Reopening Strategy for COVID-19

Throughout the COVID-19 (novel coronavirus) crisis, Town staff have embraced our mission to deliver essential & desired services to the Greenville community.

The Town Hall office is open with modified service procedures. The Public Works / Parks Offices are still currently closed. The Fire & Safety building(s) are closed to the general public. Greenville's approach is complementary to the guidelines and recommendations of the State of Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) and the Centers for Disease Control (CDC).

For any business that needs to be conducted with the Town of Greenville, we ask people to consider first visiting our website or calling the appropriate office or staff person. We offer many options to serve your needs without making an in-person visit.

Should you choose to do business at a Town facility, please be assured the following mitigation measures will be in place prior to the reopening of Town facilities:

- Plexi-glass dividers will be present at all public facing counters.
- Social distancing measures will be in place to limit the number of people in facilities when necessary.
- Hand sanitizer will be available at all locations.
- Town staff have increased the frequency of cleaning and disinfecting all surfaces and high touch areas and objects.
- Town staff are being encouraged to wear face coverings when in public settings where other physical barriers or social distancing measures are difficult to maintain.

General Public Guidelines

We need your help to ensure our phased reopening strategy is successful. Please help us and each other by continuing to follow these general guidelines throughout all steps:

- Practice social distancing and maintain 6 feet of distance whenever possible.
- Per CDC recommendation, wear a face covering, if you are able, when in public.
- Practice proper handwashing. Wash your hands with soap and water for 20 seconds.
- Regularly clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces.
- Stay home if you are feeling sick.

Why a Sports & Splash Park?

In 2006, the Town of Greenville formed a committee for the purpose of creating a master plan for a 75-acre parcel acquired in 2004 dubbed Greenville's "Field of Dreams". Over a period of about one year, the committee used meetings, a survey, and several public listening sessions to draft a plan for this future park. The Master Plan calls for a vast array of facilities including baseball/softball fields, soccer fields, tennis, basketball, trails, a nature area with a constructed wetland, and a homestead gardens. In 2010, the original master plan concept was updated.

In 2018, a citizen committee was formed for the purpose of reviewing the Sports Complex Master Plan and exploring any changes that may need to be made. Through a series of meetings, a citizen survey, and public engagement meetings, the committee determined that the Town should revise the master plan to incorporate a more diverse set of recreational amenities. The Town Board adopted a revised master plan in 2019.

In 2020, a citizen committee was formed to explore options and possibly recommend to the Town Board a referendum to support financing the first phase of development for the park. The committee recommended and received Town Board approval of Resolution No. 40-20 on May 18, 2020, establishing an advisory referendum for the August 11, 2020, Partisan Primary Election.

Advisory Referendum

An advisory referendum is a voting process that gives voters the opportunity to advise the Town Board if Greenville voters support financing the development of the park through \$6.5 million dollars of general obligation debt.

The Field of Dreams Referendum Steering Committee recommended using a 10-year general obligation loan. Estimated savings of using a 10-year loan vs. 20-year bond is over \$1.5 million in interest costs.

The following question will appear on the August 11, 2020 Partisan Primary Election:

"Should the Town of Greenville begin the development of a new community park on existing Town-owned land, which includes a swimming beach, splash pad, children's playground, athletic fields, ball diamonds, recreational trails, restored native natural areas and off-street parking for an amount not to exceed \$6.5 million."

TOWN CHAIRPERSON

Welcome to summer! I do not think anyone would deny it has been a crazy year thus far. Between COVID-19 and the human equality tensions, there has not been much positive in the news. Makes it hard to watch or read at times. Out of all this it has been wonderful to take time for family and to get outside and see so many friendly, smiling neighbors enjoying our community despite so many significant events being cancelled. On behalf of all the business owners in our community, I want to thank all of you for your support during these unprecedented times. Let's get you caught up on the happenings in Greenville.

