## Kandiyohi County Jail Annual Report 2016

The current Kandiyohi County Jail was occupied in January of 2001 with an indirect/direct supervision construction and consists of 190 beds. The jail is divided into two separate "pods". Delta Pod is divided into two housing units with one housing 32 minimum security inmates and the other unit housing 54 medium security inmates. Charlie Pod is divided into seven units with one housing eight male inmates and six units housing 16 (male or female) inmates.

The Kandiyohi County Jail utilizes the Department of Corrections 2911 Rules to ensure that the jail is meeting all requirements. In the last 15 years, the jail has not received less than 90% on the DOC yearly inspections. Since the new jail opened, we have received 99% or above in all categories of the inspection.

The Kandiyohi County Jail has 48 full-time employees:

### **NOTABLE FACTS FOR 2016:**

Since 2001, we have assisted many other counties and/or government agencies with boarding their inmates for various reasons. In 2016, we boarded inmates from seventeen other counties/agencies. Our average daily population was 124 inmates, of which 54 were boarders. Total days boarded for 2016 was 19,410 days, generating \$1.1 million in revenue.

In 2016, the jail/courthouse booked and processed 2,258 individuals. Of those bookings, 1,730 were male and 528 were female. We also processed 24 juveniles at our booking station located at the court house.

The jail contract with A'viand's Food Service to administer dietary needs to jail inmates and is capable of preparing and serving up to a thousand meals per day. The Kandiyohi County Jail utilizes video visitation for jail inmate visits. Inmates are allowed one 30-minute visit per day, every day of the week.

Revenue Recapture is utilized to reclaim some of the inmate medical and dental expenses and in 2016 we recovered approximately \$4,885. This figure includes our medical canteen recapture.

Kandiyohi County inmates are required to pay a \$15 booking fee. In 2016 the jail collected \$13,654 in booking fees. Unpaid accounts are either submitted to our collection agency or submitted to Revenue Recapture.

Kandiyohi County charges convicted inmates \$20 per day for a Pay-for-Stay fee. If an inmate pays this fee within seven days of being released, they receive a 20% discount and only pay \$16 per day. We also collect \$16 per day from inmates that are granted work release. In 2016 the jail collected approximately \$57,503 in Pay-for-Stay and work release fees. This includes what has been paid directly to the jail and paid by the collection agency.

The jail provides public fingerprinting for a \$10 fee. In 2016, our staff fingerprinted 452 people and collected \$4,520 for this service.

The Electronic Home Monitoring Department had 175 clients during 2016. 17 of which were juveniles, compared to 150 clients with 15 juveniles in 2015.

The jail contracts with the canteen company Turnkey Corrections. Employees with Turnkey are responsible for all vending machines and canteen products for the inmates. Family members are able to put money on an inmate's canteen account by mail, online, or in person through a kiosk in our jail lobby. The jail receives a percentage of the commission on the canteen items sold. Family members are also capable of purchasing telephone cards and hygiene products online. The amount of commission our jail received in 2016 was \$109,117 which includes totals from Turnkey Corrections and Reliance Telephone Company.

In 2016, the Kandiyohi County Jail received a grant in the amount of \$4,439 from the Department of Justice. The 2016 State Criminal Alien Assistance Program is a monetary award to local governments to compensate for the cost of jailing illegal aliens. The 2015 grant was \$14,388.

The total revenue generated by the Jail for 2016 was \$1.4 million.

### **TRAINING**

The Kandiyohi County Jail has correctional officers certified as instructors in the following areas:

Most of the training officers in our facility are certified to teach multiple courses. Utilizing our own officers as instructors decreases the cost of training for the jail and increases camaraderie between the officers.

The MN Department of Corrections (DOC) requires that Correctional Officers receive a minimum of 16 hours of training per year. In 2016, correctional officers averaged 29.63 hours of training. In addition, the average number of hours per the four Correctional Sergeants was 38.46.

