SEA MEMORIAL EVENT

The Saturday before Memorial Day our community gathers alongside our Veterans for a memorial ceremony for those lost at sea, and those who were buried at sea, in service of our country. The event was originally organized by David Russell, former Fairfield fire chief, WWII Patrol Craft veteran, and member of Port 5, over thirty-four years ago. Captain Roger Crossland, USN (Ret.) served as the Officer of the Day.

This year's guest of honor was Fairfielder and World War II Radioman First Class Carl Massaro, who served aboard a Landing Ship Medium (Rockets) during the Battle of Okinawa (April 1 – June 22, 1945).

It filled my heart with pride to watch the Massaro family helping their father, Carl, 97year-old World War II Veteran and long-time personal favorite of mine, lay the wreath for the Sea Memorial.

I would like to thank our Town Clerk, Betsy Browne, who helped organize this lovely

memorial event and for all our Town's American Legions and VFW's for their service and participation that brings such honor to this Memorial Day service in our Town.



It was my honor to recognize Purple Heart Recipient and Fairfield Police Officer Alan Bakula at the Sea Memorial. Officer Bakula is a former US Army Sergeant and OGA contractor with over 10 combined deployments, and a recipient of multiple Purple Heart and valor citations.





Officer Bakula received his first Purple Heart after being hit with small arms while actively engaged in a firefight during an operation in northern Afghanistan. He received his second Purple Heart after he and his team were ambushed in a minefield and wounded from an anti-personnel mine detonated by a teammate directly behind him resulting in severe fragmentation wounds and his teammate losing a leg.

Officer Bakula represented the Fairfield Police Department at the Memorial Day Parade in honor of all those who sacrificed so much for our country who sustained wounds far worse in the name of freedom.

I want to thank Fairfield resident Jim Yacone, who is a Silver Star and Purple Heart recipient and was not able to attend the ceremony. He and Major (Ret.) Dan Eddinger approached our Town about becoming a Purple Heart community and worked closely with the Town's Chief Administrative Officer Tom Bremer, who is a

Vietnam Veteran, to make this possible.

I was proud to announce during the ceremony that Fairfield is officially a **Purple Heart Town**, and is now listed as a Town on the <u>Purple Heart Trail</u>.

A Purple Heart flag will fly on August 7th, which is National Purple Heart Day and the town



will be placing Purple Heart parking signs at Independence Hall and Old Town Hall and in other areas in Town to honor Purple Heart Recipients.

MEMORIAL DAY MASS

Sunday's Annual Memorial Day Mass was sponsored by the Knights of Columbus at Our Lady of Assumption Catholic Church with Father Peter Cipriani. It was a privilege to be invited to speak in honor of those who paid the ultimate sacrifice for our country.



TOWN GOVERNMENT NEWS

CHARTER REVISION COMMISSION

The Charter Revision Commission (CRC) will vote on their final changes to the <u>Town</u> <u>Charter</u> at Monday's <u>meeting</u>, and then their final recommendations will come before the Board of Selectmen for a vote.

In an effort to ensure the fairest and most transparent Charter Revision process, I hired special counsel <u>Steve Mednick</u> to facilitate the Commission's work, and every meeting held by the Commission has been shown live on Fair TV and online. All meetings have been posted to the Commission's website <u>here</u>. The CRC has held public hearings and allowed for public comment during meetings and via email. Attorney Mednick brought in expert panelists on different forms of government and officials from other CT municipalities joined the meetings to relay their experiences.

Residents and elected officials are encouraged to watch all meetings to understand the process and the reasoning for suggested changes by the Commission.

After the CRC's final vote, the BOS will hold special meetings to hear and vote on the changes. One of those meetings will include a public hearing. If approved, those revisions will go on the ballot in November for all citizens to vote on.

FIRE DEPARTMENT RATING | HOMEOWNERS INSURANCE

Fire Chief Denis McCarthy and I would like to recognize Asst. Chief Schuyler

Sherwood, who led a committed team of Department members participating in a recent Insurance Services Office (ISO) Public Protection Classification review. The ISO rating is the basis for Fire Insurance rates on insurance policies, and homeowners will benefit from lower rates as a result of this effort.



In this process, the team worked to improve critical areas of

Training, Operations, Fire Prevention, Apparatus Maintenance, Communications, and Water Supply/Hydrants toward gaining a classification upgrade from Class 3 to Class 2. Fairfield is now one of 1729 Fire Departments nationwide with a Class 2 rating.

Fairfield is truly lucky to have Asst. Chief Schuyler Sherwood, who is a longtime member of the Fire Department and is dedicated to the Fairfield community.

WELCOME NEW POLICE OFFICERS

I was honored to swear in and welcome five new Police Officers to the Police Department this past week.

