CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT No. 1

Proposed by 102nd General Assembly (First Regular Session) SJR No. 26

Shall the Missouri Constitution be amended to allow places where individuals, corporations, organizations, and associations provide childcare outside of the child’s home to be exempt from property tax? This is intended to make childcare more available, which would support the well-being of children, families, the workforce, and society as a whole.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT No. 4

Proposed by 101st General Assembly (Second Regular Session) SS 2 SJR No. 38

Shall the Missouri Constitution be amended to authorize laws, passed before December 31st, 2026, that increase minimum funding for a police force established by a state board of police commissioners to ensure such police force has additional resources to ser its communities?

This would authorize a law passed in 2022 increasing required funding by the City of Kansas City for police department requests from 20% of general revenue to 25%, an increase of \$38,743,646.00, though the City previously provided that level of funding voluntarily. No other state or local governmental entities estimate costs or savings.