The summer months are key times for construction projects for the Town. One of the larger projects in recent years is now complete. I would like to welcome the Greenville Fire Department and First Responders to their new home. We look forward to a grand opening soon with tours available thereafter. Being conscientious of the current pandemic, this event will wait to be schedule until we are in step 3 of the Badger Bounce Back Plan. In the meantime, you'll have to trust me when I say the view from the hose drying tower is amazing!

By the time you read this our Public Works team will have completed the pulverize and pave project on Spring Road and will be moving on to a similar project on South Creek Drive. In addition, Public Works is performing initial design & engineering work on Greenwood Road, which is planned for an urbanization project during the Summer of 2021. Many of you may also have noted the significant project happening to College Avenue (CTH CA). Although this project is being coordinated by Outagamie County

Highway Dept. the Town of Greenville is paying for 25% of the cost. This project will include new roundabouts at the intersections of this busy roadway as well as recreational trails leading from CTH CB to Casaloma Drive in Grand Chute. Another significant project for Public Works in 2020 is the reconstruction of Lift Station #2. This is a critical project as both our engineers for the town and the Wisconsin DNR have found deficiencies with this facility which helps provide sewer service for nearly all residential areas along STH 76 in Greenville. No one wants that stuff backing up in their basement!

Our Community & Economic Development team does much more than building inspections. To be honest, with all the construction going on in Greenville, I am surprised this team has time for more than building inspections. I tip my hat to our building inspectors, Dale and Rene, for their continued dedication to the community as I know the summer months can be exponentially busier for them. Beside inspections, this team is leading efforts to perform sub-area planning so future development, whether residential, commercial, industrial, or otherwise, can be done with the full of the community and our tax dollars in mind. The Greenville Planning Commission has committed to focusing residential development to the sewer service area. This allows for our Town to fully utilize infrastructure already in place and not continue to add to our costs of constructing and maintaining new infrastructure. All are welcome to be a part of the sub-area planning efforts as there will be open houses and interactive discussions occurring throughout the process. I would

like to thank this team for their part in bringing new or expanding businesses to Greenville including:

- YMCA childcare addition
- Valley Living Shops on Technical Dr.
- Associated Appraisals on Neubert Rd.
- Shepherd of the Hills Church STH 15
- Greenville Auto on STH 15
- Toys for Trucks expansion

The Parks & Rec staff continues to work on the Chip Garrow Memorial Trail at Jennerjohn Park. Chip, a long-time employee of Greenville and all-around amazing individual, passed away in Feb. of 2019, but not before inspiring all he touched in his life with an infectious smile and courageous will to live your best life. In the news of late, the Parks Dept. has also been busy updating the master plan for the Greenville Sports & Splash Park. A citizen committee was formed to provide direction and oversight to town staff for many aspects of this project including identifying the need, determining the scope of the project, and deciding on the means for financing the project. They utilized past Park & Rec. citizen survey input and worked with local organizations including Greenville Youth Sports, Fox Cities United Soccer, and the YMCA to determine the need and appropriate scope. Our town surveys of citizens consistently rank additional recreational trails and a community outdoor swimming facility as the most desired facilities to add to the community. In addition, with nearly 800 children registering for GYS in 2019 and nearly 500 children in the soccer club, the committee determined the need for additional facilities is now. Having identified the need, the committee moved focus to narrowing its scope to meet the immediate needs and community desires. This proved to be no

simple task as the committee met several times before coming up with the right mix of the proposed design while attempting to stay fiscally responsible. It was determined phase 1 of the park should include 3 miles of recreational trails, swimming beach & splash pad, 2 new baseball/ softball diamonds, 2 new athletic fields, and centralized parking. To gain the communities opinion the committee resolved to hold an advisory referendum as part of the Wisconsin Partisan Primary Election August 11. The outcome of this vote will determine the desires of Greenville's voting community to move forward. The committee requested this scheduled election date so, if approved, the project could go out to bid for construction during the more desirable late fall and early winter period.

