Significant projects were undertaken in the community in 2019 to help move our infrastructure and facilities into the 21st century. Julius Dr. and Spring Rd. each had nearly one mile of roadway reconstructed with recreational lanes added to Julius Dr. The CB recreational trail has been extended further north, providing a safe trail system from Hwy 15 all the way along CTH CB, into the Village of Fox Crossing and beyond. Rectangular rapid flashing beacons (RRFB) were added to the intersection of Municipal Dr. and Parkview Dr. to enhance the safety of users of the recreational trails. Many more safety additions to our trails and other enhancements are being discussed including: a new tunnel under STH 76 near Lions Park and a safe crossing for users at the building to the community. Hyacinth and STH 15. Many may have noted the construction of Well #5 on town property on STH 96 near the Field of Dreams, which is due to go into service January 2020. This project is a substantial addition to our water service



and allows for our water and sewer services to completely encircle the service area; meaning, those who are users will not see significant outages during planned and unplanned enhancement or repair work.

The most significant and most noticeable project in 2019 has been the construction of our new Fire & Safety Building. The construction crews and town staff members did an amazing job of staying within budget and on schedule right up until Mother Nature decided to give us one of the wettest autumns on record as well as premature cold weather. Due to these uncontrollable weather conditions the driveway and parking paving efforts, as well as lawn installation and landscaping work, remain incomplete. At the time of the writing of this article, town staff, fire department personnel and town officials are considering paving options and timing for installation. This will determine the proper timing for when the building will be occupied by the department and staff. As the weather warms in the spring, hopefully sooner than later, the remaining exterior work will be completed. All of this will be followed by a ceremony to dedicate

With all that was accomplished in 2019, there is even more to look forward to in 2020. Infrastructure projects include: paving projects on South Creek DR. & Spring Rd., engineering prep work for Greenwood Rd. & School Rd. urbanizations

efforts, stormwater pond construction for STH 15 east (new) & STH 15 west (expansion), lift station #2 reconstruction, utility relocations for the upcoming STH 15 expansion project and installation of a new roadway into the future Field of Dreams Park.

In 2020, town staff will be hosting four elections (Spring Primary-2/18, Spring Election & Presidential Primary-4/7, Partisan Primary-8/11 and the General Election-11/3). Town staff continues to work on the incorporation process to become a village and plans to have a referendum vote for incorporation align with the 2020 election calendar.

As we move into a new year our minds can quickly become pre-occupied with our own harried lives. I ask you to remember to take the time to not only ask your children about their day, but to truly listen. Honestly get to know your parents. Hold on to those special, precious friends in your life working hard to bridge the gaps in lifestyles or geography. Help a neighbor, even if they don't ask. Try one thing every day that scares you. Most importantly, remember to take time for yourself...breathe, stretch, dance, and live your dreams.

#### 2020 Town Budget Overview

The 2020 Town Budget is now available on the Town's website. Town electors approved a town tax levy of \$3,455,042 at the special Town Meeting held on Thursday, November 14, 2019. Following the electors' approval, the Town Board adopted their 2020 Budget resulting in a Town tax rate of \$2.47 per \$1,000 of assessed value; an increase of \$0.27 from the previous year. This is directly attributed to paying debt principle & interest for the new

The priorities and funding recommendations for the 2020 fiscal year reflect the conditions of the current economy, demands for general services and Town goals. The budget is a continuation of the Town Board's strategic plan and a five-year Capital Improvement Plan.

## What is the Town Budget?

Per the requirements under Wisconsin State Statutes, the Town of Greenville is required to prepare and adopt an annual fiscal year budget. As required, the budget lists all existing indebtedness and all anticipated revenue from sources during the ensuing fiscal year. Additionally, appropriations for each department, service or activity must also be shown.

Overall Town spending for fiscal year 2020 will decrease by roughly 28%. The Town will continue to spend significant dollars toward capital infrastructure improvements in 2020 however. Over \$3 million dollars in road repairs and maintenance activities are planned. Additionally, improvements to the entrance of the Greenville Sports Park along STH 96 are planned.

