ADMINISTRATOR'S NOTE:

Greetings everyone. 'Tis the season to be jolly and we are hoping that everyone was able to enjoy the holidays with family and friends. Now that it's over let's face it, we all would like to say "bah humbug" to the other season.....tax season! The most dreadful time of the year! The following is an overview of the 2023 Village of Greenville Budget.



BUDGET BREAKDOWN

The 2023 Village Budget was adopted by the Village Board on November 28, 2022, and includes a total tax levy of \$6,940,206.00. The total tax is comprised of the property tax levy (\$2,876,328.00) and the debt service levy (\$4,063,878.00). The property tax levy is used to fund the operations of the Village. This includes maintenance, labor, and service contracts. The debt service levy is used to fund the equipment and the capital improvement projects of the Village. This includes road maintenance, equipment replacement, and large scale road projects. The debt service levy pays for the debt payments on all outstanding loans of the Village. These two levies combined equal the total tax levy of \$6,940,206.00.

The local tax rate did increase over last year from \$2.94 per \$1,000 assessed to \$3.82 per \$1,000 assessed. However, the total tax rate decreased from \$13.97 per \$1,000 assessed to \$13.26 per \$1,000 assessed.

The two major expenditures that led to an increase in the local tax rate are the replacement of a 1997 Pierce Fire Pumper/Tender (\$942,000.00) and the reconstruction of School Rd. est. (\$6,100,000.00). Both these expenditures required additional borrowing to finance them which led to an increase in the debt levy.

Due to inflation, the cost of refuse and recycling has also increased. In order to maintain the current level of service, the Village needed to increase the garbage fee from \$120 to \$130 for a 65-gallon can. This covers the increased cost from the service provider.

In closing, the Village Board will continue to provide the services needed and expected from residents in the most cost-efficient manner possible. This means spending tax dollars wisely while also trying to maintain the appropriate tax rate for the services expected and needed by residents.

It was able to do this because the Village's building inspectors have the required certifications to perform this work. This is great news for property owners and businesses. With this delegation the Village is able to conduct plan review and issue permits quicker than the State, keeping projects moving and saving time and money. It also allows better customer service through more frequent and timely inspections. Building Permits Required

If you are thinking about doing a home improvement project over the winter or plan to make improvements to your property in the spring and summer, don't forget you will need a permit. Projects that require a permit include any new construction (house, shed, garage, gazebo or any structure), building addition, building remodel, fences, decks/porches, pools/hot tubs, windows/doors, reroof, flatwork (driveway extension, walk way, patio etc.) heating/air conditioning, electrical, plumbing, alternative energy (solar, wind, geothermal etc.), moving or demolition of a building and signs. LAND STEWARDSHIP Farm

Farmland Preservation Grant

The Land Stewardship Committee is seeking applications from village farmland owners who desire to permanently preserve 20 acres or more of their farmland. The selected farmland can be preserved by participating in the Regional Conservational Partnership Program (RCPP) 50% matching grant and an agricultural conservation land easement that is administered by the American Farmland Trust (AFT). The successful applicant must match the grant by donating 50% of the assessed land value of the acreage to be preserved in order to be eligible to receive the 50% matching RCPP funds. The landowner would receive the grant funds provided both parties accept the terms of the developed agricultural conservation easement, which is individually drafted with each applicant landowner and can reflect many of the landowner's preservation wishes. Winters in Wisconsin can be long, cold and snowy but don't let that keep you from getting out and enjoying the parks. Check out these fun winter activities:

- The sledding hill at Jennerjohn Park open daily and lit from dusk until the park closes at 10pm
- Groomed cross country ski trails at Jennerjohn Park
- The walking/nature trails at Lions Park and Pebble Ridge Park
- Ice rinks at Community Park and Jennerjohn Park open daily (weather permitting) and lit from dusk until the park closes at 10pm

If the temperature is above freezing or if the ice seems soft, please refrain from skating on ice rinks. This will damage the ice surface and make it more difficult to keep the rink open throughout the winter. Please remember that snowmobiling is NOT permitted in any park or on any portion of the Village's recreational trail. If you see anybody snowmobiling in these areas please report them to the Sheriff's Department.