Last, information of the process to incorporate Greenville as a village. On July 7 the Wisconsin Dept. of Administration gives their determination for our re-submittal to incorporate. Should we get the green light to continue to move forward the issue will go to Outagamie County Circuit Court who will order Greenville to host a referendum on the topic. This referendum will coincide with the November 3 Wisconsin General & Presidential Election. If you have questions about why we should incorporate here is a list of the pros & cons:

Pros: Protection of borders, preservation of tax base, zoning authority including Shoreland Zoning, extra territorial authority, land division autonomy, complete village powers, bonding authority, Tax Increment Financing (TIF) without special restrictions, potential for improved bond ratings, opportunity for more grant funds.

Cons (depending on viewpoint): Elimination of the Town Meeting and authority to fund private enterprise without Town Elector approval.



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PUBLIC WORKS

Yard Waste Site

The Yard Waste Site is open to all Greenville residents who have purchased a permit to use the site. Due to the increased operation costs the revised fee for the 2020 Yard Waste Site Permit will be \$20. Additional stickers within the same household are sold at a discounted price of \$10 per sticker. Permits are good for one calendar year. Dumping Ordinance

The Town of Greenville adopted a Dumping Ordinance in 2010. This ordinance states: No person, firm or corporation shall dispose of, dump or bury garbage, yard waste or refuse, upon any road right-of-way or upon any public or private lands in the Town of Greenville other than upon those premises duly designated and licensed as sites for the disposing, dumping or burying of garbage, yard waste or refuse. If you are found to be dumping in the Town of Greenville you may be fined \$50 to \$1000. Please keep our Town clean!

Important Park Information

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, we have developed a three step Reopening Plan for the Town of Greenville's Parks and Recreation. Each step is designed to have flexibility in the case of relapse and with the exception of Step I, there are no specific dates or timelines identified in this plan. The safety and enjoyment of town parks involves the cooperation of everyone and we need your help to ensure our phased reopening strategy is successful. Please help us and each other by following these general guidelines throughout all steps while using our facilities.

Free Tire Drop-Off

- Wednesday, July 8 Thursday, July 16, 2020
- Wednesday, September 9 Thursday, September 17, 2020

For the Town of Greenville Residents only, with a limit of 4 tires per household. Tires will not be accepted at the Town during any other time, however tires can be dropped off at the Outagamie County Landfill for a fee. Tires from businesses are not accepted. Only tires with a rim size of 18" or less will be accepted at no charge. For tires with a rim size of 19" or larger in size or quantities of over 4, the resident is charged \$5.00 per tire at the Public Works Office; or \$175.00 per ton if taken directly to the Outagamie County Landfill/Recycling Center at 1419 Holland Rd., Appleton.

Brush Pick-Up Collection Dates: 7/13, 8/10, 9/14 & 10/12

For after hours emergencies, please call our office (920) 757-7276 to be directed to the main menu, allowing you to choose which department your emergency falls within. Please note that these after hours extensions are **only for emergencies** that are not able to wait until regular business hours for attention. If the situation can be addressed during the next business day, please leave a detailed message in the Public Works general mailbox.

PARKS, RECREATION & FORESTRY

- Park Hours are 7:00am 10:00pm
- Dogs are not allowed in parks—they are allowed on trails but must remain leashed at all times. Please remember clean up after your pets!
- Do not park on the grass.
- Glass containers are not allowed in the parks.
- Motorized vehicles are not allowed in parks or on the trails.
- Practice social distancing and maintain 6 feet of distance whenever possible.
 If facilities are busy, patiently wait at a safe distance or return at another time.
- Per CDC recommendation, wear a face covering, if you are able, when in public.
- Practice proper handwashing. Wash your hands with soap and water for 20 seconds.
- Restrooms will cleaned and sanitized daily, however, other park surfaces will NOT be cleaned or sanitized. Users should be prepared to bring their own hand sanitizer.
- Special guidelines for use of park facilities will be posted at all facilities. Users are encouraged to stop, read and adhere to these guidelines.
- Stay home if you are feeling sick.