### **PROGRAMS & RECREATION**

In 2016, the Kandiyohi County Jail Program Department consisted of three staff members that work to encourage inmate participation in jail programs on a daily basis. Inmates are encouraged to take a self-motivating role in bettering themselves upon release from jail. Program staff can offer numerous programs for inmates but it is ultimately the inmate's responsibility to be prepared and ready for class when staff arrives to escort them to programs. The Program Department prides itself on utilizing local agencies to participate in providing supportive, informational and educational classes to inmates as well as program staff sharing their own talents with the inmates. This is a cost saving approach that is a win-win situation for the county, agencies, staff and inmates alike.

Inmates also have the ability to receive information on applying for a birth certificate, social security card as well as detailed personalized requirements of what

they will need to obtain a valid driver's license. Jail inmates can also be connected with contact information to the following community based programs such as the Women's Shelter House, Heartland Community Action Agency as well as the Sexual Assault & Violence Center.

While in custody, inmates have the opportunity to learn how to use a loom to make knit scarves, knit hats and blankets, as well as sweater mittens. At times, we place a holiday tree in the lobby of the jail with a sign posted "Kandiyohi County Jail Inmate Giving Tree" ~ Handcrafted by our inmates, the items on this tree are free and available to families/visitors of inmates of the Kandiyohi County Jail. In previous years, inmates have made such items as tie blankets, lap blankets, afghans and knitted hats. In 2016, we donated 4 blankets, 30 scarves and 30 hats to organizations such as the Women's Shelter, Hope Pregnancy Center and the Kandiyohi County Boys & Girls Group homes. Inmates take great pride in knowing that the work they are doing is being appreciated in the community.

Occasionally we have the opportunity for a guest speaker to meet with the inmates. In 2014, we were fortunate to have Sheila Ray Charles. She is the daughter of the legendary Ray Charles. Sheila delivered a heart wrenching story of abuse, crack cocaine and prison through her music and a story of her personal journey to salvation. Inmates were touched and inspired hearing her story and felt a connection to the singer. In 2016, Cody James Ministries came to the Kandiyohi County Jail and brought the gospel message with the combination of original music and the personal testimony of Cody James and his 25 year battle of addiction.

Education classes are provided through Willmar Public Schools / Adult Basic Education. We have one instructor that works approximately 12 hours, three days a week. Students are required to pass five subject tests in order to obtain their GED. A number of students begin the first steps to obtaining their GED while in jail by continually practicing on the subject. For many students, this is a huge accomplishment as it is just one step closer to accomplishing their goal and meeting the conditions of their court order. Students that attended studied basic math, reading, writing, English, nutrition & family relationships, job search skills, keyboarding, life skills, computer skills and career & college exploration.

In order to encourage inmate participation we conduct surveys that allow inmates to critique the programs that are currently being provided for them. The Program Department also uses this as a tool to review current programs and to make any necessary changes in either adding or canceling certain programs. Inmate responsibility is the key ingredient to attendance in jail programs and all jail programs are behavior based, i.e. negative behavior in the housing unit disqualifies inmates for programs.

Inmates have the opportunity to exercise a minimum of seven hours a week in either of our two gyms. Multiple cameras ensure safety and security in the gyms as well as proper use of equipment. The recreation department also works in conjunction with the jail medical staff to ensure that any restrictions or doctor ordered rehab for the inmates is adhered to. The recreation department implements programs and different forms of exercise for inmates to relieve stress and tension.

In the D pod gym, inmates have the opportunity to use a Pec Deck, treadmill, table tennis, a multi-fit station, weight station and an exercise bike. In the C pod gym, inmates play basketball, horse, 21, speed, volleyball, handball, doubles handball, or they can walk or run. The inmates can also have access to TV and workout DVDs.

A bulletin board in the D pod gym contains information on diet and exercise, sports related news, and important announcements.

### **VOLUNTEERS**

The Kandiyohi County Jail has utilized volunteers for decades, but since the expansion of the jail in 2001, there was never as high of a need, nor as many volunteers as we have now. As a community, we are fortunate to have so many citizens volunteer their time and talent to the county jail.

We currently have 44 volunteers at the jail and of those, 35 are very active. Their combined hours of service for 2016 totaled 1,628.75 hours. The average for those 35 was 46.50 per person.

