New Village, New Logo!



The Village of Greenville Village Board approved a new logo at their September 12th meeting. The new logo features a sun-backed "G" rising above rolling hills. The rising "G" represents the continuing growth of Greenville and the bright future of the community. The rolling hills are a nod to Greenville's founders who built their homes, businesses, and farms on the gently rolling hills of the area.

The logo design took many months of collaboration between staff, residents, business leaders, and the Village Board to arrive at a logo that was simple, clean, and representative of Greenville's past, present, and future. Due to cost constraints, the logo will be rolled out over time as equipment, vehicles, and facilities are replaced.

The Village will also be upgrading its website to be easier to use and more interactive for the public. It will also incorporate the new logo design. So look for it in the coming months.

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Public Works

Yard Waste Site

The Village of Greenville's Yard Waste Site was relocated in July 2022 and is now at W8031 School Road. The metal/oil/anti-freeze drop off location did not move and is still located at the site on Parkview Drive. Residents wishing to use the new site will need to obtain a key card to open the gate system prior to arriving at the site. Key cards can be purchased at the Municipal Service Center during regular business hours. You will not be able to access the site without a key card. Access to the site requires an annual renewal fee of \$40 and the card itself cost \$5 to obtain/replace. If you have previously purchased a 2022 Yard Waste Site sticker, you will only be required to pay the difference for the remainder of this calendar year.

Please note that the extended hours of operation will end on Wednesday, November 30.

Where Do I Report a Problem?

Street light outages: Local street lights are owned and maintained by WE Energies and should be reported directly to them using their Street Light Outage Map at:

<https://www.we-energies.com/slo>. Street Lights that are at the intersections of two State Highways are owned by the State of Wisconsin DOT and should be reported to (414) 227-2166.

Dead animals: For both county highways and village roads, residents should call or email Outagamie County Highway Department. at 920-832-5673 or highwayemail@outagamie.org.

Garbage Missed Collection/Operations:

This is contracted and concerns should be reported directly to Harters Fox Valley Disposal at 1-888-804-8556. New service set up and bulk item collection should be done through the Village's Public Works Department.

Recycling Missed Collection/Operations:

This service is contracted and general operation concerns should be reported directly to LRS at 920-759-0501. New service set up and cart replacement should be done through the Village's Public Works Department.

Dead Street Tree: Contact the Village of Greenville's Forestry Department by using the form on our website or contacting the office at 920-757-7276.

What is I&I and How Does It Affect You?

What is I&I? Inflow and infiltration (I&I) is water, that doesn't need to be treated at the waste water treatment plant, entering into our sanitary sewer collection system. This is typically through leaking sewer laterals/mains or an illegal connection from stormwater to sanitary sewer.

Why is it bad? For many different reasons, but the most important being the cost. Greater amounts of wastewater sent to the wastewater treatment plant can result in higher rates for all users. Clean water can also overwhelm treatment process and other bacteria that break down the solids at a treatment plant and make them less effective.

Leave Your Leaves

Properly cleaning up your yard in the fall will help keep our local waters clean too! A great way to do that is to keep them right on your property. Try mulching your leaves in place by making several passes over them with a mulching mower. This will keep leaves on your lawn and provide it with nutrients it needs for healthy grass next spring. You can also collect mulched leaves and spread them in garden beds or under shrubs. Leaves provide valuable protection for plants through the winter and also provide nutrients for spring growth.

LEAF COLLECTION

Fall leaves provide beautiful color on trees, but in local waters they contribute to green algae blooms—not so pretty. There are a few different options for dealing with leaves:

1. **Mulching**—you can mow over your leaves & leave them on the land
2. **Composting**—mix leaves in with other lawn trimmings to create a rich soil
3. **Raking & Collection**—be sure to follow community collection policies & cover your leaves with a tarp between pick-up times

Draining Your Pool?

Taking the time to follow the proper procedures when draining the water from your pool or spa will help keep our local waters a healthy place for fish and other aquatic life to live.

1. **Dechlorinate the Water:** Let the water sit for at least one week to reduce the chlorine or bromine level.
2. **Discharge Water to Grass or Landscaping:** Discharging the water onto grass or landscaping will allow the water to soak into the earth, where it will be naturally cleansed prior to entering local waterways.
3. **Monitor the Discharge:** Monitor water as it is discharging to ensure it does not cause erosion or flooding.
4. **Protect Local Waterways:** If a pool or spa has been acid washed, the water can't be discharged off the owner's property. Water from back flushing pool filters should only be discharged to the sanitary sewer (down a sink or toilet) or on-site septic tank system where it will be treated prior to entering local waters.

Remember it is illegal in all communities to discharge pollutants, including chlorinated pool water, into a storm drain.

Speed Limit Reduction on School Road

The Village has received numerous complaints about increased speeds and safety issues on School Rd. To reduce these hazards, the Village Board has approved reducing the speed limit on School Rd. once construction is completed. The new speed limits will be 35 mph from STH 76 to Julius Dr. and 45 mph from Julius Dr. to Greendale Rd. These new limits will be effective after the completion of the School Rd. paving project and once new speed limit signage has been installed.