Officers Jonathan Simmons and Sara Ball are joining Fairfield with previous law enforcement experience. Officer Simmons is a lateral transfer from the Bridgeport Police Department, and Officer Ball is a lateral transfer from the Trumbull Police Department. Officers Jonathan Maisonet, Omaine Stephens and Brett Ubaldi are entry-level officers who have begun training at the Connecticut Police Academy and will



be joining their fellow officers upon completion.

I am proud our Police Department is able to recruit such great candidates in what is otherwise a very difficult time for police departments. Please join me in welcoming these officers and wishing them safe and successful careers.

BIGELOW CENTER FOR SENIOR ACTIVITIES UNVEILS NEW BUS

A brand new Senior Center bus, one of a fleet of five, is running on weekdays, helping Fairfield's seniors and residents with disabilities get to doctor appointments, grocery shopping, the bank, and the senior center. Riders are charged \$1 each way. The senior transportation program averages more than 11,500 trips per year, traveling more than 57,000 miles each year. During the pandemic, these buses drove more than 3,600 trips and nearly 48,000 miles.

The Town of Fairfield is grateful for the grant funding that is part of the Federal Transit Administration's Section 5310 Program to support public transportation services that meet the needs of seniors and those with disabilities. The Town was awarded 80% of the total price of a new 13-seat, wheelchair-lift enabled replacement bus. The new bus allows us to serve a larger number of residents with a high degree of comfort and safety. I hope residents will utilize and enjoy this service.





SLOW DOWN, MOVE OVER

Every day, law enforcement officers put their lives on the line for the safety of all. The dangers these officers face extend to operating on limited-access highways, such as I-95 and the Merritt Parkway in Connecticut. In 2021, there were <u>65</u> first responder fatalities caused by secondary accidents while responding to an emergency. This conveys the importance of Connecticut's "Slow Down and Move Over Law," which requires motor vehicle operators to slow down and move over to provide safe clearance for first responders.

The Town of Fairfield proudly stands with and advocates for Flagman. Founded by Cindy lodice, the sister of Fairfield native Cory lodice, who was tragically killed while aiding a motorist in need on the Merritt Parkway in 2020, Flagman dedicates its mission to educating others on road safety during emergencies. DOG LICENSING

Dogs six months of age or older must be licensed by July 1st each year. A current rabies certificate is required.

Licenses may be purchased by mail, via lobby drop box or at the Town Clerk's Office, Monday – Friday, 8:30 AM to 4:00 PM beginning June 1st. Renewals are available online.

DUCK FARM ROAD BRIDGE DEMOLITION & RECONSTRUCTION

Duck Farm Road Bridge will be closed beginning June 13th at 10:00 AM for demolition. The contractor anticipates closing the road from June 13th, and lasting through the construction season through the end of the year.

Detours will be designated as illustrated in the approved plan. The main detour will utilize Brookside and Mill Plain Road. However, the Town has installed additional signs well before the bridge to alert traffic to take alternate routes and avoid the area, if possible. The Fairfield Police Traffic Unit will monitor potential issues. The proposed detour map is listed below. 

COVID-19 UPDATE

The <u>CDC</u> has changed from community transmission indicators to a "<u>Community</u> <u>Level</u>" indicator, which is focused more on the presence of severe illness as indicated by hospitalization-related data. Since seeing a peak of COVID-19 activity during the third week of May, cases, hospitalizations and deaths have been trending downward. Fairfield County is currently in the CDC's "Low" Community level category with most counties in CT being in the "Medium" category. We recommend residents follow the <u>CDC guidance</u> which includes staying up to date with vaccination and getting tested if ill.

For vaccination locations, there are <u>numerous sites</u> available in Fairfield and nearby as well as <u>daily walk-in clinics</u> in many Towns.

The Health Department is holding two vaccination clinics next week on June 15^{th} from 10 AM – 1 PM for those 12 and older (Moderna boosters) and on June 16^{th} from 4 PM – 6 PM for those 5 to 11 (Pfizer boosters). Sign up through <u>VAMS</u>.

There are <u>10 COVID testing</u> sites in Fairfield under contract to offer no-out-of-pocket cost testing to CT residents.

FUNDING AVAILABLE FOR HOME REPAIRS

Spring showers bring...home repairs? If you're a Fairfield homeowner dealing with a leaky roof or if you're needing to make other repairs to your home, the Community & Economic Development Department may be able to help. Eligible homeowners can receive up to 60% of the total project cost, up to a maximum of \$15,000 per qualified applicant, per year. Financial assistance is provided in the form of a special, no-

interest loan that is repaid when the owner sells, refinances, or transfers the property. Eligible home improvements include exterior painting, siding, or roofing projects; installation of new or replacement storm windows and doors; lead-based paint or asbestos abatement projects;



installation of replacement boilers or hot water heaters; heating, plumbing, or electrical improvements to address code deficiencies and modifications to accommodate persons with disabilities. Applicants must be income-eligible and a current Town of Fairfield homeowner to participate in this program. Certain other restrictions do apply.