Volunteering is a great way to contribute to the community and gain experience, yet it also fosters personal growth. We have not heard one person say, "I'm only a volunteer." There is a high level of respect and pride for our volunteers at the jail. Their service and longevity attests to their sense of respect and pride for what they do for the inmates. The community and jail both benefit by having a safer and more secure jail. It benefits the inmates to have something to do, someone to talk to, to listen to them, to advise them or just to be there for them when no one else is.

You cannot put a price tag on their efforts because often times the payoff for their work with the inmates may be long term. The benefit the staff and community receive, as a result, is invaluable. The programs department continues to make the promise of new programs and new volunteers as long as the Kandiyohi County Jail stays in service.

### **TRANSPORT DIVISION**

The Transport Division consists of eight correctional officers and is supervised by the jail lieutenant. When not on transports these officers are used to assist with inmate management and also provide shift coverage. One of the correctional officer's main duties is working with our medical department but is also available for transport if needed. The transport officers' responsibilities include transporting prisoners to court, medical and dental appointments, and court ordered placements. We transport from the Community Behavioral Health Hospitals, Rice Hospital, and Prairie Lakes Youth Programs to court and many other various places. Many hours of the Transport Division are centered on transporting incarcerated prisoners to and from state facilities. The Transport Division also assists the Sheriff's Office with warrant pick-ups.

The Transport Division maintains a fleet of four squad cars, two minivans, and one full-size 13-passenger van. Two of the vans are divided with partitions so we are able to transport both male and female inmates together without them having any

physical contact with each other. This saves both on transport vehicles and transport officers.

In 2016, the Transport Division transported 2,062 inmates, which consist of 1,558 male prisoners, 411 female prisoners and 93 juvenile offenders. Of those offenders transported, 84 were boarded inmates and agency assist transports. We have logged approximately 57,059 miles, an average of 4,914 miles per month. Transport mileage increased by 1,904 miles from the previous year with 121 more inmates. By transporting inmates to prison, transporting boarded inmates to appointments and assisting other agencies, we generated revenue totaling \$9,922 in 2016.

### **COURT SECURITY**

Kandiyohi County (8<sup>th</sup> Judicial District) has three chambered judges that work solely out of the Kandiyohi County Courthouse. The courtrooms are also utilized by visiting judges from other counties. These judges oversee Kandiyohi County cases.

The Court Security Division consists of one full-time armed licensed Kandiyohi County Sheriff Deputy and two full time correctional officers. The deputy is responsible for safety and security of the Court House, assisting at the front desk where the public passes through the metal detector, serving papers and serving warrants. He/she is also responsible for monitoring the 4 court rooms, building hallways and parking lots.

The correctional officers are also responsible for assisting at the Courthouse public lobby in which the public must pass through the metal detector before entering the courthouse. They also do fingerprinting for summons, first appearances, traffic court and juveniles on felony charges as well as taking DNA if need be. If there is a jury trial scheduled, additional correctional officers are called in to supervise the jury and provide security in the courtroom.

### **JAIL SECURITY**

The correctional staff is in charge of the inmates 24 hours a day. They receive and book them into the jail upon their arrival and search, shower, and give them the proper jail clothing to change into. They inventory all of the inmates' belongings. Any money the inmate comes in with is put onto Turnkey Commissary system so the inmates can make authorized purchases within the jail. This system is also utilized for booking and medical charges and payments toward Huber, electronic home monitoring and pay for stay. Booking officers also perform a health assessment of each inmate and make any necessary medical referrals. All medical assessments are given to the medical unit for further assessments.

Inmates are then assigned a housing unit where they are held until released. These housing units are staffed 24 hours a day by correctional officers who help coordinate all activities of each inmate in that particular housing unit. These activities include, but are not limited to, cleaning, delivering inmate meals, escorts to visiting, meetings with lawyers or probation, attending classes and program activities that go on throughout the day.

During the daytime hours inmates are expected to get up and eat breakfast, clean their rooms, and take their turn on the clean-up crew to service the communal living area. Inmates are encouraged to attend recreation and activities through programs. Smoking is prohibited in the jail by staff and inmates alike, as our county is tobacco free.

All activities that go on in the jail are monitored by our Central Control, which is staffed by correctional officers. They monitor cameras and have control of all secured doors in the facility. All entrances into the jail facility have a sally port and have an interlocking door system.