No Parking on Streets

During the months of November-March, there is no parking on village roads between the hours of 12:00am and 6:00am. Vehicles parked in the road during these times may be ticketed and/or towed at the owner's expense. We ask that if a winter storm is predicted, please do not park your vehicle on the road at any time. This will help the Village staff to clear the roads quicker, safer and to the best of our ability.

Coming and Going

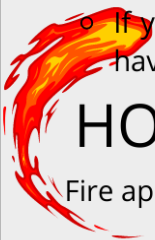

Focus on Projects

Happy fall Greenville and welcome to the cool crisp air of autumn. Soon the fields will begin to be harvested and those of us with suburban fields of grass will be thankful for the slowing of the grass growing season. Of course, that only means we need to be warming up our backs and preparing for snow shoveling season. Just like you, our village staff will be doing their final maintenance on our parks for the year as well as wrapping up our significant projects of 2022 as we discuss the list of potential projects of 2023.

The most significant project in the community is not even a village project. The STH 15 expansion project being managed by the WisDOT is making good progress forward. No doubt it was a shame to see so many trees cut down to make room for the expanded roadway, but we all know it is for good reason as we anticipate much safer travels between Greenville and New London. The completion of the eastern segment and bypass segment for the STH 15 expansion project is expected to complete by November of 2023. The western segment, from Givens Road to STH 45, will complete one year later in November of 2024.

In addition to all the visible projects completed in 2022, less visible engineering work has been underway for projects in 2023. Depending on decisions during our budget development process, the significant projects proposed for construction next year include:

- School Rd Urbanization (STH 76-East Termini)
- Hillview Pulverize and Pave (Julius-STH 76)
- Julius Pulverize and Pave (Hillview-STH 15)
- Parkview Dr Urbanization (STH 76-Ridgeway Dr)
- Greenville Business Park Area Storm Water Retrofit
- Town Hall Maintenance/Renovation

Critical projects managed by the village totaling over three million dollars in funding include roadway improvements, water main infrastructure expansions, stormwater run-off development, and facility enhancements. Roadway changes in 2022 included significant changes to School Road (STH 76 to Julius Dr.) and repaving of a portion of Everglade Road. Water and sewer infrastructure has been added as part of the School Road project and new water main was laid along Mayflower Drive adding a critical redundant loop to the system. A large portion of Bear Creek in the Everglade watershed area had dredging performed with another phase planned to be completed before the end of the year. This is being done to help with significant storm water run-off concerns. Facility upgrades were completed with a new yard waste facility with additional facility work being planned for Village Hall. Money for the Village Hall project will come from American Rescue Plan Act funding so no further burden will be put on Greenville taxpayers.

With all these projects and all the change happening, it could often appear Greenville is nearly as crazy and chaotic as the rest of the world. Although it is true there is much change occurring in our community it is important to understand these projects are planned change we are doing very well to manage. The difficulty is dealing with unplanned change such as staffing changes. Over the last few months we have been dealing with being short staffed in our building inspection and public works engineering roles. This may have caused some delays to some so I apologize if you experienced any inconvenience as we worked to fill the roles. I ask for your patience, once again, as we replace Brian Rickert our Public Works Director. Brian is moving to a new opportunity closer to his home. Brian worked tirelessly to improve our staff, our standards, and our culture. It may take several months to find an adequate replacement, so during the interim we are fulfilling the responsibilities with current staff. I ask you be kind and understanding during the next few months as we work to fill this leadership role within our community.

Greenville is an amazing place to live and work. Life is always better when you approach your day with a smile. Better yet are the words of Mark Twain, "Life is short, break the rules. Forgive quickly, kiss slowly. Love truly. Laugh uncontrollably and never regret ANYTHING that makes you smile."

Staff is also working very hard to design a newly updated website for 2023. This is not as easy as it sounds as we not only want to make the look and feel more resident friendly, but we also are hoping to achieve an easy and enjoyable experience. We are working on enhanced features like getting a permit, paying your water bill online, finding answers to questions regarding local law and what to do and who to contact if you are experiencing problems within the village.

This is the last newsletter of 2022, and what a year it has been! Myself and village staff would like you and your families to have a great Thanksgiving, a wonderful Christmas and a magical New Year.


Sustain Greenville

Changes to Absentee Voting

There have been two major changes to the absentee ballot laws passed recently. The first is a Temporary Injunction of September 7, and additional hearing on September 13, 2022, simply stating that the Wisconsin Election Commission may NOT direct clerks to themselves add address information to witness certifications. Previously, clerks had been given guidance that should they receive an absentee ballot with an improperly completed certificate or with no certificate, the clerk may return the ballot to the elector, inside the sealed envelope when an envelope is received, together with a new envelope, and if time would permit the elector to correct the defect and return the ballot by the deadline. This Injunction couples with a Permanent Injunction effective August 30, 2022. Pursuant to the Voting Rights Act, any WI voter who requires assistance with mailing or delivering their absentee ballot to the municipal clerk because of a disability, must be permitted to receive such assistance by a person of the voter's choice with a few exceptions.


