 or 2020, **OR** receive a stimulus check, please use the Child Tax Credit **Non-filer Sign-Up Tool** in order to start receiving these payments as soon as possible.

RECYCLING DO'S AND DONT'S | SUSTAINABLE FAIRFIELD TASK FORCE

Fairfield pays close to \$700,000.00 a year for our recycling programs, but a lot of our Town recycling is contaminated - in other words there are multiple items in the blue bins that CAN NOT Be recycled. Our recycling processor says that close to 25% of our recycling is contaminated - sometimes it is as simple as residents putting their recycling into plastic bags (which the processor then treats as waste even though the materials inside might be good recycling containers).

SAFETY TIPS FOR PEDESTRIAN, BIKING, AND RUNNING | FAIRFIELD'S BICYCLE AND PEDESTRIAN COMMITTEE

As more of our fellow Fairfielders get out to enjoy the summer weather, your town's Bicycle and Pedestrian Committee would like to remind townspeople of the



following safety tips for motorists, pedestrians and cyclists to ensure we operate as safely as possible. Below is a summarized list of more lengthy tips at the Committee's website www.fairfieldct.org/bikeped that also includes Fairfield's Complete Street's Policy, maps of our town's bicycle routes, pumps, bike repair stations, and more.

Motorists

- Expect pedestrians and cyclists on the road
- Reduce speed when encountering pedestrians and cyclists
- Look for cyclists when opening doors.
- Give cyclists *at least* 3 feet of space
- Connecticut is a yield State regarding pedestrians in crosswalks
- Never drive under the influence of alcohol or other substances that impair the operation of a motor vehicle

Pedestrians

- ALWAYS face traffic, it's the law because it's safer
- Walk/run single file
- Make sure you're visible
- Keep your dogs on a short leash
- Don't cover your ears so you can't hear
- Cross the street safely, use a crosswalk whenever possible

Cyclists

- Ride with the traffic flow
- Obey all traffic laws
- Ride single file if riding with others
- Yield to traffic when appropriate
- Don't cover your ears so you can't hear
- Be predictable
- Stay alert at all times
- Look before turning
- Watch for parked cars