### **JAIL MEDICAL UNIT**

The Kandiyohi County Jail Medical Unit has contracted jail medical services through MEND Correctional Care. MEND provides two full time nurses Monday through Friday and one nurse for four hours on each Saturday and Sunday. Correctional nurses provide nursing services to all inmates that are held in the jail. MEND also have Health Techs that do all med passes to the inmates, something that used to be done by the officers. MEND has a medical provider that comes in two days a week and a mental health provider that comes in one day a week. With the addition of the Health Techs we have someone in medical most days of the week from 6:00 am to 10:00 pm, before it was 7:00 am to 3:30 pm, Monday through Friday. MEND also provides a 24 hour on-call nurse and provider, which was something we did not have with Public Health.

In 2016, the correctional health nurses conducted 7,389 in-house nursing visits for 2,112 inmates. There were a total of 1,459 clinic visits conducted on-site by the jail providers (Nurse Practitioner, MD and Psychologist). Because of the increased medical needs of the inmates there were only 96 outside referral medical appointments which involved transporting inmates outside of the jail to other appointments including dental and medical providers in the St Cloud area and Twin Cities metro area. With MEND, we saw a large decrease in the number of inmates referred to outside medical appointments.

Correctional health nursing staff provided the following services for inmates:

- Health assessments
- Mantoux (Tuberculosis) testing
- Sick call (seen the inmates upon request for an medical issue)
- Medical, mental and dental referrals
- First aid
- Preventive health services and health promotion
- Set up, reorder and supervision of inmate medication delivery

The correctional health nursing staff also provide:

- Training/ education for the medical component of the annual training for the

Jail staff

- Annual Mantoux (Tuberculosis) testing for Sheriff's Office employees.

The Kandiyohi County Jail has and will stay true to our mission of providing a safe and secure detention facility for offenders; following all laws and standards.



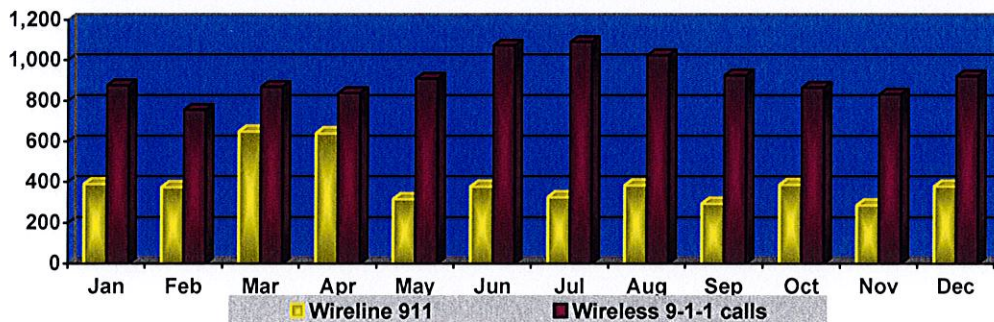
## The Kandiyohi County Sheriff Office Communications Center 2016 Annual Report

The Kandiyohi County Sheriff's Office has 16 full time employees in the Communications Center. For 2016 the Communications Center completed 50,066 Initial Complaint Reports, for Kandiyohi County and Big Stone County, which averages to over 135 incident reports per day. We handle communications for all emergency services in Kandiyohi County, including 11 Fire Departments, 6 Ambulance Services, 6 First Responder Agencies, the Kandiyohi County Rescue Squad, the Atwater Police, Willmar Police, and the Kandiyohi County Sheriff's Office.

We also provide 24/7 9-1-1 dispatch services for the Big Stone County Sheriff's Office. Big Stone County has a total of 7 fire departments, 3 ambulance services, and 2 first responder agencies. This is in addition to the Ortonville Police Department and Big Stone City South Dakota Police Department. Presently, we handle Big Stone's non-emergency admin lines between 5:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. on weekdays and 10 hours each weekend day.

The chart below shows 2016 monthly telephone comparisons between traditional wired phone calls to 9-1-1- and wireless phone calls to 9-1-1, in Kandiyohi County.

