

TOWN OF FRANKLIN HISTORICAL OVERVIEW

As we celebrate another Founders Day, events of the past become lifesize once again. Our thoughts go to the very early days and the founding of "our Town" on May 26, 1836, which was originally a part of the Town of Bellmont.

Town government has remained substantially the same over the years. A Town Board of elected officials, four councilmen and a supervisor form the Board. The first supervisor was Harry B. Hatch at whose home the first town meeting was held on July 1, 1836. In addition to the Town Board, other elected or appointed officials are the Town Clerk, Tax Collector, Justice, Assessor, Constable, Highway Superintendent, and Fire Code and Building Code Inspectors. Board meetings were held at prescribed times and places. At the present time Board meetings are held on the second Monday of every month.

The Town of Franklin is the third largest town in the county of Franklin containing 108,416 acres with 60.5 miles of Town-owned roads to maintain. It would be reasonable to assume that the number of miles of town roads increased over the years to the present day as population increased. In fact, the population has increased to 1,016 in 1990 from a figure of less than 200 in 1836. In addition, over the past few years, winter maintenance, plowing and sanding, is provided by the town for 28.3 miles of county roads. Highway maintenance was and still is one of the Town's most needed and greatest expenditures. As early as 1851, the Town was divided into districts under the supervision of a Commissioner of Highways, who was Thomas Goldsmith. Each district was headed by its own Overseer of Highways serving under the Commissioner. Road warrants were drawn up for the purpose of upkeep of the roads. Each district assessed the inhabitants of that particular district for the required manpower to maintain the roads throughout the year. Penalties were imposed on all persons having neglected or refused to work out their highway assessments. Over the years, this practice changed and a regular highway department with highway employees developed.

Prior to the establishment of the Town of Franklin in 1836, the settlement of Franklin Falls in 1827 was operating a sawmill and forge. A catastrophic fire in 1852 reduced the area to ashes. Very little remains of this early settlement except the hydro-electric plant of the former utility company, Paul Smith Electric Light, Power and Railroad Company which was sold to Niagara Mohawk Power Corporation.

The area known as Merrillsville was settled in 1829 by Lamsons, Cates and Merrills. Some of the early buildings are still standing today. The John R. Merrill Inn was a famous stopover for the stage coaches. The Merrillsville Town Hall (a former Merrill building) was purchased and moved by the Town in 1920 to its present site. It is used today as a voting and caucus district.

Onchiota, established in the late 1800's, was a mill town with a general store and the only phone in town. In July of 1903, property on Clear Pond, which was near Onchiota, was purchased by Paul C. Ransom who established the Adirondack-Florida School for boys. World War II brought changes and the northern campus was closed in 1949. The buildings were sold and are now used as private homes.

The Town of Franklin boasted of a black population as early as 1846, resulting from the efforts of Gerrit Smith (abolitionist) to resettle former slaves. Many Civil War veterans brought slaves home with them to further the cause of freedom and help them find homes. The local cemeteries contain many of their names.

The Hopkinton and Port Kent Turnpike, the major artery, was under construction from 1829 to 1832. Cedar mile posts were set along the entire route with numbers cut in the wood. All of the route is currently maintained.

Two railroads, namely the Delaware and Hudson and the New York Central served this area after the 1870's. The service was curtailed around 1968. Eight regular daily trains, plus freight trains were routed through these lines. Many of the large, well known inns and hotels have since fallen into disuse as a result of readily available motor and air transportation.

The one and two-room schools that dotted the town are now closed and students travel by bus to a centralized school district in Saranac Lake. In early times, students walked in all kinds of weather as there were no buses.

Churches in the town have changed over the years as follows:

Merrillsville Methodist Church, Merrillsville was established in 1894 and taken down in 1947 when no longer needed.

St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Vermontville began at the turn of the century and has been inactive since the 1970's. It was sold in 1993 to a business.

The former Wesleyan Methodist Church, Vermontville was in existence in 1849 and later sold to the Methodist Episcopal Church, Vermontville in 1895. When it was no longer needed in Vermontville, it was consolidated with Bloomingdale United Methodist Church March 10, 1966. The building was sold to the Vermontville Nazarene Church on August 18, 1966 and is presently very active.

St. Rose Church, Alder Brook was erected in 1854 and destroyed by fire December 8, 1924.

The Town of Franklin has celebrated the founding of the town each year since 1986 with displays, craft tables, games, naming a king and queen and an evening square dance.

A TOUR OF THE TOWN OF FRANKLIN BACK ROADS

Refer to the map on the adjoining page.
First, locate the *Franklin Town Hall* on Route 3 Vermontville.
Start the trip 300 yards southwest at *Norman Ridge Road*.

- (A) *Norman Ridge Road* will quickly open up to awesome views of *Whiteface Mountain*, old barns, and fields.
- (B) Irish and English immigrants to *Alderbrook* in 1848 were some of the earliest settlers in the area. In *St. Rose of Lima Cemetery* is the monument of Rev. Richard O'Donnell who served the entire Town of Franklin as pastor, healer, and civic leader from 1891 - 1949.
- (C) *The Port Kent to Hopkinton Turnpike* was largely responsible for providing access for the Town's early settlers. The *Goldsmith Road* evokes a feeling of how roads in the area used to be. Originally settled by Gerritt Smith, the abolitionist, in the late 1800's, Goldsmith's became a thriving lumber mill town. There are few traces of it left. Parallelling the Goldsmith Road is the north branch of the Saranac River which has public access for anglers.
- (D) *Loon Lake House* (est. 1879) was a famous resort run by Ferd and Mary Chase. The golf shop at the *Loon Lake Golf Course* (est. 1895) is a great place to have lunch on the porch and peruse the pictorial history of the area.
- (E) Traveling back down the mountain you may wish to stop at *Hunters' Home Spring* site of Paul Smith's first hotel. Make a right directly across from the Goldsmith Road. Go 300 yards and on the left across the bridge is the spring. Drink crystal mountain water.
- (F) *Maxine Summer's Antiques*, once a part of the *Merrill Inn*, is a great place to buy antiques and collectibles.
- (G) *Red Barn Antiques* is also an interesting place to stop and buy antiques and collectibles.
- (H) Stepping into the *Six Nations Museum* is like entering a kaleidoscope of Indian history and culture. A must see!
- (I) *Buck Pond Campground* is one of the finest in New York State. There are beautiful, quiet, well kept facilities here for swimming, picnicking, and camping.
- (J) *Forest Murmurs* is a unique collection of original Adirondack furnishings and items for sale in an old church.