## **PUBLIC WORKS**

#### **SNOW PLOWING**

There are different levels of service that roadways within Greenville receive depending on their functional classification. Primary and secondary roads (high-speed and high-volume) roads will see winter operations shortly after the snow event has started. Residential routes (low-speed and lowvolume) will see winter operations after there is 4 inches of accumulated snow. Sometimes, residential roads do not get plowed due to the road temperatures being high enough to melt on its own. We do use a de-icing agent, however, not all roads will be free of ice so please, DRIVE SAFELY & SLOWLY.

Also, no two cul-de-sacs are plowed the same way. Driveways, trees, mailboxes and fire hydrant locations are all different within different cul-de-sacs. The snowplow drivers have to take all of these things into consideration when making the decision on the most effective, time conscience way to clear the snow.

State Highways 15, 76 and 96 along with County Hwy's GV, CB and CA are maintained by the Outagamie County Highway Department. The Town of Greenville is not able to do any maintenance on these roads. So, if any concerns arise, or your mailbox gets damaged by a snow plow, please direct your calls to the Outagamie County Highway Department at (920) 832-5673.

## DEPOSITING SNOW ON RIGHT-OF-WAYS

As of February 15, 2008, the Town of Greenville has adopted an Ordinance that bans depositing snow in public right-of-ways. This means that any snow that is plowed on private property may not be deposited on any street right-of-ways, including ditches, paths and walkways. Pushing snow across or

into town roads is also against this Ordinance. All snow that is cleared from your driveway must be deposited onto your own property. The Town of Greenville may issue citations for violating this Ordinance. Citations start at \$25 & may reach up to \$250 for repeat violations.

## CHRISTMAS TREE AND BRUSH PICK-UP

Brush pick-up begins the second Monday of every month, year round. Collection can take up to a week to complete. Residents who would like to participate in brush pick-up should call: (920) 757-7276 or email <a href="mailto:publicworks@townofgreenville.com">publicworks@townofgreenville.com</a> to be added to the collection list, no later than 12pm the Friday before. Please review the full Brush Pick-up Policy located on our website before being added to the collection list. **An extra collection for Christmas trees will begin January 2, 2020.**

#### **YARD WASTE SITE**

The Yard Waste Site is open to all Greenville residents who have purchased a permit to use the site. Yard Waste Site Permits can be purchased at the Public Works office. Due to the increased operation costs the new charge for the 2020 Yard Waste Site Permit will be \$20. Additional stickers within the same household are sold at a discounted price of \$10 per sticker. Permits are good for one calendar year. The Yard Waste Site Policy, along with accepted material, can be found on the Yard Waste and Brush Pick-Up page of our website. The Yard Waste Site has resumed normal business hours:

Monday - Thursday 7:00am - 4:30pm Friday 8:00am - 12:00pm

(With the exception of Holidays)

#### NO PARKING ON STREETS

There is no parking on town roads between the hours of 12:00am and 6:00am. These parking restrictions will remain in effect through March 31.

Vehicles parked on Town roads during this time may be ticketed and/or towed at the owner's expense. If a winter storm is predicted, we ask that you do not park your vehicle on the road at any time. This will help the Town of Greenville's employees to clear the roads to the best of our ability.

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

#### STREET TREE PROGRAM

If you are new to the area, you may not be familiar with our tree program. The Town collects money in all new subdivisions with curb and gutter for the purpose of planting street trees in the terrace along the road. Trees are planted in the spring and are only planted on lots that have an established lawn. Lots receiving trees will receive a letter in spring detailing the planting procedure along with a tree care sheet.

These trees are planted by the Town on Town property and are therefore maintained by the Town indefinitely. The Town holds the responsibility of maintaining these trees to ensure the tree health as well as the safety of the public. Under no circumstances should anybody attempt to prune, stake or fertilize any street tree. If you have any concerns about your street tree, please give us a call. We do ask homeowners to keep the trees properly mulched and watered. If you have any questions about our street tree program or about trees in general, please call our office at (920) 757-7276.

#### WINTER ACTIVITIES

Winters in Wisconsin can be long, cold and snowy but don't let that keep you from getting out and enjoying the parks. Check out these winter activities:

- The sledding hill at Jennerjohn Park open daily and lit from dusk until the park closes at 10pm.
- One of the many groomed cross country ski trails.
- The walking/nature trails at Lions Park and Pebble Ridge Park.
- The ice rinks at Community Park and Jennerjohn Park open daily (weather permitting) and lit from dusk until the park closes at 10pm.