GREENVILLE FIRST RESPONDERS

From January to the end of May we have responded to 152 calls compared to 176 this same time period in 2019.

The Greenville First Responders started out 2020 being very busy but then came Covid 19. After the pandemic, people seemed apprehensive about calling 911 even if they were having an emergency. Please remember if you have an emergency never hesitate to call 911. The hospital you go to will take every precaution to keep you safe and give you the best care possible.

Due to Covid 19 our First Responders now ask a series of 9 questions about how you feel and if you've had any contact with any person having Covid 19, amongst others. If any of the answers are "yes" we would have extra personal protective equipment (PPE) which includes gloves, gowns, safety glasses, a face shield and N-95 mask. We are also limiting how many responders we have per patient contact. In extreme emergencies more responders would help out as needed. The questions and PPE take only take a few more seconds and we will always be able to administer aid as soon as possible, this is for your safety and for ours.

The summertime events we usually have may not be able to happen this year, this is an unsettling time for everyone and we're hoping we can make up for it next summer.

For the unforeseeable future, we will have to be kinder to each other. Try • to stay safe by social distancing and listening to the experts is the best way to fight Covid 19.

Thanks again for all your support; we're hoping we can show off our new fire station in the very near future.

Bicycle Safety

- Be visible. Wear light colored or reflective clothing. Use lights on the front and back when riding at night or in other conditions when visibility is lower.
- Ride on the right. It is dangerous to ride on the road against the direction of traffic.
- Signal lane changes and turns with hand signals. Drivers will generally give you more space and time to make your turn if they know what you intend to do.
- Stay out of the "door zone." Be far enough away from parked cars that if someone opens a door without looking, you don't have to swerve suddenly.
- Obey traffic laws. Bicycles are vehicles under state traffic laws.

Tips For Walking Safely

- Do not walk on freeways or restricted areas.
- Cross or enter streets only where it is legal to do
- Use sidewalks if possible.
- If there are no sidewalks, it is safer to walk facing road traffic.
- Make it easier for drivers to see you by dressing in light colors and wearing reflective clothing, and carry a flashlight in dark areas.
- Don't count on drivers paying attention, so watch out and make eye contact to be sure drivers see vou!
- Alcohol and drugs can impair the ability to walk safely, just as they do a person's ability to drive.
- Use extra caution when crossing multiple-lane, higher speed streets, and don't assume that because one lane has stopped, drivers in the other lanes have seen you and will also stop.



Driver Tips—Watching For Walkers

- Drivers can come across pedestrians anytime and anywhere, even in places where you do not expect to see them.
- Pedestrians can be hard to see in bad weather or at night, so drivers must keep a lookout and slow down if they can't see clearly.
- When entering a crosswalk, drive slowly and prepare to stop.
- Stop for pedestrians who are in a crosswalk, marked or not.
- When stopping for a pedestrian in a crosswalk, stop well back so drivers in the other lanes can also see the pedestrian in time to stop.
- Do not pass other vehicles stopped for pedestrians.
- When turning, drivers often have to wait for a "gap" in traffic, so be aware during that period, pedestrians may have moved into the driver's intended path.
- Be especially cautious around schools and in neighborhoods where children are around.



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
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

New Permit System

Greenville is in the process of implementing a permitting system to create greater efficiency for staff, developers and the public. The Town has contracted with Civic Systems which it already uses for its financial and utility billing functions. When complete, the permit system will offer an online application portal. The public will be able to apply for permits, pay for permits, and check the status of permits and request inspections all online. The Town's goal is to have the permit system operational by the end of 2020.

I-41 Commuter Study

East Central Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission recently completed a feasibility study evaluating commuter service along the I-41 corridor. The Town's recently adopted Comprehensive Plan recommends working with its businesses to understand potential commuting needs. 