\*This total accounts for 9-1-1 calls made to the Kandiyohi County Sheriff's Communication Center. Not all of these calls required an Initial Compliant Report. It also does not take into account the number of administrative calls handled by the Communications Center. The estimated number of calls (both 911 and administrative) the Communications Center handled for 2016 was 86,915. Our peak month for 911 and administrative calls was August with approximately 8,900 calls coming into the Communications Center.

This year we also continued to educate the public on dialing 911 and what information is needed by the Dispatcher. Our communications bus was set up at Home Depot for their Safety Day, as well as Willmar Ambulance Emergency Medical Services week open house. We also set up our bus at the Willmar Fire Station for their open house. We continue to use our 911 telephone simulator to help teach kids how to properly use 911 and stress the importance of knowing their address, phone number, and parents' names.

## **KANDIYOHI COUNTY WATER PATROL 2016**

There were 18 deputies trained and available to work water safety 2016. One deputy is primarily assigned to these duties over the summer months while the others perform these duties in addition to their regular duties.

The Kandiyohi County Sheriff's Office uses a 19-foot Alumacraft, two 17-foot Lund's and a 18' Smoker Craft for patrol. We also have a rescue boat used for search, recovery and dive operations.

In 2016, Kandiyohi County received a \$14,593 grant from the State of Minnesota to supplement our expenses for water safety. We also received a \$5,125.00 Federal grant which was used to help fund extra enforcement hours during the summer months.

The Kandiyohi County Sheriff's Office continues to supervise county lifeguards. These lifeguards work at two of our county parks, Salisbury Beach and Games Lake. Both of these beaches become very popular during the summer, especially over the 4th of July.

## **Kandiyohi County Snowmobile Safety Patrol 2016 Season**

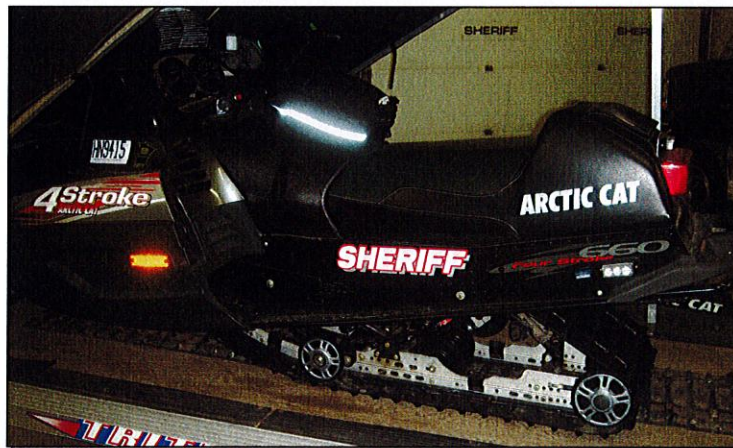

## **SWAT**

### **2016 Annual Report**

#### **KANDIYOHI COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE**

The following report is a summary of the 2016 activity for the Kandiyohi County Sheriff's Office specialized tactical unit or SWAT.

The team is currently made up of twelve (13) members of the Sheriff's Office. All members are fulltime licensed deputies. In 2016, we added two members to the team, one to replace a member that resigned and the other for an opening that had existed for some time. Both new members attended a 5 day basic course held at Camp Ripley, near Little Falls, MN.

The tactical unit was consulted for 3 incidents and responded three (3) additional tactical call outs for the calendar year of 2016. The breakdown of the events is as follows:

Narcotics related search warrant execution with C-VI Drug and Gang Task Force on the 14100 block of 1<sup>st</sup> Avenue E, Atwater, MN. The incident details are:

- Incident occurred on October 13, 2016 (KCSO Case # 16014811)
- Location is a rural farm site with a large amount of scrap metal
- Location was believed to have booby traps
- Location has a locked gate at entrance
- Information was that there may be firearms present
- Search warrant executed and subjects taken into custody

Search warrant looking for suspect in a violent assault at his residence on the 100 block of Lake Avenue South, Spicer, MN. The incident details are:

- Incident also occurred on October 13, 2016 (KCSO Case # 16014817)
- Location was in the city of Spicer
- Subject of warrant has a violent history and is confrontational to law enforcement
- A surveillance system was in place at the site
- Subject has access to weapons
- Search warrant executed and no one was found in the residence

Narcotics related search warrant execution with C-VI Drug and Gang Task Force on the 14100 block of 1st Avenue E, Atwater, MN. The incident details are:

- Incident occurred on December 1, 2016 (KCSO Case # 16017258)
- Same location where warrant was executed on October 13, 2016
- Same suspects as prior warrant execution

- Still believed subjects had access to firearms
- Warrant executed and subjects again taken into custody

SWAT unit members attended nine (9) training sessions throughout the calendar year in addition to the Upper Midwest Special Operations Team Association Conference which was attended by four SWAT members. Besides the scheduled sessions, each officer dedicates numerous hours over and above that required of them thru additional training and maintenance on SWAT equipment.

Each member has to meet physical fitness requirements and tactical firearms proficiency yearly with each weapon that SWAT has in its program. Each member of the unit is required to pass each training session and all firearms qualifiers to remain on the tactical team.

SWAT training sessions cover a wide range of skill sets, including multiple weapon proficiency, hand-to-hand tactics, and building entry and search techniques. The KCSO SWAT team utilizes a variety of training locations, including abandoned residences, vacant businesses, and several ranges. During the 2016 training sessions, KCSO SWAT members trained alongside the Willmar Police SWAT at several sites in Kandiyohi. During these trainings, entry tactics, open area clearing, and threshold assessments were worked on. Several scenarios were completed covering various lifelike callouts.

KCSO SWAT also took possession of the MRAP Navistar Maxxpro vehicle in June, 2016. This was an armored personnel carrier from the military reutilization program. The vehicle arrived inoperable, and members donated numerous hours to the initial stages of getting it running, as well as replacing damaged windshields, removing old military communication cables, seats, etc.

SWAT members, when not training or participating on a tactical event; perform regular duties as law enforcement officers with our agency. Each member carries their tactical equipment in their assigned vehicle, and can respond directly to an incident with all their gear, if necessary. The skills each member gains during tactical training are brought with them into their regular duty work.

The tactical team members and I would like to thank Sheriff Hartog and Chief Deputy Stehn, the Kandiyohi County Board of Commissioners, and the Citizens of Kandiyohi County for their continued support.

Each member of the tactical team is proud to serve and protect the citizens of Kandiyohi County.

STAT was organized under the Kandiyohi County Sheriff Office in 1994 in order to assist the Kandiyohi County Sheriff Office and Willmar Police Department tactical teams. The primary mission of STAT is to provide medical support for any injured or ill hostages, bystanders, officers or suspects and to work as a liaison between the tactical teams and the Emergency Medical Service (EMS) providers during a tactical event. STAT is directed by the Tactical Commander of the Kandiyohi County Sheriff SWAT team, which is Detective Sgt. Kent Bauman, and STAT works within the scope of Medical Direction through Rice Memorial Hospital in Willmar. All training and call-out hours are voluntary without monetary compensation to the team members.

STAT continues to thank and acknowledge the assistance and support of the Kandiyohi County Sheriff Office, the Willmar Police Department, the tactical officers, and all of the other emergency medical care providers including Rice Memorial Hospital in Willmar. STAT is able to provide the volunteer members with the necessary training and equipment to successfully fulfill their mission through the continued support and training of these agencies and personnel.

# **Kandiyohi County Sheriff's Office**

## **Dive Team Report**

### **2016**

The Kandiyohi County Sheriff's Dive Team provides the Sheriff with underwater search and recovery ability of evidence, drowning victims, and potential water hazards. The following is an overview of the dive team's certification level, training, and activity for 2016.

In 2016 the dive team consisted of four deputies:

- Rob Twedt (team leader)
- Joe Delzer
- Robert Braness
- Tim Fischer

Each deputy had attained a certification level of "Rescue Diver" through the Professional Association of Diving Instructors (PADI). Furthermore, each member had attained specialties from PADI in deep water diving, underwater navigation, night diving, ice diving, and dry suit operation.