If the temperature is above freezing or if the ice seems soft, please refrain from skating on ice rinks. This will damage the ice surface and make it more difficult to keep the rink open throughout the winter. Please remember that snowmobiling is **NOT** permitted in any park or on any portion of the town's recreational trail. If you see anyone snowmobiling in these areas, please call the Sheriff's Department at 832-5000.

#### SEASONAL EMPLOYMENT

The Town of Greenville will be accepting applications through spring for seasonal park laborers for the summer of 2020. There may be both long term and short term positions available. Duties include grounds and facilities maintenance, mowing and trimming grass, painting, litter and trash pick-up, cleaning facilities, etc. May also be required to assist the Public Works and Sanitary Departments when needed. ## PROUD TO HAVE SERVED YOU IN 2019

#### Take a look

- Members of the GFD conducted many school visits, fire extinguisher training presentations, station tours and fire drills. We hope everyone involved learned something from each of these events. Since January, we've participated in 46 public education events, reaching out to 1,540 adults and 1,790 children.
- Fire Prevention week in October, was capped off with our Fire & EMS Open House. It was good to see so many people stop by even though the weather wasn't the best.

We are seeing a lot of excitement as the new Fire and EMS station nears completion. It was on schedule or a little ahead of schedule until late fall when Mother Nature had other ideas. Heavy rain, snow and frigid temperatures led to delays in masonry and concrete work. This put the project behind at least three weeks and had a huge impact on the timing for asphalt paving. The decision was made not to pave due to site conditions and weather. We are hoping there are other options so we can start the transition into the new station. We will keep the Town residents informed.

#### HOLIDAY SAFETY

- Pick a fresh Christmas tree and keep plenty of water around the base. Dry trees account for more than 1000 fires every year!
- Do not use lights with worn insulation, broken plugs and loose sockets. String lights per the instructions to prevent overloading electrical circuits.
- Shut indoor/outdoor lighting off before going to bed.
- Be careful if stockings are hung by a fire in the fireplace.

#### STAY SAFE THIS WINTER

- Drive appropriately for the conditions. DON'T TEXT WHILE DRIVING... IT CAN WAIT!
- If you are a snowmobiler, please drive safely on the trails.
- Keep the fire hydrants in front of or near your home clear of snow. Clear a 3 foot area around hydrants. This will save us valuable time in the event of an emergency.
- Replace all CO alarms every 6 years or sooner if they don't respond properly when tested.

- Replace all smoke alarms every 10 years or sooner if they don't respond properly when tested.
- If you are physically or financially unable to install new smoke detectors, we have a limited number of smoke detectors that can be installed free of charge. This program is available through a partnership with the American Red Cross. Please call the Greenville Fire Department for details (757-7262).

The Greenville First Responders have been very busy this year, we were hoping that the number of calls that we have responded to in the first half of the year would have slowed down but unfortunately, that didn't happen. From January 1st, 2019, to November 30th, 2019, we have responded to 378 calls compared to 315 at this same time in 2018.

#### SAFETY EQUIPMENT UPDATE

In the last newsletter we started a fundraiser to purchase some safety vests that have a lighter weight material and could easily be put on for a questionable call. We wanted to supply every

First Responder with their own vest to have in their vehicles just like our medical bags. To date we have about \$8,100 of the \$15,000 goal. We would like to thank everyone that has donated so far and if anyone is still considering a donation please send to:

Please remember, especially in winter with slippery conditions, if you see an emergency vehicle please slow down and allow for extra room.

We still have a few years before the Highway 15 construction begins, so we are asking everyone to use extra caution. Highway 15 is a busy road and we have had several tragedies on this road in the past few years. We all need to be more careful and drive slower.

We are expecting to move into our new fire station early in the New Year. Unfortunately, the weather did not cooperate and they were not able to blacktop the parking lot or do the landscaping. Once that is complete, we will be able to have an open house and show off our new beautiful building.

