• 126 acres of conservation land, 3,900 feet of river



Brick Kiln Historic Trail Loop

- Trail loop completed in 2022
- Three raised boardwalks over wetlands
- One foot bridge
- Named for brick industry that took place on the property for 100 years (1830s to 1930s)

Pinnacle Park






- 34 acres with nearly 1-1/2 miles of trail and scenic overlooks
- Trail loop completed back to parking area in 2021

Clay Pond Headwaters Conservation Area


Turn north from Route 27 onto Chester Turnpike, kiosk at end of Class 5 Road

Clay Pond Headwaters



- Trail network connects to Bear Brook State Park
- Skill levels range from easy to moderate
- More than 750 acres of conservation land

Head's Pond Conservation Area


Route 3 and Post Road, Parking and Trailhead

Head's Pond Trail

- Trail approximately 1-3/4 miles, out and back
- Flat terrain, all skill levels
- Dogs and bikes allowed
- Trail maintained by the Hooksett Kiwanis




Head's Pond Conservation Area

Highest Conservation Area in Hooksett, off Quimby Mountain Road

Quimby Mountain

- Long-term planning for a parking area and trails
- Approximately 80 acres of upland adjacent to the highest point in Hooksett (900 feet in elevation)






What is the Hooksett Conservation Commission?

- Meetings: 2nd Monday of every month at Town Hall, 4:30 _{PM}


