FAIRFIELD RECOGNIZES NATIONAL POLICE WEEK

During this week, we honor and recognize law enforcement officers who lost their lives in the line of duty for the safety and protection of the communities they served.

The Fairfield Police Department and police departments everywhere have shouldered many challenges in modern policing that require so much more of the men and women who protect our Town every day. Fairfield thanks the Fairfield Police Department for their selfless and dedicated service to our community.

Fairfield pays special recognition to its Officers whose names appear on the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial:

Officer James Cavanaugh (EOW 04/11/1966) and Deputy Sheriff Francis Melville Pike (EOW 05/13/1894), who served Fairfield prior to the official formation of the Fairfield Police Department in 1930.

TOWN GOVERNMENT NEWS

TOWN BUDGET

I sent out a <u>budget update</u> last Friday after the BOF set the mill rate for Fiscal Year 2023, at 27.24, a .96% increase.

Ultimately, the budget is where Town operations and financials meet. It has been my goal to improve services and create efficiencies in Town government while being mindful of the impact on taxpayers. I believe additional budget adjustments could have been made by the Town bodies to reduce spending, especially considering the record-high inflation rates residents are experiencing. I encourage you to continue voicing your opinions on the budget and other Town matters with all your elected officials.



CHANGE IN POLLING LOCATIONS

I want to share with residents what occurred at an emergency RTM meeting on Tuesday evening with just 24 hours' notice given to its members and the public. This meeting resulted in nearly 40% of Fairfield's registered voters unnecessarily having a new polling location this year, and will potentially face being assigned

another new polling location for November of 2023.

The State Legislature redrew its legislative district lines in accordance with the

Census for this November's state elections. State Statute requires towns to redraw their RTM district lines by the Spring of 2023, ahead of the municipal elections.

There was a fundamental disagreement between the political parties as to whether or not we needed to change the polling locations this year. Personally, I think changing polling locations is disruptive and should only be done when required.

The Town verified for the RTM that it does not have to redraw district lines until the Spring of 2023, with the staff attorney in the Secretary of State's Office and was confirmed by the Town Attorney. (You can read the legal opinion from the Secretary of State's office in the backup on page 5 linked here.)

Ultimately, on a party-line vote, the RTM voted to add three polling places to the Town's existing ten, for this year's State primaries and general elections. This will result in 16,600 voters having to go to a different polling place this year and will generate more costs to run the elections. There is a high likelihood that many voters will see another change in the 2023 municipal elections when the new RTM district lines are redrawn.

While I have no authority to intervene in the RTM's decision, as your First Selectwoman, I will make sure to keep you informed of changes to your polling locations and any new information coming out of the Registrar of Voters office.

CHARTER REVISION COMMISSION

The Charter Revision Commission (CRC) has been working diligently over many months, reviewing our <u>Town Charter</u> with a Charter Revision Attorney to assist with this work. There has been a lot of feedback from the community and careful review by CRC members.

The Commission held a special meeting on May 11th, where it discussed Articles II-VII of the Town Charter, Articles VIII and IX, and the budget. You can watch the discussion <u>here</u>.

The Commission also convened on May 12th to discuss the Board of Education, cooperation provision, uniform creation standards, and specific board and

AFFORDABLE HOUSING PLAN

The Affordable Housing Committee held a public hearing Wednesday to receive comments on its proposed 2022-27 Affordable Housing Plan. You can view a copy of the proposed Plan here, the presentation here, and the recording of the public hearing here.

The Affordable Housing Plan is intended to outline goals and strategies to facilitate the development of affordable housing and housing options in Fairfield over the next five years.

The Town last updated its affordable housing plan in 2014. Under State law, communities must prepare or update an affordable housing plan by June 1, 2022, and every five years thereafter. The Affordable Housing Committee will meet next week to review and make any final adjustments to the Plan, before submitting it to the Board of Selectmen in advance of the June 1st deadline.



STATE LEGISTLATION

ADEQUATE SHELTER BILL

I am pleased to share that <u>HB 5170</u>, "An Act Concerning the Tethering and Sheltering of Dogs," has passed the house and Senate. HB 5170 will now be sent to the Governor's office for his signature to become law.

I was very passionate about this legislation when I served in the Connecticut General Assembly and took the time to share written <u>testimony</u> on the bill this year. I have always been a strong advocate for animal welfare issues and served as Co-Chair of the Animal Welfare Caucus for several terms in the legislature. During my time in the legislature, I worked on many common-sense animal welfare laws to protect those who cannot protect themselves.

I believe the passing of this legislation will make it easier for Fairfield's local ordinance on proper shelter and tethering of dogs that is being proposed by the RTM.

Once the ordinance is reviewed by the Town Attorney, it will be brought before the RTM for consideration.

COVID-19 UPDATE

The <u>CDC</u> has changed from community transmission indicators to a community indicator based on hospitalization data. CT is currently rated as "medium," as is <u>Fairfield County</u>. For vaccination locations, there are <u>numerous sites</u> available in Fairfield and nearby as well as <u>daily walk-in clinics</u> in many Towns.

There are <u>10 COVID testing</u> sites in Fairfield under contract to offer no-cost testing to CT residents.

The Health Department will be offering a COVID-19 booster clinic on Thursday, May 19^{th} – Moderna only from 11:00 AM – 2:00 PM. Appointments should be made through the CDC VAMS website.

Clinics will be held at our Public Health Nursing Office located at 100 Mona Terrace in the white portable behind the Senior Center.



FUNDING AVAILABLE FOR HOME REPAIRS

Spring showers bring...home repairs? If you're a Fairfield homeowner dealing with a leaky roof or if you're needing to make other repairs to your home, the Community & Economic Development Department may be able to help. Eligible homeowners can receive up to 60% of the total project cost, up to a maximum of \$15,000 per qualified applicant, per year. Financial assistance is provided in the form of a special, no-

interest loan that is repaid when the owner sells, refinances, or transfers the property. Eligible home improvements include exterior painting, siding, or roofing projects; installation of new or replacement storm windows and doors; lead-based paint or asbestos abatement projects;



installation of replacement boilers or hot water heaters; heating, plumbing, or electrical improvements to address code deficiencies and modifications to accommodate persons with disabilities.

Applicants must be income-eligible and a current Town of Fairfield homeowner to participate in this program. Certain other restrictions do apply.
