Dear Fairfielders,

I am sending out the newsletter early this week, as many of us will begin to celebrate the religious holidays of Good Friday, Easter, and Passover. The holidays coincide with Spring, where we celebrate renewal, rebirth, freedom, and forgiveness. I want to personally wish all Fairfielders a lovely holiday with your families and friends.

TOWN GOVERNMENT NEWS

FEDERAL GRANT RECEIVED

I am excited to share that Fairfield received a federal grant of \$3.50 million in assistance to replace the Town's emergency radio network. I want to thank Senator Blumenthal for his help in securing these federal dollars that will cover the cost to build the infrastructure of the network that will allow our Police and Fire Departments to connect directly with the State's platform and other municipalities, which is critical during emergencies for both first responders and our community.

I want to recognize Captain Pete Koval, who took the lead in writing the grant application for this funding. We are working on another application for additional grant funding with Congressman Himes' Office that would add Public Works, Parks & Recreation, the Board of Education, and the Sewer and Health Departments onto this emergency network system.

These remaining Town departments currently operate on isolated systems that are either not compatible with one another or have no system at all. The level of

interoperability gained through this project will not only increase the safety of Fairfield's first responders but will also allow them to operate more efficiently through direct communication access. This project will bring Fairfield's Public Safety communications into the future on the State's exceptionally reliable and secure platform preventing unauthorized access/interference.



TOWN BUDGET

The Representative Town Meeting (RTM) held its budget hearings on April 6th and April 7th, which you can watch by clicking on the respective dates. The RTM will vote on the budget Monday, May 2nd, and the Board of Finance (BOF) will set the Mill Rate on Thursday, May 5th.

Per the Town Charter, the RTM has the authority to decrease the budget but not increase it unless an appeal to a cut is submitted. Department heads are appealing three cuts to the RTM made by the BOF. The RTM can vote with a 2/3 majority to restore the funding. I included an overview of the changes the BOF made to the budget in my last newsletter that you can read here. I will send out more information in my April 29th newsletter on how to tune into the RTM meeting and reach out to your RTM members to voice your opinion in advance of the budget vote.

CHARTER REVISION COMMISSION

The Charter Revision Commission held a special meeting on April 4th. The Commission discussed the Town governance model, resignations and vacancies,

and the remaining Commission meeting schedule so they can coordinate with the Work Plan Group. You can view the full discussion here and reference the baseline document here. Their next meeting will be tonight. You can view the agenda and see instructions to listen to the meeting here.

REDISTRICTING UPDATE

I provided an in-depth update on the RTM Redistricting Committee in my last newsletter that you can read <u>here</u>.

Since then, the Secretary of State's office rendered an opinion through their Staff Attorney to the Fairfield Town Attorney, which was read into the record by RTM Representative Iacono at the beginning of the April 11th Redistricting meeting.

There appears to be a disagreement on whether or not to change the polling places once or twice and whether or not to let the Charter Revision Commission complete its work that could potentially change the Town's number of RTM Districts. According to the Secretary of State's Office, the State Statute does not require redistricting to be completed until March or April of 2023, ahead of the November 2023 municipal elections.

As I have shared in prior newsletters, the Charter Revision Commission will send its recommendations to the Board of Selectmen (BOS) for approval. Whatever changes pass through the BOS will be placed on the ballot this November for Fairfield voters to weigh in on. Personally, I feel it makes sense for the RTM Redistricting Committee to reconvene after November and before the March/April 2023 statutory deadline to finalize the Town's district lines.



COVID-19 UPDATE

The <u>CDC</u> has changed from community transmission indicators to a community indicator based on hospitalization data. CT is currently rated as "low," as is <u>Fairfield County</u>. We don't have word yet on how CT DPH will change their protocols, but I do believe this is a much better tool in assessing the real impact of COVID in our community at this point in the pandemic.

For vaccination locations, there are <u>numerous sites</u> available in Fairfield and nearby as well as <u>daily walk-in clinics</u> in many Towns.

There are <u>10 COVID testing</u> sites in Fairfield under contract to offer no-cost testing to CT residents.

FRESH WATER FISHING SEASON

BIRD FEEDING HALT FOR SUMMER

The Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection recommends

that you remove birdfeeders and bird food from <u>late March through November</u>, due to increased reports of black bear sightings in heavily populated residential areas.

Anyone who sees a bear in Fairfield can contact animal control at **(203) 254-4857**. If the animal is behaving aggressively or refusing to leave a residential area, residents should call the police department at **(203) 254-4800**. 

FUNDING AVAILABLE FOR HOME REPAIRS

Spring showers bring...home repairs? If you're a Fairfield homeowner dealing with a

leaky roof or if you're needing to make other repairs to your home, the Community & Economic Development Department may be able to help. Eligible homeowners can receive up to 60% of the total project cost, up to a maximum of \$15,000 per qualified applicant, per year. Financial assistance is provided in the form of a special, no-

interest loan that is repaid when the owner sells, refinances, or transfers the property. Eligible home improvements include exterior painting, siding, or roofing projects; installation of new or replacement storm windows and doors; lead-based paint or asbestos abatement projects;



installation of replacement boilers or hot water heaters; heating, plumbing, or electrical improvements to address code deficiencies and modifications to accommodate persons with disabilities.

Applicants must be income-eligible and a current Town of Fairfield homeowner to participate in this program. Certain other restrictions do apply.