Street Tree Program

If you are new to the area, you might not be familiar with our street tree program. The Village collects money in all new subdivisions with curb and gutter for the purpose of planting street trees in the tree terrace along the road. The tree terrace is the portion of the road right of way that typically extends about 15 feet in from the curb. Street trees are planted in the spring and are only planted on lots that have an established lawn. Lots receiving trees will receive a letter in spring detailing the planting procedure along with a tree care sheet.

These street trees are planted by the Village on Village property and are therefore maintained by the Village indefinitely. The Village holds the responsibility of maintaining these trees to ensure the health of the trees as well as the safety of the public. Under no circumstances should anybody attempt to prune, stake or fertilize any street tree. If you have any concerns about your street tree, please give us a call. All we ask from homeowners is to keep the trees properly mulched and watered.

GREENVILLE UTILITY

Keep Your Pipes from Freezing!

Water expands as it freezes, putting pressure on the pipes containing it. Expanding water can cause even metal pipes to break, especially those exposed to harsh, low temperatures like ours here in Wisconsin.

While outdoor pipes are the most likely to break, damage can occur in your home, too. Water pipes in unheated areas like garages, basements, attics, or kitchen cabinets are the most common of victims. Consider these precautions to avoid any issues:

- Remove, drain, and store outdoor hoses.
- Close indoor valves that support outdoor hose bibs.
- Open outdoor hose bibs and keep them open after closing valve in basement.
- Check water supply lines under kitchen and bathroom sinks, in basements, and in other unheated areas.
- Consider installing products to insulate at-risk water pipes.

STORMWATER

Did you know most salts won't melt ice when the temperature is below 15 degrees Fahrenheit? Or that cracked corn is a good traction alternative to sand or kitty litter?

Stormwater management may seem like a summer problem when actually, it is an issue even in the forms of ice and snow too. We may sand and salt to control winter's climate but after the ice melts the remaining materials can get into our waterways and pose a threat to the health of our streams and fish.

Here are some creative tips to help you manage stormwater – be it the frozen or liquid kind – around your home:

- Shovel early. The more snow and ice you remove, the less salt you will have to use and the more effective it can be.
- More salt does not mean more melting. Apply appropriately, salt takes time to work. Consider purchasing a hand-held spreader to help you apply a consistent amount.

15^o Fahrenheit is too cold for salt. Most salts stop working at this temperature. Use a traction agent as needed, but they do not melt ice.


- Sweep up excess. Salt or sand on dry pavement is no longer doing any work, sweep it up before it is washed away and apply less the next time.
- Try an alternative for traction. Sand and kitty litter are effective but can clog sewers and degrade stream habitat when washed away. Cracked corn can be an alternative to try that is more environmentally friendly.
- All de-icers will melt the ice but some have less of an impact on the environment. Use products containing an acetate, potassium chloride, or magnesium chloride.

STREETS

No Parking on Streets



Parking restrictions have gone into effect on all Village roads and will remain in place though March 31. These restrictions prohibit parking on Village roads between the hours of 12:00 am and 6:00 am. Vehicles parked on the Village roads during these hours may be ticketed and/or towed at the owner's expense. If a winter storm is predicted, we ask that you do not park your vehicle on the road at any time until the roads have been cleared. This will help the Village of Greenville employees to clear the roads more effectively and efficiently.

Plow Infractions

In February of 2008, the Village of Greenville adopted an ordinance banning property owners from depositing snow in public right-of-ways. This means that any snow that is plowed on private property may not be deposited on any road right-ofways including ditches, paths and walkways. Pushing snow into, or across, Village roads is also against this ordinance. All snow that is cleared from your driveway must stay on your own property. The Village of Greenville may issue citations up \$250 to anyone violating this ordinance.