The dive team conducted training exercises on 3/29/16, 5/12/16, and 9/1/16. Throughout 2016's three training dates, the dive team conducted an ice dive, completed various deep dives and worked on a variety of underwater search techniques often involving a placed mannequin or object.

The Sheriff's Office Dive team assisted with the recovery of two juvenile males, which drowned in Foot Lake on July 2016.

## CEE-VI Drug and Gang Task Force Statistics 2016

The CEE-VI Drug and Gang Task Force presents the following statistical information for the year of 2016 for your information and review. CEE stands for “Cooperative Enforcement Effort” and VI stands for the original six counties that formed the Task Force.

The CEE-VI Drug and Gang Task Force was formed in 1990 as a multi-jurisdictional law enforcement drug investigation unit. In 2006, two Gang Agents were added to the unit to investigate gang activity and to broaden the focus of the Task Force. Since 1990 the Task Force has evolved from a unit that only investigated drug activity to a unit that now investigates drug activity, gang activity and violent crimes.

The CEE-VI Task Force coverage area now consists of five counties including; Chippewa, Kandiyohi, Meeker, Yellow Medicine and Swift. This coverage area is 3,610 square miles with a total population of 97,311 people.

The CEE-VI Task Force is funded by state grant funding and by local funding through the five participating counties. The Task Force is governed by a Board of Directors consisting of County Sheriff's, Police Chiefs, the Kandiyohi County Attorney as well as an executive Board of Directors consisting of a County Commissioner or representative from each of the participating counties.

In 2016, there were five agents, a commander and an administrative assistant assigned full time to the task force. Agents were assigned to the task force from the Meeker County Sheriff's Office, Kandiyohi County Sheriff's Office, Willmar Police Department and the Yellow Medicine County Sheriff's Office. The commander and administrative assistant are assigned to the Task Force from the Kandiyohi County Sheriff's Office.

For the year of 2016, the CEE-VI Drug and Gang Task Force conducted investigations on individuals involved in the manufacture, possession, sales and distribution of illegal drugs and criminal gang activity. The Task Force also conducted and assisted local law enforcement agencies with violent crime investigations. These investigations resulted in the arrest of a total of 320 people in 2016 with the majority of the individuals arrested being Caucasian males over the age of 18.

Of the 320 arrests, 225 of the arrests were for drug crimes. The task force also arrested 95 people for violent crimes, property crimes or outstanding warrants. Also, in 2016 the task force arrested 28 documented gang members compared to 25 in 2015.

The Task Force noticed a decrease in the purchase and/or seizure of cocaine, marijuana and synthetic cannabinoids but noticed an increase in the purchase and/or seizures of khat, heroin, LSD, marijuana concentrate, methamphetamine, prescription pills and synthetic cathinones.

We purchased and/or seized approximately one half ounce of cocaine in 2016 (compared to 3.45 ounces in 2015), approximately 39.9 pounds of marijuana in 2016 (compared to 113 pounds in 2015), approximately 5 ounces of synthetic cannabinoids in 2016 (compared to 1.6

ounces in 2015), approximately 11.8 pounds of khat in 2016 (compared to none in 2015), approximately 5.3 grams of heroin in 2016 (compared to none in 2015), approximately 98 hits of LSD (compared to none in 2015), approximately 5.8 grams of marijuana concentrate (compared to none in 2015), approximately 12.47 pounds of methamphetamine (compared to 2.6 pounds in 2015), approximately 2,102.25 prescription pills (compared to 287.5 in 2015) and approximately 7.3 ounces of synthetic cathinones (compared to none in 2015).

The year 2016 showed that the sale, possession and use of methamphetamine, marijuana and prescription pills continues to be the biggest problem in our service area and individuals are arrested more frequently for these drugs than all of the other drugs combined. In 2016 our methamphetamine and prescription pill purchases and/or seizures more than quadrupled from 2015. We have also noticed a lull in gang related activity and gang related arrests in our service area compared to previous years and the three biggest gangs in our area continue to be the Latin Kings, Gangster Disciples and Sureños 13.