In addition, we would like to thank you all for your continued support. It has been a very busy year and we have had some difficult calls, but it helps to know the residents of Greenville are behind us.

#### WINTER TIPS: WALKING

- Take short shuffling steps when walking over ice (walk like a penguin).
- Be cautious of icy sidewalks and wear boots to help avoid slipping or falling.
- Wear a heavy warm coat that will deflect the wind.
- Be sure to wear gloves or mittens and a hat or headband to keep yourself warm.
- Wear bright colored reflective clothing, to make yourself more visible to drivers.
- Always use sidewalks or paths where available. If there isn't any walkway, walk facing the traffic.
- Always use marked crosswalks and crossing guards when possible.
- Walk with a friend.
- If walking with headphones always be aware of where you are and what you could be stepping in front of.

#### WINTER TIPS: DRIVING

- Clear snow and ice from windows, lights, the hood, and the roof before driving.
- Leave plenty of room for stopping.
- Don't try to outdrive the conditions. Remember the posted speed limits are for dry pavement.
- Brake early and correctly. It takes more time and distance to stop in adverse conditions.
- Be wary of bridge decks. They freeze first, making them more dangerous than the approach road.
- Exit ramps sometimes have less anti-icing material than the main line.
- Don't use "cruise control" driving in wintry conditions. Even roads that look clear can have sudden slippery spots. Using your brake on these spots to deactivate cruise control, may possibly cause you to lose control of your vehicle.
- Many 4x4 vehicles are heavier than passenger vehicles. This
  means it takes longer to stop than passenger vehicles. Don't
  get overconfident in your 4x4 vehicle.
- Look further ahead in traffic than normal.
- Trucks are heavier than cars, making their brake time slower. Avoid cutting in front of them.
- Don't crowd the plow. Leave room for maintenance vehicles and plows. Stay back at least 200 feet and don't pass on the right. Remember to slow down and always wear your seat belt.

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
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## **COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT**

#### **Zoning Code Update**

Greenville adopted its 2040 Comprehensive Plan on July 22, 2019. The Planning Commission and Town Board have already started the implementation process by initiating an update and complete rewrite of Chapter 320 Zoning Ordinance.

The Town Board developed Ad Hoc Committees to initiate the development of the zoning ordinance and have set a tentative schedule to help guide the project. The Town has also made public participation an important component in the process

#### CROSS CONNECTION INSPECTION PROGRAM

The Purpose of the Town of Greenville's Cross Connection Control Program, as defined in the local Ordinance §340-26, is to help eliminate possible contamination of the public water distribution system. As part of this program, an inspection of your facility's

internal water system is to be completed. Inspectors will be reviewing your water system for connections that could possibly contaminate the public water distribution system. The Cross Connection Control Program is a DNR mandated program

that requires the Town of Greenville to inspect 10% of our residential homes each year. This means that your home/subdivision will be inspected every 10 years regardless of the outcome of your previous inspection or the age of your home.

The Greenville Lions have been very busy this fall with several different projects. For the month of September, we did 13 eye tissue transports across the state to restore vision for patients with failing vision or partial blindness.

In October, the Lions Club worked a "Man Cave" at the Greenville Lioness Fall Fair. Although it was very wet, the Lioness did an amazing job. We held our annual Sports Banquet/fundraiser, with a great turn out. Lots of great prizes were handed out and funds were raised to give back to our community and support our park projects. All in all, a very successful night.

Each month the Lions club volunteers sponsor and serve a meal at the Fox Valley Pillars, homeless shelter. Those serving in November were: Jerry Sabatke (Lead), Roger Mielke, Steve Schmidt, Paul Hoffman, and Ryan Paschke. Those who served in October were John Peters (Lead), Eric Bogart, Brian Hansen, Rich Schoenbohm, and Greg Graycarek.

We also performed vision screenings on 718 Hortonville/Greenville 4K and 1st graders. 41 were screened as being out of range and recommended for an eye exam. Early detection of vision problems is key

to a child's learning and we are happy to have impacted those 41 students and caught any issues early.

Also, we are extremely proud to have received the Wisconsin Park and Recreation Association's Partnership Award. Tony Nowak, Director of Parks for Greenville put the award package together for consideration.
