July 10, 2023 – The <u>National Fire Protection Association® (NFPA®)</u> — the official sponsor of Fire Prevention Week<sup>™</sup> for more than 100 years —has announced <u>"Cooking</u> safety starts with YOU! Pay attention to fire prevention TM" as the theme for Fire Prevention Week, October 8-14, 2023. This year's focus on cooking safety works to educate the public about simple but important steps they can take to help reduce the risk of fire when cooking at home, keeping themselves and those around them safe. According to NFPA, cooking is the leading cause of home fires, with nearly half (49 percent) of all home fires involving cooking equipment; cooking is also the leading cause of home fire injuries. Unattended cooking is the leading cause of home cooking fires and related deaths. In addition, NFPA data shows that cooking is the only major cause of fire that resulted in more fires and fire deaths in 2014-2018 than in 1980-1984. "These numbers tell us that more public awareness is needed around when and where cooking hazards exist, along with ways to prevent them," said Lorraine Carli, vice president of the Outreach and Advocacy at NFPA. "This year's Fire Prevention Week campaign will work to promote tips, guidelines, and recommendations that can help significantly reduce the risk of having a cooking fire."

Following are cooking safety messages that support this year's theme, "Cooking safety starts with YOU! Pay attention to fire prevention":

- Always keep a close eye on what you're cooking. For foods with longer cook times, such as those that are simmering or baking, set a timer to help monitor them carefully.
- Clear the cooking area of combustible items and keep anything that can burn, such as dish towels, oven mitts, food packaging, and paper towels.
- Turn pot handles toward the back of the stove. Keep a lid nearby when cooking. If a small grease fire starts, slide the lid over the pan and turn off the burner.
- Create a "kid and pet free zone" of at least three feet (one meter) around the cooking area and anywhere else hot food or drink is prepared or carried.

"Staying in the kitchen, using a timer, and avoiding distractions that remove your focus from what's on the stove are among the key messages for this year's Fire Prevention Week campaign," said Carli.

Fire Prevention Week is celebrated throughout North American every October, and is the oldest public health observance on record in the U.S. Entering it's 101st year, Fire Prevention Week works to educate people about the leading risks to home fires and ways they can better protect themselves and their loved ones. Local fire departments, schools, and community organizations play a key role in bringing Fire Prevention Week to life in their communities each year and spreading basic but critical fire safety messages.

## ASSESSING STATISTICAL UPDATE SCHEDULED FOR 2023

State Law (RSA 75:8-a) requires that cities and towns conduct a full value property reassessment at least every five years. Since the last revaluation took place in 2018, Hooksett's Assessing Department will be conducting a full value property reassessment in 2023. This is done so that property assessed values will reflect statewide current market values. As the real estate market fluctuates – up and down – our assessments may be out of sync with current market values. State law requires assessments between 90% and 110% of current market values when conducting a revaluation or update. Our 2022 assessment ratio is 63.1% of the current market value. It is strongly encouraged for taxpayers to review their PRC (Property Record Card), to verify the data is accurate, this can be done via online from the online database which is a link on the assessing page at hooksett.org. If anyone finds any discrepancies, please call the office to set up an inspection. Having better data upfront will make the update process smoother for all in the long run. ## **UPCOMING TOWN PROJECTS**

The Town is working with the State DOT to study the intersections of Hackett Hill Road/Route 3A and Main Street/Route 3A to determine what needs to be done at the intersections. Roundabouts and signalized intersections will be considered.

State DOT is also working on plans to upgrade Hooksett Road between Alice Avenue and Martins Ferry Road. The upgrades will consist of a five lane road with sidewalks and bike lanes. Also being considered is a roundabout at the intersection of Mammoth Road.

The Lilac Commons Pedestrian Bridge will be inspected in the Spring. This is a routine inspection to determine the condition of the bridge and to determine if any maintenance work needs to be done.

The Donati Field Pedestrian Bridge will be replaced this Fall. Macy Industries will be donating the bridge. The Town is responsible for construction of the footings.

GM2 Engineering Firm is currently designing intersection improvements and a new bridge at the intersection of Martins Ferry Road and North River Road.

The fourth and final phase of the Hooksett Riverwalk Trail will be well underway this fall. This phase takes hikers to the Allenstown border, where it meets up with the Allenstown trail system. The complete trail provides nearly 1-1/2 miles of trails and 750 linear feet of bridges and boardwalks over streams and wetlands.

This exciting achievement began in 2015 with the opening of Phase I. This conservation area provides a beautiful landscape for visitors to enjoy along the Merrimack River, while protecting state-endangered and threatened species.

## HERITAGE COMMISSION UPDATES

The Heritage Commission had a very busy summer, and fall is looking to be just as exciting. Current projects include ongoing demolition requests, researching the viability of a Neighborhood Heritage District, seeking funds to restart the restoration at Old Town Hall, and making plans for Light Up the Village 2023.

There has been an increased interest in preserving the areas of the village as well as those areas that abut the district. Tony LaCasse, commission chair, has read through several studies dating back to 2003 that interviewed townspeople to determine how best to preserve the village. In those studies he found that historically the town has sought a variety of ways to protect the character and charm.

In 2008, the New Hampshire Division of Historical Resources created a handbook that provides the framework to create a district of protected areas that are much more flexible than traditional neighborhood conservation districts. Mr. LaCasse will continue his research efforts and gauge interest with property owners in the village area.

Additionally, the group hosted a weekly book club at the library to discuss "Hooksett Historical Sketches" by Charles R. Hardy. The book was published in 1969 by Mr. Hardy who served as town clerk for Hooksett from March 1929 to March 1966. It is truly incredible to see the stories that he pulled together without the internet! If you don't have a copy, this is definitely one you don't want to miss. Pick up your own for \$20 at the Hooksett Public Library.

Did you know that Part Two is currently being written? Several members of the Heritage Commission are actively compiling stories, or "sketches" as Mr. Hardy referred to them. # HOOKSETT'S HISTORY AND A NEW BUSINESS COLLIDE



The Robie's Country Store at 9 Riverside Street is now open 7:00AM-6:00PM for all your farm fresh needs as well as serving Breakfast and Lunch 7:00AM-2:00PM, Closed Sunday's.

Visit Robie's Country Store and step back in time to Hooksett's history while enjoying farm to table food.

"Since 1822 a general merchandise market has operated at the present site of Robie's Country Store on Riverside Street. What stories the property could tell. Just consider what it has experienced. In its early years, the store was part of a thriving social and business community in the village area. Guests of a nearby inn probably sampled its wares. It heard horse-drawn carriages rumbling through the adjacent wooden covered bridge. It saw the building of our town hall and our first library. It was witness to river traffic, the Isle of Hooksett canal system, and the advent of the railroad that carried passengers and freight to and from the Hooksett Village Depot just across the road. From 1887-1997 it was run by a member of the Robie family. Four generations, 110 years – quite a legacy!" - robieshistoricpreservation.wordpress.com.

It is necessary for each person to bring their insurance card to the clinic. For individuals who are uninsured or underinsured, Granite VNA will provide the vaccine at no charge.