The CEE-VI Task Force also conducted 144 searches of residences and vehicles in 2016 (compared to 191 in 2015). This included 102 search warrants executed (compared to 91 in 2015). The Task Force also did 20 drug and gang presentations in 2016 for a total audience of 509 people. Also, in 2016 the CEE-VI Task Force seized \$40,233.00 in cash, seven vehicles and 58 firearms.

Also during the course of our investigations, we regularly remove children from homes where drug use and/or sales are occurring. In 2016 we removed 50 drug endangered children from homes (compared to 62 children in 2015).

On behalf of the CEE-VI Drug and Gang Task Force, I would like to thank everyone for supporting us and our continued efforts to combat drugs, gangs and violent crimes in our communities.

## **2016 Weight Restriction Report**

### **2016 Weight Restriction Report**

In 2016, the Kandiyohi County Sheriff's Office, with the support of Kandiyohi County Public Works Department, worked approximately 202 hours during the spring axle road restriction period.

The spring axle road restriction enforcement period was February 22<sup>nd</sup> thru April 15th. During this time period 75 vehicles were stopped, 30 were weighed and 9 were cited for being over-weight. There were 58 warnings issued for other overweight and permit violations. Deputies logged 4744 miles during the enforcement phase.

Through our education and enforcements efforts we continue to show a significant decrease in the number over-weight violations each year. The mission of the Sheriff's Office Weight Enforcement Division is to ensure compliance with weight restrictions, promote safety and to educate those individuals that operate vehicles with heavy loads with in Kandiyohi County.

**2016 FORFEITURE REPORT  
KANDIYOHI COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE**

In 2016, the Kandiyohi County Sheriff's Office initiated forfeiture proceedings 28 vehicles:

- 21 DWI's
- 4 Drug related
- 2 Designated offenses
- 1 Fleeing a Peace Officer

Of the 28 vehicles listed, 9 of them were returned to the registered owner or lien holder, 9 were forfeited (and sold) and 8 are still pending.

Money or proceeds received from the sale of forfeited property, after payment of expenses incurred by the department and payment of any valid liens, are distributed 70% to the arresting agency, the Kandiyohi County Sheriff's Office; 20% to the prosecuting agency, the Kandiyohi County Attorney's Office; and 10% to the State of Minnesota. Traffic offense forfeitures, "designated offenses", M.S. §169A.63, are disbursed 70% to the arresting agency and 30% to the prosecuting agency.

**2016 Records Report**  
**Kandiyohi County Sheriff's Office**

In 2016, the total number of Part 1 offenses were 204 offenses. The total number of Part 2 offenses were 833. There were 716 total number of offenses cleared by arrest or considered exceptionally cleared. The totals for the Kandiyohi County Sheriff's Office, for this year, counts all offenses listed per incident.

Part 1 crimes are defined as crimes of a more serious nature. These crimes consist of homicide, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, motor vehicle theft, and arson. Part 2 crimes are defined as crimes of which only arrest data is collected. These crimes consist of drug violations, driving while impaired, liquor law violations, gambling, weapon violations, and sex offenses.

The Kandiyohi County Sheriff's Records Department is required to report the number of crimes as stated in Minnesota State Statute 299C.06. The reported crimes are broken down into Part 1 and Part 2 offenses. When our agency submits these crimes to the State of Minnesota the State will only count the highest offense on the hierarchy list and score that offense. The offenses of justifiable homicide, motor vehicle theft, human trafficking and arson are the only exceptions to the hierarchy rule.

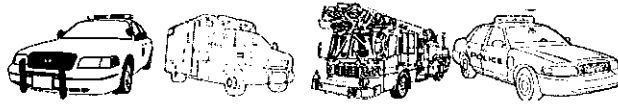

The Kandiyohi County Sheriff's Office handles all 911 calls for Big Stone County and all agencies within that county. Kandiyohi County Dispatch handles administrative calls for Big Stone agencies when their dispatch is not operating.

In 2009, the Kandiyohi County Sheriff's Office agreed to answer 911 calls for Big Stone County and administrative calls when requested by Big Stone County. There is a contract that is signed by Kandiyohi and Big Stone Counties regarding this agreement and in 2016 we received \$125,055 for dispatch services to Big Stone County.

Kandiyohi and Big Stone County Sheriff's Offices continue to show that having shared services does work efficiently.