This trip is approximately forty-two miles long. It can be driven quickly in half a day or taken more leisurely for a full day's tour. Most intersections are well sign posted with small brown wooden signs with yellow lettering. Although this route is beautiful most any time of year, many of the stopping places are only open during the warmer months.



WORLD WAR II VETERANS

The following pages contain a collection of copies of newspaper clippings and photographs of our area World War II service men and women. For the most part, they have been arranged alphabetically.

The first two pages are dedicated to two men who made the supreme sacrifice in the service of their country: Donald R. Merrill and Ellsworth Stickney. Their names are followed by a star on the Hall Honor Roll that adorns a wall in the Town Hall in Vermontville. See copy on inside front cover of this booklet.

The source materials for these pages came from collections held by the Saranac Lake Free Library, Edwin Merrill, Mescal Thomas, Cora Cray, Bing Tormey, and from some individuals themselves.

Attempts were made to include pictures or articles of all the individuals named on the Honor Roll; however the limited amount of time and resources available toward this effort restricted the attainment of that goal.

We also recognize that there are area residents who served in World War II whose names are not included in the Honor Roll and some material related to them has been included.

It should be noted that without the efforts of Carol Lavigne and Norma Peckham this section of the booklet would not have materialized.

Lieut. D. R. Merrill Killed in Action in Raid over Germany

VERMONTVILLE, Dec. 9—Official word that her son, Lieut. Donald R. Merrill of Vermontville, who has been missing in action over Germany since August 25, has been killed in action was received Thursday by his mother, Mrs. Frank Cass, of this village.

A War department telegram notified Mrs. Cass that Lieut. Merrill had been killed following a bombing raid on Germany. He was a bombardier of one of the American Air Forces heavy bombers.

Lieut. Merrill was inducted into the Army on Aug. 6, 1941. He was sent to Officer Candidate school at Fort Benning, Ga., where he received his commission of second lieutenant.

Later he transferred to the Air Forces and trained as a bombardier. He was stationed during this period at Maxwell Field, Ala., and Tampa, Fla. Early last July he was ordered to overseas duty.

Lieut. Merrill was stationed in England with the Heavy Bomber Command and was believed to have completed a number of missions before the last one from which he did not return.

Mrs. Merrill and their son, Thomas who was a year old on Dec. 6, were en route to Vermontville from Watertown yesterday and she did not know of the tele-

gram until her arrival last night.

Since her husband went overseas Mrs. Merrill has been making her home in Vermontville. She is formerly of Nashville, Tenn.

Besides his mother, wife and son Lieut. Merrill is survived by two sisters, Miss Mescal Merrill and Mrs. Richard Hough of Vermontville and one brother, Edwin F. Merrill, fireman first class in the Navy, who is on active duty somewhere in the Pacific.

SGT. LEO AMELL RETURNS FROM ENGLAND BASE

VERMONTVILLE, June 12—Staff Sgt. Leo Amell of Vermontville has arrived at the New Contombe hospital in this country from England according to word received by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Amell of this village.

Sgt. Amell is suffering from a physical disorder and will be hospitalized in this country for some time. He will be allowed a brief sick leave to visit his family before returning to the hospital later.

He entered the Army Air Forces on April 6, 1942 and trained at Mission, Tex., Randolph Field, Tex., Boise, Ida., Casper, Wyo., and Kansas City, Mo. He was sent overseas about a year ago.

Sgt. Amell was an aerial gunner aboard a bomber and completed 20 missions over Germany before returning home. On his last mission three of the plane's four engines were shot away and the crew just reached their home base. On the first mission after Sgt. Amell was grounded, his plane and crew were reported missing.

Another son, Tech. Sgt. Homer Amell, is also stationed in England with the Army Engineers.

PFC. Carl Aubin Injured on Guam Back in State



VERMONTVILLE, Oct. 10—PFC. Carl Aubin who was wounded in action in the recent battle on Guam Island in the Pacific has arrived at the Naval Hospital in Oakland, Cal., his parents have been notified.

Mr. and Mrs. Herbert S. of this village have received word that he has been at the hospital since Sept. 20. Previously he was hospitalized in Hawaiian Islands.

PFC. Aubin enlisted in Marine Corps on Aug. 18. He took his boot training at Parris Island, S. C., and received further instruction at Camp Elliott, Camp Pendleton and Diego, Cal.

In February, 1943 he wandered to overseas duty. In May his parents received a radio message from him that he was well and safe and on Mother's Day another received another communication.

PFC. Aubin was stationed in Auckland, New Zealand and in Australia. He saw action in a great deal of fighting in battles of Queen Augusta, Bougainville and Guam. He was wounded in the Guam battle.




In Louisiana


Cassius Shumway Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Cassius H. Shumway, of Vermontville, is once again in the role of private citizen.

He is the holder of the Purple Heart.


